KING'S KOMMENTS

Stockmen in Wheeler County are faced with a problem that often goes untreated or unnoticed. That problem is shin oak poisioning. Usually a shortage of feed will cause livestock to seek out the tender buds that are the only source of green material available. The shin oak buds, tender flowers and newly formed leaves are palatable and poisonous. The tannia of the shin oak is the toxic agent and causes an upset in the digestive tract of

the affected animals. Livestock that eat shin oak buds, flowers and leaves begin to lose weight and have a constant case of diarrhea. Calves are especially susceptible, and some have died from hemorrhagic enteritis and bloody diarrhea after being ill only 24 hours.

Most cases are of a longer duration and last from 3 to 10 days with constipation changing to a bloody diarrhea. The animal may exhibit evidence of discomfort and pain with an absence of appetite and running activity. Affected animals tend to urinate frequently and drink small amounts of water from time to time. Illness may terminate in death after a duration of more than a month. Some animals recover after being ill from 10 to 14 days. Treatment has proven to be of little value.

Due to sever losses at livestock many years, some ranchers pen and feed cattle for 3 to 4 weeks when shin oak begins to bud. Supplementary feeding may help reduce losses, however the use of a properly mixed feed containing calcium hydroxide (hydrated lime) in a palatable formula has proven to be a more effective antidote than the supplement alone. may have to be lengthened if a frost nips the buds, causing a later regrowth. After cattle get on the feed, their milk supply should increase. Calves may scour and lose hair in the anal region, but this should not cause alarm.

A feed formula, developed by Dr. J. W. Dollahite and others at Texas A&M University, that is palatable and economically feasible is as

follows: Ground Alfalfa 600 lbs. **Cotton Seed Meal** 1,080 lbs. 120 lbs. Vegetable Oil Calcium Hydroxide 200 lbs. Total 2,000 lbs. This is an open formula and can be mixed by the owner or any experienced commercial feed producer. Problems have occurred when substitutions to the ingredients have been attempted. Care must be taken not to get the hydrated lime too moist, so as to cause heating. The vegetable oil in the mixture is important and should not be left out. Molasses should not be used to increase palatablility, since the increased moisture may cause heating.

For those livestock owners desiring to purchase a custom mixed feed, there is one available from Godbold Feed, Inc. of Lubbock, Texas, or their retail dealers in many areas of Texas, where shin oak poisoning is a problem.

Calves should be creep-feed and cattle should be fed at the rate of four (4) pounds of the formula daily, starting about a week before the buds appear on the shin oak. The feeding period







Social and economic demands necessitate more years in school -technical training, college, graduate school and post graduate school are becoming the rule rather than the exception. These pressures operate a silent, but never ending, threat to young people today.

In a society that values people for what they can do, pressure is inevitable. Family pressures, psychological pressures, economic pressures, political pressures and peer pressures all exist for youth.

Some pressure can increase motivation. For example, a student with a high grade in a subject will probably feel enough motivation in the face of an exam to study hard to keep his high grade. This pressure is good. However, there is a point in which the youngster is adversely affected and achievement levels off.

To much pressure can lead to stress and anxiety.

Warning signs are clear when this occurs-parents need only observe their youngster. Has his general attitude changed-is he depressed, extremely nervous, or turning to alcohol or drugs for relief? And physical symptoms -is he wakeful and restless at night when he ordinarily slept





wth. After a number of wind storms the soil is reduced in organic matter and plant nutrients which could be used by crops in years to come.

Many farmers have attempted to control erosion by stubble mulching and emergency tillage. However, these measures have left much to be desired due to the extreme winds which buffeted the area these past few weeks. It was interesting to observe



Tommy Cole cotton land which had rye seeded between the cotton rows was showing no signs

of erosion. This appears to be the only successful practice on cotton land which will prevent wind erosion when we experience the high wind velocities to which our area has been exposed during the month of March.

Many farmers feel they sacrifice too much valuable moisture by inter-seeding wheat or rye. However, Mr. Cole does not feel that his yield has been cut by this practice, indeed he feels that the opposite is true. One thing is certain, he will have good productive land to farm in the years to come and when he passes it on to future generations they, too, will be able to reap decent yields from this land. If conditions continue as they have, this will not be true of much of the land we observed blowing recently.
