In addition to 28 years in the Wheeler School system, Mrs. Wood taught three years at Kelton and three years in Hemphill County.


A luncheon was held Thursday, May 26 for members of the Wheeler Grade School faculty. The group honored three of their fellow teachers who will not be in the system next year.
