

YOUTH DIES IN WHEELER MOTEL FIRE

Jon Anderson, 18, died of burns and smoke inhalation resulting from a fire reported at 5 a.m. Saturday morning at the Sand and Sage Motel in Wheeler. The fire was discovered by Gary Rice after being awakened by the smell of smoke.

With the report of the fire, motel owner Cecil Snelgrooves entered the room and pulled Anderson from the room. The Fire Department and Ambulance responded within a very short time, but nothing could be done for the young man.

Room 4, occupied by Anderson, received heavy fire damage with only smoke damage to other parts of the motel located on east highway 152. Anderson was pronounced dead at the scene at 5:34 a.m. by Justice of the Peace Charlie Whiteley.

Fellow workers, Jimmy Mayden and Lonnie Anderson, had been in room 4 with Anderson earlier. Lonnie had gone to his room around 1 a.m. Mayden left some time later. Jon Anderson was employed at

E. W. Moran Rig 2. The rig is located north and east of Briscoe. Jon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Anderson of Albuquerque, New Mexico. The body was

returned to Albuquerque for burial.

Wheeler Schools Budget Adopted

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees was held Thursday, August 11th. The budget for the 1977-78 school year was adopted.

The Board lowered the 1977-78 tax rate .10 cents making a total tax of 1.65. The assessment rate remains the same at 55% of full market value. The new rate is 1.40 for maintenance and operation and .25 for bonded indebtedness. This is the third consecutive year that the Board has been able to lower the tax rate.

In other action the Board approved a new half unit in special education, approved the amended 76-77 budget and employed a teacher aide, Rosemary Dodd for the 77-78 school year. Five new staff members will report for in-service August 22. They are Jane Ann Hall, 3rd grade, Bobby C. Hill, English and Government, Mike Morgan, Social Studies, and Junior High coach, Terry McCasland Voc Ag, Charles Carter, Physical Education and Junior High Coach. Beth Hester will join the staff as a part-time secretary.

Highway Projects For Wheeler Co.

Childress—Work in Wheeler County is included in the 1978 Special Rehabilitation and State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission. The quarter-billion-dollar program was made possible by the funds provided by the 65th Texas Legislature.

A large part of the program will be financed with General Revenue funds especially appropriated for this purpose with the remainder of the projects financed with state highway funds.

District Engineer Lewis H. White of Childress said the work includes seal coat on State Highway 152 for 16.9 miles from the Gray county line, east of U. S. Highway 83 in Wheeler, and 15.5 miles on State Highway 152 from U.S. Highway 83 in Wheeler, east to the Oklahoma state line; seal coat on F. M. 1547 for 3.0 miles from Interstate Highway 40 in Lela, south to the Collingsworth County line; and seal coat for 3.0 miles of F. M. 3075 in Lela, north. Total estimated cost of these projects is \$442,300.

Statewide, the program provides for the improvement of some 6,900 miles of highways at an estimated construction cost of approximately \$225,560,000, with an additional \$4.3 million set aside for later assignment. Approximately 68 percent of the overall program will be on State and U. S. Highways, another 30 percent on Farm to Market Roads, and the remaining 2 percent reserved for future assignment.

The program is the first phase of a long-range program to restore the highway system to the standards Texans come to expect, White said. It is based on recommendations submitted by several district engineers and selected following a statewide assessment of highway needs. The work-day set for Saturday August 13th, at the Mobeetie Jail was successful in getting the building cleared, of stacked up museum articles, so that the Labor Day Program committee could have a clear way to plan for the Labor Day festivities. HIGH SCHOOL
Enrollment day for Wheeler High School will be Friday, August 26, 1977. The classes are to register at the specified time period: Seniors—9:00 to 10:30 A.M., Juniors—10:30 to 12:00 a.m., Sophomores—1:00 to 2:15 p.m., Freshmen—2:15 to 3:30 p.m. Regular classes will begin the 29th of August.

Requirements for graduation from Wheeler High School are English—12 Quarter Units (4 years), Social Studies—8 Quarter units (World History—3, American History—3, Government—2), Health—2 Quarter Units, Math—6 Quarter Units, Science—6 Quarter units, Physical Education—9 Quarter units, Electives—17 Quarter Units and the total units combined are 60 units.

The following schedule is usually followed by the various classes (bold type—required subjects): 9th—English I, Physical Science, Related Math I or Algebra I, Band, Physical Education or Athletics, Homemaking I, Vocational Agriculture I, Typing I, Drafting I, and Speech; 10th—English II, World History, Biology, Related Math II or Geometry, Physical Education, Band or Athletic, Vocational Agriculture II, Homemaking II, Speech, Drafting I or II, Health, Typing II, and Free Enterprise; 11th—English III, American History, Homemaking III, Vocational Agriculture III, Home and Family Living, Shorthand, Bookkeeping, Psychology, Physics, Alg. II, Speech, Health, Chemistry, Typing I or II, Physical Education, Band or Athletics, and Drafting; 12th—English IV, Government, Health, Speech, Farm Shop, Home and Family Living, Co-OP (HM DEPT), Typing I or II, Shorthand, Bookkeeping, Psychology, Physics, Chemistry, Drafting, Physical Education, Band or Athletics, and Free Enterprise.

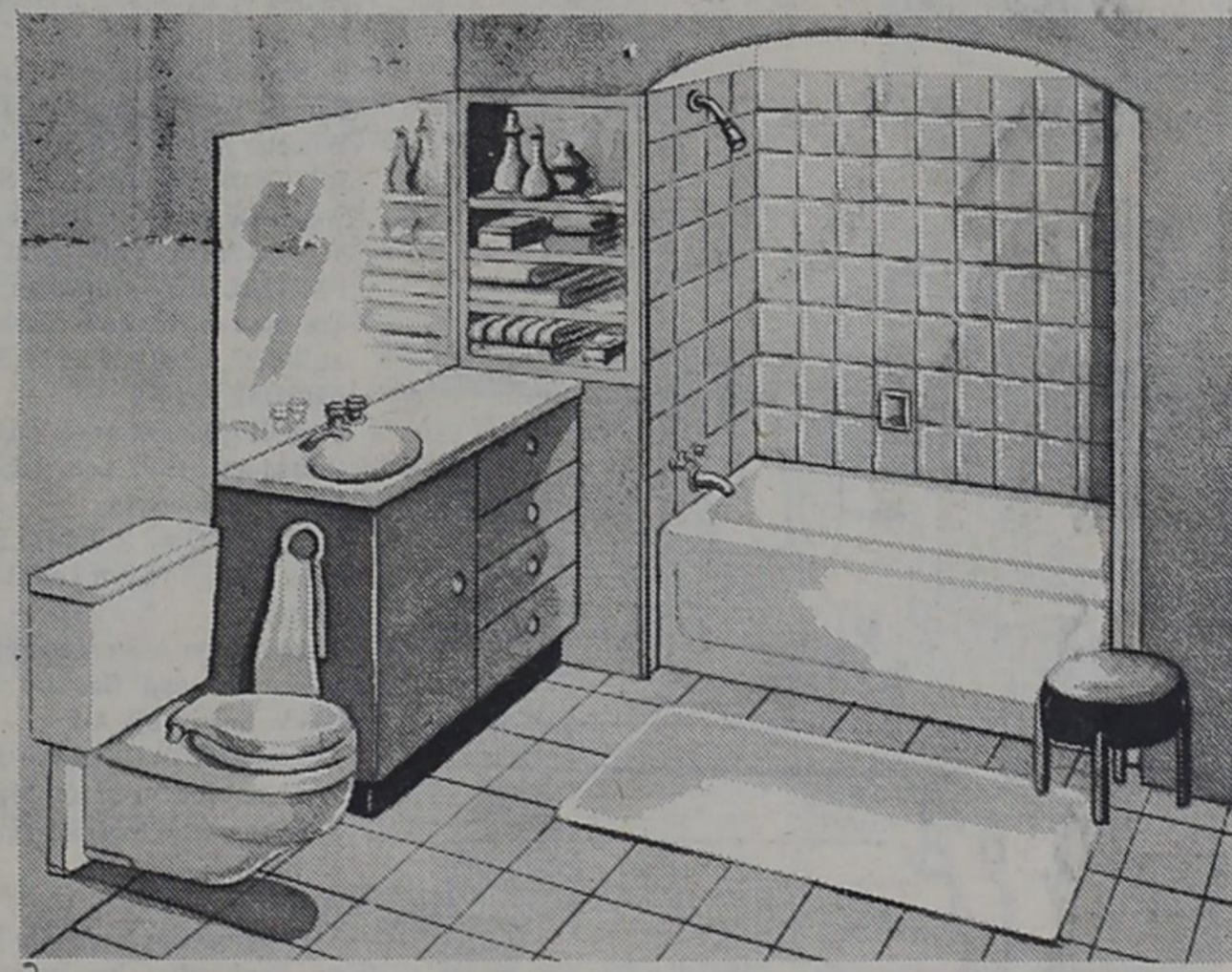

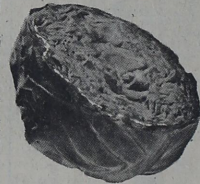
