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GROOM VICTOR OVER WHEELER

MUSTANG BID FOR VICTORY DIES AT ONE AT END

The Wheeler Mustangs bid for football supremacy in District 1-B came up short last Friday night in Groom as they fell back into second place by a narrow 12-9 loss to the Groom Tigers.

This important game matching the state's third and eleventh ranked teams in Class B was tension packed from the opening kickoff and was finally decided with just seven seconds remaining in the game.

Nearly 2000 fans were on their feet as the Mustangs called time with 11 ticks left on the clock and facing fourth down at the Tiger 3.

Dell Ford got the call and when the bodies were unraveled, Ford was a yard shy of paydirt and the last of many big plays had preserved the Tigers margin.

The Mustangs aborted drive for victory started on their own 29 after Groom had wiped out a 9-6 lead the Mustangs had held since the end of the third quarter.

Thomas Reed, who was the big gun offensively for the Tigers all night, recovered a fumble by Don Brown at the Wheeler 27 with 8:40 to play and six plays later he squirmed into the end zone on a quick pitch and the Tigers had their 12-9 lead.

Sammie Sutton returned the kickoff 14 yards & the Mustangs started their race against the clock and a fired up Tiger defense.

Pushed back to the 24, the Mustangs faced third and 15 and Brown picked up 14 of the yards on a wingback reverse. Having to run on fourth down, the Mustangs called on Brown once more and he picked up the yard and a new lease at the 40.

Marvin Grimes brought the packed throng to their feet on the

next play as the sophomore tailback broke outside his left tackle and appeared to be long gone down the sideline until

Roger Baggerman hauled him in with a desperate lunge at the Groom 17.

The Mustangs got only a yard in three tries and on fourth down the Tigers were flagged for pass interference and Wheeler had first and goal at the Tiger 8 with 1:47 left.

Grimes got 3 on two trips into the Tigers left side and Brown picked up 2 on the other side to set up the last big play.

Wheeler had nudged into the lead via three field goals off the toe of Jim Verden as the Mustangs faltered at the Tiger 10, 23, and 13. Verden's first boot came with only 51 seconds to play in the half and came at the conclusion of a 17 play, 60 yard drive that saw Wheeler have the pigskin the entire second quarter until Verden's kick.

After a scoreless first quarter, Groom took over at their 43 after a Mustang punt. Pushed back 15 for clipping the Tigers took to the airways for only the second time in the game and Nathan Wieberg hit Baggerman on the right side and the Tiger was finally hauled in on the Wheeler 31. Reed broke the scoreless tie on the next play as he found daylight on the Mustangs right side on the quick pitch and breaking a big tackle, romped 31 yards to paydirt.

Recovering a fumble at the Groom 25 early in the second half, the Mustangs had a good opportunity to get six and go ahead but they had to call on Verden and his 40 yarder knotted the score.

Wheeler took the lead at 0:49 in the third quarter after a Mustang drive from their 32 had been stopped at the Groom 13. Verden's 30 yard field goal gave the Mustangs the lead that held up until Reed's big run.

Saturday, October 9, will be Homecoming at Wheeler. The Wheeler Mustangs will meet Textline in a conference game at 2:30 in the afternoon. The activities will begin Friday afternoon with an assembly at the school at 2:00. The pep rally and parade will be Saturday morning

At the assembly, the queen candidates will be introduced and Doyce Watson, president of the ex-student association, will address the student body and guests. The queen candidates, Anne McIlhany, Darla Moore, Cindy Davis and Terri Rarden will be escorted to the stage by Senior Mustangs, Tony Hefley, Jim Verden, Gary Ware and Don Brown. Darrell Gaines, president of the Student Council and a Senior Mustang, will present the candidates and their escorts and serve as master of ceremonies.

The parade Saturday morning will begin at the school and continue down Main Street to the corner of Texas and Main. The floats entered by the classes and organizations will form a circle with a pep rally to be held inside the circle. The floats will be judged by a group of townspeople and prizes will be awarded first, second and third place. The prizes, \$25, \$15, and \$10, will be donated by the Lions Club, Volunteer Fire Department and Wheeler Riding Club.

The Wheeler Band Boosters will serve a noon meal from 11:30 until 1:30. The menu will include Spaghetti, green salad, tea or coffee, and dessert.

At the pre-game coronation at 2:00, the queen candidates will be carried onto the east end of the 50 yard line. They will be introduced individually as they are escorted onto the playing field. The 1976 Homecoming queen will be named, owned and queen will be named, crowned and presented a bouquet of roses.

Concluding the day's activities will be the game with the Textline Tornados. The Wheeler Mustangs will be out to win; the team now has a record of 3-0.

Each of the four queen candidates are cheerleaders. They were nominated by the Mustang Team and the winner will be selected by secret ballot prior to the coronation ceremonies.

The Wheeler Band Boosters urge you all to come to town for the Homecoming parade at 10:00 and attend the pep rally afterward, then mosey on down to the cafeteria for lunch. All profits from the lunch will go into the Mustang Band uniform fund.

TEXLINE IS MUSTANGS HOMECOMING FOE SAT.

The Textline Tornados come to Wheeler Saturday afternoon and the 2:30 kickoff will top a day of homecoming activities for the Mustangs and their supporters.

The big question that will be answered in the Tornadoes clash will be just how much the loss to Groom last week took out of the local crew.

"We had our sights set on a 10-0 season but now we are going after a 9-1 because we aren't out of the district race by any means", Coach Preston Smith said this week. "The kids are real disappointed over the loss

but they have a lot of pride and will come back strong".

Facing the visitors from the north plains won't be the easiest task the Mustangs have faced. The Tornadoes don't possess a lot of size but they do have good speed and quickness and romped all over the McLean Tigers last Saturday in Textline.

Barring mishaps during this weeks workouts, the Mustangs should be in pretty good shape for the Tornadoes although Don Brown is still recovering from an illness bout that has left him out of shape.

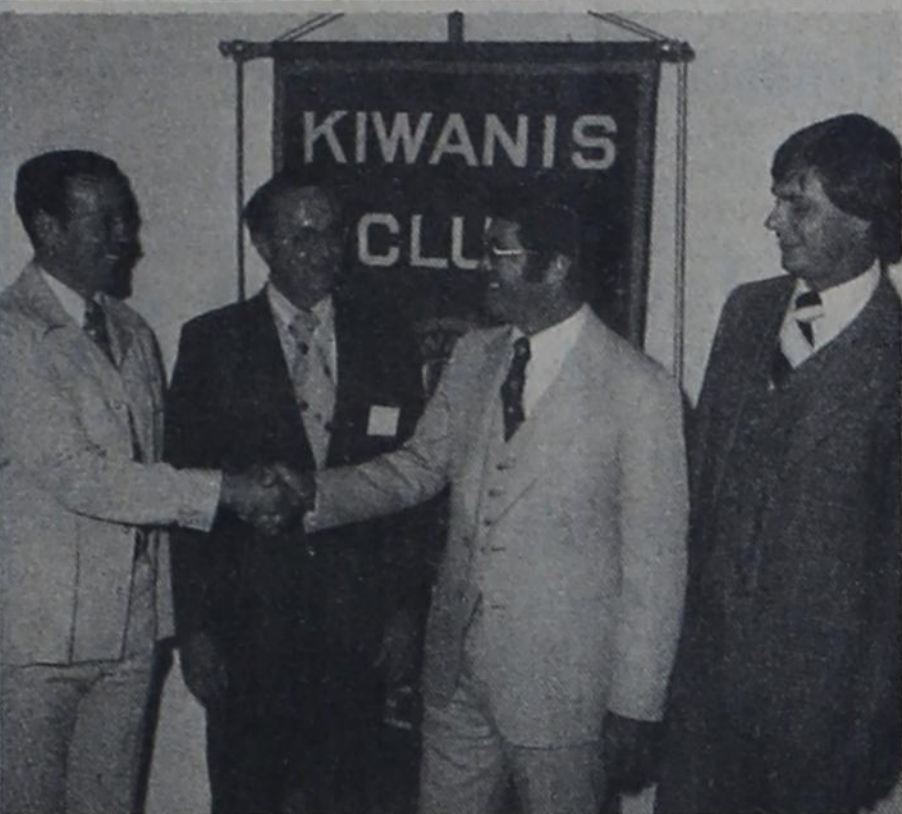

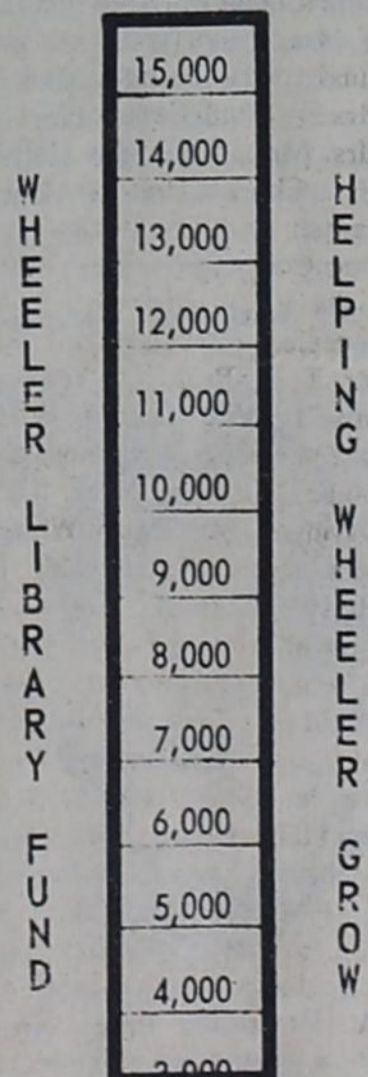

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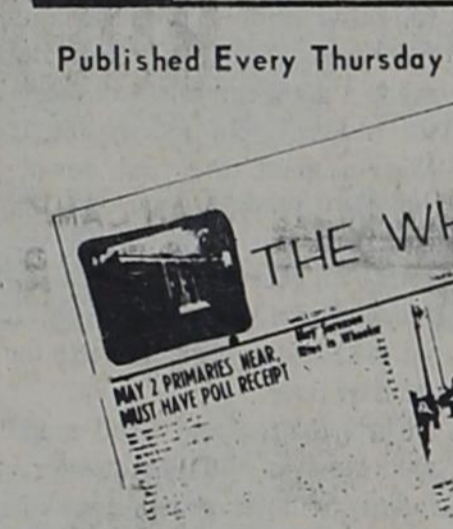

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE VOTERS OF THE 13th CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT FROM CONGRESSMAN JACK HIGHTOWER

Two years ago I was elected to Congress by an overwhelming margin against an incumbent Congressman. During the 1974 campaign I refrained from any personal attacks on my opponent.

At that time I made it a point with my volunteers and my staff that they should treat anyone who opposed me with the utmost respect. I thank all of my friends, supporters and staff for keeping the 1974 campaign on the highest level possible.

Responsiveness of government was a key issue. Our government does a poor job when it compounds our problems with red tape and burdensome regulations. Bureaucratic brush-offs of legitimate requests are very frustrating. I decided to organize my staff in such a way that people could deal at the local level with the bureaucratic maze of the federal agencies.

I promised two years ago that you would be able to call a number in the district and get an answer. When I took office I immediately established district offices in Amarillo, Vernon, and Wichita Falls—staffed by personnel who have been instructed personally to be responsive to the wishes and needs of my constituents. I am pleased that many people have told me they appreciate the work and attitude of my assistants. This is the only way I know to have a responsive Congressional office and I assure you I intend to try to improve this service constantly.

The Postal Service has been a bigger mess than ever since the Nixon Administration reorganized it. This is one reason I have chosen not to flood the mails with political propaganda such as newsletters. My alternative has been to communicate through the news media and to come home to the district at every opportunity for personal contact with constituents. All you ever heard about Washington having an artificial atmosphere is true. It has been my experience that the worst Congressmen are those who rarely come home. I am not going to let that happen to me. My policy is to talk with the people at home to see what they are thinking, and return to Washington and vote their philosophy and interests. I live in the district and commute to Washington.

As many of you know, I am being attacked, broadside, by my opponent in this 1976 campaign. His allegations and innuendos are based upon a misrepresentation of the record. I have voted in my two committees—Agriculture and Small Business—and on the floor in exactly the way I have reported to you and as I promised. My record is conservative by any measure. It is also independent of domination either by the Democratic leadership of the House or the Republican White House. I am neither an obstructionist nor a rubber stamp.

As this Congress adjourns, its overall record is mixed. This Congress has done some things it should not have done and left undone some things it should have done—such as enacting a "sunset" bill to cut down on federal bureaucracies or formulating an effective energy plan. We have been able to enact a bill to provide for prompt payment for the cattleman. We were able to pass a bill to provide for some relief on the estate tax problem which should benefit everyone who wants his or her property to remain in the family. These steps are not enough but they are movement in the right direction.

All of us feel sometimes that our views are not reflected properly in Washington. I would prefer a Congress that holds a tighter rein on spending, but I do not choose the other 434 members of the House. I work with them and try to influence them, but I cannot dictate their votes. I feel my job is to represent you—the people of the 13th District—and I pledge to do my best to represent you well.
