MUSTANGS MAKE JAYTON PLAYOFF VICTIM

WHEELER WINS QUARTERFINALS GAME PLAYED IN VERNON 29-20



Although not real impressive doing so, the Wheeler Mustangs got by the quarter final step up the state championship ladder last Friday night in Vernon as they defeated the Jayton Jaybirds 29-20.

A large, enthusiastic following of Mustangs backers saw the Mustangs build a 29-6 lead and then hold off a furious Jaybird rally in the final quarter that had the fans standing most of the final 12 minutes.

Jayton cut the Wheeler margin to nine points with 6 minutes left in the game and forced the Mustangs to punt and had a potential scoring drive stopped at

the Mustangs 17 as the clock was winding down to zero.

A short 33 yard drive put the Mustangs in front 7-0 on the last play of the first period with Marvin Grimes punching over from the 2. Mike Evans split the uprights and the Mustangs weren't to be headed although they did survive some anxious moments.

Some anxiety was evident early when the Mustangs took the opening kickoff and moved smartly to the Jaybird 14 on the running of Grimes and Dell Ford but Grimes fumbled at the 9 and when Jayton recovered, thoughts began to go back to the Ropes

game when fumbles killed the horses all night.

After recovering Grimes fumble, the Jaybirds drove to the Wheeler 33 where Bobby Guthrie pounced on Robert Segura's fumble and Wheeler drove for their first TD.

Starting from their 26, the

Mustangs quickly got their second touchdown in just five plays as Dell Ford propelled the Mustangs most of the way with a 76 yard run before he was overtaken at the Jayton 5. Bret Mosley cleared Ford with a block after Ford and found daylight to the Jaybird secondary.

Two running plays netted nothing and Guthrie passed to Myron Jolly in the back of the end zone for the six points at 6:45 of the second quarter and Wheeler upped the lead to 13-0 as Evans failed on the extra point effort.

Jayton wasn't rolling over even though down by 13 and returned the kickoff 30 yards to the Jaybird 44 and with the aid of a personal foul penalty, scored in eight plays with the six pointer coming on a 9 yard pass from

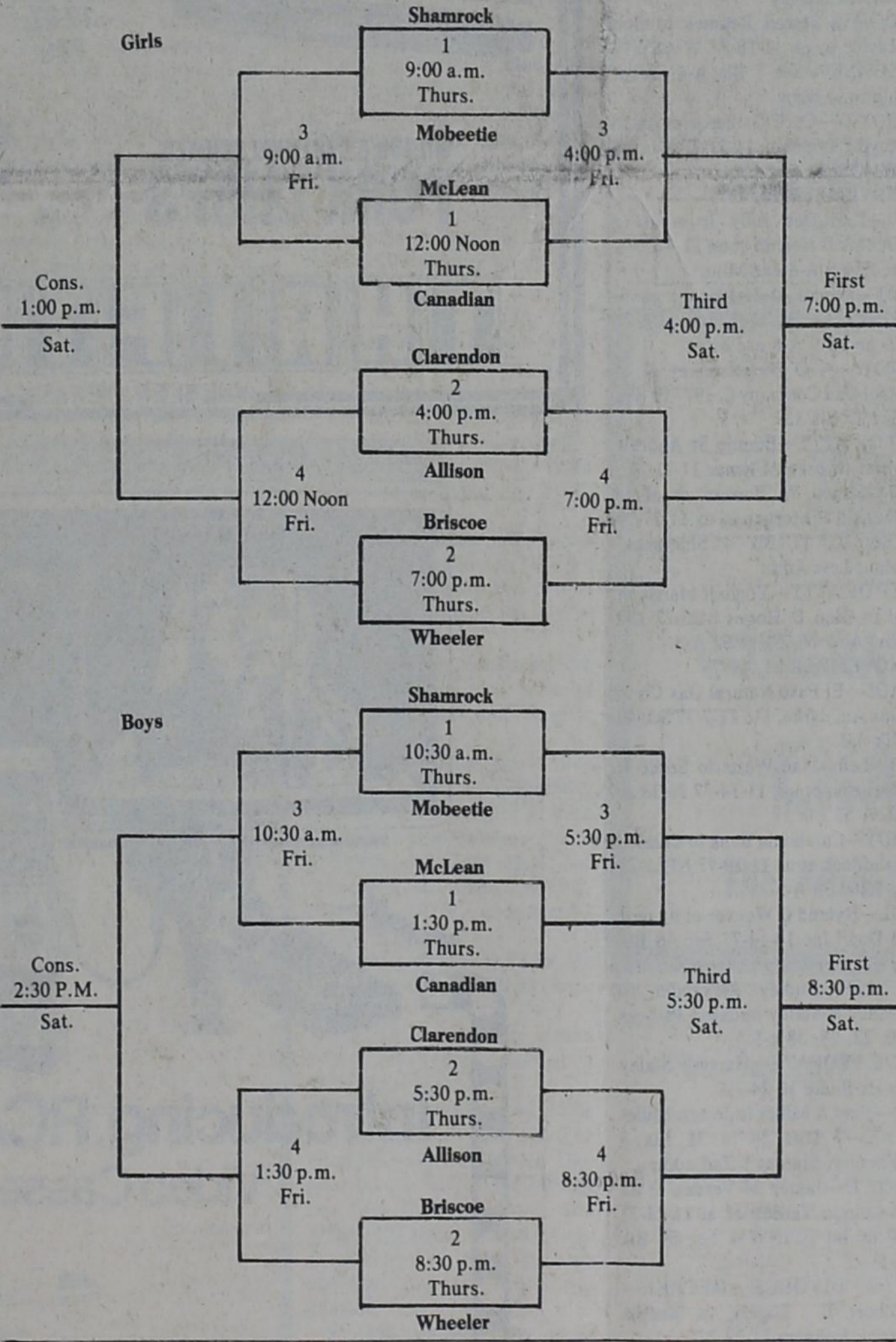
Even though the Wheeler Mustangs are in the state football playoffs, preparations for the tourney have continued smoothly and some of the best basketball to be seen in this area will take place during the three day event.

There will be two sessions of play on Thursday and Friday and one session on Saturday and admission to each session will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students and the first session Thursday gets underway with a 9 a.m. game between the Mobeetie and Shamrock girls.

Cattle Nutrition Program Subject

There will be a meeting on cow nutrition and cow-calf health problems in the Shamrock High School Auditorium Thursday, December 1st at 7:30 p.m. The meeting is being sponsored by the Livestock Sub-committee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce according to Don King, CEA.

The program will offer information to enable producers to do the most efficient job possible of getting their cows through the winter and having a good calf crop.

Dr. John McNeill, Beef Cattle Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss supplemental feeding. He will talk about using wheat and

cotton seed as supplements.

Dr. Gene Cope, Area Veterinarian for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss health programs for the cow-calf producer. This will include vaccination schedules, internal parasite control and disease problems.

There will be time for questions after each presentation.

This meeting should be very beneficial to all cow-calf producers. Make your plans now to attend and hear the latest information concerning cow-calf nutrition and health.

MUSTANGS TO FACE WINDTHORST IN BIG GAME SATURDAY AT CHILDRESS

It has all settled down to just four remaining teams in the battle for the coveted Class B state championship in football and a classic contest is in the offing Saturday night in Childress as the state's number one ranked Wheeler Mustangs and the powerful, undefeated Windthorst Trojans meet.

Many observers feel like these two teams are the best of the remaining four and the Mustangs will have their work cut out for them.

The Mustangs have been a high scoring outfit all through the '77 season and in Windthorst, the Mustangs will face a club that has been quite stingy in giving up points. The Trojans have given up just 33 points to opens to date with 13 of these points coming in playoff competition.

Wheeler has been fortunate in escaping injury throughout the regular season but that luck appears to have run out as several Mustangs have sustained injuries in the Ropes and Jayton victories but only one Mustang is considered out of the Windthorst game. Center Kevin Lasley received ligament damage to one of his ankles early in the Jayton game.

Sam Schaffer broke a bone in his left hand but will see duty Saturday night and several other Mustangs are nursing assorted bruises but injuries are forgotten when a big game like is in store Saturday night comes along.

Windthorst comes into the game with a 12-0 record and will field the quickest team the Mustangs have faced this year and one that possesses good speed both offensively and de-

fensively. The Mustangs will outweigh the Trojans on offense but when the Trojans go on defense, Greg Wolf and David Steinberger, weighing 235 and 220 respectively, man the tackle slots in the Trojans five man line and have proved to be extremely hard to run against.

Windthorst uses several sets off the wing T formation and will run also from a full house backfield and everyone of their backs is capable of going all the way with their speed.

"Windthorst has a real good ball club and one that is well coached and we will have to play our best to win but that is what the playoffs are all about," coach Preston Smith said this week.

"We are real fortunate to have good backup people for some of

Nuclear Plants Set New Energy Record

A significant milestone in the history of man's use of energy was passed this year; electricity generated by nuclear power plants in America surpassed that generated by hydroelectric plants.

The Federal Power Commission reports that nuclear plants accounted for 12 percent of all the electricity produced in the United States in the first six months of 1977. The nuclear total was 123.8 million megawatt hours (A megawatt is 1 million watts.) This exceeded hydro-generation, which totaled nearly 110.4 million megawatt hours, or 10.7 percent of the nation's electrical output.

Nuclear power is now challenging natural gas (13.2 percent) for third place fuel in electricity generation, behind oil (17.8 percent) and coal (46.1 percent).

It would indeed seem that nuclear power is vital in meeting our energy needs.

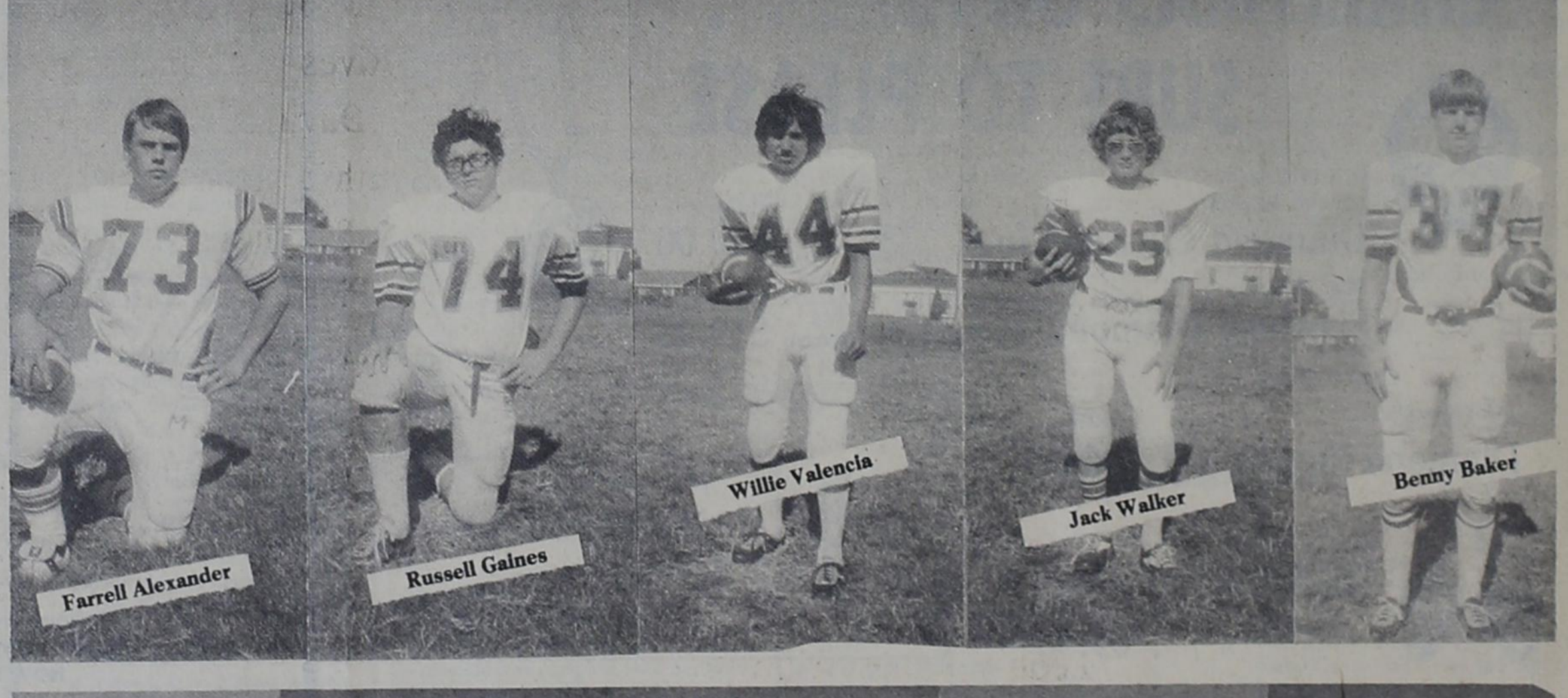
Certification for Using the M-44 in Coyote Control
Joe Van Zant, CEA, Gray County has invited interested people in Wheeler County to attend a training session for becoming certified to use the M-44 cyanide "gun". The meeting is scheduled for Thursday, December 8 at 7:00 P.M. in the Courthouse Annex at Pampa. This will be similar to the training meetings for pesticide applicator certification held earlier this year.

Any wishing to purchase or use the M-44 device or cyanide capsule will be required to show they have had this training.

Pesticide Applicator Certification
Joe Van Zant has also announced there will be a Private Pesticide Applicator Certification training meeting Tuesday, December 6 at the Courthouse Annex in Pampa. Anyone who has not received the certificate that is required for the purchase of restricted use pesticides is invited to attend this meeting. Certification can also be obtained through the self-study option. Contact me for further information.

Crop and Livestock reports needed from Farmers and Ranchers
From mid-November to Early January, many Texas famrers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. Accurate estimate have always been of great importance to producers and are even more important in light of the supply demand situation facing agriculture today. Date collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the state of Texas. Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and use only for state and county estimates.

Winterize cows for Profit
With winter approaching, stockmen can take certain steps to "winterize" their cow herd for a more efficient operation. Efficiency is increased mainly by culling unproductive cows that would otherwise consume costly supplemental feed. These steps are part of a cow herd "winterizing" Checklist:
1. Sell all cows found open in a pregnancy test.
2. Treat eyes for injury, blindness and tumors.
3. Check teeth for excessive wear and decay—both cause problems in eating and loss of weight.
4. Inspect ears for ticks and treat as needed.
5. Treat any cow showing signs of stress from internal parasites.
6. Remove all cows in poor condition since they probably will not conceive next year.
7. Watch for lameness and any other problem in structural soundness that might limit the cow's ability to forage.
8. Check udders and teats for injuries that may limit the milk when the calf does arrive.
9. Search last year's records for helath problems that may limit a cow's furture usefulness, such as retained placenta, calving difficulty or prolapsed uteri.
"Winterizing" the cow herd is just good, sound management. This saves on supplemental feed and also reduces the competition for range grasses.



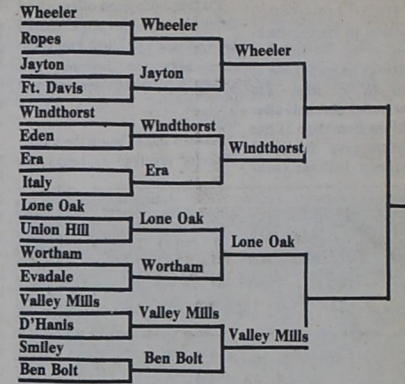
