The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will hold their annual Installation Banquet Saturday, February 5, 1977, in the school cafeteria. Entertainment for the evening will be "Morning Star", a group of musicians from McMurry College of Abilene. The activities will get underway at 7:00 p.m.

In addition to the installation of officers, recognition will be given the Outstanding Man, Woman, Teenager, Employee and Farmer and/or Rancher. The recipients of these awards are selected by Chamber Committees.

Elected to serve as president of the Chamber for the coming year is Bob Roark, owner and manager of Roark's Fine Food. ### SJC Offers Rapid Reading Course

"How long does it take you to read the daily paper?" "How many words per minute can you read?" How many words per minute would you like to read? These are questions that will be considered by those enrolling in the AGP Rapid Reading course to be offered soon to all area residents on the Sayre Jr. College Campus.

This is the fourth year the AGP has been made available at SJC, and through previous AGP programs, students have benefited greatly from development of reading skills, especially in the improvement of reading speed and comprehension.

The course will be offered on Monday nights beginning Feb. 14 and continuing through Feb. 21 and 28. It will be held in the College Classroom Building from 6:30-8:30. Judy Nicholas, SJC Language Arts instructor, will conduct the course. All materials will be furnished.

This is an excellent opportunity for area students and adults to increase reading speed in a short, inexpensive program. AGP is designed for any high school or college student or adult wishing to improve his reading skill.

Fee for the course is \$36 per person. If college credit is desired, enrollee must also pay the regular fee for one-hour credit which ranges from \$8.50-\$10.50 depending on place of residence.

As a minimum number will be required for the class to develop, prospective enrollees are encouraged to register as soon as possible to ensure the offering. ## PLANNING FOR RETIREMENT

Retirement is a major step for most people—and making a smooth transition from full-time working to satisfying retirement takes thoughtful planning and preparation.

Consumers should consider these five points in planning for retirement.

First is income. Financial preparations for the future may be the easiest part of your plans. Ask yourself these questions: What will my income be when I retire?—What will my money needs be when I retire?—are my legal affairs in order and checked by an appropriate authority?

Then consider your health. You will take into retirement a state of health that you have been contributing to all your life. Ask yourself these questions: do you have annual physical examinations?—do you know what food you should eat or avoid in order to maintain proper weight and good health?—do you exercise daily according to capability?—do you get adequate rest each day?—are you aware of the essential ingredients in maintaining sound mental health?

Next consider where you will live. There are many possible options for living arrangements in retirement. Approximately one-fourth to one-third of retirement income is spent on housing.

Investigate the variety of living arrangements available before you retire. Then ask yourself these questions: will you continue to live where you are?—will you move into a small place or a low maintenance condominium?—what will your neighborhood be like in 10-15 years?—will you move to a new location?—are the medical services and other facilities you desire available in the place you've decided to live?—have you tested the new location to be sure you will enjoy it?—are activities that interest you available in that location?

An additional, and important, consideration will be the people in your life when you retire. You may be home eight to ten hours more each day now. How will this affect your relationship with your spouse? For many couples this is a time of closer and enhanced relationship. Other family ties are a source of personal satisfaction and affection. Both old and new friends provide significant social relationships. Ask yourself these questions: what changes do you expect to take place in your family life and social relationships prior to retirement?—how can you maintain contact with members of your family and your friends?—have you and your spouse discussed the options for engaging in meaningful activities? What are they?—what efforts are you making toward initiating new friendships?

And last, but maybe the most important, how will you spend your time? Planning how to invest your time after retirement

may be as important as planning for the investment of money—if less tangible.

Many studies support the notion that the individual should continue to be active in retirement. Non-activity and non-use can, in the long run,

Also, over-the-counter fashion fabrics and inner fabrics offer homesevers the same quality and type of fabric available to ready-to-wear manufacturers.

Today's woman can sew faster

and easier than ever by using clever, quick and easy techniques, along with new notions, tools and sewing aids—such as fusible products—which eliminate many steps toward garment completion.

Turning again to the "economics" of homesewing, making garments at home can save 60-70 per cent or more, when compared to purchasing ready made. Also fabric quality and workmanship are better and lower priced than similar-quality ready to wear.

Other frequently mentioned motivations for sewing are better fit, a creative expression, individuality in coordinating style, fabric, and trim or designing ones own garment, and productive use of leisure time.

Choosing the correct pattern type can help homesevers solve many of their own fitting problems.

But since several categories are available, choosing the right pattern type requires some personal analysis.

Pattern type relates to the figure type—not age. All major pattern companies base their pattern types and sizes on the same body measurements approved by the Measurement Standard Committee of the Pattern Fashion Industry.

To identify the correct pattern type for you, analyze your body build and compare it to the description for the pattern types in the back of pattern catalogs.

If you have an average, well proportioned and developed figure (5'5"-5'6") choose 'Misses' patterns. If you find that 'Misses' patterns are almost right for you but too long waisted, choose 'Miss Petite,' designed for the shorter figure (5'2"-5'4").

'Junior' patterns are designed for well proportioned but somewhat shorter (5'4"-5'5") and generally more slender figures than the 'Misses'. For the petite junior figure (5'1"-5'3"), select 'Junior Petite' patterns.

'Half size' patterns are specifically designed for full-developed

but shorter waisted figures (5'2"-5'3"). For larger, more fully mature figures (5'5"-5'6") 'Women's' patterns are best.

'Young Junior Teen' is especially designed for the developing preteen and teen figure. These patterns, regardless of size, do not allow for much bust development. But if bust allowance is needed, larger sizes in this category should not be substituted for pattern sizes unavailable in other pattern categories.

Once you have identified your pattern type, select pattern numbers from that category in the size closest to your measurements. A few alterations may be needed to allow for figure irregularities, but fewer changes to obtain a perfect fit will be needed within the correct pattern category.

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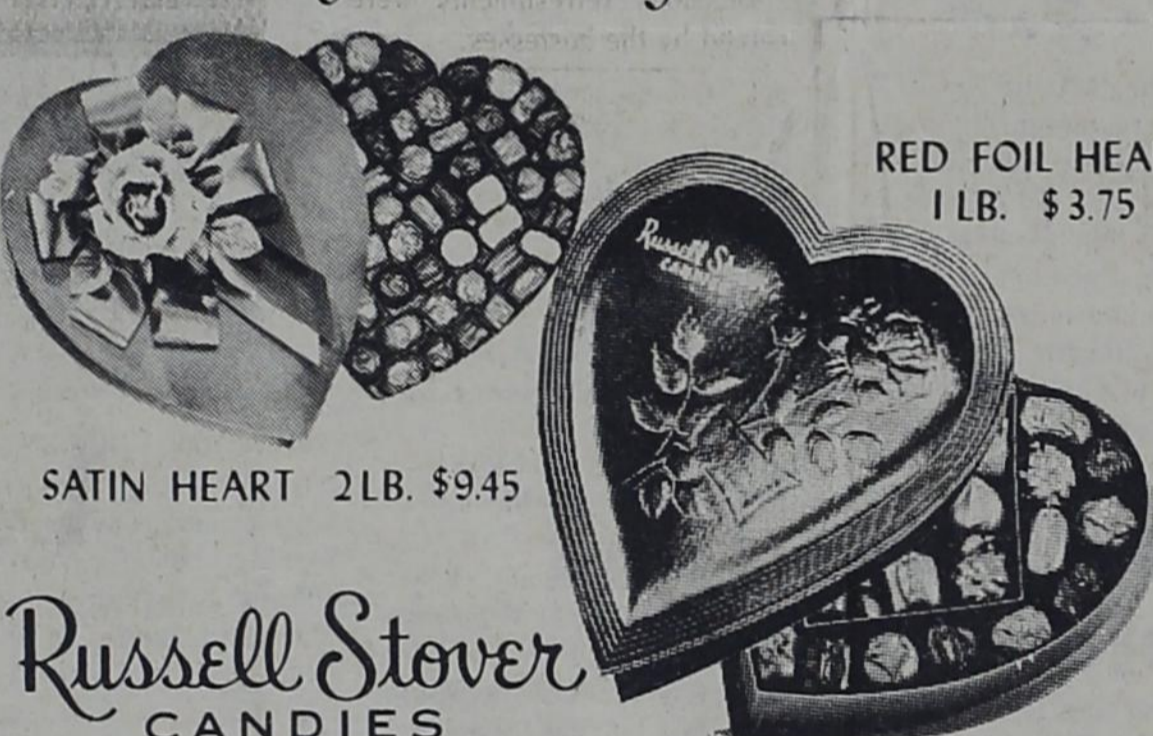

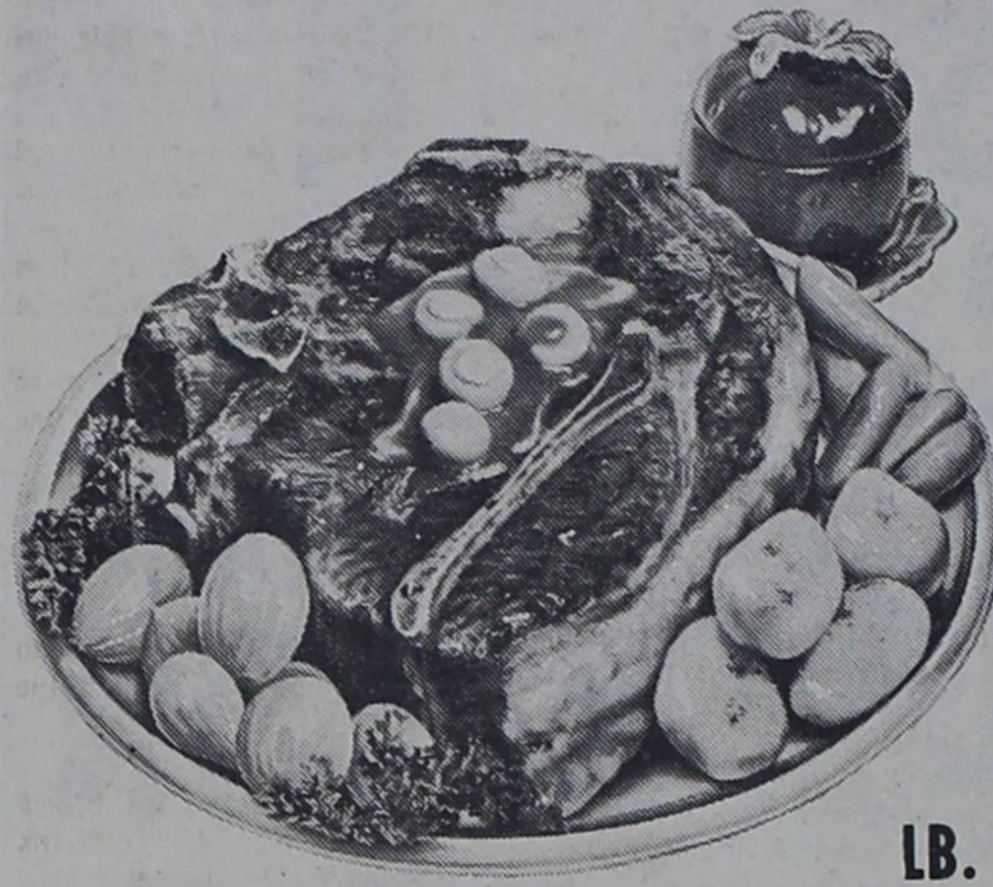

Sometimes we may put more emphasis on the proper care of our soil than we do on using our

water as it should be used. Water is a very important resource and should be used wisely. Some of the methods used to conserve water is the building of ponds, installing parallel terrace systems, diversion terraces and water ways. Even the correct management of our rangeland will help conserve our water.

If you have a soil and water conservation problem, contact the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation district. Cost share may be obtained on many soil and water conservation practices.
