BANK NOTES TO PERFORM

The Booker Bank Notes, a 40 voice mixed ensemble, sponsored by First Bank & Trust Co., Booker, Texas will be the featured entertainment at a benefit sponsored by the Old Mobeetie Association to be held on Saturday, March 19, 1977, at the Mobeetie High School at 7:30.

This is the first time the Bank Notes have appeared in Mobeetie, however, they have been singing throughout the Panhandle area for nearly 8 years and have made more than 170 appearances in 5 states. During 1976, the group appeared before more than 6,000 people.

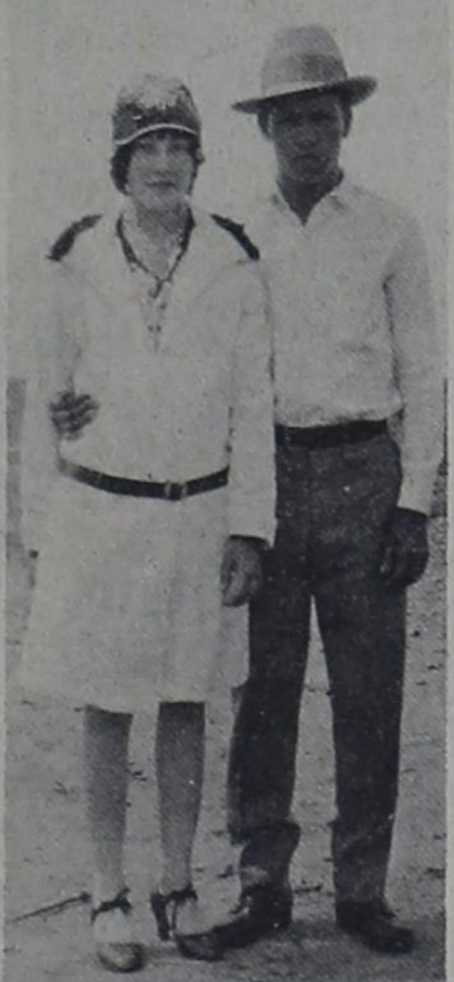

Wilbur Hugh Sims, 58, died at his home in Mobeetie as a result of a gun shot wound. Sims had taken his gun to the barn to shoot a cat; he climbed onto a stack of hay and slipped. When he fell, the gun discharged; the charge struck Sims under the arm and came out through the chest.

The accident occurred about 12:20 p.m. Tuesday, March 8, 1977.

Rabies Clinic Mar. 26

Dr. Tommie Hennard will hold a Rabies Clinic Saturday, March 26. The purpose of the clinic will be to vaccinate all pets against rabies. At the same time the City of Wheeler will have dog licenses on sale.

The clinic will be held at the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic on West Highway 152 from 1:00 until 5:00. Pet owners are urged to have their pets on a leash to better control them.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. The shot will cost \$3.50.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and

proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City Limits are required to be licensed and vaccinated.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies.

For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 during the time the clinic is being conducted and a member of the Key Club will be on duty to pick up the animals.

Cats Should Be Vaccinated

Although it is not required that cats be vaccinated, they are in danger in the fight against rabies and should be vaccinated, stated Dr. Hennard. The cost for vaccinating a cat will be \$3.50.

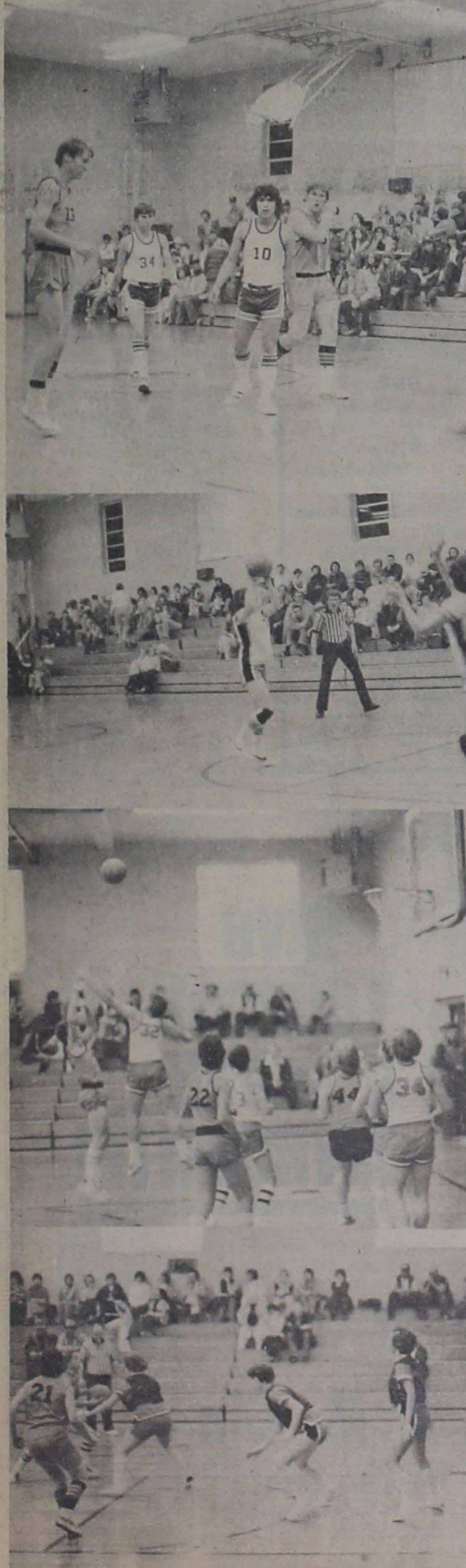

ST. PATRICK'S DAY

Ireland is famous for giving America some of its best cooking. With St. Patrick's Day coming up thoughts turn to this good Irish cooking.

In Ireland it is said that a beef roast with vegetables is often the dinner treat for St. Patrick's Day. Irish Soda Bread and potato soup just naturally go along with the fresh beef brisket roast. The dessert, Coffee-Mint Parfait, is a take-off on the famous Irish coffee. Vanilla Ice Cream is layered alternately with a coffee flavored liquor and green cream de menthe. The topping is whipped cream, of course.

The following recipes were taken from Martha Logan's Food News & Views, Swift & Company.

CUP O' POTATO SOUP

Yield: 4 to 6 servings about 1/2 cup each.

- 1/2 cup mashed potatoes
- 1 cup beef broth or bouillon
- 1 T butter or margarine
- 1 t finely diced onion
- 1/8 t white pepper
- 1 cup half and half
- 1/4 cup shredded Munchie Cheese

Chopped parsley, optional

Blend mashed potatoes into broth. Add butter, onion and pepper. Bring to a boil. Simmer 5 minutes. Add half and half and cheese. Heat to serving temperature; do not boil. Serve in soup cups topped with chopped parsley.

FRESH BRISKET OF BEEF WITH VEGETABLES

Yield: 6 servings
3 to 4 pound Swift Premium ProTen Beef Brisket

- 1/2 t paprika
- 1/2 t salt
- 1/4 t pepper
- 1/2 cup flour

Fat

- 1/2 cup water
- 4 to 6 medium carrots
- 4 to 6 small onions

Combine seasonings and flour. Dip roast into season flour. Keep remaining seasoned flour for gravy. Brown slowly in fat in heavy skillet or Dutch oven, turning to brown both sides, about 20 minutes. Add water, cover tightly and cook over low heat or in 350 degree oven 1 1/2 hours. Add vegetables and continue cooking until vegetables and beef are fork tender, about 1/2 hour. Remove meat and vegetables to warm platter and prepare gravy.

Beef Gravy: Measure pan drippings. Add water if needed to make 2 cups liquid. In skillet or Dutch oven add 2 tablespoons fat skimmed from pan drippings and 2 tablespoons of the seasoned flour. Blend and brown mixture over low heat. Gradually add remaining drippings stirring constantly as gravy thickens and becomes smooth and creamy. Serve hot over sliced brisket of beef.

Horseradish Sauce: Combine 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish and 1/2 teaspoon salt with 1 cup sour cream. Blend well. Serve with sliced brisket of beef.

2 c sifted flour
3/4 t baking soda
1/2 t baking powder

flour mixture until consistency of coarse cornmeal. Mix in caraway seeds. Gradually add buttermilk. Knead and shape into a ball. Place in a well greased loaf pan or 8 inch oven proof skillet. Cut a cross in the top, brush with milk. Bake in a 375 F. oven 40 to 50 minutes.

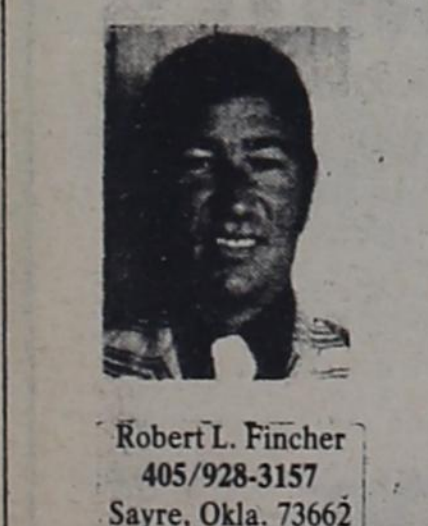

PANHANDLE ASSOCIATION OF SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICTS MEETING

TEMPLE—"We are not going out of the agricultural business today, nor next week, nor next year. There is enough water left in place to give us some lead time to do something about the problem," said George W. McCleskey, member of the Texas Water Development Board to soil and water conservation district directors and guests at the Panhandle Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts' meeting held recently in Friona.

A. L. Black of Friona and Chairman of the Texas Water Development Board served as master of ceremonies. Black is a long time leader in soil and water conservation from the local to the national level.

McCleskey, who spoke on the topic of "Irrigation Water on the High Plains," said that the problem of water depletion is a very pressing matter about which something must be done in the immediate future in order to save irrigated agriculture in the area.

"At the very best, it will probably be 25 years before water can be delivered to this area," he said.

Kenneth Kuykendall, president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and Frank Gray, member of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board also addressed the group.

Kuykendall urged SWCD directors to be spokesmen and to promote the activities of their district. He also reviewed actions taken on resolutions passed at the state meeting of SWCD directors held in McAllen last October.

Current state and federal legislation which may have a bearing on the farming and ranching industry was also discussed.

Gray discussed district financing under the matching fund program administered by the State Board.

He also discussed the State Board's current activities relative to Section "208" of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972. The State Board is responsible for "208" planning with respect to agricultural and silvicultural practices.

New officers of the Panhandle Association were elected. They are Odell Pugh, president, Texhoma; Sherman County SWCD and William Miller, vice-president, Perryton; Ochiltree SWCD.

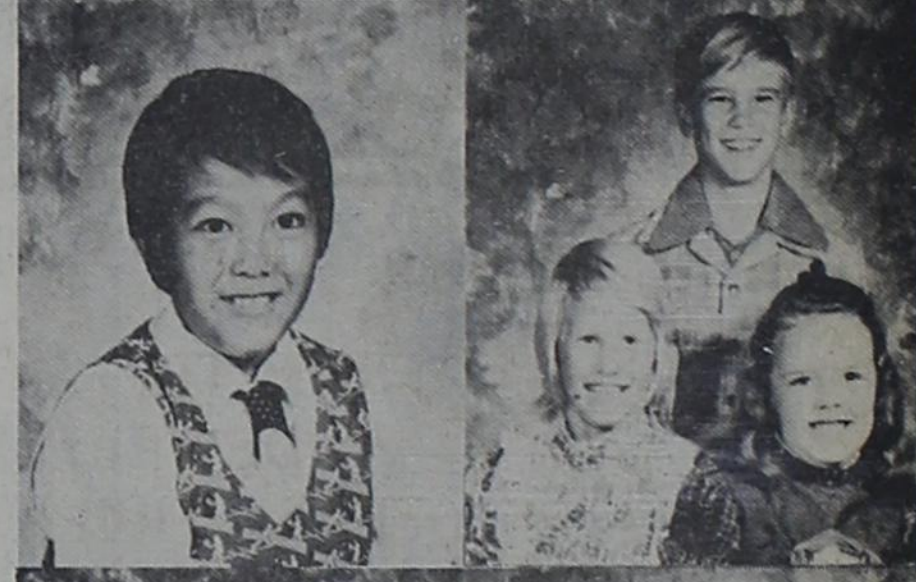
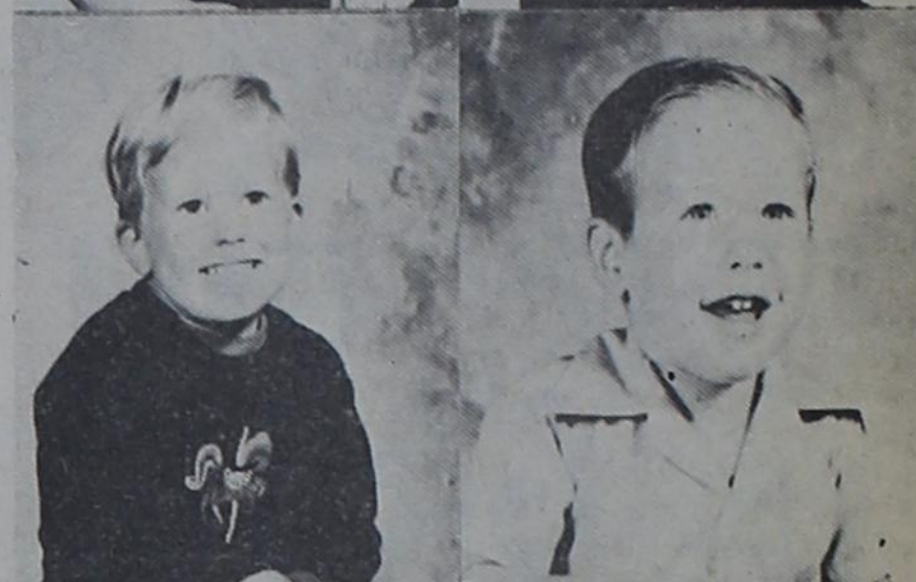
