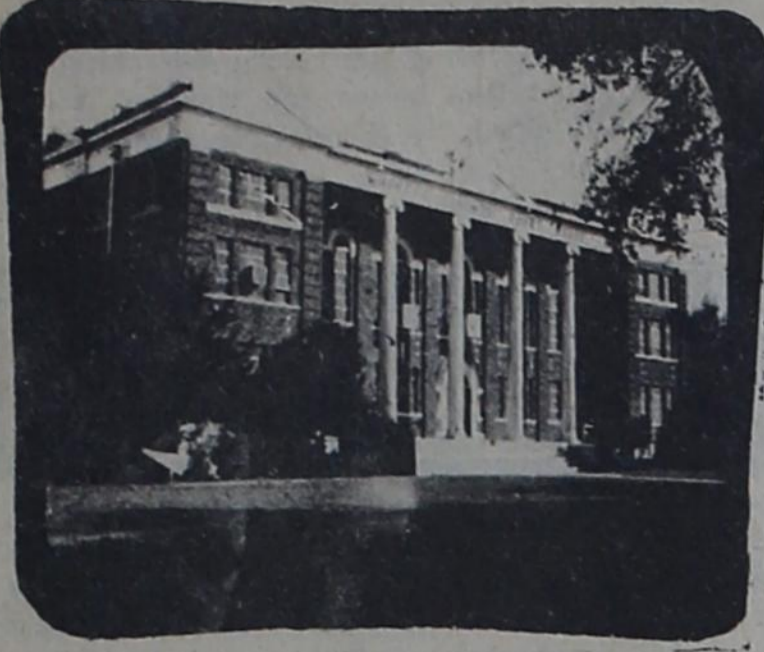

Wheeler High School's athletes will be honored at the annual Athletic Banquet next Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the school cafeteria.

Co-sponsored by the Pep Club and Mustangs Booster Club, the banquet will close out the school year for athletics except for the spring sports regional and state meets.

Guest speaker for this year's banquet will be Jerry Larned, athletic director and head football coach at Monahans High School.

Larned graduated from Haskell High School and North Texas University and is in tremendous demand as an after dinner speaker in the Midland and Odessa area and is noted as one of the most dynamic clinic speakers in the state.

Prior to taking the job at Monahans six years ago, Larned had coached in high school at Bowie, Duncanville, Hamlin and Iraan and served on the staff at Sull Ross University.

Larned was voted as South Plains AAA Coach of the Year in 1973, 1975, and 1976 and is a past director of the Texas High School Coaches Association. His record at Monahans is 47 wins, 15 losses and 2 ties. Prior to the Monahans position, Larned's coaching record was 119 wins and 37 losses.

Wheeler High School is just completing one of its most successful years in athletics and this is the opportunity that fans have to pay tribute to these young men and women that have represented Wheeler so well.

## WHEELER CHRISTIAN ACADEMY ENTERS STATE COMPETITION

Fourteen students from Wheeler Christian Academy attended the State Convention for schools using the Accelerated Christian Education curriculum last week in Denton, Texas. A total of 18 Christian schools were represented.

Four young men were 1st place winners in the following track events: Ted Phipps—1st Place in 100 yd. dash, Rusty Phipps—1st Place in 220 yd. dash, Billy Binion—1st Place in 440 yd. dash, and these same three students along with Larry Ratcliff placing 1st in the 440 yd. relay. These track runners are now preparing to participate in the

## Richard Kiker Is Named Chairman

Richard Kiker, has been appointed Wheeler County chairman for the Beef Development Taskforce (BDT).

A national organization of cattle producers, the BDT has proposed a Beef Market Development Program to promote the industry through increased consumer education, research and foreign market development.

The task force hopes to raise \$30 to \$40 million per year for the Program. More than 80 cattle organizations have endorsed it. Cattle producers will register and vote on the Program this spring.

As BDT county chairman, Mr. Kiker will be organizing campaign efforts throughout Wheeler County.

As BDT county Chairman, Mr. Kiker will be holding producer meetings to discuss the upcoming Beef Research and Information referendum.

"We want to make certain that every cattle producer in the county understands how much he personally stands to gain from the Beef Market Development Program," Mr. Kiker said. He said the beef industry needs to do more educational work with consumers, expand nutrition and production research activity, improve ways to market and handle cattle and tap high foreign markets now able to buy high quality American beef.

## LINES FROM LINDA

Pressures today pose a greater threat to youth than at any time in recent decades, conflicting with their need to develop emotional stability.

There are increasing technological demands, social and economic demands, and personal demands on each young individual to achieve maximal potential.

This is the scientific age and pressure is thrust on youth to understand higher and higher levels of technology. But these scientific facts may conflict with basic family beliefs the youth learned as a child and still uphold.

The constant push for change allows no time for meditation, thought, or for living with any established fact for a period of time. Because nothing is ever at rest, it is difficult for young people to develop a sense of stability.

Social and economic demands necessitate more years in school - technical training, college, graduate school and post graduate school are becoming the rule rather than the exception. These pressures operate a silent, but never ending, threat to young people today.

In a society that values people for what they can do, pressure is inevitable. Family pressures, psychological pressures, economic pressures, political pressures and peer pressures all exist for youth.

Some pressure can increase motivation. For example, a student with a high grade in a subject will probably feel enough motivation in the face of an exam to study hard to keep his high grade. This pressure is good. However, there is a point in which the youngster is adversely affected and achievement levels off.

To much pressure can lead to stress and anxiety.

Warning signs are clear when this occurs - parents need only observe their youngster. Has his general attitude changed - is he depressed, extremely nervous, or turning to alcohol or drugs for relief? And physical symptoms - is he wakeful and restless at night when he ordinarily slept

well, does he urinate more frequently, does he twist his hair or even unravel socks? All these signs point to a youngster under too much stress.

All of us are aware of the advantages of certain kinds of pressures and deliberately apply them. However, pressures may hurt and even destroy. When pressure continues beyond a youth's capacity, he becomes distressed.

The dangers of going too far in applying pressure are very real in our society today. Recognizing the warning signs helps parents know when to draw the line and ease up on a young person. Best, rather than most, pressure must become the goal of all. Some pressure is appropriate, too much is devastating.

## Microwave Demonstration

Learn to cook the Microwave way by attending a Microwave demonstration April 22 at 1:30 in the Courthouse Annex Meeting room. Mrs. Billie Phillips, freelance home economist and microwave consultant from Fort Worth will be in Pampa for this program.

Mrs. Phillips received a B. S. degree from Northwestern State University. She has worked as

County Extension Agent in Louisiana, Home Service representative with a Maryland Gas and Electric Company and home economics teacher. Recent experience includes teaching Microwave Cooking, food preparation for food service workers and Consumer Education for Senior Citizens at Tarrant County Junior College through the Community Campus. She teaches Microwave Cooking Classes regularly at the Cook's Nook in Fort Worth as well as Tarrant County Junior College.

Mrs. Phillips has been trained by all the major microwave manufacturers and feels it is helpful to the consumer to be able to see several different brands with different features demonstrated. She will be pointing out features to look for if you are interested in purchasing the appliance. She will also prepare a variety of food to show how to cook in the microwave. An assortment of educational pamphlets will be available for those attending.

Microwave ovens are a very versatile appliance if used to full capacity. Microwave cooking most food quantities for a four-member family actually saves from 50 - 70 percent energy. Smaller portion sizes (cooking for one or two persons) makes the microwave oven an even greater energy saver.

If you have a microwave oven and only use it to bake potatoes or store bread then you need to attend this program to learn how to use all your appliance features.

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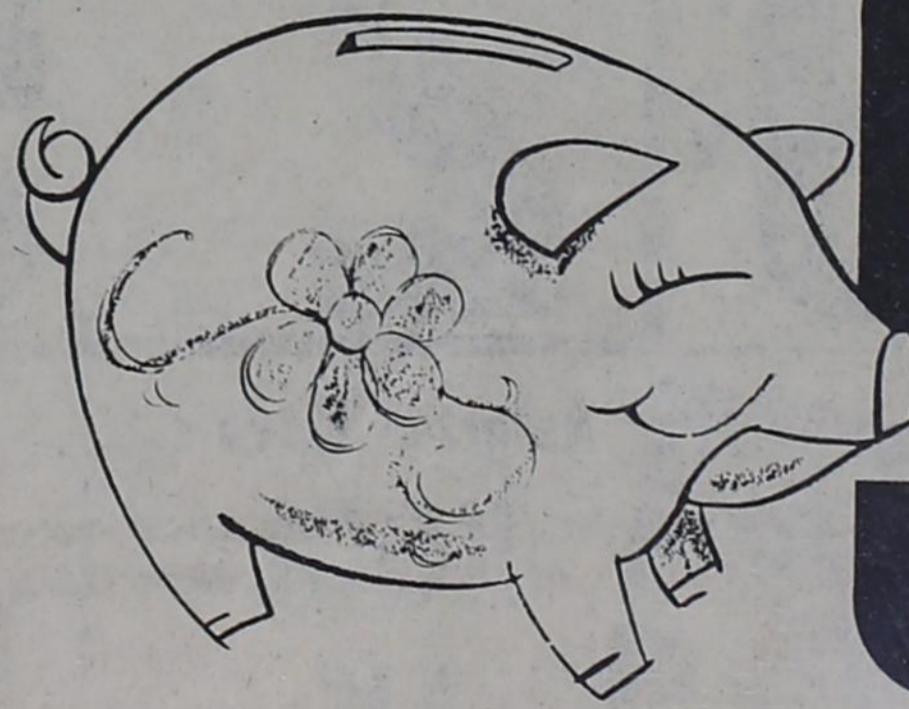
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
