





FREEZING SMALL GAME-

If the fruits of your hunter's labor are too many to cook at once, freezing is a good method of preserving them.

This is the season for various game birds, such as ducks, quail, geese, dove, turkey, pheasant, rail and woodcock. Also, small game such as squirrels, rabbits, opossum and raccoons can be frozen for later use.

First step is to thoroughly clean them and cool before freezing. Wrap each bird or animal individually in a moisture-vapor-proof freezing paper, using the drugstor wrap.

For this wrapping method,

wrapping big game, such as

Freeze small game immediately after packaging. Keep the meat at 0 degrees F. or lower until it is used. Quality meat, correctly wrapped in moisturevapor-proof freezing paper will keep frozen at this temperature from six months to a year, except for the organ meats such as heart and liver, which should be used within six months.

When thawing game, do so in the refrigerator. Allow five hours thawing time per pound. **CRANBERRY HEARLDS**

HOLIDAY EATING The "merry berry" has arrived

for the holidays-the bright and place the game in the center of bouncy cranberry. This fruit can be found all year around in various forms, but the major part of the fresh crop comes to market during November and December. "Now is definitely the time for consumers to buy fresh cranberries.'

Remember that fresh berries are bouncing berries-high quality cranberries will bounce several times when dropped. Avoid berries that dull in appearance, shriveled and/or soft.

Refrigerate cranberries in their package until needed. Cranberries usually keep wellin the refrigerator for a couple of weeks. If the original bag is unbroken, simply put the berries, sealed in the bag, into the freezer. When you are ready to use them, there's no need for thawing. The berries will separate easily and they are ready to be made into a delightful side

dish, relish, salad or desert. The cranberry adds its special

taste to meals in dozens of ways. Use it fresh as a garnish on the meat platter, or add a few berries to a fruit salad to give a colorful flavor twis to it all. Grind

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of October, 1976, according to Sergeant James Powell, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and seven persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1976 shows a total of 96 accidents resulting in four persons killed and 53 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1976, shows a total of 608 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 324 injured, as compared to October 1975, with 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured. This was 65 more accidents, one less killed, and 41 more injured in 1976 at the period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1976, occurred in the following counties: Three each in Parker, Young; Two each in Sherman, Wise; One each in Archer, Lamb, Montaggue, Palo Pinto, Wichita, Deaf Smith, and

TYPE OF SHELL-NOT SEASON GROWN

Squash is no longer classified "summer" or "winter"-but by hardness of the shell and matur-

What may be called summer squash is more correctly labeled soft shell. And hard shell is the name for squash more plentiful during the winter.

This is the season of the year when hard shell squash is coming to market. Varieties now available include acorn, buttercup, butternut and hubbard.

Consumers buying hard shell squash should be sure the rind is firm. This vegetable will keep for several weeks if stored in a moderately cool, dry place. It does not require refrigeration.

Winter squash has goldencolored flesh which is dry with a 'swetish' taste. Golden or yellow-orange-colored flesh is sign of Vitamin A content.

Smalled types of hard shell squash, like the acorn, are usually cut in half, seeds removed, baked, seasoned and served in the shell.

The larger squash, such as hubbard, are usually cut into pieces, baked, pulp removed, mashed and seasoned. Or, you may prefer to remove seeds, cut off the rind, boil, mash and season. Hard shell squash may be more easily cut if placed in boiling water for about 10 min-
