Hedley's Joe Lemley stole an inbounds pass, then hit a desperation jumper with three seconds left to steal a sure Class B bi-district cage victory away from Wheeler, 54-53, last night before more than 1,000 fans. Wheeler, which led Hedley by five points with two minutes left to play, seemed to have put the victory away and led, 53-52, with only eight seconds remaining in the game before Lemley's bucket brought pandemonium on the Harvester Fieldhouse floor in Pampa.

The victory shoves Hedley into Friday's and Saturday's Region 1-B Tournament in Levelland. The Owls, now 32-4, will meet the Fort Davis-San Elizario winner in first-round play. Midway through the final period, Wheeler struck for 12 unanswered points to take a 50-42 lead with 2:39 left to play. After Hedley struck for two more baskets to cut the lead to 50-46, then Wheeler scored another bucket to lead again by six points (52-46 with 1:53 left). Hedley closed the gap to 53 to 52 with eight seconds left on Bob White's two free throws. The Wheeler inbounds pass was the chance Joe Lemley needed to bring back Hedley from the dead with three seconds left, and he did with a 10-foot jumper.

Strong defensive play by both clubs dominated the game's early going. Wheeler held a 3-0 lead with 5:20 left in the first period as Dell Ford hit a free shot and a jumper. The first period ended with the score deadlocked at 9-9. Hedley struck for six unanswered points at the outset of the second quarter to take a six-point lead (15-9). The Owls moved to their biggest lead and 26 seconds left in the first half on John Lemley's two free throws that made it 23-13.

"As far as I'm concerned, we beat ourselves," said a dejected Wheeler coach, Bill Wiggins. "We had a five point lead late in the game, I thought we had it won. "But we missed some crucial free shots. We missed one with 20 seconds left that would have wrapped it up for us. Our game plan was to get their big guy (Messer) into foul trouble. We fed it to the men in his zone, and he fouled out midway through the fourth quarter. "We played well the second half. I thought all our kids did real well."

Wheeler's Don Brown led all scorers with 21 points. Teammate Wendell Moore added 13 to the Mustangs' cause. The loss ended Wheeler's season at 25-8.

## WHEELER TACKLE INKS WITH TEXAS TECH.

Jim Verden, a 235-pound all-state tackle from Wheeler, has signed a national letter of intent to play football at Texas Tech, it was announced Saturday by the university.

Verden, who stands 6-3, chose

Tech over two other schools which tried to recruit him—University of Texas—Arlington and Texas Christian.

Verden almost waited too long to receive a scholarship. The national signing day was February 27.

"They wanted me but, on account of basketball, I wasn't able to visit the campus or really talk to them. By the time I got down there, they already had been committed to their 30 scholarships," Verden said. "They had one kid change his mind so they offered me a scholarship. I was going to go there even if they didn't. I would've walked on. Scholarships don't mean that much to me—you've got to be happy wherever you go."

Verden helped Wheeler to a 9-1 record and co-championship in District 1-B. The Mustangs' only loss was to Groom, eventual state semifinalist, 12-9. Verden was named to the all-state first team offense and second-team defense, making both units as a tackle.

As a junior, Verden made the all-district first team defense and second team offense. He made the first team both ways as a sophomore. Verden currently is a member of the Mustang basketball team of District 3-B and is awaiting the bi-district playoff against the 4-B champion, which has not yet been decided.

He plans to wind up his sports career at Wheeler in track season after placing fifth in the state in the shot put a year ago with a toss of 51-7. He won the district shot championship with a 53-5 toss, which would have been good enough for second place in the state meet.

Verden is not sure whether he will compete in track at Tech. Verden, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Verden, recently was named Wheeler's outstanding young person.

## Co. Sheriff's Dept. Report

Wheeler County Sheriff Doyle Ramsey Reports nineteen prisoners handled through the Wheeler County Jail during February.

Among other activities by the Sheriff's Department were five minor thefts. Three of these occurring in Wheeler. A newspaper stand was taken from the PostOffice lot and found at the park; the stand was damaged, but nothing was taken. The CB antennas were taken off a pickup during the night of February 9, while the owner was staying at the Honey Inn. A short change artist, described as a negro male,

hit Wilmart on February 20. The other two thefts occurred in the Shamrock area. A CB was taken from a parked car while the owner was away. Unknown subjects entered the drive at a Lela Mobil station and filled up with gasoline and drove away without paying.

Sheriff Ramsey also reports the department worked three minor traffic accidents, assisted in two ambulance calls, answered four prowler calls and arrested two drunkers.

A burglary of a residence during the day was reported in Briscoe with food being taken. Two fugitives were picked up on 1-40, held in Wheeler County Jail and returned to Florida and California. The Florida fugitive had stolen an auto, which was also recovered. The California fugitive was wanted in connection with five counts of grand larceny.

Ten D.W.I.'s and on D.W.L.S. were filed by local highway patrol units and turned over to the Sheriff's Department for court action.

Two felony charges were filed during February according to Sheriff Ramsey. One in connection with a negro male attempting to pass a \$865.90 forged check at the First National Bank of Wheeler on February 11 and later that day passing a forged check for \$132.17 at a grocery store in Shamrock. He is being held in the Wheeler County Jail at this time. One case for unauthorized use of vehicle was filed on February 18.

Sheriff Ramsey also reports numerous checks received for collection by his department. He urges merchants to be very careful in taking checks. Be sure and get some type of I. D. Most all people have a drivers license issued by the state—record the state and number on the check; this helps in finding the person if the check returns. Be very careful in taking checks on people unknown to you, urges the sheriff.

Sheriff Ramsey reminds everyone that the Sheriff's Department is now located in the bottom floor of the jail and welcomes anyone who would like to come by and visit with them. Judging will focus on knowledge of nutrition, meal planning, food buying and meal service as well as on ability to prepare food.

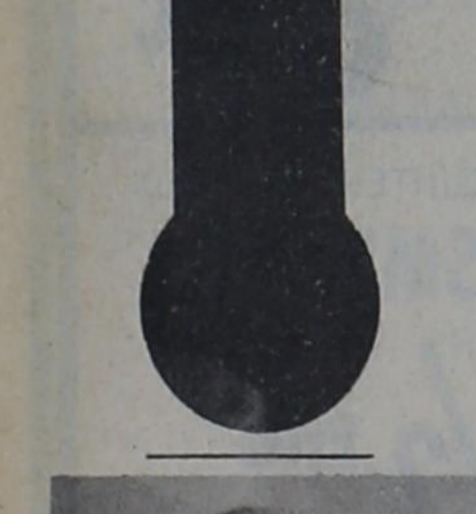

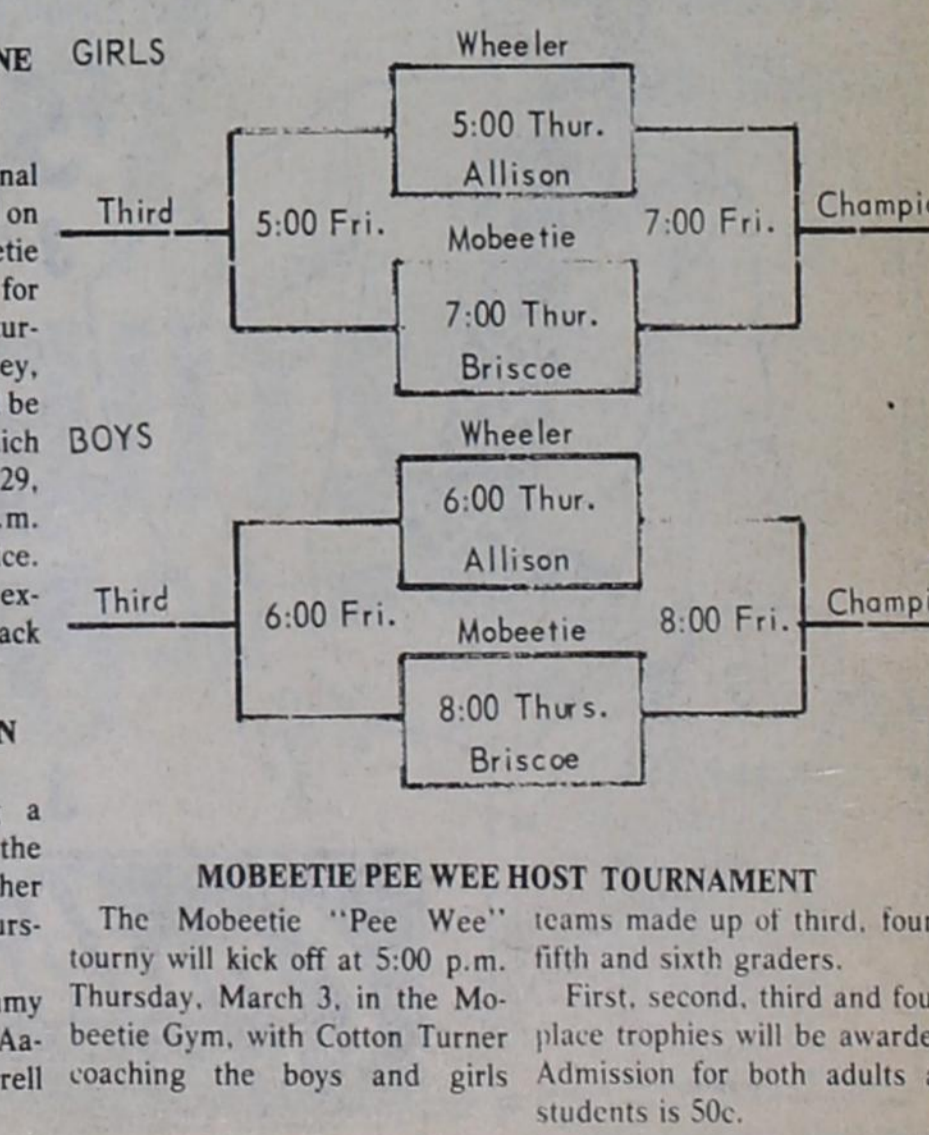

Unconsciousness because of injury or illness is usually a protective act of nature. 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**NEW PATTERNS On The Land**  
Texans built enough of the new, evenly spaced parallel terraces last year to reach from Texas to Maine—more than 2,200 miles," according to Lavon Williams, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Wheeler, Texas. "In fact, nearly half the terraces built in Texas were the new kind."

Cooperators with local conservation districts built more than 5,000 miles of all kinds of cropland terraces last year. 2,265 miles were parallel, as compared to 984 miles the year before.

"This isn't just another Texas brag," Williams continued. "It just shows how popular these modern terraces are becoming. The amount built has doubled two years in a row."

"Terraces spaced an even number of rows apart and without point rows are called parallel terraces," Williams pointed out. "They really save time and money for the farmer and they do a good job of conserving soil and water."

Parallel terraces are spaced to fit both the farmer's equipment and the lay of the land. For example, they might be built 24 rows apart or 72 rows apart, depending upon the slope. Three, four, six, or eight-row equipment could be used in either of the above cases.

Designing, laying out the building this kind of terrace system, however, is not an easy job. It takes more engineering time to design and stake a parallel system. They may cost more to build. Shorter terraces with more grassed waterways may be needed. More cuts and fills are used.

"Our engineers are willing to take the extra time to figure out parallel terraces. Some short cuts have been developed and we're getting more efficient in working out these modern conservation systems."

Williams thinks that in another year or two, 50% to 75% of the terraces built in Texas will be the parallel type.

Landowners and operators like them—from city farmers to soil and water conservation district supervisors. They are easy to plow and they save time and fuel. They also eliminate or greatly reduce short rows of uneven length point rows. Some landowners say they would not have built terraces if SCS had not worked out these which are much easier to farm.

"Cost-share form the Great Plains Conservation Program has helped many farmers build these terraces. Technical help from the Soil Conservation Service and loans from the Farmers Home Administration have also helped get this job done," Williams concluded.

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Used-furniture can make beauty-and-styled dreams a reality—by chasing away rising-cost nightmares.

Imagination and an eye for used furniture repair possibilities are a must.

Time and patience are required, too—you may have to shop several weeks to find the piece you need at the right price.

Also, you will need time—and willingness—to make necessary repairs. As a rule, the more time you devote to repair, the more money you save. Furniture that needs the most repairs often is priced at "next to nothing".

The best sources for good used furniture are warehouses and moving companies. Often the only charge made for such abandoned furniture is that for moving the piece to your home.

Other good sources are "for sale" ads on laundry, supermarket and college bulletin boards.

The Salvation Army, Goodwill and such organizations sell used furniture, but their best buys go fast since demand is usually greater than supply—so check their stock regularly.

Garage sales, too, can be a good source. If you find several items you want to buy, offer one lump sum. That usually saves money.

Probably the last place to look for bargains is at used furniture stores. While the selection is better, prices will be higher.

Other furniture ideas start with non-furniture items. Packing crates, a large barrel and a pile of plywoods and wooden cable spools can be converted into tables easily.

Making attractive, useful furniture from discarded items has the extra reward of accomplishment—in addition to saving money.

Wide use of color can help solve decorating problems of small size rooms and limited furnishing.

Color cannot, of course, increase the actual size of a room, but it can create an illusion of spaciousness. Also, the wise use of color can enhance the lease expensive furnishings.

Color has three dimensions—value (its lightness or darkness), intensity (brightness or dullness) and hue (hues give warmth with yellow and reds or coolness with blues).

By studying the dimensions of color, especially in relation to decorating problems, home decorators may find many simple, inexpensive decorating answers—with a can of paint.

A small room looks larger if painted a cool color, such as light blue. A feeling of spaciousness occurs when colors used within the room in furniture, draperies and accessories are of close or similar value—preferably light.

Light values create the impression of distance. Close values have a quieting effect while strong contrasts appear busy.

Furnishings contrasting in value, intensity and hue tend to divide a room and make it look smaller. So, a small room needs little contrast in color.

A difference in value is more contrasting than in a difference in hue. For example, a color scheme using orange and blue of the same value is less obvious than the use of one hue but in different values. Increasing the number of hues in a room, it's important to make them close in value.

While cool colors recede and make a room appear larger, they do have a formal feeling.

Today's homes are more casual and most people prefer warm colors. If small rooms are to be decorated in earth tones, these warm colors may be used if they are close in value and dull in intensity.

When these warm colors are dull in intensity, such as warm tans, any hue looks good against them. These unifying hues (warm colors) make the most useful colors for backgrounds. Generally, duller intensities are

it against a background which is of its own value. Dark values are often used for floors because they create an impression of stability.

Warm and cool colors may be used advantageously in regard to the orientation of the house. Rooms located on the west side of the home will cooler if painted a cool color. Those located on the north will convey a feeling of warmth when painted a warm color. It is interesting to note that while green is considered a neutral color, it is classified as

warm when it has a predominance of yellow—but when more blue, it is considered cool.

## Texas Animal Agri. Conference

The Third Texas Animal Agriculture Conference will be held in the J. Earl Rudder Center April 4 and 5. The General Session held on Monday morning starting at 9:30 will have as a theme "A Look into the Future." We have asked Dr. Coleman Hensley, President of Indentronix, Inc. of Santa Cruz, California to talk about electronic identification and management for livestock. He will be followed by General James R. Rose, Director-Water Development Board, Austin who will talk about water supply and water quality in the state of Texas. The future of antibiotics and livestock feeding in the future is one of our big questions. Dr. Jacob Mosier, Head of the Department of Surgery and Medicine, Kansas State University, will discuss this subject. He has served as Chairman of the Subcommittee of the FDA Advisory Committee which looked into the future use of antibiotics. The Beef Research and Information Act will also be discussed. Mr. J. D. Sartwell, Texas Chairman of the Beef Development Task Force and Dr. Ernie Davis, Chairman of the Extension Committee in Making Plans for the Educational Program for the Beef Referendum will be the speakers.

Following the General Session Monday morning, there will be Horse, Swine, Dairy and Beef Short Courses. Included in the Beef Short Course will be a half a day program from the Pasture and Forge Section and another half day program from Range and Wildlife. The Dairy Short Course will be abbreviated into a one day short course and move to Hopkins County on Tuesday. The wine Short Course will move to Plainview for a one day short course on Wednesday. There will be an Exhibits and Trade show sponsored by about 24 companies involved in marketing products to the livestock industry.
