




When thinking of retirement there are five tasks for adjusting to later years in life that may be the key to creating a more satisfying retirement.

Recent information from a research group in the University of Illinois indicates that with a severe infection in both eyes, a suppression of weightgain exceeded 30 lbs. Calves with pinkeye in one eye showed monetary losses of \$4.40 and those with both eyes affected, up to a \$14.00 loss based on a selling price of \$40.00/cwt.

Allthough there is probably no single cure-all for pinkeye, there are several practices that can be followed to help reduce problems from this infection. Common pinkeye is generally the result of a combination of the effect of bright sunlight damaging the eyeball, allowing the entrance of an organism that causes further eye damage, leading to varying stages of ulceration and even blindness. 



TREES REQUIRE INFREQUENT FERTILIZATION College Station-Elegant shade trees that enhance many yards are often overlooked at fertilizing time. However, a landscape specialist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service says that most trees can tolerate the neglect and only require fertilizer every few years.

"Most trees need to be fertilized only about once every three years", says Everett Janne. "However, trees that have their roots confined by streets, curbs or other structures should be fertilized more often."

He cautions against oververtilization as it may cause excessive top growth, making the tree vulnerable to storm damage.

Janne recommends fertilizing a tree on the basis of its branch spread. For every 1,000 square feet of branches, apply about six pounds of

Some veterinarians recommend that when an outbreak occurs, all animal be treated whether or not they show evidence of infection, since it is considered to be a herd problem.

Cattlemen should remember that there are other problems of the eye that might resemble pinkeye, so the advice of a veterinarian is recommended.





Put In Area Lakes

LUBBOCK-Bass fishing received a shot in the arm last week as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked 350,000 smallmouth bass in two area lakes.

The inch-long bass were transported from the state fish hatchery at San Marcos and 40,000 were put in Mackenzie lake near Silverton and 310,000 were stocked in Lake Meredith near Fritch.

The trip from central Texas was made without incident and very few bass were lost from the shock of transporting over the long distance. Agitators and bottled oxygen were used during the trip to keep the young fighters healthy.

These smallmouths are the offspring to Tennessee smallmouth brought to Texas two years ago. Several Texas lakes now have a catchable population of smallmouth bass including lake Meredith where anglers are catching some nice one-pound
