Services for A. L. "Bodie" Cole, 59, of 3613 N.E. 11th, was held Thursday, September 29, at 10:00 a.m. in the Christ Lutheran Church with the Rev. Robert Kuhlman, minister, officiating. Burial was in Llano Cemetery by Blackburn-Shaw Memorial Chapel.

Mr. Cole died Monday, September 26, 1977. Mr. Cole was born in Pampa. "Bodie" is a 1935 graduate of Wheeler High. He worked for First National Bank in Wheeler until he entered the service in 1942.

He had lived in Amarillo since 1946. He was a retired bookkeeper and served in the U. S. Navy during World War II. He was a Charter Member and treasurer of the Christ Lutheran Church. Survivors include his widow, Ruth L.; a daughter, Janet C. Hendley of San Antonio; a brother, C. E. of Amarillo; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert E. Cole of Wheeler; and a grandson.

On the games second play, Marvin Grimes tore loose at left guard and was finally hauled in on the Tiger 38 after gaining 28 yards but misfortune hit the Mustangs in the face to kill the drive.

First, Bo Guthrie and Grimes didn't connect on a pitch and Grimes recovered on the 50

### Vandals Wreck Lights At Briscoe

Vandals wrecked about \$500 worth of safety flashing lights recently on the highway construction project north of Wheeler, according to O. V. Johnson, highway department engineer from Wellington in charge of the work.

The project is on U. S. 83 from the Hemphill County line south 4.2 miles. "We are concerned about this type of vandalism since it creates a dangerous situation for the traveling public at night," said Johnson.

The flashing lights are used to guide traffic through hazardous areas at night. "If the offenders are local they may not realize that they could be the cause of death or a serious injury to a friend or relative," Johnson added.

The detour around the railroad overpass is a critical area at night with the flashing amber lights playing a major role in leading traffic safely through winding section of road.

The case is being investigated by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department.

### Punt, Pass And Kick October 8

October 8, 1977 has been declared Punt, Pass & Kick Day by Mayor O. B. "Pete" Burton of Wheeler.

More than 110 youngsters, ages 8 through 13 years are expected to match punting, passing and place-kicking skills in local competition on that day, Mayor Burton noted. The Wheeler Punt, Pass & Kick program is sponsored by the Wheeler Coaches and Pete Burton Ford.

In his proclamation, Mayor Burton pointed out that Punt, Pass & Kick "offers youngsters an opportunity to compete in a national program which underlines the importance of physical conditioning basic to other forms of excellence."

Punt, Pass & Kick is celebrating its 17th anniversary under sponsorship of the Ford Dealers of America in cooperation with the National Football League. Participation this year is expected to top 1,300,000.

Participants in the program compete only against others of the same age. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing. There is no body contact and any youngster 8 through 13 years of age is eligible to register at a participation Ford Dealer if accompanied by his parent or guardian. No entrance fee is required.

Punt, Pass & Kick receives the enthusiastic support of athletic coaches throughout the United States. George Allen, head coach of the Washington Redskins, for example, has described the program as "the finest youth activity of its kind in the world."

The event will take place in Wheeler on Nicholson Field at 10:00 A.M., October 8, 1977.

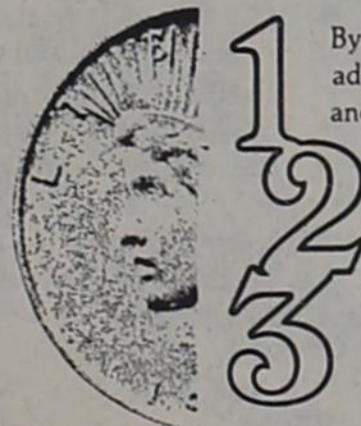

Mrs. Candler toured the Holy Land this past summer, along with her daughter, Nell Candler, and plans to continue her education.

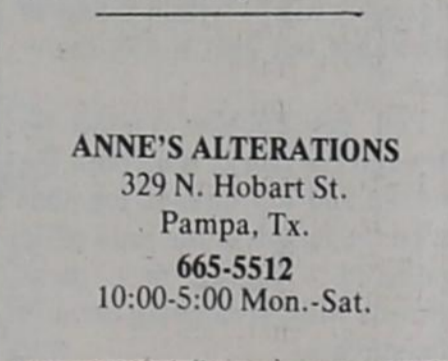

which forced the Mustangs to boot the ball away a couple of plays later from the Groom 46.

Myron Jolly shanked the kick and the Tigers had the pigskin on their own 32 after the 14 yard boot.

Neil Wieberg probed the Mustangs right side for 2 and then Kris Black hit Wieberg on a veer pass good for 40 big yards to the Wheeler 26.

Four running plays by Kent Reed put the ball on the 7 and John Krizan swept his right end on the next play for the games initial touchdown at 5:51. Wieberg touched the extra point for the Tigers lead that they held until just before halftime.

If anything, Groom's TD made the Mustangs more determined and back they came after the kickoff. Duane Childress, speedy Mustang split back, broke for 16 and Grimes followed with runs of 11 and 10 to put the ball on the Groom 28.

The Tigers stiffened and the Mustangs faced fourth and three at the Groom 9 and the Mustangs opted for the field goal try. Losing five for a delay of game penalty, Tim Patterson attempted a 32 yard try for three and the kick sailed wide to the left to leave the Mustangs pointless after two promising drives.

Groom's passing attack was 100% for the game as they had no incompletions but did have 3 of their passes picked off by the Mustangs secondary and two of them led to the Mustangs first two touchdowns that gave them a 14-7 halftime lead.

Duane Childress gathered in a tipped aerial by Mike Lee at the middle stripe and returned 12 yards to the Tiger 38 in the second quarter and there was no denying Wheeler this time.

A pickup of 7 by Childress on a reverse put the drive in motion and Grimes went all the way on the next play through a big hole opened up on the right side by the Mustangs offensive line.

Patterson's kick for the tie sailed to the right this time and Groom led by one with 7:10 remaining in the half.

Another interception at the 50, this one by Jolly, and return to the Tiger 41 with 2:09 left gave the fired up Mustangs a shot to go ahead at halftime.

Guthrie lost 6 attempting to pass on first down but made up for it in spades on the next play.

A perfectly thrown pass by Guthrie and a finger tip catch by Jolly, who never broke stride, at the 17 was another of many big plays that gave the Mustangs their win. The speedy split receiver, who had gotten behind the Tiger defender, sped into the end zone and the jubilant Mustangs had their first lead.

Calling on Grimes, the Mustangs went for the two points and great second effort by the Mustangs tailback put the Mustangs up by 14-7 and the momentum was clearly on the Mustangs side.

It took Coach Preston Smith's charges just four plays on their second possession in the third quarter to add to their lead and 70 yards were covered in the drive with Grimes getting 2 on first down.

Giving to Grimes on second down again, the Mustangs found themselves 26 yards closer to the goal at the Tiger 42.

Dell Ford, who carried the ball just 4 times but gained 37 yards, came up with another of his big plays as he broke one tackle after another from the 42 and was finally corralled at the Groom 9. Grimes went up the middle and scored standing up and Wheeler's lead rose to 13.

If fans thought Groom would quit were in for a surprise as the Tigers methodically drove from their 24 to the Mustangs 1

following the third Wheeler TD.

A 42 yard halfback pass completion from Wieberg to Jigger Britten almost put the Tigers in the end zone on the last play of the third period but Jolly hauled Britten down on the 1.

What followed broke the Tigers back. Reed hit off right guard for half a yard where Jeff Davis and Mike Lee led the charge and the Tigers smelled paydirt.

Reed was called on again but nothing was gained for his effort as a swarm of white shirted Mustangs belted him down at the line of scrimmage.

Still trying to run at the Mustangs left side, Black called his number but the ever present Davis was there along with a host of Mustangs to belt him down back on the one.

The goal-line stand was completed on fourth down as Black was surrounded on the 10 by Mustangs as he attempted a roll out pass.

If that didn't stop the Tigers, the ensuing 90 yard march to paydirt did as the Mustangs used 16 plays and most of the clock to seal the victory.

## LINES FROM LINDA

LINDA HORTON-County H.D. Agent

For fashion with comfort this fall, look for cotton. Cotton's characteristics make it ideal for

transitional weather. It breathes and feels good close to the skin. In lightweight fabrics, it is cool when the weather is hot. Layered or quilted, it's warm when the weather's cold.

A variety of cotton fabrics will be fashionable for '77. Ribless corduroy will be "it" for tops, pants, skirts, and suits.

Colors will be jewel tones, such as emerald, ruby, and garnet that "go with" earth colors—camel, sand and gray.

Sporty denim and brushed cottons will show up in all shades of indigo. Blue denim teamed with khaki will give a fresh look to fall wear.

Poplin, especially in bright colors, will turn out in rainwear, sportswear, and jackets. Quilted poplin will lend variety and color to the fall coat scene.

For elegance, day or night, velvet is back in black—in suits, pants, skirts, and jackets.

Fashion's mood is also for soft gathers.

Styles are soft blouses, dirndl skirts, ruffled trims or dresses that hang gently from the shoulder. Fabrics are feather-weight knits, challis, crepe de chine or flannel.

But gathers are the major structural detail. These tips will help make gathering easier and attractive:

For even and small folds, use a stitch that is only as long as necessary. Woven or knitted fabrics that are thick and closely constructed usually need longer stitches than do woven or knitted fabrics that are lightweight and loosely constructed.

When gathering heavy or bulky fabrics, stitch to each seamline, stop and start again on the other side of the seam. Push seam allowances to the opposite side so that the gathering stitches can be drawn separately.

Before drawing up the gathers, pin the matching notches or seamlines together. Draw the gathering threads to fit the area. Distribute the fullness evenly.

TO GATHER WITH A STRAIGHT STITCH, first slightly loosen the upper tension so bobbin thread will draw easier. Use heavy duty bobbin thread such as silk or nylon to minimize breakage.

Run two rows of stitching for better control and evenness. Stitch from the right side.

If ripped stitches leave their marks in the fabric, stitch along the seamline and again 1/4" within the seam allowance. If ripped stitches don't show, consider making each row of stitches 1/8" on each side of the seamline.

TO GATHER WITH A ZIG-ZAG, adjust the machine for medium to wide stitch width. Place fabric under pressure foot wrong side up. Take 1 stitch through the fabric so that all zigzagging will be within the seam allowance but next to the seamline.

Pull the bobbin thread up through the fabric. Pull both the bobbin and top threads together to be the length of the area to be gathered. Zigzag over these threads without catching them in the stitches.

Gather by pulling the encased threads.
