THDA Members To Attend Meet

Three members of home demonstration clubs in Wheeler County will attend the annual Texas Home Demonstration Association (THDA) conference September 20-22 in Galveston. Those attending from Wheeler County are Mrs. Porter Rogers, Briscoe H. D. Club; Mrs. Jack Winslett, Shamrock H. D. Club and Mrs. Sam Schaffer, Wheeler H. D. Club.

Among highlights of the meeting are keynote addresses, educational workshops and social events.

Education workshops during the meet will include sessions in health, safety, family life, citizenship, cultural arts and 4-H. From those workshops, members will bring background, teaching methods and actual subject matter for developing local programs in Wheeler County.

Organized home demonstration and Extension Homemakers Education (EHE) clubs now have 22,000 members in Texas. A 1973 national survey reported national membership at 600,000—to total a larger membership than any other women's organization in the United States.

According to home demonstration guidelines, members are organized to improve family and community life through the study of health, food, clothing, housing and furnishings, money management and family life.

In 1973, they shared that information with 100 million youth and 200 million adults nationwide by serving as volunteer instructors of individuals and community groups in their own counties.

In Texas they also donated time and services to 50 different projects. Most of these projects were in health and safety and community improvement along with programs for 4-H and other youth and older adults.

In addition, they contributed more than \$10,000 to improve community centers—and they provided \$8,700 in scholarship funds for youth.

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ment. Here are hints that may help to alleviate some of the stress:

Do not make going to school the topic of daily conversation. Do not let other children

frighten or tease with tales of how awful school is. Encourage the child to trust your perceptions of what school is like.

Answer all questions about school honestly.

If possible, visited the school during the summer with your child. Look over classrooms, school buildings and facilities.

Never give the impression that there is a choice about attending school. Make it clear that all children go to school.

Show that you appreciate your child's cooperation in helping with preparations to begin school.

Make transportation plans clear. If the child is to walk to

school, go along once or twice to establish the route, or arrange for your child to walk with other children in the neighborhood.

If the child is to ride a bus,

clearly identify which bus before school starts.

Do not get into the habit of seating your child in the classroom. This can lead to tears and clinging, which can start the child off on the wrong foot with the teacher and other children.

If your child does cry, rest assured that in most cases the tears will stop quickly.

Do not overly excite your child about going to school. It is not natural for children to be happy about giving up the secure atmosphere of home for the uncertainties of school.

For working mothers, if possible, make arrangements to be at home for the first day or two

when your child gets home from school.

Let your child know that during the school day you will be going about your usual first days of school.

Maintain a normal home life during the first days of school.

Be mindful that some of the child's anxieties will be associated with your own. Be calm and relaxed about the opening of school and this attitude is likely to filter down to the child.

Even with the best made plans, there is still the possibility that when the day arrives, the child will cry or be "sick". Try not to be overcome with sympathy. Standing firm from the begin-

ning will help to alleviate problems which could arise later. Be patient and reassuring to help your child feel secure about the first days of school.
