Permanent types can be cleaned according to the manufacturer's instruction. Nonpermanent types are replaced, since they are inexpensive. It is wise to check filters every 30 days. Preschoolers are sometimes left unprotected because parents wait until the child is ready for school before starting the immunization series.

Each year in the United States children die of disease they never should have contracted. Others are disabled although the means for prevention is readily access-

Check immunization records now. If you are not sure that your children are fully protected, check with your family physician or local health department.

Tetanus immunization is not only kid stuff. Adults need its propection, too.

More than half of the reported cases of tetanus occur in persons 50 or older.

Tetanus--also known as lockiaw, can often be fatal. It is caused by spores of bacteria which can enter the body through a wound. The spores are almost everywhere, but particularly in manured soil.

Because the tetanus germ cannot grow in the presence of air, deep pencture wounds or cuts are a favorable growing environment for the germ.

Once in the wound, tetanus germs secrete a toxin. This toxin is so powerful that one-fourth teaspoonful is enough to kill 100,000, people.

For children, protection against tetanus usually starts with the basic immunization series--in which the tetanus toxiod is given in combination with diptheria toxoid and pertussis vaccine--at two, four, six, and eighteen months with a booster when they start school. To continue the protection,

physicians generally recommend a booster every 10 years. Adults should consult their physician or local health department about their immunization status.

Everyone should be protected against tetanus, but it is particularly important for pregnant women and agricultural workers and adults in occupations in which tetanus-favoring injuries are frequent.

SLEEPING BAGS

Sleeping bags are on sale, but "try them on," before deciding. First consider equipment rental, if the outdoor experience is new to you. "In fact, rent more

than once,". Then judge what features to look for in a sleeping bag. The bag should be about two

inches longer and wider than your body is-clothes in full outdoor sleeping gear.

Some labels state measurements, but testing is best, so 'try it on.'

Ask to see a cross-section of the sleep bag construction. The best are "offset sewn"; that is, the quilting stitching on the outer shell is not directly above the stitching on the inner shell. "Quilt-through" constructionin which outer and inner shell are stitched together-allows more heat loss than "offset sewn" construction.

About zippers: look for two double-toggle zippers that open the bag either from top or bottom for ventilation. Some bags zip all the way down the side and across the foot end. Better ones have-along the zipper-a draft tube that reduces heat loss.

Fill materials are down or polyester. Down usually maintains heat better-per pound. However, polyester-filled bags maintain their fluff better than down in humid or damp weather, and polyester costs less.

Reading cleaning instructions. Most fills-down or polyestercan be machine-washed and dried at home.


