BARBARA HELTON FIRST WOMAN TO COMPLETE A&M EQUIPMENT SCHOOL

COLLEGE STATION—Barbara Helton, accustomed to making her own way outdoors, broke new ground in a Construction Equipment Training School at Texas A&M University. The brown-eyed brunette graduates Friday, October 21, and started work Monday, Oct. 24, for a contractor in the Texas Panhandle town of Canadian. She will crank up a crawler tractor or motor grader for Adcock and Prater Construction Co., for work one usually associates with burly, hardhatted men. "I'm not an 'inside' woman," she grins. Mrs. Helton was the first woman to train in the heavy equipment division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service, part of the Texas A&M University System. "Barbara's done extremely well," assessed division head Al Jones. As the division's groundbreaking female trainee, she attended two weeks indoor classes on grading stakes, using a transit and rod, the parts, operation and maintenance of a diesel engine, safety and Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) regulations.

Then the class went outdoors. They learned to start equipment, which myriad handles to pull and started digging holes and moving earth. Barbara and the other class members learned how to cut "V" and flat-bottom ditches and how to throw dirt all one way. On the crawler tractor, they dug basements, stockpiled earth and cut sanitation ditches and pits. "We learned how to do it," the mother of five stated. "Now it will take lots of experience to really learn how to do it well."

Mustangs Smell Title! Smash McLean 48-0

The big play Wheeler Mustangs took another step toward the District 1-B throne room last Friday night as they put down the challenge of the McLean Tigers and did it in a convincing 48-0 manner.

Holding a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter the Mustangs came up with a goal line stand reminiscent of the Groom game and stopped the Tigers on fourth down at the Wheeler 1 yard line with a fumble recovery and that

stand finished the Tigers.

McLean had driven from their own 20 in an 18 play drive and had they scored it could have kept them in the game a little longer but Sam Haynes didn't get a good handoff and bobbed the pigskin and the Mustangs swarmed around the loose ball. To really show their superiority, the Mustangs then proceeded to drive 99 yards to paydirt with fullback Dell Ford breaking for the last 32 yards off right guard.

Ford had scored the first Wheeler TD with 4:06 remaining in the first quarter on a 69 yard scamper and simply outran the pursuing Tigers after he broke into the clear at the 50. Mike Evans was a perfect 6 for

6 from placement Friday night and his kick after Ford's second scoring dash put the Mustangs on top by 14 with 4:07 to play in the half.

After their initial threat, the Tigers could get nothing started against the aroused Mustangs and could garner only 2 first downs in the last half.

A short 46 yard drive following a Tiger punt put the Mustangs up by 21 points at halftime and Marvin Grimes gained all 46 yards in five carries and went over from 1 yard out with just 48 seconds showing on the clock in the second quarter.

The Mustangs, who continue to show improvement each game, continued to roll up the points and yardage in the second half even though the lineup was sprinkled liberally with subs and scored the first four times they had their hands on the ball in the final two periods.

Duane Childress, who toted the ball only twice but gained 60 big yards, followed a clearing block by Tom Christner and sped 48 yards for the Mustangs fourth touchdown on a reverse at left end. Evans booted true at 8:11 and Wheeler led by 28-0.

Just three plays were needed for Wheeler to travel 56 yards for their next TD as the Mustangs continued to make the big plays offensively.

A 22 yard pass completion to Sam Schaffer put the ball on the Tiger 34 and then Grimes ripped off 33 more steps off left tackle before he was bounced out of bounds at the McLean 1. Grimes went up the middle for the final yard and Evans kick boosted the score to 35-0.

Childress returned a Tiger punt 7 yards to the Wheeler 32 as the third period wound down and

in just 2 plays the Mustangs were in the end zone again.

Freshman fullback Benny Baker broke at right guard for 11 and after a 15 yard holding penalty set them back to their 31, the Mustangs called on Baker once more and he responded with a 69 yard scoring burst at left guard.

Baker got the Mustangs final six pointer minutes after the fourth quarter started as he went over from 4 yards out. Wheeler chose to go for two but Tommy Calverly was stopped short to leave the Mustangs ahead by 48-0.

The big play in the short 44 yard drive was a 17 yard pass completion from Myron Jolly, who took his turn at the man under slot for several plays along with Rich Brown and Ty Henderson, to Kyle Lasley for 17 yards. Baker and Calverly moved the ball into position for Bakers short plunge.

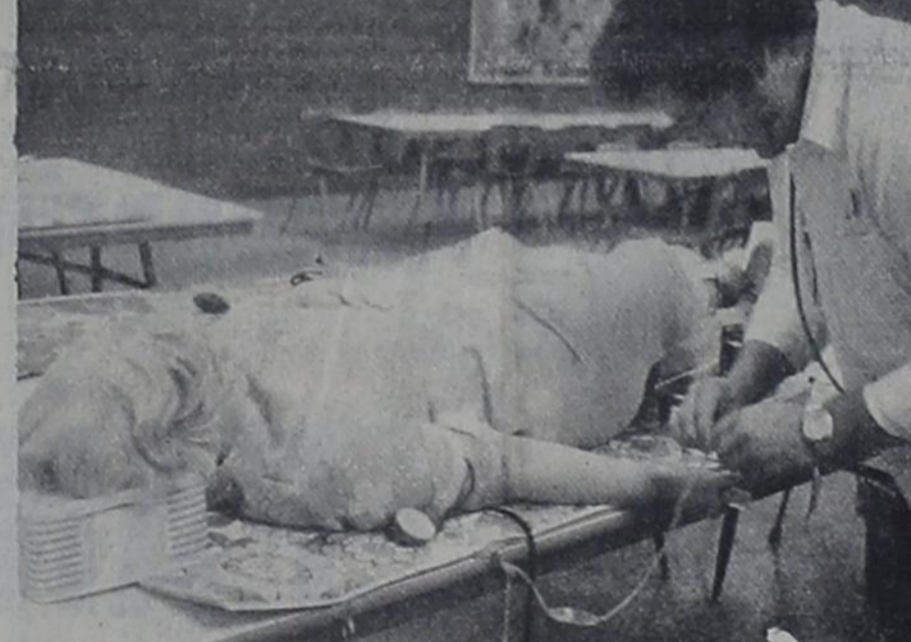
School classes, organizations and civic clubs from across the county are expected to have booths at the Fun Night. In the
