## HIGGINS COMES TOWN FOR HOMECOMING

Homecoming fanfare will prevail Friday night on Nicholson Field as the Wheeler Mustangs go after win number six and the Higgins Coyotes will furnish the opposition. The Coyotes, reportedly head-back to six-man football, will bring a squad both small in number and size but possessing the one element that can hurt any ball club, and that is speed. "Higgins doesn't have a whole lot of talent on their club but they have a couple of kids that can break the long one if you don't watch out the speed is the great equalizer in football", Coach Smith told the Mustangs Booster Club gathering Monday night.

The head mentor of the Mustangs, along with his quality coaching staff, has been stressing the fact of taking each opponent as they come and this week is no exception. Homecoming hasn't proved to be one of the Mustangs better efforts in the past but with what

the Mustangs have going for them now, maybe that bad omen will be eliminated. Injuries play a big part in a football team's success and to date the Mustangs have suffered only the normal bumps and bruises and as in the weeks before, they should be in top condition.

"Our kids like how it feels to be on top and they want to stay there and I think you will see great effort out of these Mustangs each week", Smith said this week. Kickoff for Friday's contest is set for 7:30 and one of the highlights of Homecoming will be the crowning of the Homecoming-Football Queen who is chosen by the Mustangs football squad. Higgins uses the old straight T formation on offense but will use a lot of odd sets out of the T which could pose some problems for the Mustangs defensively.

## \$400,000 BOND ELECTION SATURDAY

Voters in the Wheeler Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday to decide the fate of \$400,000 Bond Issue. The bonds are to be used for the construction of a Gymnasium, Tornado Shelter and Future Classrooms.

With the present tax structure and the increased value of mineral interests and related industry the facilities can be 'paid off' in 10 years or less with no increase in taxes. Presently \$0.25 of the total tax rate is designated for paying the bonded indebtedness of the District.

The new athletic facilities are necessary due to the extension of physical education into the lower grades. The present gymnasium would remain for use by lower grades; it is now being used during the entire day with activities "doubled up" in some instances.

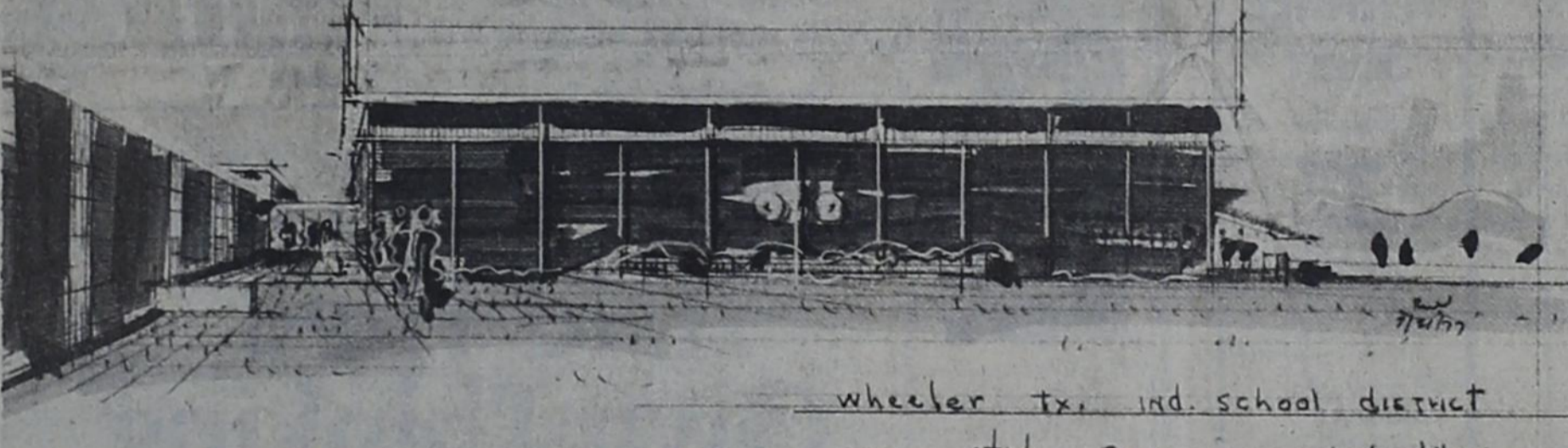
The proposed tornado shelter

would double as additional classrooms when necessary. Each year with the arrival of tornado season, our students sit in the classroom with no place for shelter if the alert should be sounded. These facilities would be available for the community

and offer shelter for patrons gathered at the school for evening activities—hardly a year passes without a storm at graduation or baccalaureate. The shelter would be a large open space with the capability of being divided into classrooms.

The proposed structure would be located to the north of the central lobby of the main building. This location would provide easy access for both high school and elementary students. The school system is in need of these facilities and the cost

involved will only continue to climb. Remember to cast your ballot Saturday, October 15. Anyone holding a current Registration Certificate and resides within the Wheeler Independent School District is eligible to vote.

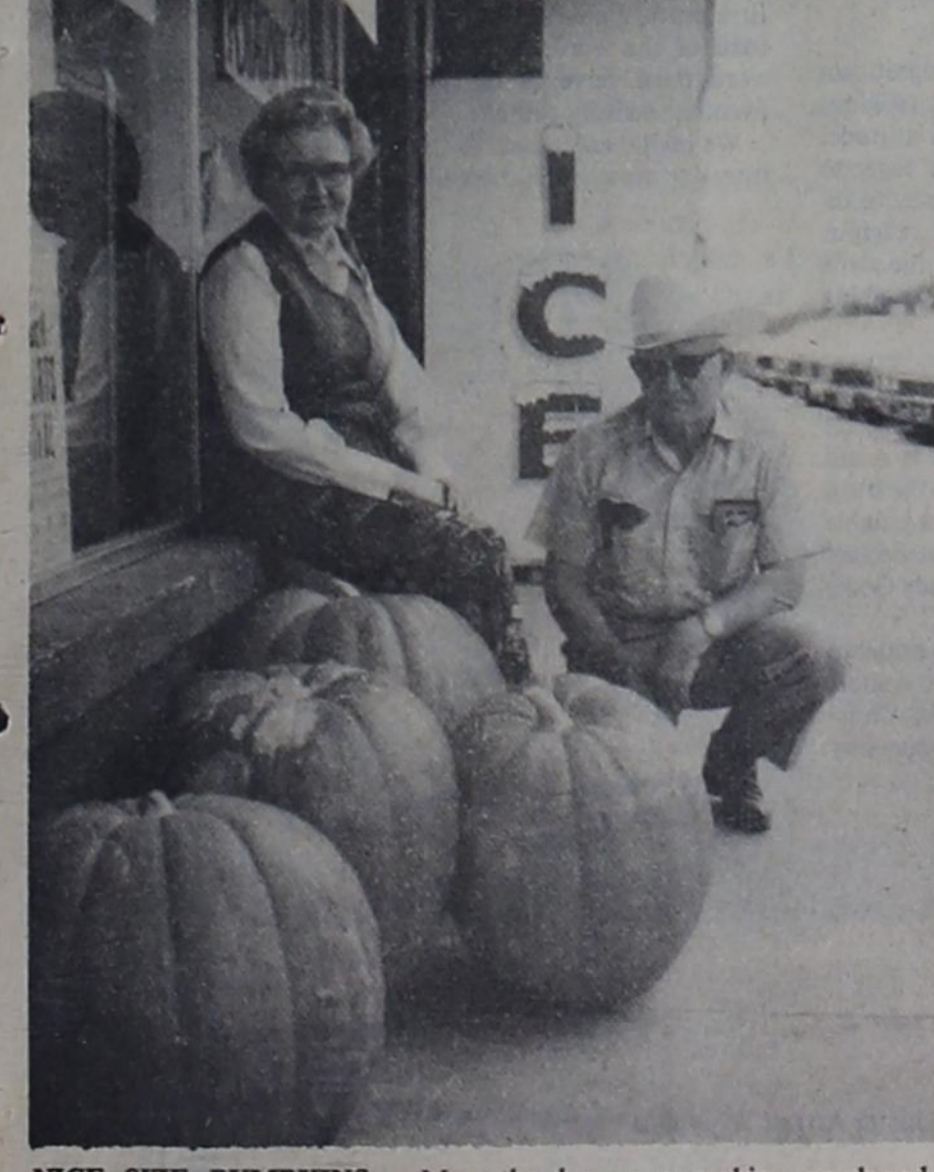

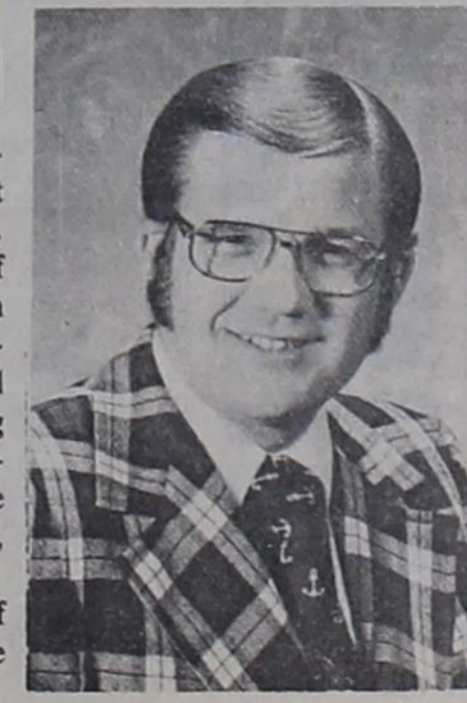

## The Bereans Did Their Own Thinking

Not many of us think for ourselves when it comes to matters in religion. We prefer to leave religious subjects and Bible issues to those supposedly trained and skilled in this field—the priests, theologians, pastors, and ministers. Sometimes we get the idea that the Bible cannot be understood by common people. Some religious leaders even teach and encourage this view.

Does the Bible say anything about the ability and the responsibility of the average person to understand its message? Most certainly it does.

The Jews of Berea, for example, are described in the New Testament as "noble." Yet, they were not famous, nor were they rich or powerful. In fact, they were somewhat obscure. The description of their nobility is recorded in Acts 17:11:

*"These were more noble than those in Thessalonica in that they received the word with all readiness of mind and searched the scriptures daily, whether these things were so."*

This reference to the Bereans is significant because it is plainly a tribute to a religious people. The Bereans were noble in attitude. They were noble because they were eager to be taught the truth—they were sincerely truth-seekers! Although ready to receive religious teaching from others, they were at the same time very careful to examine such teaching in the light of the scriptures.

Unfortunately, this attitude of the Bereans—the spirit of independent, personal investigation—does not prevail widely among religious people in the twentieth century. It is a sad commentary on our lack of love for the truth (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12). Man is in a pitiable state when he possesses neither the intellectual vitality nor the spiritual interest to study God's will for himself.

The New Testament abounds with evidence that harmonizes with the attitude of the noble Bereans. The apostle Peter insisted that Christians should know what they believe and why

they believe it, "ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15).

The apostle John places the responsibility directly upon every Christian to follow the pattern of the Bereans and prove every teaching to be sure it is from God: "because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1).

By revelation John commends very highly the favorable characteristic of the church of Ephesus of being ready at all times to check truth against error. They had "tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars..." (Revelation 2:2).

Members of churches of Christ today are simply trying to reproduce faithfully the church of our Lord as it existed in the first century—the same in doctrine, worship, name, organization, service, life and work. The Bible clearly teaches that the seed of the gospel—the word of God—will produce after its kind, pure and undenominational Christianity. The first century church was founded upon the basis of the word; it follows that the same word must serve as the blueprint for the twentieth century church.

We invite our friends to "search the scriptures" to see whether these things be so!

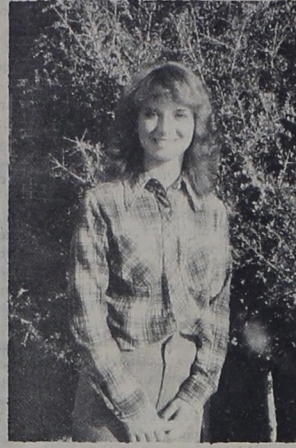

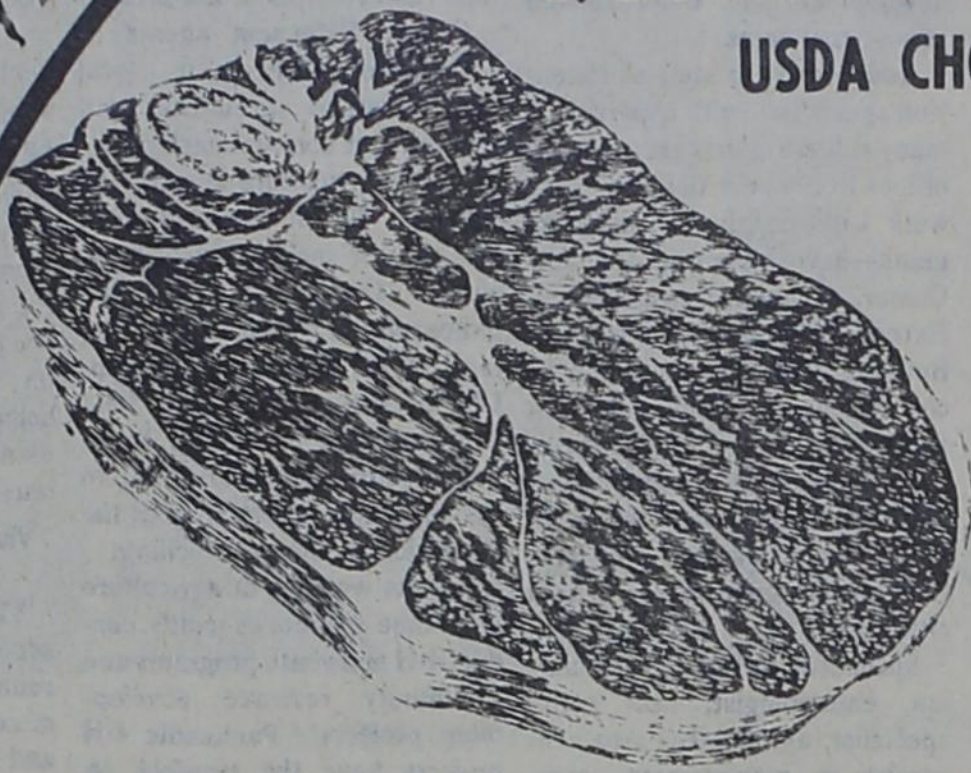
