Greater Wheeler Development Association, a group of local individuals who realized the need for additional housing in Wheeler in 1975 is again needing your cooperation.

The two duplex units completed in 1975 have remained full since the first family moved in in November, 1975. These units are located in the 700 block of Stanley Street. Wheeler is still

needing rental property and the Association feels additional units are needed.

The first step in obtaining the loan necessary to build the units is to determine the need. This

determination will require the cooperation of you the local citizens. If you presently rent and would consider moving into one of these units or a similar unit, please contact Richard Wallace at Baldwin, Rucker and Co., 111 W. Texas Street in Wheeler. The phone number is 826-3011.

A number of oil field workers presently live elsewhere and work in the immediate Wheeler

area. Employers or supervisors who have employees living elsewhere are urged to contact Mr. Wallace.

Before the loan can be obtained to build rental property a need has to be proven.

Those contacting Mr. Wallace will be asked to fill out a rental survey sheet. This is simply a form to prove rental property is needed; it does not mean you have to move into a unit if it becomes available.

One of the duplexes will be available soon and the present

list of persons interested in renting needs to be updated, according to Mr. Wallace. If your name is on the list and you are still interested, please contact Mr. Wallace and make application.

Greater Wheeler Development Association arranges for the loan through Farmers Home Administration; the association has to provide 2% of the money for the total building project.

Membership in the association requires a minimum donation of \$25 which will be used for housing.

RAINS CAUSE FLOODING

Storm Warnings Sounded Friday

Wheeler citizens were warned of the possible approach of a storm system Friday afternoon. The city and surrounding area had received rain all day in the amount of 4.03; the rain on top of the 6.69 already received May closed roads in all four directions of Wheeler.

Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department went on storm watch around 1:30 Friday afternoon and remained until 7:00 p.m. In addition to watching the clouds the men helped people who were stuck, watched the flood waters and warned motorists of dangerous situations.

The firemen were stationed north and west of town to stop motorists if two dams in the area broke. The water was traveling over the dam at Christner lake north of town and could wash a car off 152 if it broke. The water was running over the top of the dam on the place owned by Cecil Pierce; this dam was located near the Farm to Market Road west of town.

George Weems, who lives northeast of Wheeler on Sweetwater Creek, reported the water to be the highest he has seen it since 1959.

According to Joe Rogers, the rainfall for Wheeler for the month of May now stands at 11.65. The rainfall for the year in Wheeler is 21". To break the rainfall down to the amounts received since Wednesday, May 18, 9.90 was received May 19, 4.03 was received May 20 and 0.03 fell May 24.

Rains Damage Local Cemetery

The heavy rains received recently have rendered extensive damage to the Wheeler Cemetery. The Wheeler Cemetery Association, under the direction of J. C. Moore, Jr., assured the Times the damage would be corrected as soon as possible.

A large amount of dirt is needed and a few tombstones need to be straightened. The association has had difficulty in getting assistance due to damage to city and county roads and property.

WCA AWARDS BANQUET

The Annual Awards Banquet of Wheeler Christian Academy was held last Friday night, May 13. Many students received awards in various areas.

Certificates of Award were given in the areas of Bible Memory, "A" average, Best Groomed, Perfect Attendance, Most 100's, "E" Level Privilege, and in the area of Fastest Reader and Most Improved Reader. One student gained 600 w.p.m. since the beginning of school. She reads at the rate of 1000 w.p.m. now as do two other students in the school.

In addition to the certificates trophies were also presented in some important areas.

Martin Gately received the trophy for "Highest Grade Average" in the Intermediate Learning Center with an average of 96. In the Upper Learning Center, Lee Young received the trophy for "Highest Grade Average" with a 94.7.

Poisoning Is Reported RABID SKUNK IN AREA

Dr. Tommie Hennard, veterinarian, informed the Times this week that he has treated two dogs poisoned by strychnine.

Dr. Hennard warns of the dangers in using this poison. The food on which the poison is placed may be picked up by children or an animal other than the one for which the poison was intended.

It is believed these animals picked up the poison by accident. Dr. Hennard feels the strychnine was intended for skunks.

Dr. Hennard also reported a rabid skunk was killed in the Kelton area. The Albert Andersons, who live on Britt Ranch, are taking the shots. The skunk entered the back porch of the Anderson home and killed some kittens before being killed.

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KING'S KOMMENTS

By Joe Don King, County Agent

RABIES
There has recently been a case of rabies confirmed in Wheeler County. The case occurred in a skunk in the northeast part of the county.

In view of this the following information from Dr. Gene Cope, Area Extension Veterinarian, Amarillo may be of interest to you.

Rabies is an acute infectious encephalomyelitis which can occur in all warm-blooded animals including man, and is caused by a neutropic virus (attacks nerve tissue). The virus is found in saliva, salivary glands and central nervous system of infected animals. Bats are the only symptomless carriers of the disease.

Symptoms of Rabies:

1. Incubation period is 21-60 days in dogs, but has a range of 10-205 days; most develop symptoms in 21-35 days. In man, the onset of symptoms is 11 days to 11 months.
2. There are three forms of the disease:
 - a. Furious
 - b. Dumb
 - c. Atypical

Symptoms in small animals:

1. Change in disposition—wants to be by himself in dark places.
2. Has desire to wander, about 2 days after symptoms start, and bites everything in its path. Dogs will return home if possible after a time.
3. Menatly deranged.
4. Will eat indigestible objects such as rocks, sticks, etc.
5. Eyes matter.
6. Change in voice.
7. Paralysis of muscles used to swallow.
8. Paralysis of low jaw.
9. Progressive paralysis and death occurs 4-7 days after onset of symptoms.

Dumb
1. No particular viciousness.
2. Usually has a shorter course.
3. No tendency to roam—usually hides in a dark corner.
4. Stupid look due to paralysis of lower jaw.
5. Paralysis spreads to other portions of the body.

Symptoms in cattle and horses:
In cattle the furious form is most common with the animal attacking other animals and humans. Instead of the usual peaceful look on their face, their expression is one of altertness, the eyes and ears following sounds and movement. Cattle usually begin to bellow as symptoms progress; the character of the bellowing is different from normal and may continue intermittently until approaching death.

Probably the so-called dumb form is the one to which people are exposed most often. The animal is not that vicious; one of the symptoms is as if the animal is choked or has something wedged in its mouth. In attempting to relieve the choke, a person comes in contact with infected saliva. Horses may show symptoms of colic by rolling. These animals usually are very aggressive, biting and kicking viciously. They frequently suffer self-inflicted wounds.

The virus of rabies may be found in saliva a few days before symptoms begin; this is the reason for the 10 day observation period.

Do yourself and your pets a favor and get them vaccinated against RABIES.

There have been five cases of rabies reported in the Panhandle area this year. In each instance the rabid animal was a skunk and they were observed fighting with the family dogs and cats.
