Flag Day Celebration Set At Mobeetie Jail Wed.

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association will celebrate Flag Day on June 14, 1995 at 5:30 p.m. with a brief ceremony in which old, torn, tattered, and damaged flags will be received for proper disposal in a private service. The Flag Day ceremony will be held at the Jail Museum in Old Mobeetie and will feature several speakers including County Judge, Wendell Morgan, Wallace Fields, the Mobeetie Girl Scouts, and the Wheeler Boy Scouts. All businesses, government offices, or private individuals who have United States flags that need to be disposed are invited to bring flags to the ceremony. This is an annual event sponsored by the Jail Museum.

Manhunt Consequence Of Evening Rafting Incident

An evening excursion along the South Fork of the Red River resulted in a major search for a group of Wheeler youth. Thirteen individuals, ranging in age from 17 to 21 were involved.

It was decided it would be fun to go inner tubing down the river from the Magic City Bridge to the Highway 83 bridge. With the recent rains, the flow of the river should be sufficient to carry the inner tubes and their passengers. Inner tubes were gathered and loaded into a trailer. At 6:00 P.M. eleven began their trip down the river; two remained behind to meet the adventurers near Shamrock.

At 10:30 when none of the travelers had completed the trip, the Shamrock Police Department was contacted. In turn, the County Sheriff's Department was notified. Volunteer from both the Wheeler and Shamrock Fire Departments were asked to help. The Texas Highway Patrol provided portable lighting and arrangements were made to get a helicopter involved in the search. Ft. St. was prepared to bring a helicopter.

The search ended at 12:30 when the last seven individuals were picked up 2 miles west of the Shamrock bridge. Four were found 1 mile west of the bridge. The youth had encountered sandbars and in other areas, the water was too shallow for them to float. They had to walk a great deal of the distance.

An estimated distance is 12 miles, due to the turns the river makes. Local adults, who admitted to having made a similar journey reported the time required was 6-8 hours.

The helicopters were returned around. None of the youths were injured during the trip.

Adventurers and their parents gathered at the Wheeler Fire Department for a discussion of the situation.

Chamber Reports Turkey Hunt Generates \$15,000

The Board of Directors of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and several members met at noon Tuesday, June 6. The City-Wide Garage Sale, the Turkey Hunt and the 4th of July Celebration were the topics discussed.

The weather did not cooperate completely with the City-Wide Garage Sale. Twenty-six garage sale permits were sold in Wheeler, four booths were set up on the square and 5 businesses held sales in conjunction with the event. The chamber's profit for the day's activity was down \$27 from 1994.

James Masters was in charge of the Turkey Hunt. Thirteen local landowners provided areas for 47 hunters from over the nation to hunt. Some \$15,050 was generated from the hunt and \$11,610.00 was paid to the land owners. This does not include the money spent by the hunters for hunting licenses, motels and meals.

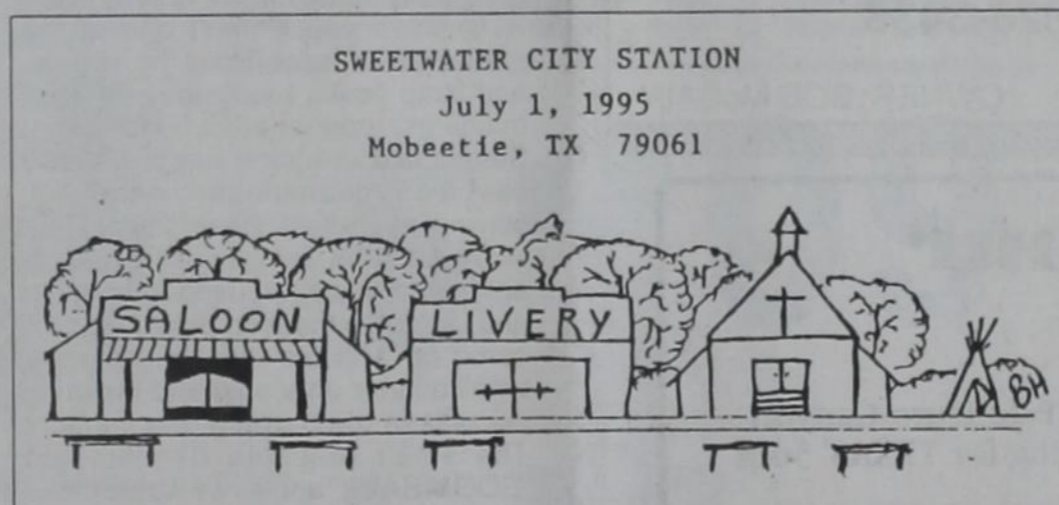
CO. VETERANS' MEMORIAL DEDICATION AT 3:00 P.M.

The cancellation design was chosen thru an art contest sponsored by the Old Mobeetie Association. The contest was won by Bernice Hefley, a local artist. The cancellation depicts buildings typical to an old western town.

The Special Cancellation can be obtained two ways. The first way will be to visit the Sweetwater City Station at the Heritage Day Celebration. You will be able to purchase the newly released TEXAS STATEHOOD COMMEMORATIVE STAMP, affix it to an envelope, and have the Special cancellation applied. Also available will be the LEGENDS OF THE WEST STAMPS, and the LEGENDS OF THE WEST MINT SET.

Customers may purchase a stamp at their local post office, affix the stamp(s) to envelopes of their choice, address the envelopes (to themselves or others), insert a card of postcard thickness, tuck in the flap and place the envelope(s) in a larger envelope addressed to: POSTMASTER, SWEETWATER CITY STATION, P.O. BOX 7000, MOBEETIE, TX 79061-9998.

After applying the postmark, the Postal Service returns the envelopes thru the mail. There is no charge for the postmark. All orders must be post-marked by July 31, 1995.

Co. Tax Office To Close June 13-15 for Training

The Wheeler County Tax Office will be closed Tuesday, June 13 through Thursday, June 15, while staff members receive training in a new RTS (Registration and Titles System). The office will open again on Friday, June 16, for regular hours.

The new system and its state of the art equipment should speed up the process of registration and titles, which is a vital part of the work of the tax office. It should eliminate some problems and speed up the entry of information into the state system in 24 hours.

JAN NEWLAND TEXAS SPORTS

Jan Newland was closing the door on her All-America collegiate basketball career and just beginning her coaching career when she met her husband-to-be Mike Newland.

Basketball brought them together — they met as high school basketball coaches in Iowa — but it was far more than just basketball that formed the foundation of this very special relationship.

When Jan, a Claude native, landed a job as the head girls' basketball coach at Wheeler, Mike followed and even served as her assistant coach.

After settling down at Wheeler, they started a family. Mike became the head boys' basketball coach at Wheeler and later the principal at Wheeler Elementary school, while Jan's Lady Stangs were racking up district titles by the truckload (nine in a 14-year span).

Their relationship survived the good times and the bad — and in a way is still going strong to this day. Jan was one of eight nominees inducted into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame during ceremonies earlier this month at the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches Convention in San Antonio.

She was a two-time all-state player during her high school days at Claude, which also included two state titles. Collegiately, she played for the U. S. team in 1973-74 and was a member of the very first Kodak All-America team in 1975.

She found out by surprise that it was her late husband, who died of cancer in the fall of 1993, that nominated her for the prestigious honor.

"I didn't realize he had done this. I found out from a person on the nominating committee. He never said a word about it," Newland said. "He had listed all my accomplishments through college, through everything and then he never mentioned it to me."

"We were always the type that would pull things on one another. This was just like something he would do but it was still a surprise."

Jan's enshrinement into the TSHOF is a perfect example of the relationship she had with her husband.

Shortly after his death, Jan received a bunch of trees in the mail. "I was thinking what in the world was this?" Newland said with a laugh. "Mike had ordered all these trees. I thought, yeah, he is getting the last laugh on me because I was going to have to plant all these trees now."

The memory of Mike Newland still lives on in Wheeler.

A scholarship bearing his name is given out every year to a Mustang student. The Southwest Basketball Officials Association also annually awards a girls' sportsmanship award in his name, Newland said.

"He was really an inspiration to the kids," Newland said. "You try to look at things positively. The thing I think of is that my kids (Kimberly and Jarod) know what true dedication in a marriage is after seeing what all Mom and Dad went through."

When the cancer was first detected, Mike drove back and forth from Amarillo for radiation treatments. There were times when he got sick during a game and Jan, who would routinely sit at his side, would then take over.

Flavor Enhances That Don't Add Sodium Nor Excess Calories

One favorite of the Texas Beef Council recommends the blend of one half each of Greek seasoning and pepper prior to grilling with the wood flavor of choice. Mesquite has been a real favorite in the preparation of fajitas in the past decade and will continue to flavor many other cuts of beef.

Used Oil Collection Sites Established for Area

The Panhandle Environmental Partnership is setting up a network of used oil collection sites in the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle. The Partnership is a program of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) and the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission (TNRCC), which made the program possible with a grant of almost \$300,000. The Partnership is opening the sites in cooperation with the region's local governments, giving "do-it-yourselfers" convenient locations to dump used motor oil. Dumping used oil in unauthorized places is illegal. Oil can seep into soil and contaminate underground supplies of water, thus endangering the health of thousands of area residents who depend on underground water for drinking and agriculture. While some area residents already have access to used oil recycling centers, other do not. Until now, many residents in smaller communities have had to carry used oil to distant or inconvenient recycling stations.

coaching duties.
He underwent a grueling 17-hour surgery in Dallas and later went to Houston for experimental surgery. Jan would teach and coach during the week, fly to Houston to be with Mike on the weekend and then fly back for work on Monday.

"I did that for about 2 1/2 months. When we got to bring him home I had to learn how to give shots and IV's," Newland said. "In between teaching and coaching, I had to be nurse and Mom."
"It was really hard. You have loyalty to the school and to your program. You don't want to cheat your athletes but at the same time you have a hus-

band that is dying of cancer that you have a responsibility to. Plus, our two kids were having to go through this. At the time they were eight and 10 and not many kids that age can learn how to run an oxygen machine, suction machine and a feeding machine. We kept him here at home and he died here at home."
As sick as he was, Mike attended almost every Wheeler football game. Jan bought a portable oxygen machine so that he could sit in the car near the end zone and watch Mustang football.

"I belong to a group that deals with people going through divorce or being widowed and that has helped a bunch," Newland said. "I really wanted to mention something about Mike during the

(TSHOF) induction ceremonies but I knew that I would start crying and I didn't want to do that. I didn't want to cry in front of all those people."
"I just had knee surgery nine days before that. I was on crutches and had a huge knee brace, so I wasn't walking that well. I said I thought this would be a good time to go ahead and have it done so everyone could see what a 40-year-old ex-jock looked like."
Bad knee or not, it was an extraordinary moment for Newland. And thanks to her late husband, something she never expected.
"It was really special. Mike's parents flew in from Missouri to be with me," Newland said. "I guess he did get to pull the last surprise on me."
And somewhere, looking down on it all, you know Mike Newland had a big smile on his face.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:
* the value placed on your property
* any exemptions that you may apply to you
* the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
* the taxable status of your property
* the local governments which should be taxing your property
* any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).
The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 101 E. Texas, courthouse square, Wheeler.
Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline
The 1995 deadline is July 1st. (or 30 days after a notice of appraisal value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Duties
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district, or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday

Taxpayers May Protest or Challenge Appraisal

Property owners in the Wheeler County Appraisal District who are subject to local ad valorem taxes may now protest or challenge the appraised value of taxable properties for 1995 tax year.

The protest period officially began Tuesday, May 30th, when the appraisal district mailed Notices of Appraised Value to all taxpayers of record. The final day of the official protest period is July 1st. This gives taxpayers 30 days to file a formal protest according to state law.

According to Chief Appraiser, Larry Schoenhals, many values are settled each year without the need to file a formal protest. Taxpayers who have questions about their appraised values should contact the appraisal office and provide all the information they have concerning the property in question.

If the appraisal district and the taxpayer cannot agree as to the taxable value of a property, the taxpayer may file a written protest to the Appraisal Review Board (ARB). 1995 ARB protest hearings have been scheduled for July 20th (personal property/real estate) and July 21st (mineral/industrial).

Property owners who protest the valuation must not attempt to contact ARB members outside formal hearing. Each property owner who files a written protest must sign an affidavit stating that no such contact has occurred before a hearing can begin.
