
A reading log will be provided to record the time you spend reading. Please keep good records. We need this information for our state report to the Texas State Library.




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Here & There By Laura Guthrie

Some of the schools that have consolidated with Sweetwater are: Excelsier on April 20, 1920, Roundtop on April 20, 1920, Friendship on May 16, 1927, Mayfield on April 2, 1927, Brookside on June 21, 1930, Sunny Point on August 9, 1941, Fairview on March 7, 1942, Salt Flat on April 18, 1942, Meridian on June 1, 1956, and Bulo on May 22, 1963. Some other schools that consolidated with Sweetwater that I haven't found dates for were Mulberry, Wilson, Buena Vista, Grimes, and Buffalo.

Buffalo started having school in 1899 in a frame house located near Charley Meissner's home. It was only grades one - eight. 1922 was the last year Buffalo had school.

Meridian started having school some time after 1900. The first school was a three month subscription school in a tent on the east side of Mr. R. E. Hodges's farm. Parents raised money and donated labor to build a school on the southeast corner of Kay Potter's farm. The building was ready for classes in 1906. I was told that Meridian was the only high school to consolidate with Sweetwater.

Sand Hill School began in 1905. It was located about four and one half miles north and one and three fourths miles east of Sweetwater. In the 1920's the school transferred into the Meridian and Mulberry School Districts.

The Mt. Zion School was located four or five miles north of Meridian and one and a half miles west. The school was built around 1902 or 1903. Mt.





Local Group Takes Tour of Washington D.C.

On May 28th, fourteen junior high students sponsored by Betty and Doug Rives of Wheeler traveled on a Lakeland Tour to the East Coast to tour historic sites. Travel from Amarillo was provided via Miami Air, a direct charter plane, which carried the group to Richmond, Virginia. A bus met them there to take them to the Jamestown Settlement on the James River, south of Richmond, There the group saw America's first permanent English settlement. They also saw an exhibition of how early settlers made glass in the 1700's. Later that night, the group walked the streets of Colonial Williamsburg on a Lanthorn Tour of the silversmith, milliner, printing office, and the post office. Two students in each group actually carried candle lanterns to lead their group on this evening walk.

The next morning, we continued our tour of the historic sites in Williamsburg. We visited the Capitol, the site where Virginia patriots developed the principles of self-government. The Governor's Palace is another important building where British governors resided. Several trade sites were explored such as the Wigmaker Shop where town people, dressed in colonial garb, demonstrate, using various types of hairs, how to craft wigs of the 1700's. At noon, we ate at Shields Tavern and sampled the food typical of colonial

The afternoon of May 29th found us on our tour bus heading north to Washington, D. C., a three hour trip. We were able to tour Arlington Cemetery before our evening meal. This was a favorite spot for many of our students. They especially liked the "Changing of the Guard" at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. President Clinton had been there earlier in the day to place a wreath on the tomb. Students witnessed the presentation of a wreath to honor the soldiers killed in Iraq. This was followed by a quick stop by the Vietnam Memorial Wall. Rubbings of names on the wall

were done by many of us. The following day, May 30, we visited the National Archives where we saw the Declaration of Independence as well as many other famous documents cherished by our country. Then we proceeded on to Ford's Theater where we saw the balcony box where Lincoln was shot as well as the house across the street where he died. After grabbing a t-shirt at the Hard Rock Cafe, we made our way to our appointment at the Holocaust Museum to walk through Daniel's Story, a hands-on look at the life of a Jewish child during a terrible time of persecution. Everyone seemed to soak up the importance of this portion of history.

After lunch at the Old Post Office, the Wheeler group spent the entire afternoon visiting the Smithsonian Museum Complex which included the American History Museum, the Natural History Museum, the Air and Space Museum, and the National Gallery of Art.

After a busy afternoon, the entire Texas and Oklahoma group traveled by way of metrorail to the Pentagon Mall for our evening meal. The metrorail experience was one that most of us will never forget. It is difficult to keep over forty people together on this type of transportation. We did survive and were picked up at the mall by our bus to go on our night tour of D. C. We toured the Kennedy Center, Iwo Jima Memorial, and the Lincoln Memorial. At 11:00 P. M., Mr. Rives went with our students to the top of the Washington Memorial for a spectacular view of D. C. and the Potomac River. Finally, exhausted, we gave up and went to the motel.

Bright and early the morning of the 31st, we drove by bus to Mount Vernon, east of Washington, D. C., to the home and grounds of George Washington, our nation's first president. Interpreters explain the history of the rooms in the mansion, and students explored the grounds to see Washington's tomb, slave quarters, and various outbuildings and gardens. This mansion is located on the Potomac River, and the area is unbelievably beautiful.

In the afternoon, we visited the nation's capitol in D. C. There we were able to go into the Senate and House of Representatives Chambers. The students were impressed with the beauty of this building as well as its many statues and works of art. We also walked through the Supreme Court across the street from the Capitol. We also managed to walk over to the White House and took pictures from Pennsylvania Avenue, now closed to motorized vehicles.

Mid-afternoon, our bus drove us to Maryland where we left to return home from Dulles Airport by way of Dallas. Experiencing a delay due to thunderstorms in the area, we arrived back in

Amarillo late in the evening There were other schools that traveled with us on our trip this year. A group from Pampa sponsored by Pam Harris and a larger group from Seminole, Oklahoma combined with us to make our tour group.



From The Minister's Desk:

Harvey Porter, the minister of the Montgomery Church of Christ in Albuquerque, New Mexico, recently wrote an excellent bulletin article. This bulletin article was entitled, "Worship or Entertainment" and it said:-

"I read in an article this past week that the reading ability of our public school students is below the average of those in the 1960's. The article cited several factors. Parents were both working and had little time to spend with the children at night in helping with homework. The writer cites hours of viewing television as the chief cause for the decline in reading ability of our

nation's youth.' "Our nation is into entertainment. We live in a fast and hectic society and we want relief from our cares and pressures. We live in a fast and hectic society and we want relief from our cares and pressures. We can forget problems while we are entertained. We attend movies, sporting events, take more trips, longer vacations, and watch more television. Indeed, we do need some diversion from our problems and worries. It is necessary to maintain a proper balance in the various areas of our life. There needs to be a proper amount of time given to rest, work, study, play, worship, and en-

tertainment. "For the last decade there has been a decline in attendance in most churches in our country. No doubt there are a number of reasons. Some perceive worship as boring. The weekend is the only time they have to rest and relax and have family time together. They take trips, go camping, fish, play golf and attend sports events. And some want to attend a church where the worship service is entertaining. To meet this desire, some churches are adding orchestras, string ensembles, various choirs, and singing groups, hand-clapping, arm-raising, swaying, and other activities to provide entertaining."

Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

With the recent tornado disaster, people in the Wheeler County area are more aware of being prepared for a disaster. This is Part II of putting together a Family Disaster Supply Kit. The kit includes six basic items: Water (in last weeks article) Food, First Aid Kit, Tools and Supplies, Clothing and Bedding, and Special Items.

TIPS FOR FOOD: Store at least a 3-day supply of non-perishable food. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking and little or no water. If you must heat food, pack a can of sterno. Rotate these foods into the regular diet frequently to keep the supply fresh. In a disaster supply kit include:

* Ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables.

Canned juices, milk, soup (if pow-

dered, store extra water). Staples such as sugar, salt, pep-

* High energy foods such as peanut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars,

* Vitamins, infant food and food for special diets.

* Comfort/stress foods such as cookies, hard candy, instant coffee, tea

TIPS FOR FIRST AID KIT: Assemble a first aid kit for the home and one for each vehicle. An approved American Red Cross kit may be purchased, or one may be assembled with the following items:

* Sterile adhesive bandages in as-

pads (4-6 of each).

 Hypoallergenic adhesive tape. * Triangular bandages (3).
*2-inch and 3-inch sterile roller ban-

dages (3 rolls each).

Scissors, Tweezers, Needle, Moistened toweletts, Antiseptic, Thermometer, Tongue blades (2), Sunscreen, Tube of petroleum jelly or other lubricant. Assorted sizes of safety pins, Cleansing agent/soap, Latex 5423. aloves (2 pairs).

Pre-Trip Planning Good Idea For Summer Travel

Trooper L. B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety advises that summer driving too often combines hot weather, hot cars, and hot tempers. Pre-trip planning can help minimize these dangerous symptoms of summer driving.

Pre-trip planning includes vehicle preparation. Check the belts, hoses, and coolant fluid. Other fluids to check are motor oil, transmission oil, brake fluid, power sterring fluid and windshield washer fluid. You should also check the wiper blades. With summer often being dry and dusty, be sure to check the air, oil, and fuel filters to preserve engine life. Also, check your tires for correct and even air pressure, along with checking treadwear and sidewall cracking.

Lengthy trips should begin with route planning. A call to your nearby Department of Transportation or law enforcement agency may help you avoid construction area delays. Let a neighbor, friend, or family member (one not travelling with you) know your determined routes and scheduling. Part of the scheduling may include driving during cooler hours and resting your car and yourself during peak hours of

"Now," Snider says, "prepare yourself." Take proper clothing should you be exposed to extended heat and use quality sunglasses. Most of all, have a safe travel attitude before you even grasp the car keys. This safe travel attitude (being alert, courteous, and wary) is your key to safe summer
