FARM EQUIPMENT SALE SATURDAY, APRIL 16

Farmers and ranchers wanting to consign equipment to the Farm Equipment Sale sponsored by the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association are urged to do so now.

The sale is scheduled for Saturday, April 16 at 11:00 A.M. at the Wheeler County Agricultural Center at Wheeler. In order for equipment to be listed on the sale bill, consignments should be made by Monday April 4. To consign equipment, contact the Vocational Agriculture instructor in your area or the County Extensions Agent.

The commission will be 5% of the sale price. There will be a P.O. charge of 1% up to a maximum of \$50.00. The Livestock Show Association will publicize and manage the sale.

Equipment already consigned includes: 1-IHC 440 Hay Baler, 13-Boxes Twine, 1-10 ft. Krause tandem disc, 1-1 6/8 J. D. drill, 1-3-6' sweep plow, 1-5-6' sweep plow, 1-Gehl silage trailer, 2-J. D. Model H manure spreader, 1-pick-up headache rack (1/w), and 1-pick-up tool box.

The sale will be held regardless of weather. In the event of inclement weather, the sale will be held indoors.

Burton, Moore, Helton Elected to City Council

Sixty-eight votes were cast in the City of Wheeler election Saturday, April 2. Elected were the Mayor and two councilmen.

The only contested race in the election was for Place 1 on the

council. Leon Moore and Gary Davis placed their names on the ballot. Moore received 50 votes in the election and Davis received 15.

Mayor Pete Purton was elected to serve the remainder of the unexpired term on the council in Place 5. He received 59 votes.

Delbert Thomas was elected for a second term on the council in Place 5. He received 59 votes.

Production Credit Annual Meeting

Agricultural Financing sets the theme for Canadian Production Credit Association's annual meeting of stockholders April 9 (Saturday) in Canadian's City Hall.

According to Larry Albin, the association's president, the meeting begins with registration at 9 a.m., followed by a business session and meal.

Highlight of the meeting will be director elections. Nominees for Place 5 are Mack J. Macias and Don Powell of Canadian. L. F. Etheredge, also of Canadian, is not seeking reelection. Incumbent Lloyd R. Buzzard of Spearman and Cecil Leicht of Farnsworth are nominees for Place 6.

Jack H. Barton, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, serves as guest speaker. Barton, whose topic is "Building for our Agricultural and Financial Future," heads the Houston bank which last year provided more than \$1.5 billion in loan funds to Texas farmers and ranchers. The credit bank is the principal source of most Canadian PCA loan funds and a member bank of the \$37 billion national Farm Credit System.

Other business items include the nominating committee's report by W. C. Epperson, chairman of Pampa, the association's financial report by Albin, report from the board by C. B. Henderson of Wheeler. Welcome will be given by George W. Arrington, stockholder from Canadian, and the invocation by W. A. Goad, Jr., Wheeler stockholder. Thomas R. Helton, stockholder from Wheeler, serves as master of ceremonies.

More than 450 farmer-rancher members and guests from Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts and Wheeler counties are expected to attend.

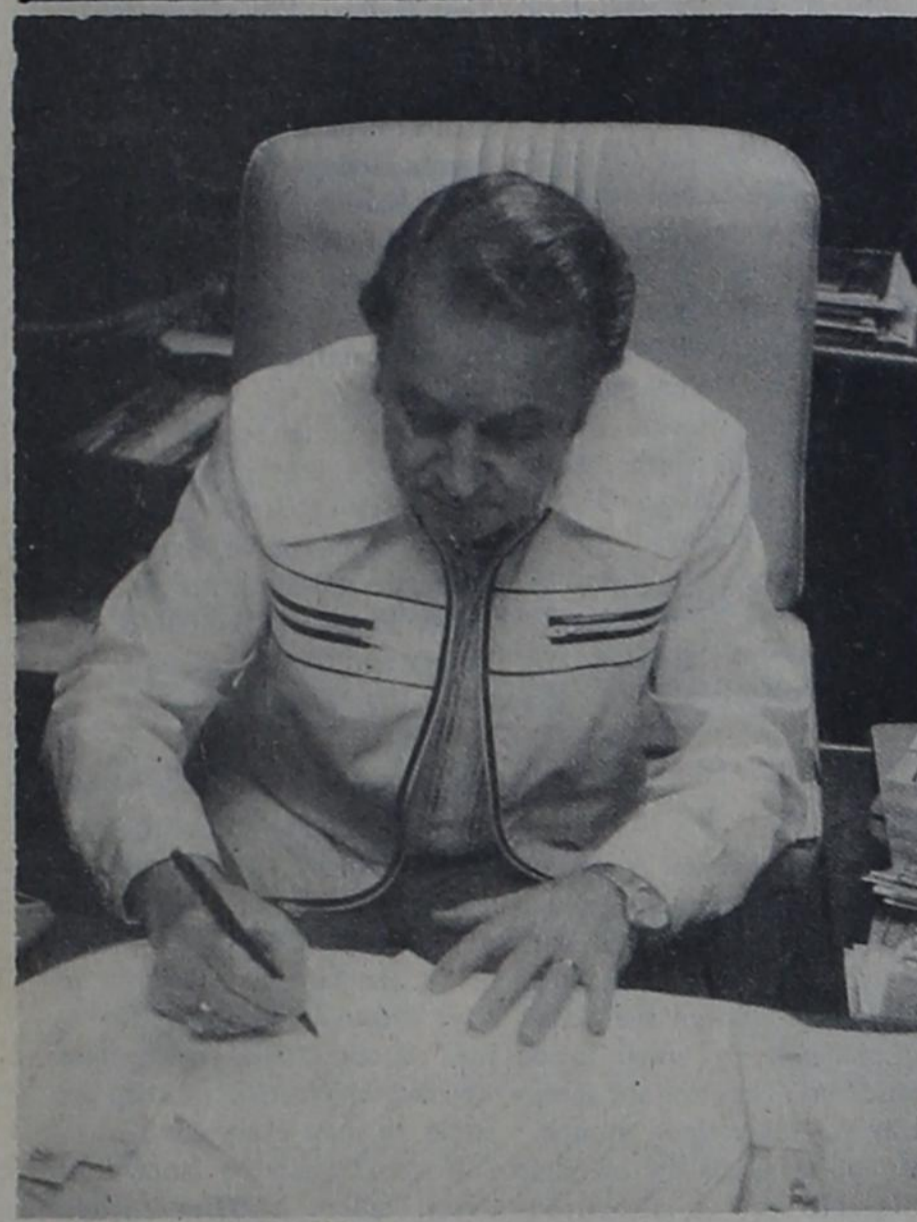
Christian Center Easter Activities

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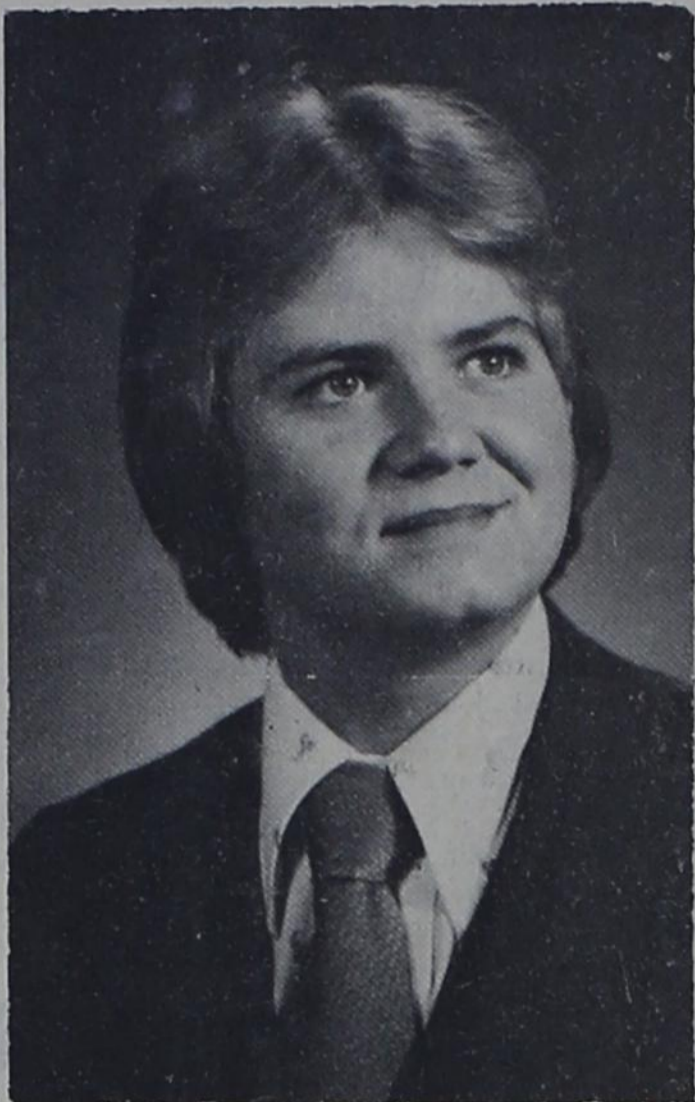

"Four score and seven years ago, our fathers brought forth to this continent a new nation, conceived in 'liberty...' Liberty for all facids of life no matter what shape, form, or equality.

TRACK

On March 25 and 26, the boys' track team attended the Top-of-Texas Meet at Lefors.

Field events were held on Friday, the 25. Winning first in the shot was Jim Verden, with a toss of 53'2 1/2". In the discus Verden not only won first with a 160'7" toss but bettered the school record set by him at White Deer (156'4") earlier this year.

On Saturday, the 26, the 440 relay won third, with a time of 46.3. Duane Childress, Marvin Grimes, Dell Ford, and Don Brown run on the relay.

In the 120 yard high hurdles Myron Jolly gained 4th with a time of 17.1.

Darrell Gaines won 1st in the 880 yard dash with 2:06.6. Wendell Moore finished 5th with 2:22.1, and Mike Lee finished 6th with 2:22.8.

In the 330 intermediate hurdles, Don Brown won 2nd with a time of 43.2, and Dell Ford placed 4th with 45.1.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 97
AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT, MAINTAIN, EQUIP AND OPERATE IN THE TOWN OF WHEELER, TEXAS, SYSTEMS TO USE, SELL, DISTRIBUTE AND SUPPLY ELECTRIC ENERGY FOR LIGHTING, HEAT, POWER AND OTHER PURPOSES TO SAID TOWN, ITS INHABITANTS AND OTHERS, AND TO USE THE STREETS, AVENUES, ALLEYS, HIGHWAYS, SIDEWALKS, BRIDGES AND OTHER PUBLIC GROUND OF SAID TOWN FOR SAID PURPOSE FOR A PERIOD OF FIFTY (50) YEARS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF WHEELER, TEXAS: ARTICLE I: There is hereby granted to Southwestern Public Service Company, a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of New Mexico, having a permit to do business in the State of Texas, and to its successors and assigns, a non-exclusive franchise authorizing it to construct, equip, maintain and operate in the Town of Wheeler, Texas, systems to use, sell, distribute and otherwise serve, supply and furnish said Town and its inhabitants and others with electric energy for light, heat and power and other purposes, and to use the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of Town, both above and below the surface thereof, upon the terms and conditions of this ordinance.

ARTICLE II: The franchise rights and powers herein granted shall exist and be in force from and after the passage of this ordinance for a term of fifty (50) years.

ARTICLE III: Southwestern Public Service Company is hereby authorized and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in executing the powers and utilizing the privileges herein granted by this franchise, provided that all work done on said streets, alleys, highways or other grounds of said Town by said Company shall be done with the utmost diligence and at least inconvenience to the public or individuals; that said Company shall, within a reasonable time, restore streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it to their original condition as nearly as possible and that said work shall be done subject to the approval of the Town.

ARTICLE IV: Southwestern Public Service Company, its successors and assigns, shall furnish any and all citizens residing in the corporate limits of the Town of Wheeler, Texas, and otherwise entitled thereto under the terms and conditions of this ordinance electric energy on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by the parties, provided that said Company shall not be required to make any extension of its existing lines for a greater distance than Two Hundred Feet (200') from where it may have a service line for each new customer to be served by such extension. The Company shall not be responsible or liable to any person, firm or corporation for the interruption of such service arising from floods, fires, windstorms, accidents, Acts of God or any other cause beyond its control, but in case of any such interruption the Company shall use reasonable diligence to re-establish service as soon as possible.

ARTICLE V: Southwestern Public Service Company, its successors and assigns, for and in consideration of the granting of this franchise and as rental for the occupation and use of the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of the Town of Wheeler, Texas, shall pay the aggregate sum of two percent (2%) of the gross receipts, as hereinafter defined, of the Company, for electric energy used within the City limits of the Town of Wheeler, Texas, upon which such rentals and charges are based is defined and shall be computed and determined as follows: From the total gross receipts from the sale of such electrical energy for lights, heat and power, within said City limits, for the particular quarter of the year involved, there shall be deducted the receipts from sale to the Federal Government, Federal Government departments and agencies, the County of Wheeler, the Town of Wheeler, Texas and other public government authorities and sales to industries upon such utilities published Industrial Rates, and the balance paid after said deductions shall constitute the gross receipts upon which such rentals and charges shall be paid.

Such payments shall be payable for each quarter period of each year, said periods to begin on the first days of the months of January, April, July and October of each year. The payments covering each prior period shall be made within reasonable time immediately after each period. Such payments shall be in lieu of any and all other taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements) upon the business, revenue or property of the Company or any part thereof in said Town during the term of this franchise, and they shall continue only so long as said Company is not prohibited from making them by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises and so long as the Town does not charge, levy or collect or attempt to charge, levy or collect other franchise, license, privilege, occupation, excise or revenue taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements).

For the purpose of determining the amount of the gross receipts of the Company, as hereinabove defined, the books of the Company, shall, at all times, be subject to the inspection of the town of Wheeler, Texas.

ARTICLE VI: Southwestern Public Service Company shall, within thirty (30) days from the passage of this ordinance, file with the City Secretary of the Town of Wheeler, Texas, its written acceptance of this ordinance and upon the filing of such acceptance this ordinance shall constitute all of the terms of the

ordinance for a term of fifty (50) years.

ARTICLE III: Southwestern Public Service Company is hereby authorized and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in executing the powers and utilizing the privileges herein granted by this franchise, provided that all work done on said streets, alleys, highways or other grounds of said Town by said Company shall be done with the utmost diligence and at least inconvenience to the public or individuals; that said Company shall, within a reasonable time, restore streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it to their original condition as nearly as possible and that said work shall be done subject to the approval of the Town.

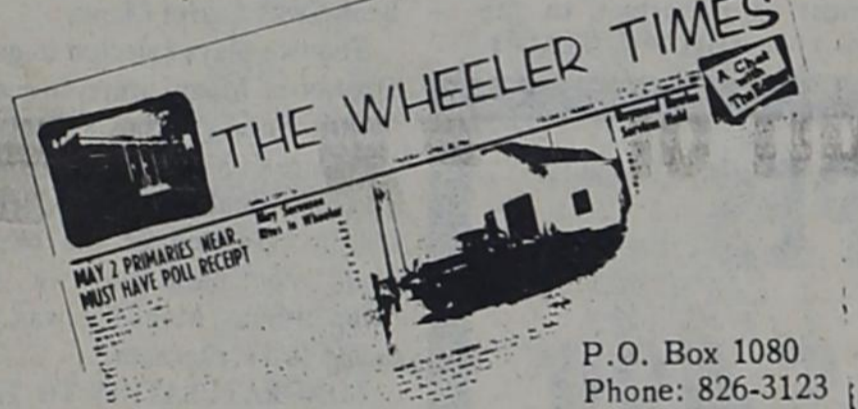

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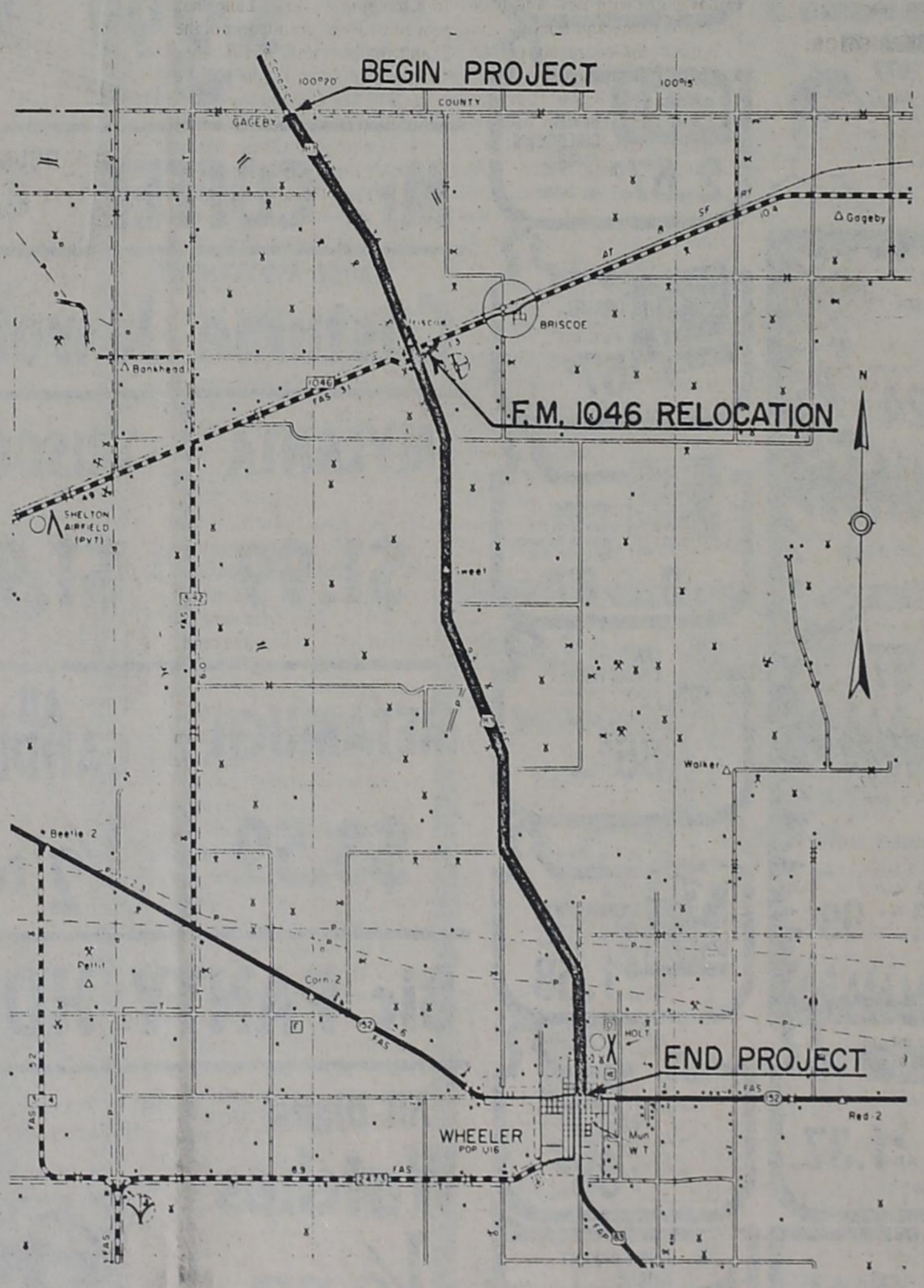

with delicious filling or savory sauces add a fancy—but easy-to-serve touch to any meal.
Crepe batter is a smooth mixture of flour, eggs, milk, salt and melted fat or cooking oil—and the dessert variety also contains a minute amount of sugar. Crepe variations using either cornmeal, whole wheat or cocoa can complement special fillings.
For cooking, electric crepe pans or griddles are available,

but any six-inch pan will work as well.

To make these thin pancakes in a skillet, hold the heated skillet with one hand and pour about two tablespoons of crepe batter into the pan. Rotate the pan quickly so batter covers the bottom of the pan in a thin, even layer. Return skillet to heat and cook 45-60 seconds.

Crepes can be folded many different ways—most cookbooks show directions for this step.

A bonus to the ease of fixing crepes is that they do not have to be made the day they are to be served. Make them a day, week or months in advance. Separate each crepe with waxed paper, wrap in freezer, vapor-moisture proof paper and freeze.

Try this basic crepe recipe that features a creamy filling and fresh raspberry accept.

BASIC DESSERT CREPES
1 cup all-purpose flour
1½ cups milk
2 eggs
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon cooking oil
1/8 teaspoon salt

In a jar combine flour, milk, eggs, sugar, oil and salt; put lid on jar and shake until blended. Let the mixture remain at room temperature for 1 hour. Cook crepes in greased skillet. Invert pan on paper towel; remove crepe. Makes 16 to 18 crepes.

CREAMY FILLING

1 cup sour cream
3 oz. cream cheese
2 tablespoons powdered sugar
2-3 drops Kirsch (optional)
Roll crepes by rolling back side up like an enchilada. Top with frozen or fresh raspberries.

Another food idea for entertaining is cheese and fruits. They make ideal dessert or snacks.

A tray of assorted cheeses and a bowl of fresh fruits make a dessert fancy enough for a party.

Cheese is also nutritious—it's an excellent source of complete protein.

Another party idea is to serve crackers and thin slices of pumpkin and rye bread with the cheese. An assortment of cheeses gives each guest the opportunity to choose his favorite.

Most cheeses need to be served at room temperature to bring out their distinctive flavors and textures. Hard varieties should be out of the refrigerator an hour before serving. Keep the cheese covered to prevent the surface from drying out.

If apples and pears will accompany the cheese, dip the cut fruit in lemon juice or other citrus juice so it will not darken.

Other dessert ideas might include cheese cakes or pies, cream cheese frosting, dips, cheese balls, sauces and fondue.

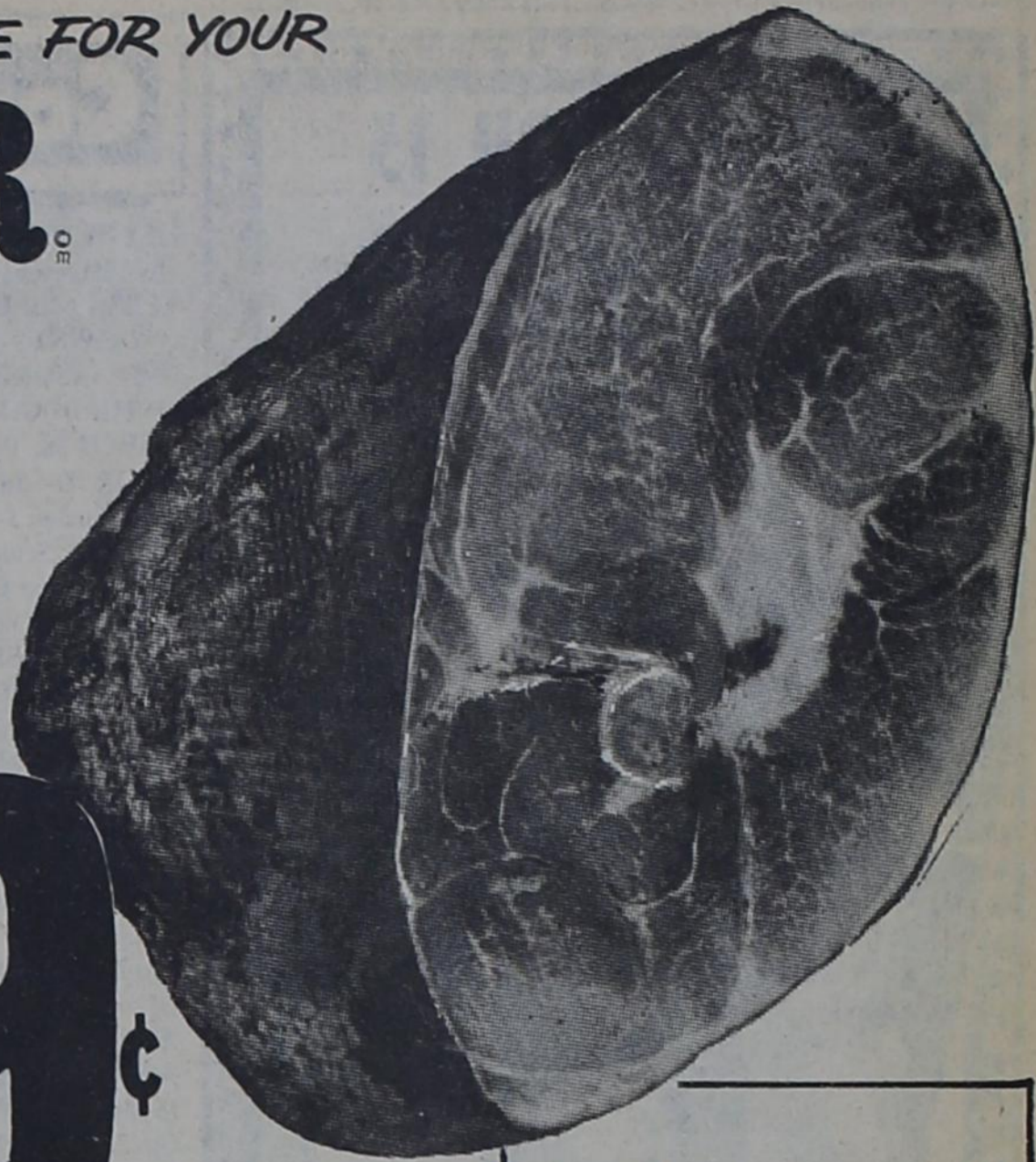

PESTICIDE APPLICATOR CERTIFICATION EXPLAINED
 The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) as amended, enforced by the Environmental Protection Agency, includes among other requirements (1) the classification of all uses of pesticides as either restricted use or general use and (2) certification of applicators (private & commercial) as a requisite to the legal use or supervision of use of restricted-use pesticides.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act, although not requiring certification of private applicators, authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators, on a voluntary basis, who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law.

The term "private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of any pesticide which is classified for restricted use for purposes of producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person.

The program established by the Texas Department of Agriculture provides three options for

certification of private applicators to include:

- 1) Completion of an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group.
- 2) Submission of a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following review of self-study material.
- 3) For emergency situations, a single-product, single-purchase, single-use certifications available through the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Private applicator certification training programs have been scheduled as a means by which Wheeler County producers may qualify for certification as a means by which Wheeler County producers may qualify for certification as private applicators. The meeting will be held Thursday, April 28 at 7:00 p.m. in the Wheeler School Cafeteria.

As an alternative to participation in a training program, self-study materials are available at the county Extension office. To complete the self-study option the person seeking certification must submit a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The single-product, single-purchase, single-use certification for emergency situations will be available as restricted-use pesticides are marketed.

The full implementation of the amended Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act is scheduled for October 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, producers of agricultural commodities must be certified applicators as a requisite to the use of restricted-use pesticides.

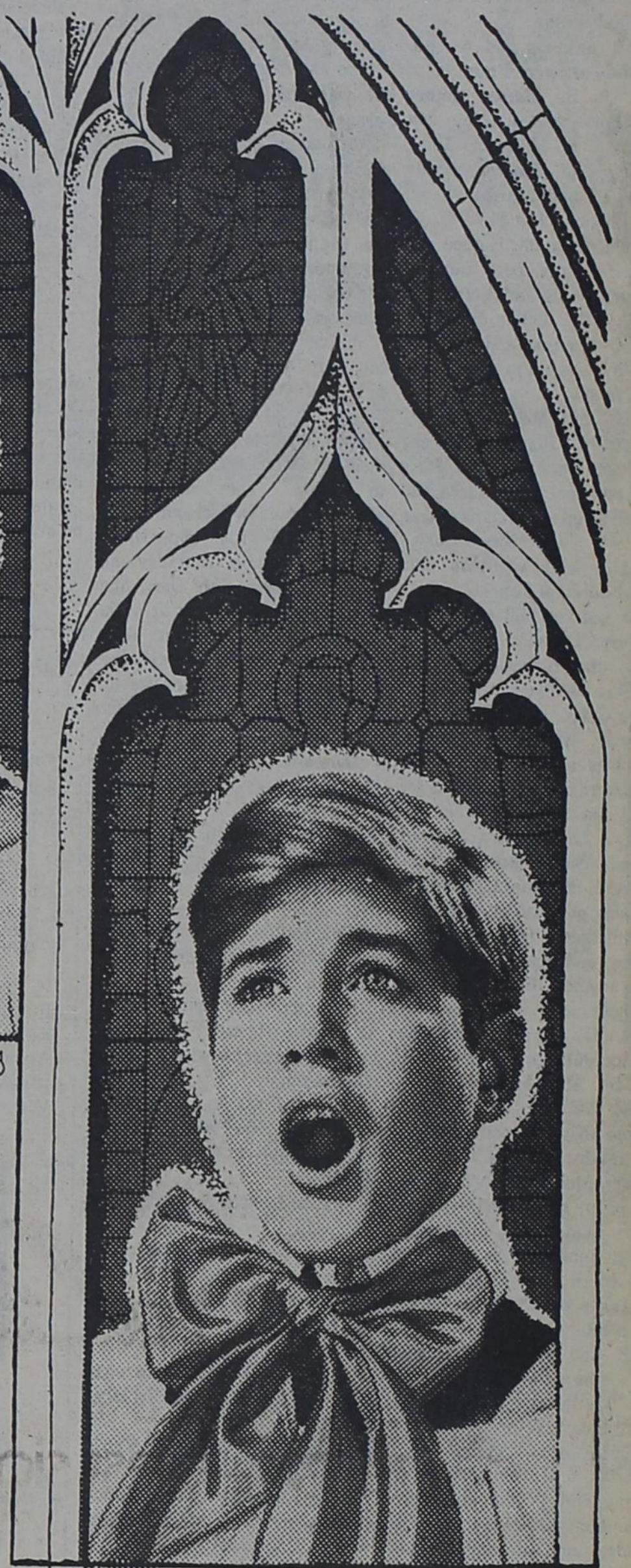
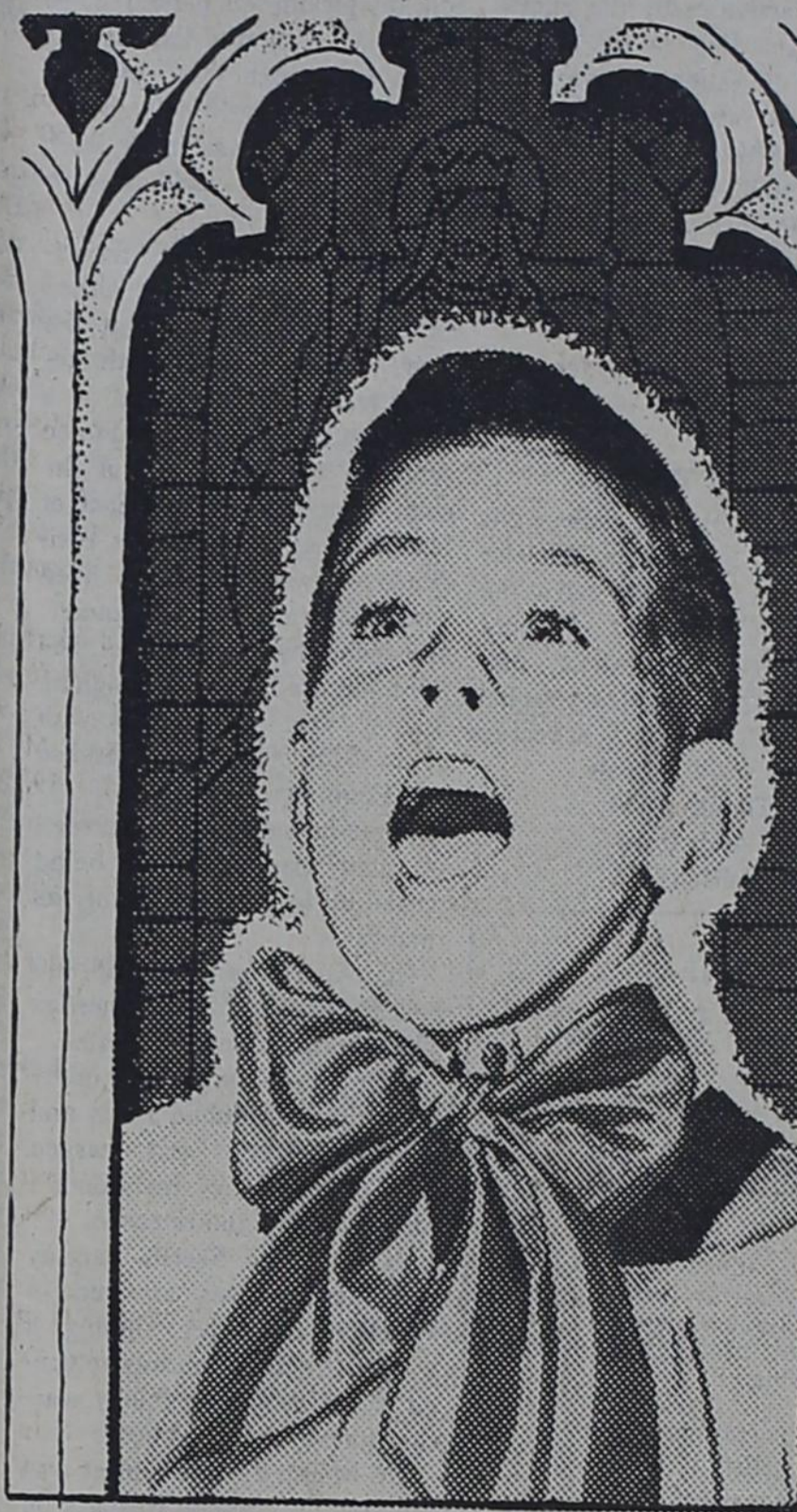

Co. Sheriff Dept. Report

Sheriff Doyle Ramsey reports 29 prisoners in the Wheeler County Jail during March. Included in these were fifteen D.W.I.'s, four for public intoxication, one fugitive, three on theft charges, one alien, one was held for criminal trespass, one possession of marijuana, and three juveniles.

Other activities by the Sheriff Office according to the Sheriff included the vandalism of an auto owned by Murl Kuhlman of Allison, on March 25th. The auto was left on highway 277 North of Allison to mechanical problems and someone broke out two door glasses, back glass and windshield.

Four theft cases were reported during the month of March.

These included the theft of tools from equipment owned by the Moery Company during the night of March 22nd. Theft of four head of cattle from the Coy Revious place North of Wheeler was reported on March 5th. Also the theft of a high-boy jack from the back of Stanley Morris's pickup during the night of March 9th, the pickup was parked in his driveway. A theft of saddles and other tack gear was reported stolen on March 13th by B. T. Johnson, arrest was made later that day and the saddles were recovered.

Three burglaries were reported in March to Sheriff Office Officials. One occurring at the New Wheeler Library with nothing taken. This occurred on a cold night and was believed to be someone getting in out of the cold. Another occurred East of Shamrock at the Hammer residence where no one has lived since the death of Mr. Hammer, one cedar chest was taken. The third occurred at Dunningham Station West of Shamrock with about \$250.00 of merchandise and Equipment taken.

Three juveniles were returned to their parents after being picked up in Wheeler County as runaway's.

One Alien was picked up and held for Border Patrol authorities who will return him to Mexico.

Four person's were filed on by Department of Public Safety and Sheriff authorities and charged with possession of marijuana. All were fined and released.

According to Sheriff Ramsey one fugitive was arrested in Wheeler and after signing a waiver of extradition was returned to Oklahoma on felony warrant for the theft by check.

On March 22nd a subject was arrested for criminal trespass on the school grounds and released on bond.

Sheriff Ramsey reports on March 17th District Court was held and two criminal cases were heard by the District Judge.

Michael Frank Moore received 10 years probation for theft of C. B. radio from a parked car. Willie George Caldwell received 5 years probation for passing forged check.

One stolen vehicle, a 1970 Ford Pickup, was recovered in Wheeler and returned to Dimmitt, Texas by its owner.

Since last month Justice of the Peace Charlie Whiteley has left his office in the courthouse and moved into the Sheriff's office building located in the Jail on Alan L. Bean Blvd. The Sheriff also reports that a warning

device, a tone transmitted by radio, has been installed in the Fire Department radio to aid in alerting the members of the Fire Department of a Fire.

Wheeler Boys Attend Track Meets

WHEELER TRACK BOYS

The Wheeler Track Boys participated in the Top Of Texas Invitational meet at Lefors Friday and Saturday, March 25-26. In the 14 track and field events, Wheeler was in the top seven in 12 events.

One new school record was broken. Marvin Grimes ran the 220 Dash in 22.5 seconds for first place at the Top Of Texas Invitational. The school record was 22.6 set in 1962 by Bobby Treadwell; Bobby Vanpool ran the same time in 1967.

Wheeler placed first in four of the 12 events. In addition to the first in the 220 yard dash, Darrell Gaines won first in the 880 dash with a time of 2:06. Jim Verden placed first in two of the field events; he placed in shot put with a distance of 53' 2 1/2" and discus with a distance of 160' 7". Don Brown placed second in the 330 intermediate hurdle, followed by Dell Ford in fifth place.

The 440 relay team placed third. Team members are Childress, Dell Ford, Marvin Grimes and Don Brown.

Myron Jolly was fourth in the 120 high hurdles. Wendell Moore was fifth in the 880 dash.

The mile relay team was right behind the first place winners; this second place honor went to Marvin Grimes, Tim Patterson, Darrell Gaines and Don Brown.

The Wheeler team took sixth and seventh in the mile run. Tony Hefley and Kevin Andis placed sixth and seventh respectively.

In the field events, Jeff Davis tossed the shot put 40' 5 1/4" down the field for seventh place.

IRISH TRACK MEET

One school record and one meet record was broken Saturday, April 2, as the Wheeler Boys Track Team competed in the Irish Relays at Shamrock. The team earned 78 points for a third place

tie with Quannah. First and second place went to Wellington and Memphis.

In the field events, Jim Verden turned in a distance of 160' in the discus for first place and a new meet record. The old record was set in 1976. Jim also placed first in the shot put with a distance of 53' 6".

A school record set in 1963 by Mendell Hunter was broken by Dell Ford at the Irish Relays. Dell jumped a distance of 6' 0" for first place in the high jump at the meet; the old school record was 5' 10".

Another first place was earned by Marvin Grimes with a time of 23.1 in the 220 yard dash. Second place honors went to

Darrell Gaines with a time of 2:06.6 in the 880 yard dash and Don Brown with a time of 42.0 in the 330 intermediate hurdles.

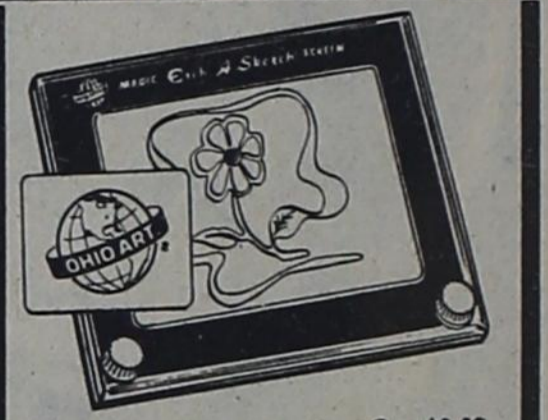
The mile relay team placed third at the meet; team members were Marvin Grimes, Darrell Gaines, Tim Patterson and Don Brown.

Mrs. Street will be hostess for the next club meeting.



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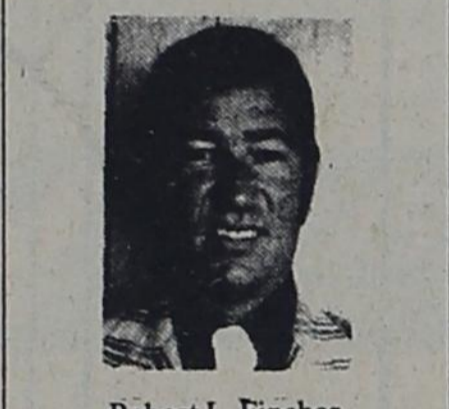

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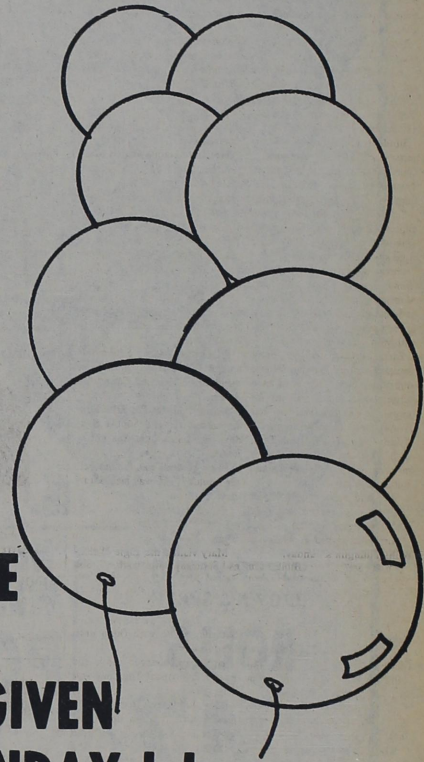
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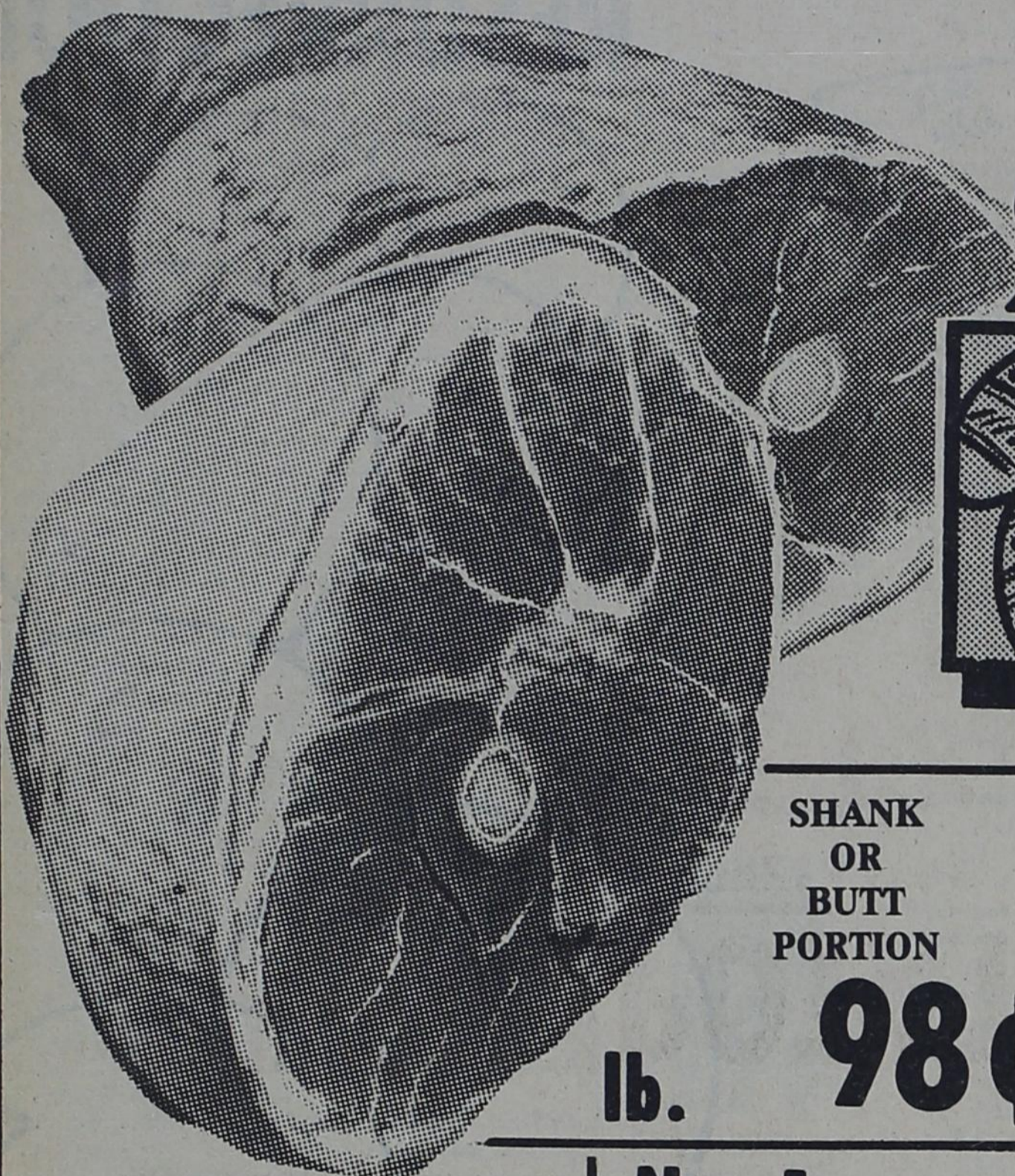
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
