

Advanced Lifesaving Course Completed

The instructors for the course were Roberta Adams of Wheeler, with thirty-eight years of Water Safety Instruction experience and Linda Davis who has held her Water Safety Instructor badge for 9 years. 





moisture are only two of many controlling factors that affect vegetative growth. Grazing, plowing, brush clearing, and industrial use have a marked effect on wildlife habitat. Vegetation changes have a much quicker and more notice-

able effect on high productive capacity species, such as quail, doves, and pheasant, than on large game such as deer. Observations have shown that brush clearing, overgrazing, and other game habitat destruction may deplete a deer herd slowly, whereas the same factors can

spell trouble overnight to smaller game. However, smaller game species recover with equal speed, thereby causing populations to normally rise and fall from year to year according to habitat conditions. Simply adding more game animals or game birds to an area does not assure reproduction or more game this fall. The decline

ing of filters and grills in home. air conditioner units keeps the house cooler-and saves fuel.

Filters are traps for the almost invisible impurities in the air and regularly build up an accumulation of dirt.

Air conditioner filters in most units-and those in older buildings-require vaccuming and warm-water washing monthly. Shake off excess water, dry and Robert L. Fincher replace filter.

Alternative to that is the Sayre, Okla. 73662 disposable filter-available in various sizes, usually easy to change, and inexpensive.

New homes-or recently remodeled homes-may need more frequent filter changes, or cleanings, during the first cooling season, because of extra dust in the system.

For cleaning room grills, use a soft cloth, mild soap and warm water-not waxes or cleaners.

If the system seems sluggish after cleaning, call a service man certified by the manufacturer of the air conditioner-or an elec-

Since cleaning filters and grills is relatively simple, someone in the family should be responsible for giving them a frequent check.

When shopping for room air conditioners, consider capacity





New car "fever" costs money -but consumers can save by getting the most value possible for their trade-in car.

Before asking a car dealer's appraisal for the present car, determine its approximate worth. To do this, check a used-car price guide available from a banker, credit union or insurance company-but keep in mind that these price estimates are based on the assumption that the car is in good running condition and still attractive.

When compairing offers from a different dealer, be sure the cars Decker compared are similar in features, power and construction.

If the price offered is much lower than the price guide value, consider the car's condition to determine reasons why the offer may be lower.

Some dealers who offer lower Super Value

this case, the salesman may offer BORDENS much more than expected for the used car. If you are buying a big, new expensive model the salesman may intentionally overvalue your present car to make the deal. irresistible. High balling entices you to buy your car from him and no one else.

Make certain to know all the costs of trading the car before making an agreement to buy. In some instances, the salesman may say he made a mistake in arithmetic in the price he quoted or that such a high offer was not approved by the sales manager. Even though you may feel committed to buy from him, don't hesitate to say, "I think I will look around some more."

Some car owners prefer to sell their car themselves. This may bring a higher price than the wholesale price paid by a car

It also gives the advantage of bargaining over the new car price since there is no trade-in for the dealer to sell.

To sell a car personally, simply set an asking price and decide how low a price to accept. Stick to it, and if no one meets that price, trade it in on the new car. The only expense is the newspaper ad.

Before attempting to sell the car personally, get the dealer's offer for it in writing so that it is a firm figure to count on if it's necessary to trade it in.
