The ambulance pager was our first indication that we had been a little too close to a storm. The ambulance was needed at the Wheeler Feed Yard for a search and rescue.

We certainly do 'miss the water when the well runs dry'. No electricity and not even a battery operated radio. As it turned out not for just a night, but for 25 hours and 15 minutes.

-cwe-When we learned we might possibly be without electricity for a long period of time, we delivered the exstudent books, packed and loaded to skip town. At the last stop before exiting the city limits, Barbara rolled down

the window to bid adue at Cross Car

Center—the window would not roll

back up. -cwe-

We left the vehicle and returned to the dark, quiet, house and tried to figure out how to spend time without modern conveniences. And hoping the window could at least be manually raised and secured in place—NOT!

-cwe-Determined to leave as soon as possible rather than remain without the conveniences. I made a trip into Oklahoma to get the needed part. Shortly after I returned, the electricity was restored.

A big 'THANK YOU' to the individuals responsible for the restoration of

the service.

ESCAPEES CAPTURED AFTER 18 HOURS OF FREEDOM

Two Wheeler county prisoners escaped the county jail Saturday morning around 2:00 a.m. They remained

at large for about 18 hours. The escape route was the ducting from the cell. Using a tool fashioned from a piece of metal they had obtain, the men removed the screws holding the cover and climbed into the ceiling area. They dropped down into the hallway and took the jailer briefly to obtain the keys to her car.

Before they could get access to the car, they spotted a deputy's vehicle approaching the jail. The pair fled on foot.

The deputy became aware of something unusual about the jail. He entered the jail and secured each room. He made contact with the jailer and notified other officers of the situation. It was determined the escapees were in jail clothing and one was possibly barefoot. A spot check of the immediate area was made imme-

The biggest concern of the department was a possible hostage situa-

With the arrival of daylight, the volunteer firemen were called to help with a door to door canvass of the town. The men went to each house and informed the occupants of the situation. The search was called off

The escapees remain unspotted until around 8:00 Wednesday evening. Mark and Georgann Burrell were enroute to their ex-student reunion party east of town, when Georgann noticed two men running across an open area near the airport. went to the nearest residence to phone 911.

Sheriff Jimmy Adams lives within two miles of the location where the fugitives were spotted and was the first on the scene. Arriving within a short time was the remainder of the county sheriff's department, Wheeler and Shamrock constables, six Texas Highway Patrolmen, Hemphill and Roberts county sheriffs and the Wheeler Volunteer Firemen. Commissioner Puryear and Tom Frye furnish a spotter plane, as did the D.P.S. Helping also were some 200 volunteers and some sightseers encircled the four sections on the county roads and Hwy. 152.

With the use of a PA system and the threat of dogs, the escapees were coached to give themselves up. They stood up in the brush less then 200 yards from the highway and less than

six miles east of the jail. One escapee was held on charges of armed robbery of a habitation and possession of a stolen car; he had already been sentenced to 10 years on other charges. The second escapee was only being held on a charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle—a minor charge, but now is being held on a first degree felony. Both men had been in the local jail

around two months. Sheriff Jimmy Adams extends a "Thank You" to everyone for their

assistance.

Thursday evening, June 8, a sform front came into the southwest corner of Wheeler County in the direction of Wheeler. The sirens in Wheeler were sounded at 6:28 p.m. for citizens of Wheeler to begin taking shelter.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department reported 28 locations receiving major damage. Using Sheriff Adams information, the rough map of the county was drawn to show the path of the storm.

The locations are marked 1 through 28. The computer drawn map is the work of Paul Jones of Allison from the locations indicated by Sheriff Adams.

1-4. The Crockett house was cleaned away to the dirt. Across the road cattle were killed selectively. The barrow ditches were full of debris. This would indicate the ditch is not such a good location to seek shelter in case of an emergency.

5. The Vega place was totally wiped clean of buildings, leaving only one tree with two branches—the bark was stripped away

6. Trident Pumping station is gone. 7. Ronnie Brown had his out buildings destroyed. This was on the west

edge of the tornado.

8. A mile of Southwestern Public Service and Greenbelt lines and landowner's fences were picked up.

9. The funnel was on the ground for approximately 4 miles in open country taking a strip of fencing belonging to Hiltbrunner and Mann. At this point the storm crossed the river and was 1/2 to 1 mile wide.

10. The Dunnam house suffered extensive damage to the east side, top story was blown out. The garage wall is also bowed.

11. The barn at F. M. Grimes was destroyed and huge, old trees were

12. The Andy Shipp place suffered the loss of out buildings. The trees were cropped and some uprooted. 13. Storm traveled along Co. Road

WHEELER COUNTY HERITAGE DAY SET FOR JULY

The second annual Wheeler County Heritage Day activities will officially begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 1, 1995 at the Jail and Museum in Old Mobeetie, Texas. Master of Ceremonies will be author-historian, Bob Izzard.

The living history exhibits and reenactments will depict life during the 1870's - 1880's. Friday evening the Cavalry, Texas Ranger, Buffalo Hunters, Indian Traders and Trappers will make camp on the museum grounds in preparation for the event.

On Saturday visitors will view mounted cavalry drills and artillery demonstrations presented by the 4th U. S. Cavalry Regiment E. Company (memorial) led by 1st Sargent Mike Vandeventor. Mackenzie and his 4th Cavalry actually operated in Texas from 1871 - 1875. All of their uniforms, equipment, saddles and gear are period replicas and/or authentic originals. The men of the 4th Cavalry pride themselves in historical authenticity as they recreate the trooper as he actually was.

15. Christine Underwood had damage to a trailer and barns. There was more damage to transmission lines along county road 10 and Hwy 152.

16. Wheeler Feed Yard was badly damaged. The mill, office, pens and three trailer homes used by the employees were destroyed. A large number of cattle were killed and several had to be destroyed. One estimate of damage to the feedlot was \$5 million. The business is in the process of rebuilding. Two of the families occupying the trailers had come to Wheeler to take shelter in the basement of the courthouse. One family remained and was in their car at the time the storm hit. Wheeler County Sheriff's deputies rescued them after their car was carried across Hwy. 152 by the storm. One individual was seen running across Hwy. 152 ahead of the storm. He was also rescued.

The Wheeler County Ambulance was called to Wheeler Feed Yard at 7:31 p.m. The ambulances were turned back, after it was determined there were not injuries.


In a truly unprecedented effort, the Historical Society and the County Commissioners, under the direction of Judge Wendell Morgan, identified and made signs for over fifty abandoned school sites throughout the county.

Margaret Dorman, president of the Wheeler County Historical Society, acting as liaison to the Commissioners Court, did yeoman duty coordinating the project. Harrison Hall, projects chairman, and Paula Britt, secretarytreasurer and publicity chairman, both served most effectively.

At this time all materials are purchased and prepared. Actual erection of the signs will begin when work on rural roads and bridges caused by recent torrential rains is completed. This is estimated to occur around the middle of August.

Both the County Historical Society and the Commissioners Court express their sincere gratitude to those donors who gave a collective \$690.00 to help defray the costs of this project. Labor and materials furnished by the county were essential to the projects's completion. He was president of the American Medical Society of California and I had run with their son Earl Land in Alaska. Dr. Lupton had passed away an Nell, the wife was living with her elderly father John Denman there on his home place. What a wonderful place it was. He had 800 acres in the rolling hills and had apple trees that had been planted in 1862 that were still producing delicious apples. I learned more from that gentleman about how to do this and that and still have the knowledge of how not to hurry but how to make every move count. Granddad smoked a pipe and as he puffed on the old corncob he would be thinking what to do next. We never had to tear down a job and redo it. 

Remember the deceased with a memorial, flowers or a plant; It says that you cared for the deceased and recognized the loved ones' grief. And, continue to remember in the time that follows when "all is back to normal";

* Offer an opportunity to get out of without looking down or away, even the house; arrange a luncheon, movie or shopping, and if the tears begin to flow, don't worry; you did not cause the tears, they are healing and a normal part of the process; * Provide professional recommen-

dations for the business ahead. If you are an attorney or a CPA, offer your services. Inquire as to most difficult tasks and either perform them or find someone who may;

* Finally, remember that the grieving process is tedious, individual, somewhat predictable, laborious and very necessary work; accompany your friend through the journey.



Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

With the recent tornado hitting Wheeler County, it makes us very aware that disaster can strike anytime without warning. Most people don't think of a disaster until it is too late; then suddenly realize how unprepared they are for the massive changes in their lives.

The period after a disaster is often very difficult for families, at times as devastating as the disaster itself. Families which are prepared ahead of time can reduce the fear, confusion and losses that come with disaster. They can be ready to evaluate their homes, know what to expect in public shelters and how to provide basic first aid. For the next several weeks, the "Extension Update" will run a series of Disaster Preparedness articles to help your family prepare and cope with natural

One of the first steps toward preparedness is the creation of a Family Disaster Supply Kit. This will help the family get through the first few days after a disaster. Store the kit in a convenient place known to all family members. Store the items in airtight bags or containers. Include six basic items: Water, Food, First Aid Kit, Tools and Supplies, Clothing and Bedding, and Special Items. Replenish the kit twice a year.

The following are tips on storing

Store water in clean plastic containers such as thoroughly washed and rinsed soft drink bottles with tight fitting screw on caps.

Store 1 gallon per day per family member (2 quarts for drinking, 2 quarts for food preparation, 1 sanitation). Children, nursing mothers and ill people will need more.

* Athree-day supply of water should be stored for every family member.

* Replace water every 6 months. Tips for other six Family Disaster Supply Kit items will follow next week. For a complete list, you may contact the Wheeler County Extension office at 806-826-5243.







The Wheeler Co. Bass Club held a tournament at Foss Lake on May 6, 1995 with 6 members, 1 guest and 1 Jr. member.


We had good weather for the tournament which was setup to be fished two week prior but, was postponed till the 6th due to lighting and stormy





The cloud then crossed Sweetwater Creek and moved 10 miles to the east

before setting down again. 21. The Andy Reid place was dam-

The width of the funnel at one point as it approached Allison was estimated to be 1.3 miles wide. Reports of several funnels were reported and these seemed to merge into one.

22. A place belonging to Lee Hall was struck, taking the old house, outbuildings, livestock and farm equipment.

The storm was 1/2 to 3/4 miles across and moved in a north-northeasterly direction across road 23 to the Giddens place.

23. The Bessie Giddens residence, near Allison and south of the Briscoe Highway had the roof taken off and some of the walls were taken away, leaving only a skeleton of the house.

24. Jim Donaldson's house on north side is totally gone. This was a readybuild home the family had been remodeling. They had planned to move in within the next two weeks. The only indication the house had been located there was a sewer pipe sticking out of the ground. They live in a trailer a few miles north of Allison.

Headed for Allison and then turned

25. The storm continued north on county road 23 and veered west to the Larry Elmore home on county line road. All were in cellar. Took barns and vehicles. All livestock on place is gone. Took cellar door and they had a mattress in front of them

26. Lee and Sharon Hall, across road north from Elmores. All of the barns were taken. The roof was removed and left three walls standingthese appeared to be held up by furniture. The seven individuals at the residence were in basement. Lee had gone to Allison and picked up Lloyd and Nona Hall when word was received of the approaching storm. According to Gary Hall's watch, the storm hit at 8:01 and lasted until 8:08. Tammy Jones of Pampa was on the phone with her mother when the decision was made to go to the cellar-the phone was dropped and Tammy listened to the tornado as the home was destroyed. Tammy told her husband the storm was destroying the home and when he did not believe her, she handed him the phone to listen. The Halls had 70 Ostriches and only twenty were not killed. The storm took all the pens, two new pickups, one older pickup and a suburban—destroying all three vehicles.

27. At this time the storm left Wheeler County and crossed over the road to the Bevard Dukes home, which was completely destroyed. The storm even took the floor leaving the basement exposed. Five individuals had taken shelter in the basement and ducked under a table, which was not large enough to offer much shelter. They had to hold onto each other and Todd Baize was almost pulled out. Part of Larry Elmore's pickup landed in the Dukes basement; this was not discovered until the storm was over.

The home of Anthony Cornell was lifted off foundation and set back down. It will most likely have to be demol-

Part of a roof was taken from Loretta Holbrook house.

Wheeler County Ambulance Service was paged to go to Allison for Search and Rescue at 8:16. There were no injuries requiring the attention of the service.

Allison was out of electricity until 3:00 Saturday

Everyone turned out to help the tornado victims. People came from Canadian. Four wheelers were brought to help find animals. Several of the farm animals had to be killed because of injury

County equipment was used to bury the debris. Most of the damage was gone through, to salvage what was left and the remainder was buried.

28. A barn at the Billy Finsterwald place was swept away. This was possibly a separate funnel from the main

Several scouts were camped at the M. K. Brown camp. The camp was notified to bring the scouts in to the basement at the courthouse.

The residence of Ellen Powell is located 15 miles north of Wheeler. She had part the roof of her home taken, outbuildings were destroyed and apple and apricot trees were ruined. She remained in the home during the storm.

Wheeler lost electrical power at 7:15 and service was restored 25 hours and 15 minutes later.
