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MUSTANGS CLOSE OUT REGULAR SEASON FRIDAY

Friday night will be full of ifs for the Wheeler Mustangs but regardless of how the ifs materialize, 1976 has been a big success for Mustang football with the future holding great promise. If the Mustangs beat Higgins, at least a co-championship will

belong to the Mustangs and the bigger IF is that if the Groom Tigers are tied or defeated by the Lefors Pirates, then the crown belongs solely to the Wheeler Mustangs and into the playoffs they go.

On paper the Pirates should

not be that big a hurdle for Groom but football is as unpredictable as the weather and anything can happen and the Mustangs know this.

Even though they have been playing football only two years, Higgins can't be overlooked and

it is a must for the Mustangs to defeat the Coyotes to be champions regardless of the outcome of the Groom-Lefors contest.

"Since our loss to Groom, our goal has been a 9-1 regular season record and the championship and this is all in our grasp if we win Friday night," Coach Preston Smith said this week.

"These kids have come a long way and deserve the championship and I know that they will get it." "We will just have to wait and see what happens at Lefors Friday night but we are sending scout to the Sundown-Sudan

game," Coach Smith added.

Injuries hampered the Mustangs last week and Grimes and Mosely have not come completely around as yet but should be in better shape than they were against Booker.

Friday's game will be the final regular season game for five Mustang seniors and all have played a vital role in the Mustangs success to date. Don Brown and Tony Hefley are the

The Booker Kiowas came to Nicholson Field last Friday night just needing a victory over the Wheeler Mustangs to practically cinch a berth in the playoffs but when Don Brown and the rest of the Mustangs got through with them, the Kiowas were just glad

to get out of Wheeler alive after receiving a 31-6 pasting.

No one will ever know for sure but Booker can probably say that what is now the best team in District 1-B gave them a good lesson in the art of hard hitting football.

Don Brown's fabulous night included 267 yards on 49 carries and 3 touchdowns on offense and numerous jarring tackles on defense.

His efforts earned Brown the Amarillo Globe News Class B Player of the Week for the second time in this '76 season and he and his mates now only have to defeat Higgins to claim at least a tie for the district championship.

With all three Mustangs that had playing time at fullback being injured and not able to carry much of the offensive load effectively, Wheeler's offense was geared around Brown and the senior tailback was up to the task.

Putting 7 big points on the scoreboard the first time they had the ball, the Mustangs were stung by a 70 yard scoring bomb from Rodney Meyer to Russell Brewer on the third play of the second quarter and remained only one point ahead at halftime.

Whatever adjustments were made at halftime by the Mustangs coaching staff did wonders as the Mustangs came out in the third quarter and literally blew the Kiowas out of any contention.

Brown got his first TD with a 20 yard dash around his left flank on his seventh carry in a eight play 64 yard march.

Jim Verden added the one pointer at 5:42 and this kick proved to be the margin until he booted a 30 yard field goal to

climax a second half opening drive from the Wheeler 31.

There was just no getting around or through the Mustangs defense in the second half and Booker's air attack proved fruitless also as the black clad Mustangs held the visitors without a first down in the final 24 minutes.

A short Booker punt after Verden's field goal traveled only 20 yards to the Kiowa 39 and here came Brown for six plays and Wheeler went ahead by a 16-6 count and there wasn't much doubt who was going to emerge victorious.

A 60 yard drive in just five plays put the game on ice for the Mustangs with 47 seconds left in the third quarter.

With second and one at the Booker 29, the Mustangs completely fooled the Kiowas and went to the air and quarterback Bobby Guthrie rolled to his left and tossed a perfect pass to Dell Ford who had gotten behind the defensive back and never broke stride and gathered the ball in for the 29 yard scoring toss and the Kiowas were dead.

Brad Mills returned the ensuing kickoff out to the Booker 41 but John Godino fumbled at the 33 on the next play and Verden recovered for the Mustangs.

Tony Hefley lost a yard at the close of the third period and the Mustangs called on Brown for 5 straight times and with the Mustangs forward wall doing a great job of blocking, Brown broke into the end zone from 3 yards out on the fifth play and Verden's kick made the score 31-6 and all Mustangs and their fans turned into big backers of the Lefors Pirates.

No one can remember when the Wheeler Colts went undefeated in football the last time but 1976 will be remembered a long time.

Not only did the Colts ring up a perfect 6-0 mark but they whipped the three other teams in their Jr. High district twice each.

Following last Thursday night's conquest of the McLean Colts by a 52-0 score, the Colts, coached ably by Richard Gaines and Phil Lago, were presented the championship trophy at mid-field.

The Colts got their hands on the football seven times in the first half and put points on the board six of those times.

Benny Baker zipped 54 yards on the Colts initial play from scrimmage for a quick 6-0 lead and as it has been in most of their games, it was just a matter of how much scoring the Colt coaches wanted their charges to do.

A runback of 25 yards with an intercepted pass for a TD by Willie Valencia put the Colts up by 12 and they added two more when Tommy Calverly broke into the end zone on the two point try.

With 1:21 to play in the first quarter, Ty Henderson passed to Joe Guthrie for 24 yards and the Colts third touchdown and Henderson skirted right end for the two pointer.

Another interception, this one

by Calverly at the Colt 35, was run back for an apparent six pointer but it was called back for a clipping fine but the Cubs relieve was short lived.

Valencia broke loose on a trap play to scoot 42 yards for his second touchdown as the quarter ended and the Colts took a 30-0 margin into the second quarter as Calverly ran over two more points.

A 46 yard scoring pass from Henderson to Robert Ford and

Calverly's two point run put the Colts up by 38 at the half.

Tommy Calverly broke for the longest run of the game and it was also a scoring play with 3:18 to play in the third quarter.

Calverly broke through left tackle and then there was no catching the swift back.

Midway of the final quarter the Colts got their final score of the year when Steve Spain intercepted a Cub pass at the McLean 45 and returned it all the way.

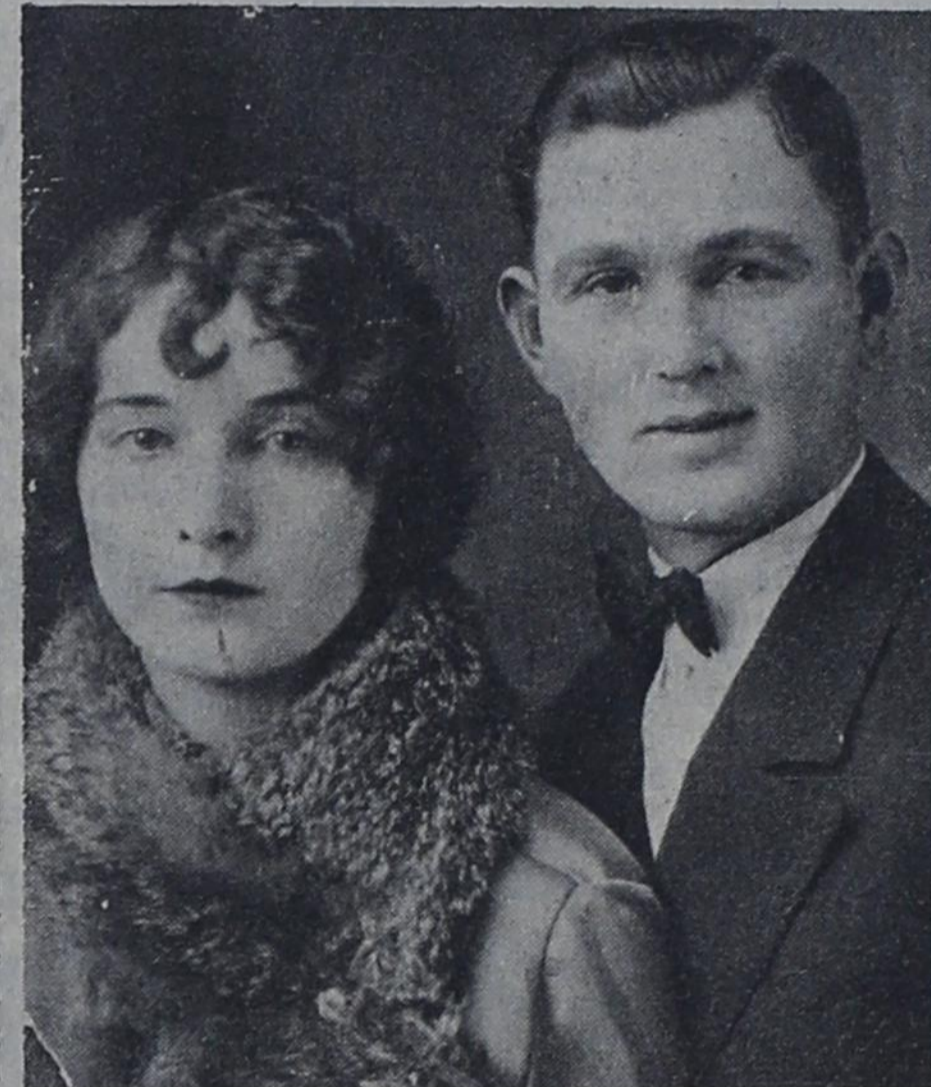

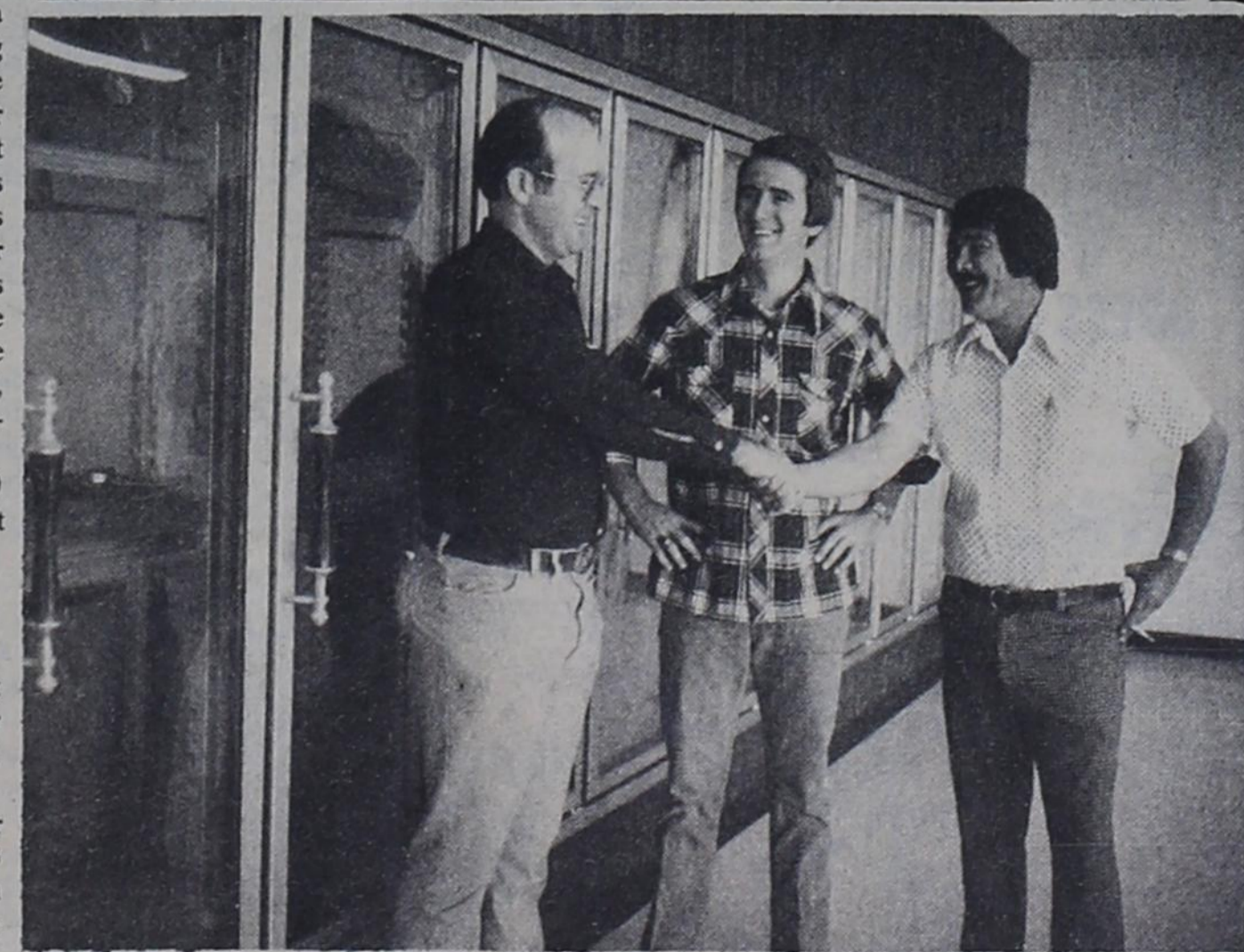
Funeral Services For C. J. Hess

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PUBLIC QUAIL HUNTS SCHEDULED

Most of the quail hunting in Texas is on private property with leases and day hunting fees, but

there are two public hunting areas in northwest Texas open to the general public this fall. The popular Matador wildlife management area, located 11 miles northwest of Paducah in Cottle county, will open its gates for quail hunting on November 6-7, 13-14, 20-21; December 4-5, 11-12, 18-19, 1976; January 8-9, 15-16, 22-23; February 5-6, 12-13, 19-20, 1977. Quail hunts on the Gene Howe wildlife management area, six miles east of Canadian in Hemphill county, will be open to quail hunting on November 6-7; December 11-12, 1976; January 8-9, 22-23; February 5-6; March 5-6, 1977.

To help defray the cost of conducting the hunt, a fee of \$1.00 will be charged for each hunter for each day hunted. Fees will be paid at check stations when the hunters report to hunt. Hunters will start arriving several hours prior to the legal shooting time on each area and a first come—first served policy has worked well over the last few seasons.

Only persons 12 years of age or older will be eligible to hunt on any of the wildlife management area open to quail hunting. The under 17 participant must be accompanied by his parent or by a person 21 years of age or older who shall be responsible for the conduct of the minor. The "under-age" hunter shall remain under the immediate supervision of his sponsor while hunting and

will not under any circumstances be allowed to hunt alone. Failure to supervise the minor will be cause for forfeiture of permits of both sponsor and minor. An adult may sponsor only one hunter. Information and directions concerning assigned areas and other regulations will be given each hunter as he or she clears the check station. Most hunters bag two-to-six

birds per day according to both management records and hunters are reminded that they must check back through the check stations as they leave the hunt area. This is a precautionary measure for area managers to be sure no one is hurt or lost on the management unit.
