

# DR. GALUTIA TO LOCATE IN WHEELER IS MORE PAVING NEEDED?

Robert C. Galutia, M. D., will be moving to Wheeler later this year to begin practice at Parkview Clinic. Dr. Galutia is presently practicing in Durant, Oklahoma, where he moved after

completing his internship in 1976. Charles Hix, administrator for Parkview Hospital, estimated the addition to Parkview Clinic and other arrangements will require

approximately four months. A formal announcement will be made at a later date. Dr. Galutia attended Oklahoma University and interned at Baptist Hospital in Oklahoma

City. He is married to the former Glenda Roark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Roark of Wheeler; the couple has a 10-month-old son, Yancy.

What is your feeling about a paving project for Wheeler? Since the completion of the paving of 84 blocks in 1969, Wheeler has grown and the need for additional paving is being realized.

Interest in a new paving project has been expressed to the City Council, but the question is "Which streets are to be paved?" If you would like to see your street paved with curb and gutter contact your neighbors, learn their feelings, and report to the council.

Wheeler has a number of building sites for additional housing, but the number of lots with paving is limited. Wheeler needs to grow and obtaining a loan for building in many cases require paved streets.

In 1969 the property owners paid half the cost of paving with curb and gutter with the City of Wheeler absorbing half the cost. At that time the property owner was assessed \$3.17 per frontal foot. The total cost today for a foot of paving on a 40' street is estimated to be \$20; the council would have to decide what portion the city would pay.

The regular meeting of the City Council will be Monday evening, June 20. The council meets at the City Office at 7:30 p.m.

**Lifesaving Course Will Be Offered**

The Red Cross is offering Life Saving to all eligible persons with Roberta Adams instructing. The class will begin at seven o'clock, June sixth at the Shamrock pool. Persons must have passed their fifteenth birthday, are in sound physical condition, and can complete the following prerequisites:

1. Perform a standing front dive in reasonable good form.
2. Swim 500 yards continuously using several strokes.
3. Surface dive to a minimum depth of 8 feet and swim 20 feet under water.
4. Tread water 1 minute.

There is no charge for the course but you must pay for your own text and pass the skill and written test. You must provide yourself with mask, fins, and snorkel.

The grass is more luxurious than I've ever seen it. Truly, this is Gods green earth.

A few weeks makes a difference. My neighbors, the Killingsworths, have their fence built. Their terraces in front are taking hold. But they, like every body else are annoyed with erosion due to our hard rains. But we mustn't be discouraged. I'm sure that in a few weeks the

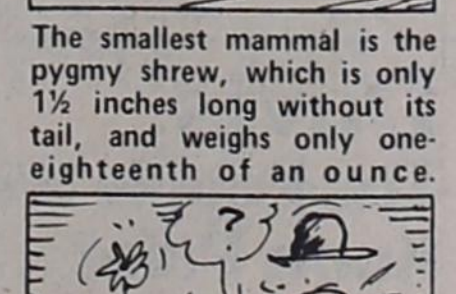

**AIR TRAVEL**

Last year, more than 16,000 consumer complaints were filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board concerning lost luggage, unhonored reservations and other air travel problems.

A "flight plan" for air travelers depends on several important consumer care tactics.

Check in on time Airlines vary on deadlines before departure time, so ask when making the reservation.

Know that over-booking is a financial necessity for the airlines due to a high percentage of "no show" travelers.

Don't be a "no show". Be sure to cancel reservations if your plans change and you are unable to take the flight on which you reserved space.

If you are "pumped"—that is, holding a confirmed reservation

but are denied boarding because the flight is oversold—know your rights.

Unless the airline gets you to your destination within two hours of the original schedule, you are entitled to a refund of your ticket price—or passage on the next available flight to your destination—and compensation equal to the ticket price up to \$200.

Your are not obliged to accept the compensation (called denied boarding compensation). If you reject the compensation, you may seek redress through the civil courts if you desire. Denied boarding compensation does not apply, however, to any intrastate air carriers (those operating within one state only) or to any charter flights.

On the other hand, if you accept the compensation, the case is closed and you have no further recourse.

If you decide not to go through with the trip—after you have been bumped—then you only get a refund of the ticket price.

Reconfirm your return reservation if your flying to a popular

resort area—or abroad.

Failure to reconfirm—normally 72 hours before departure—can, and often does, result in cancellation of your reservations.

If you fail to reconfirm, you are not eligible for denied boarding compensation.

Label every piece of checked baggage, inside and out.

For the passenger who does not want his name and address visible, concealed labels are available for some carriers.

Lock your luggage. Don't overpack. Usually air carriers will not pay for damage to overstuffed luggage that Report missing luggage immediately. Failure to report missing baggage before leaving the airport may result in denial of your claim.

Discuss compensation for missing luggage with the responsible airlines.

Any problems not resolved with an individual airlines can be reported in writing to the office of the consumer Advocate, Civil Aeronautics Board, Washington, D. C. 20428.

# KING'S KOMMENTS

**CATTLEMEN SET TO VOTE IN BEEF REFERENDUM COLLEGE STATION—Texans** who own beef or dairy cattle—another cattlemen of the nation—will soon have an opportunity to register and then vote on whether or not they want a new research and promotion program for the beef industry.

The occasion will be the upcoming referendum on the Beef Research and Information Act—An Act signed into law on May 28, 1976, by former President Ford. The Act is Public Law 94-294 and serves as enabling legislation that authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct the referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan.

The referendum will be similar to other conducted in recent years for various agricultural commodities. Public hearings on the proposed program were conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in six major cities across the nation, including Dallas, from mid-September to mid-October of last year. Additionally, the proposed order and notice of hearing locations were published in the Federal Register, August 1976. The final Beef Research and Information Act decision and order, along with the proposed referendum rules, appeared in the April 15, 1977 Federal Register.

According to the referendum rules announced, livestock producers who want to express themselves on this issue first need to register at their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices during June 6-17, and then vote also at the local ASCS offices during July 5-15. At least 50 percent of the cattle owners who register must vote in order for the referendum to be valid, and two-thirds of those voting must vote affirmatively for the program to carry.

County meeting for beef producers presently are being held in all counties of Texas to acquaint producers with the program. Generally, these meetings are being called by county chairmen of the Beef Development Task Force. The Beef Development Task Force is an organization of key leaders in the beef industry who have organized to promote the program. Educational meetings are also being sponsored by some of the general farm organizations.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has been invited to participate in these meetings to present the provisions of the law. As with past referendums, the Extension Service of each state has the educational responsibility to present facts about the proposed programs, while at the same time maintaining a stance of strict neutrality. The Extension Services of land-grant institutions of the nation have been assigned the educational responsibility for the referendum through their USDA affiliation. Efforts of the State Extension Services have been directed both toward creating awareness of the referendum and explaining the law as it applies to the proposed program for the beef industry.

Just as the Extension Service was asked to assist with the educational efforts, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices at the local level have been asked to assist with the registration of beef producers in each county during the sign-up period. The ASCA offices also will have the responsibility for conducting the election during the designated dates established by the USDA.

Thus, preparation for any referendum conducted at the national level becomes a cooperative project for a number of federal-state agencies working in conjunction with local leaders and producers to provide facts upon which to base decisions.

**VACCINATE HORSES AGAINST SLEEPING SICKNESS**  
Horse owners are urged to vaccinate their animals against equine encephalitis (horse sleeping sickness) which is often a serious problem as mosquito populations increase during warmer months.

Effective vaccines are available. However, these are effective for only one year, so revaccination is necessary each spring.

Combined killed-virus vaccines are available for eastern and western equine encephalitis (EEE and WEE) and also for eastern western and Venezuelan (VEE). EEE and WEE occur seasonally in many parts of the country. VEE has not been diagnosed since 1971 when this foreign disease invaded south Texas.

Research has shown that VEE has a complex natural history and many hosts. It isn't known which of these hosts may exist and harbor the virus in Mexico or the United States, or when the virus may reemerge to effect either country.

All three types of equine encephalitis (EEE, WEE, VEE) affect humans as well as horses. But there are some significant differences between VEE and the other two. Birds usually function as a disease reservoir, carrying the viruses of eastern and western encephalitis. Mosquitoes transmit these diseases from the birds to horses or humans.

VEE, however, multiplies so rapidly in horses that mosquitoes biting infected horses at certain disease stages can pass the virus to susceptible (nonvaccinated) horses or humans.

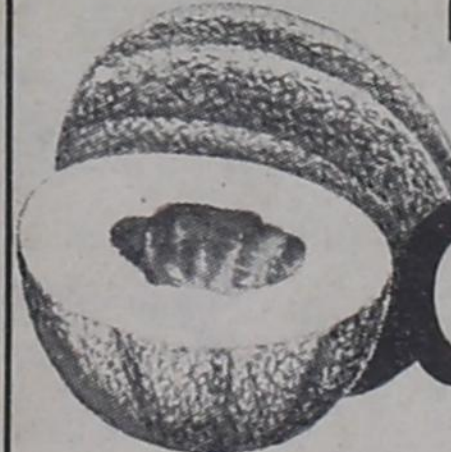

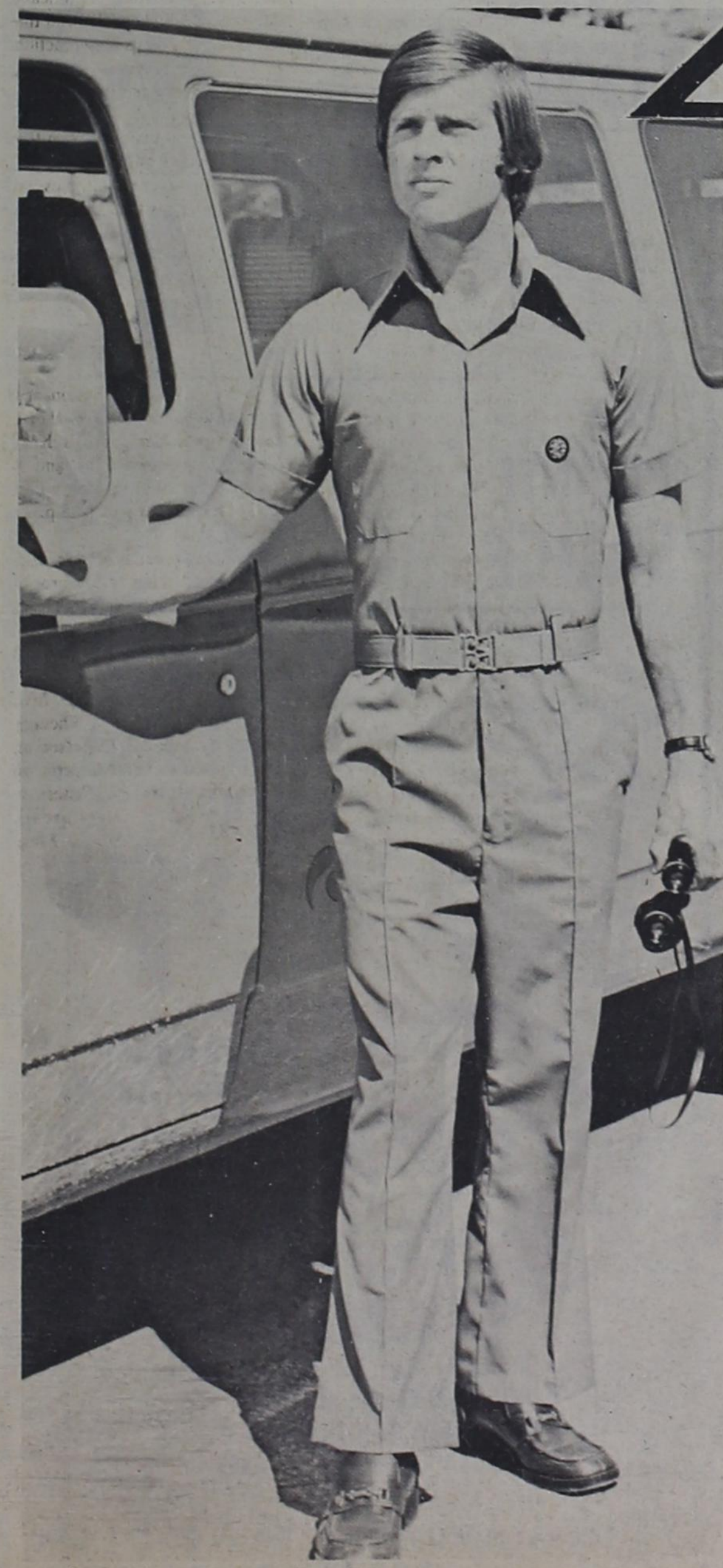
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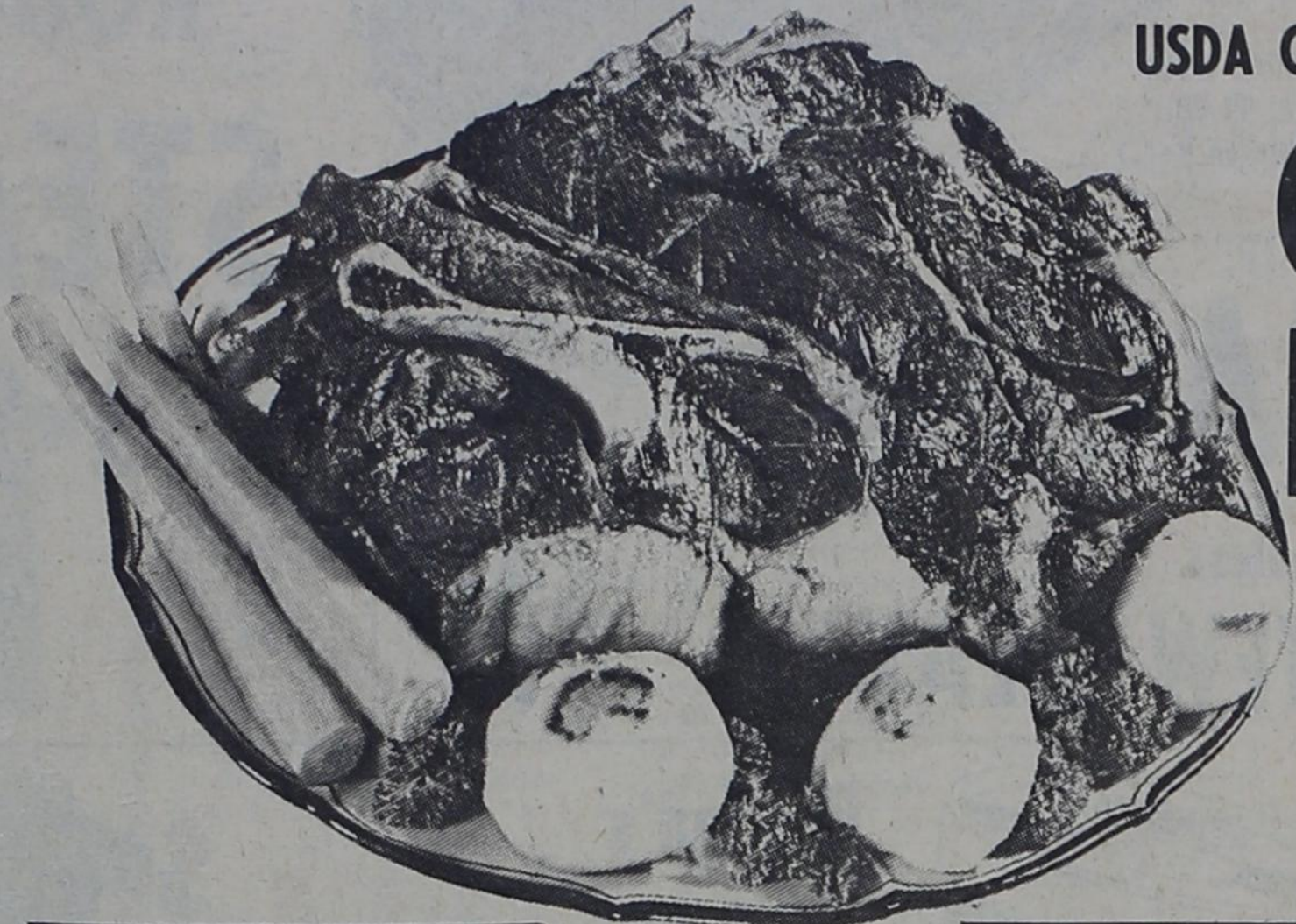
