The Bereans **Did Their** Own Thinking

Not many of us think for ourselves when it comes to matters in religion. We prefer to leave religious subjects and Bible issues to those supposedly trained and skilled in this field-the priests, theologians, pastors, and ministers. Sometimes we get the idea that the Bible cannot be understood by common people. Some religious leaders even teach and encourage this view.

Does the Bible say anything about the ability and the responsibility of the average person to understand its message? Most certainly it does.

The Jews of Berea, for example, are described in the New Testament as "noble." Yet, they were not famous, nor were they rich or powerful. In fact, they were somewhat obscure. The description of their nobility is recorded in Acts 17:11:

"These were more noble than those in Thessalonica in that they received the word with all readiness of mind and searched the scriptures daily, whether these things were so."

This reference to the Bereans is significant because it is plainly a tribute to a religious people. The Bereans were noble in attitude. They were noble because they were eager to be taught the truth-they were sincerely truthseekers! Although ready to receive religious teaching from others, they were at the same time very careful to examine such teaching in the light of the scriptures. Unfortunately, this attitude of the Bereans

-the spirit of independent, personal investigation-does not prevail widely among religious people in the twentieth century. It is a sad commentary on our lack of love for the truth (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12). Man is in a pitiable state when he possesses neither the intellectual vitality nor the spiritual interest to study God's will for himself. The New Testament abounds with evidence

that harmonizes with the attitude of the noble Bereans. The apostle Peter insisted that Christians should know what they believe and why

they believe it, "ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15).

The apostle John places the responsibility directly upon every Christian to follow the pattern of the Bereans and prove every teaching to be sure it is from God: "because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John

By revelation John commends very highly the favorable characteristic of the church of Ephesus of being ready at all times to check truth against error. They had "tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars . . ." (Revelation 2:2).

Members of churches of Christ today are simply trying to reproduce faithfully the church of our Lord as it existed in the first century-the same in doctrine, worship, name, organization, service, life and work. The Bible clearly teaches that the seed of the gospelthe word of God-will produce after its kind, pure and undenominational Christianity. The first century church was founded upon the basis of the word; it follows that the same word must serve as the blueprint for the twentieth century church.

We invite our friends to "search the scriptures" to see whether these things be so!





Insulating the Attic Homeowners can insulate their unfinished attics with a few tools, the correct amount of insulating material, strick safety precautions and several easy preparation steps.

TOOLS

lighting, temporary floring extends out far enough to cover (such as 1 x 12" boards or the top plate. plywood laid across ceiling joists), duct or masking tape (2" wide), a heavy duty staple gun and staples or a hammer and tacks, and heavy duty shears or linoleum knife to cut the insulating materials.

MATERIALS

Insulation is available in batts. blankets or loose fill-and it's important to know which ones include a vapor (Moisture; barrier or which ones need it).

Batts and blankets are made of glass fiber, rock wool, or cellulose-and loose fill is generally made of rock wool, glass fiber, and cellulosic fiber.

Batts are generally 15" or 23" wide precut in 4' or 8' lengths. Blankets 15" or 23" wide, in long rolls, can be cut by the installer. They are compressed and will expand when wrappers are removed. Loss fill comes in bags. When selecting insulation,

condider composition, fire safety, moisture resistance, odor, corrosiveness, thermal performance (or R-value), costs, and installation forms and methods.

If you choose batts and blankets, buy the width that will fit snugly within the joist spacing.

A vapor (moisture) barrier prevents most of the moisture in the house from getting into the insulation and reducing its efvectiveness. Between home laundry, cooking and bathing, about 18 gallons (68 liters) of water vapor can be produced

For un-insulated attics, select batt or blanket insulation with an attached vapor (moisture) barrier -or if you select loose fill insulation, a vapor (moisture) barrier of heavy polyethylene sheeting (4-mil or 6-mil thick) is

If the attic already has dome insulation-and you are simply adding to it, no additional vapor (moisture) barrier is necessary. However, if batt or blanket insulation with an attached vapor (moisture) barrier is all you can buy for the new job, its barrier should be slashed approximately every six to twelve inches.

The slash in the new layer of insulation prevents moisture being trapped in the first layer of insulation.

> How to Measure Material Amounts

To determine the amount of vapor barrier material and insulation material to buy, you don't even have to go into the attic. Just follow these two steps:

-Step 1. Measure the area of the first floor of your house-not counting garage, porch and other unheated areas. The first floor area will be the same as the attic

If it is a rectangle, measure length and width in feed (to the nearest foot) and multiplylenghth x width equals area.

If it is a combination, break it down into rectangles; find the area of each one; then add the areas to get the total.

-Step 2. Figure the estimated insulation area by multiplying 9 times the total attic area (90 percent of the total area). In other words; 9 x total attic area equals estimated amount of insulation material (and vapor bar-

rier material) needed.

Safety Precautions Do NOTHING until you have carefully read these safety rules: 1-Previde good lighting, 2-Lay boards or plywood sheets down over tops of joists or trusses to form a walkway-the ceiling below won't support your weight, 3-be careful of roofing nails protruding through roof sheathing, 4-If you use glass fiber or rock wool wear gloves and breathing mask, and keep the material wrapped until you are ready to put it in place, and 5-Work when temperature in attic can be tolerated

After installing temporary lighting and flooring-before insulating, check for leaks and make necessary repairs. Also, seal all places where pipes or wires penetrate the attic floor.

After collecting necessary tools and materials and following safety precautions and preparatory steps, it is a fairly simple job to insulate an unfinished attic.

Install separate vapor barrier if needed: lay polyethylene strips between joists and trusses. Staple or take in place. Seal seams

and holes with tape-seams may be overlapped 6" instead.

Adding to Existing Insulation If your attic requires a second layer of insulation, place batts or blankets at right angles to the joists (across the joists).

If the batts you are using have a vapor (moisture) barrier, either remove it or slash it to prevent moisture from being trapped between the insulation layers. Loose fill insulation can be used on top of a first layer of batts or blankets.


Variety of Center ound County Programs are Offered

County Extension agents serving the counties of the Panhandle-and the cash agricultural receipts (gross agricultural income) generated in the respective counties in 1975-follow. Total cash receipts in the 20 counties amounts \$808,678,000, points out District Agent Gross.

Wheeler County, with cash receipts of \$23,685,000, is served by County Extension Agent Joe Don King (agriculture) and Linda Horton (home economics).

FROM YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

We are very proud of our school system including the facilities and the educational programs that are presently provided. However, for some time now we have been increasingly aware of growing needs in three distinct areas. They are:

- Space and facilities for better and additional physical education classes and instructional programs
- A tornado and storm shelter for our school children during school hours as well as for the community

Space for additional classrooms as we grow and as we institute additional curricular offerings.

The purposed building to meet the stated needs will be located at the High School directly north of the 18' wide central corridor which will serve as a lobby. Thus the presently existing facilities provided along the corridor can be fully utilized.

After a long, careful study and many hours of deliberation we have developed a building program which will enable us to

The Instructional Gynmasium facilities will include a 50 foot by 90 foot wooden floor playing court with 10 foot clear space around all sides. This facility will be for the instructional physical education programs and spectator seating will be provided on each side so it can also be utilized for school and community spectator sport activities.

Of perhaps the greatest importance to our children the entire area under the gymnasium will be designed as a tornado shelter. This space will be easily accessible by two stairways. For the present, this area will only be used as a tornado shelter but as our enrollment continues to grow and as we offer additional courses it is envisioned that several classrooms can be created as needed in this area by use of partitions. These classrooms would be compatible with the storm shelter use.

There are three primary reasons for offering this program for your approval at this time.

meet all of these needs in a very economical manner.

- First, the need exists and is steadily growing. The need definitely is not going to diminish in the future for either the physical education classes, for the storm shelter or for the additional classroom
- Second, although construction costs are high at this time they can only be expected to grow in the
- Third, the increases in assessed valuation occasioned by the tremendous growth in values of oil and gas properties in the district enable us to finance the cost of these improvements with no increase in cost to the local resident taxpayer. In fact, the total tax rate has been lowered for the past three years due to the increased values of mineral interests, and in the future the tax rate to support the new debt will remain the same as that now levied. In other words, we can finance these improvements on the taxes we are now paying.

Therefore, we have called an election for October 15, 1977 for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of \$400,000 in bonds to finance the cost of the proposed facility. It is expected that the bonds will be retired in ten years or less. The excellent financial position of the school district along with the short retirement schedule will enable us to receive a very low interest rate on the issue.

We urge that you give this proposed bond issue your careful consideration and your support.
