In the 76-51 win against Samnorwood, the 5-foot-9, 175-pound senior had a hand in seven of the Cougar' scores. He completed eight of 13 passes for 240 yards, throwing touchdown passes of 45, 12, 69, 6, 36, and 52 vards. He also carried 11 times for 139 yards, scoring on runs of 5 and 21 yards. Defensively he made eight unassisted and 13 assisted tackles. He did all of this in three quarters before suffering a knee injury. "He had a heck of a game. He didn't play in the fourth quarter. He runs the ball so well we run a lot of sweeps. If the safety doesn't come up, he gets 10 to 15 yards. If he (safety) bites, he'll throw long. We've got a freshman kid (Junior Newman) that's fast enough to get open deep"-Ft. Elliott coach Curtis Smith.





Wheeler County Attorney

I have worked hard since I was elected County Attorney two years ago to earn the trust of the Wheeler County voters and to make the office of the Wheeler County Attorney a full time professional office. Because of an advertisement by my opponent in the October 5, 2000 editions of the Wheeler Times and the County Star News I am responding to several pointed innuendos and promises.

The County Attorney's Office is open every day from 8:00 a.m.. until 5:30 or 6:00 p.m. when I leave for the day. Because I am available to the public, the office and its product has grown to meet the needs of law enforcement, The Texas Department of Protective Services, The Department of Juvenile Justice, the County Officials, victims of hot check writers, domestic violence victims, and from time to time, the office assists the District Attorney's office with arraignments and pleas. Any one who says the "performance of all the duties of the County Attorney each week ordinarily required far less than forty (40) hours," is obviously not familiar with the full responsibilities of the office or plans not to devote his or her time to performing the duties of County Attorney.

The role of County Attorney has some built in conflicts of interest. The County Attorney often finds that he or she is prosecuting one family member for domestic violence assault, representing the spouse in securing a protective order and representing Children's Protective Services on behalf of the children of the above parents. The County Attorney has to remove himself or herself from two of these three cases. For that reason I do not and have not practiced family law for 10 years and have no additional conflicts.

Most importantly, conflicts between private practice and a public duty representation can arise whether or not an attorney gets paid for any service he or she provides a client-paid or unpaid. It's the representation that causes the conflict - not the fee.

My private practice for 6 years has been a part time real estate, probate, and voting rights defense practice. I have not had a conflict in regard to my private practice and public office for two years and I do not anticipate one arising because the areas of law are completely unrelated.



State-wide Crackdown **On Impaired Driving**

Austin - State officials have a stern message for Texas motorists this summer: "You drink, you drive, you go to jail." Texas is taking part in a national mobilization effort to crack down on impaired drivers and promote safe driving. Hundreds of law enforcement agencies in Texas areinvolved, including (insert name of local law enforcement agency)*.

"Texas leads the nation in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities," said Sue Bryant, TxDOT's di-rector of traffic safety. "We're here to put the public on notice that impaired driving has got to stop." In 1998, the Texas Department of

Public Safety reports there were more than 26,000 alcohol-related crashes in Texas, resulting in 1,058 fatalities and 27,058 injuries.

The statewide DWI crackdown is funded in part by a special grant from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Texas is one of only five states to receive special federal funds to reduce the number of people killed and injured in alcohol-related crashes.



Several months ago this Newspaper contained my announcement as the Republican candidate for Wheeler County Attorney. That announcement included my commitment that, if elected, I would not conduct a private law practice while serving as Wheeler County Attorney. That commitment was made because the duty owed by an attorney to a private practice client sometimes conflicts with the duty which that attorney owes to the public while serving as County Attorney. Such conflicts of interest can be prevented if the County Attorney is willing to forfeit the additional income which can be gained from conducting a private law practice while serving as County Attorney.

Such situation made it essential that I decide the use which I would make of the extra time, if elected, and that I disclose to the public the use which I would make of such extra time. In view of the fact that the public is paying for such extra time, in the form of an adequate salary, conscience dictated that, if I was elected, such extra time should be used for the benefit of the public in some manner. My solution for the use of such extra time for the benefit of the public is set forth below.

I hereby commit that, if elected Wheeler County Attorney, I will:

1. Devote whatever time is required to a diligent performance of all of the duties of that office.

2. Devote the extra time to furnishing FREE legal services to any Wheeler County resident whose economic circumstances make the employment of an attorney a financial hardship. By "free" is meant that I will not accept any compensation of any kind or nature whatsoever, and will decline any offer of future compensation of any kind or nature whatsoever, for any legal service rendered to any such person.

Performing such free legal services, while serving as County Attorney, would not give rise to conflicts of interest.

The announcement of my candidacy referred to above also included a statement to the effect that I was seeking the office of County Attorney for the purpose of doing good for the people of Wheeler County, as contrasted to doing well for myself. Every Wheeler County resident is invited to consider whether or not my commitment to render free legal services above set forth, (as contrasted to the present situation in which the extra time is being used for personal gain) supports my commitment to do good for other people.




