## MUSTANGS SWAMP TEXLINE 27-0

Building up a 27-0 lead at halftime, the Wheeler Mustangs gave playing time to the rest of the squad in the second half and easily defeated the Texline Tornados last Saturday afternoon.

The Tornados were no match for the Mustangs and proved to be no big deterrent to their homecoming celebration. Groom's loss to Booker the night before probably was the big thing on the Mustangs minds when they took the field Saturday.

Five teams in District 1-B now have one loss and the championship is once more up for grabs but the Mustangs now have to not slip up in any of their remaining games and hope for another loss by Groom to get to represent the district in the playoffs.

Only 3:45 remained in the first quarter when the Mustangs broke the goose eggs on the scoreboard. Marvin Grimes capped a 45 yard drive with a 5 yard touchdown run and Jim Verden tacked on another point with the placement kick.

Texline made their only real threat early in the ball game when the Tornados recovered a fumble at the Texline 36. Don Brown fumbled on the third play of the game after picking up 15 yards and a big 43 yard pass completion on third down gave the Tornados the ball on the Wheeler 24.

Wheeler drew a half the distance penalty and two runs put the pigskin on the 6 and visions of what happened to Groom and what might happen to Wheeler came to mind.

Terry McNabb was dropped for a loss of 3 back to the 9 and a fourth down pass was incomplete and the Tornado threat had been stopped.

After having a slim 7-0 lead after the first quarter, the Mustangs put three more TD's on the board in the second stanza to put the game on ice.

Taking over their own 37 on the first play of second quarter, the Mustangs took 10 plays to maneuver the 63 yards for their second touchdown with Grimes

and fullback Dell Ford doing yoman service lugging the pigskin. Grimes got the six pointer with a 9 yard run and after Verden's PAT attempt was no good, the Mustangs led 13-0 at 9:10 in the second quarter.

Three plays after Grimes second scoring run, the Tornados fumbled and Ford recovered on the Texline 11. The Mustangs got that 11 yards to the end zone in one chunk as Ford ripped up the middle to make the count run to 19-0. Brown added two points on the run and Wheeler had a comfortable 21-0 margin at 7:13.

Time was running out in the first half when Ford intercepted a Texline pass at the Mustangs 20 and returned 32 yards to the Texline 48. One pass fell incomplete and then Bobby Guthrie hit Brown on a 48 yard scoring strike with 15 seconds to play in the first half and this

## BABE RUTH BASEBALL'S ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

The local athletes whose names appear above have been selected to Babe Ruth Baseball's 'Athletes of the Year' program for 1976, as announced today by Richard W. Case, President of Babe Ruth International, and Leon C. Sutton, Manager—Eastern Panhandle Babe Ruth League—Wheeler.

Nominations for 'Athletes of the Year' were made earlier this summer by Babe Ruth league managers and presidents from across the nation. They were invited to nominate candidates with the best records of local achievement on their teams or in their leagues.

Criteria by which these local baseball players were nominated include the athlete's athletic ability, including statistics and overall performance, sportsmanship and personal leadership displayed during the current season. To be eligible for the program, a player must have been an active participant in an officially recognized Babe Ruth League during the 1976 season.

Sponsored by Babe Ruth International, 'Athletes of the Year' is an annual honor roll paying tribute to the team players from the world's largest regulation baseball activity for young people. The purpose of the program is to promote and encourage the playing of amateur

## COLTS CONTINUE WINNING WITH 34-6 VICTORY OVER McLEAN CUBS

The Wheeler Colts had no real competition for the third week in a row and swamped the McLean Cubs last Thursday night at McLean 34-6 before a cold, sparse crowd.

The Colts start their second half of the round robin schedule this week when they travel to White Deer for a 6 p.m. contest on Thursday.

Two touchdown runs on successive plays by Benny Baker were wiped out by penalty flags in the first half and the Colts were still able to run up a 26 point margin at the intermission and the score was held down in the second half by Coach Gaines clearing his bench.

"Our kids are getting a little cocky and I hope that one of these teams that we have already defeated pretty handily doesn't slip up on us when we play them again," Coach Gaines stated.

Two plays deep into the Cub victory, the Colts had six points

as Baker broke free on a belly play and scampered 52 yards to the end zone.

Tommy Calverly broke off right tackle for a 69 yard scoring jaunt the next time the Colts had their hands on the ball to give the Colts a 12-0 pad with still five minutes to play in the first quarter.

The 12 point spread remained until the second quarter with Baker's two TD runs nullified.

Recovering a fumble at the Cub 30 just seconds into the second quarter, the Colts scored again, this time on a 25 yard run by Baker. Calverly ran the two pointer for a 20-0 lead at 7:37.

A 27 yard pass completion from Ty Henderson to Willie Valencia put the ball on the Cub 35 to set up the Colts fourth

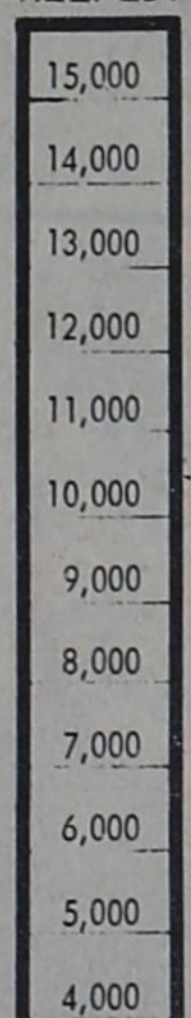

# TODAY'S CHRISTIAN

James O. Baird, tells a true story of self-giving love. It is about a friend whose wife lost an

eye when she was a child. Later her other eye became infected, and it was feared that she would lose it as well. Her husband told the doctors that, if it became apparent that his wife would lose her eyesight, he wanted them to take one of his own eyes for her. This is a beautiful demonstration of Paul's teaching "So ought men to love their own wives as their own bodies..." (Ephesians 5:28).

When one considers the following phrases in Ephesians 5:21-33, it is evident what underlies the duties enjoined there. Notice the repetition: "Reverence for Christ... (vs. 21). As to the Lord... (vs. 22). As Christ... (vs. 23). To Christ... (vs. 24). As Christ loves... (vs. 25). That He might... (vs. 26). As Christ does... (vs. 29). To mean Christ... (vs. 32)." Obviously, there can be no comprehension of the "Great mystery" without a recognition of Christ through it all.

Marriage and love go together. However, they do not stay together if there is not submission and self-sacrifice. The love for self must be a love that comes by way of the cross. Then a husband can love his wife as himself. The "looking up" in love must come from kneeling at the cross. Then a wife can reverence her husband in every way. Such love is centrifugal.

George Muller is usually identified as the friend of orphan children in the middle of the last century. But his autobiography contains a tribute to his wife. He relates how happy they were and how their happiness grew for forty years. He relates that he never saw her that he wasn't delighted. He relates that this delight was born of many days and he illustrates the practicality

of Ephesians 5:21-33. This is a paraphrase of their plan.  
1. Both of us had one aim—to live for Christ.  
2. Both of us had an abundance of work to do.  
3. Both of us did not let our work interfere with the care of our own souls.  
4. Both of us had, every day, a sort of time of prayer together.  
Sacred self-love is the dedi-

cation of two people as one to God, through Christ. It endures frustration. It grows in joy. And, as with anything done for Christ, it lasts. "So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies." The Association agreed to pay \$25 on the building fund for the new library. Leon Filligim and Claudie Brotherton were appointed to buy a new stove for the dining room.

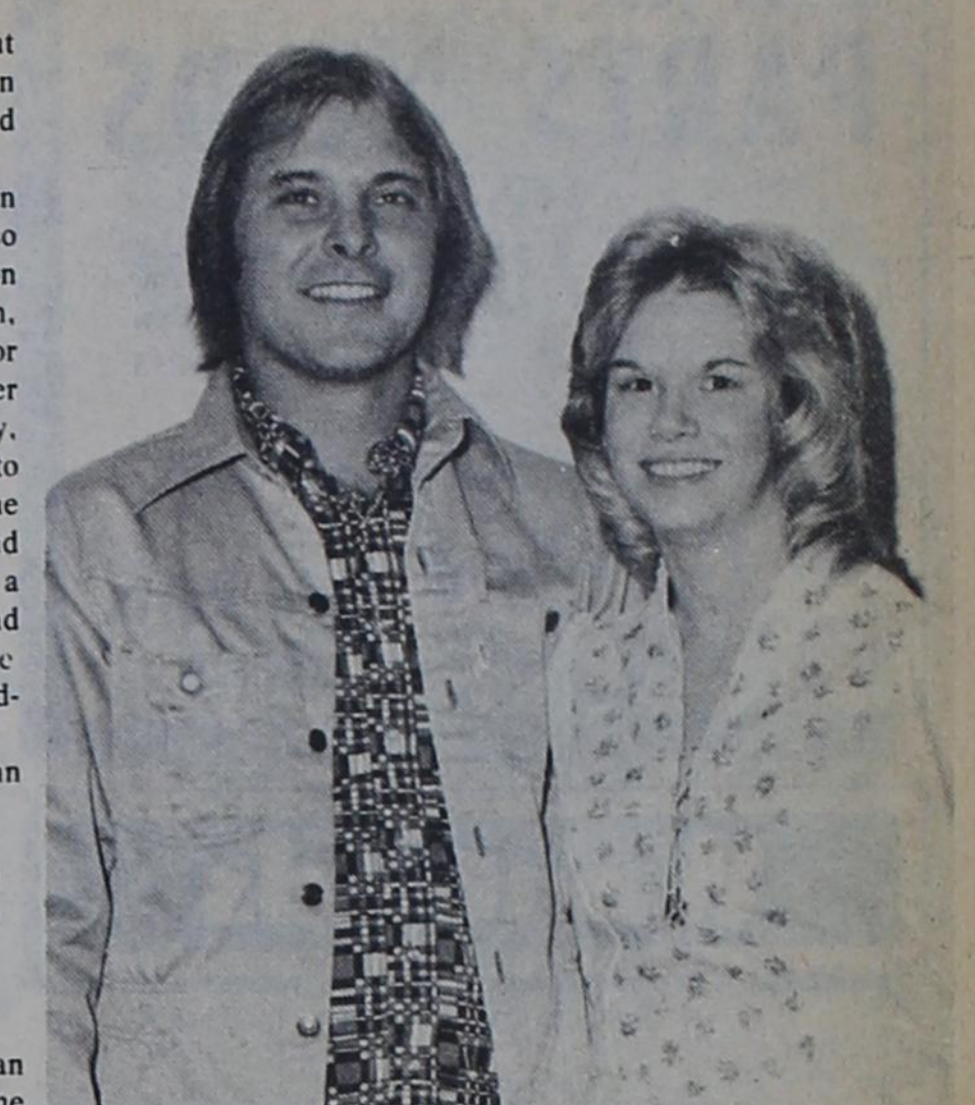

## FALL FASHIONS

Rugged, athletic looks typify the accessories collection this fall. And choosing from these new exciting items is a fun, inexpensive way to "update your appearance".

For a smashing look, the head is almost always hooded, hel-

meted or wrapped. For a totally new look, try the English boarding school cap.

The waist is belted or sashed, either with wide, low-slung belts or several narrow aviator straps.

Use scarves to wrap or drape the head, neck, waist or hips. Big blanket scarves, knitted

shawls or mufflers, hung over one shoulder, create the popular serape style.

Low-slung suede and leather drawstring bags can be pouches, pockets or sacks on narrow straps hang around the neck or waist.

Legs are covered and layered with textures and colors in knits, leathers, and cords. Panty hose may be sheer or opaque with interest created by ribbing or space-dyeing. Pinstripes, herringbone and chevron patterns in pantyhose complement tailored suits for a memswear look.

Knee-highs may be textured and patterned with the skiwear sweater look, rugby or soccer stripes, or the space-dyed look in bands or argyles and rugged three-dimensional black cable or fisherman knits. Or they may be shiny nylon knits with heat transfer prints, nubby cotton tweeds, metallics or burshed mohair looks.

Whatever the style, the knee-highs are often cuffed over midcalf or knee-high boots. Shoes take on a hearty look, and some are sporting square heels.

Matte wood jewelry with metal trim, twisted gold or silver satin ropes, and western gear add the finishing touches to fall fashion.

Real leather, suede and their fabulous fakes are continuing as one of the most popular outerwear categories for everyone this fall.

Current styles feature more detailing and fashionable design variations. Popular colors include buttery tans and earth tones of rust, mocha and brown shades.

Real leathers and suedes are more expensive than a year ago.

Costs for cowhides have risen almost 50 per cent, while sheep, lamb and pig skin costs have remained stable. Sharply soaring costs of real fur—five to 100 percent higher—and lamb

shearing trims will limit their availability except in the more expensive price ranges.

Realistic-looking, and more affordable, fake fur trims will be seen in the popular price ranges. Real and fake fur trimmed styles will be more popular than a year ago—as much as one-third of the market.

Since outerwear garments are a major investment, consumers should shop carefully.

Real leather and suede garments should be well-matched in color and texture. They should be supple enough to conform comfortably to the body during wear. If possible, lift the lining and examine the wrong side of the leather or suede. If it is a different color on the wrong side, any surface scuffs will be visible. Garments should fit comfortably since alternations are difficult. Stitching cannot be let out without showing. Restitching in the same place further perforates and weakens it.

Care instructions should be followed exactly. Often special procedures or cleaning specialists are recommended. Some fakes are only washable or dry cleanable, not both, or may be neither.

Also, it is wise to save all hang tags and the sales slip in case the garment does not perform satisfactorily after following the recommended care instructions needs to be returned to the store.

Contemporary fabrics and fashions reflect strong ethnic influence.

Especially popular are primitive inspirations from pre-Columbian Indian and Black African cultures. Ancient Mayan, Toltec and Aztec civilizations from Central and South America are inspiring such current looks as serape stripes and plaids, and colors ranging from bright hot tropics such as jungle

## LIBRARIES

Eighteen libraries in the 25 counties served by the Texas Panhandle Library System have qualified for system membership in the year that began September 1. The system will receive a grant of \$183,554 to carry out programs to improve library service in the area.

Ten regional systems have been organized under provisions

of the Texas Library Systems Act that is administered by the Texas State Library. Funds are available to the systems to carry out cooperative activities to improve library service to users of system member libraries.

Like other systems, the Texas Panhandle Library System is developing service programs particularly suited to the library needs of its region. These include providing consultant services to libraries in the area, circulation of a film collection purchased for use by all libraries in the area, a books-by-mail program for residents of counties without library service, and assisting libraries in disseminating information about services.

Other ethnic influences include South Pacific Polynesian cultures that are inspiring unique prints such as scroll borders and russet-brown, indigo-white or brown-black colorations. Mid Eastern Indian looks are continuing strong in gauze fabrics and madras plaids.

Many available ethnic fabrics are woven from cotton or cotton blend fiber contents. Indian-inspired blanket weight fabrics in wool or acrylic fibers will be seen in fall outerwear garments.

Wheeler Public Library is new member of the system this year. Amarillo Public Library serves as the Major Resource Center. Lovett Memorial Library in Pampa is an area library. Community libraries are Hutchinson County Library in Borger, Hemphill County Library in Canadian, Canyon Public Library, Rhoads Memorial Library in Dimmitt, Killgore Memorial Library in Dumas, Friona Public Library, Deaf Smith County Library in Hereford, Lovett Memorial Library in McLean, Carson County Public Library in Panhandle, Perry Memorial Library in Perryton, Shamrock Public Library, Hansford County Library in Spearman, Sherman County

Public Library in Stratford, and Swisher County Library in Tulia. The High Plains Bookmobile which operates out of Muleshoe and serves a four-county area is a unique member of the state system.

Members of the Advisory Council, a six-person group elected by representatives of each library in the system, are Mrs. Jean Wilkerson, Borger; Steve Messenger, Friona; Mrs. B. L. Morgan, Amarillo; Grace Scott, Tulia; Mrs. Ralph Headlee, Perryton; and Mrs. F. Forrest Ferrell, Panhandle. Composed of interested citizens, this council advises in the development of the system program.

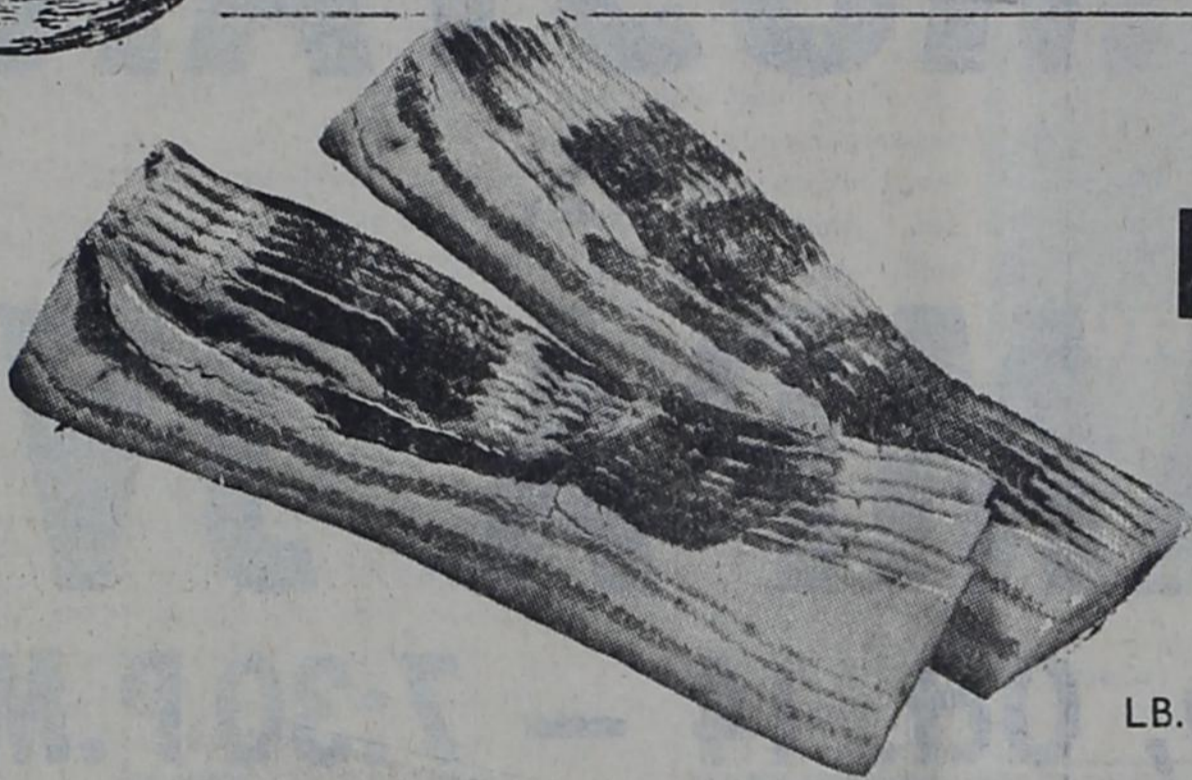

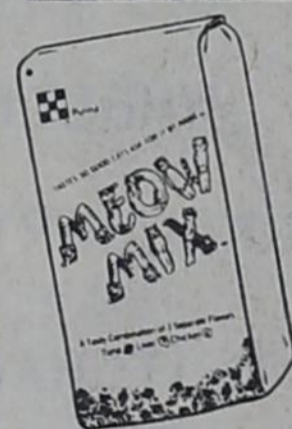
