

Big Tilt Friday For Mustangs And Groom

This one could be for all the marbles when the Wheeler Mustangs put their undefeated record squarely on the line against the 5th ranked team in the state in Class B, the Groom Tigers, Friday night in Groom.

Picked to win District I-B in all pre-season polls, the Groom

Tigers have done nothing to change many peoples minds even though they have a one point loss to Claude to mar their record.

With five defensive and five offensive starters back off the state finalists of a year ago, the Tigers not only have the experience but pressure games are nothing new to them.

The 8 o'clock kickoff will probably see a standing room only crowd at Groom come rain or shine and the victor Friday night will definitely have the favorites tag applied to them for the district championship.

The tigers warmed up for the Mustangs last week by slaughtering the McLean Tigers and did so without playing their all-state candidate at fullback, Chris Britten. While Groom had a laugh, the Mustangs were putting down the challenge of the Lefors Pirates and did so in a pretty convincing fashion, 35-10.

Don Brown, who saw limited action against Lefors, is running better this week but Coach Preston Smith indicated that Marvin Grimes would probably start at tailback for the Mustangs. Outside of Brown returning to form, the Mustangs should be in good condition for the Groom battle.

"This is the one we have been waiting for but our kids will have to play an exceptional game to win but I'll guarantee you that our bunch will accept the challenge of playing the Tigers with enthusiasm," Coach Smith said this week.

The head mentor of the Mustangs went on to add, "Even though we beat Lefors by a big margin, we didn't play that well. Our blocking was terrible most of the time and this has got to improve a lot because Groom is a sound defensive ball club and Chris Britten is their leader on defense as well as offense."

In further assessing Friday's opponent, Coach Smith said, "Groom not only can beat you running but they have a fine passer with speed in their receivers and our pass defense was poor in spots against Lefors."

Thomas Reed, a 160 lb. senior running back, ably compliments Britten in the Tiger backfield and is the fastest of the Groom backs.

Groom uses the split 6 as their basic defensive alignment with a 3 deep secondary and only Claude has been able to gain much on the Tigers and they did this through the air.

Groom spoiled a 20 game winning streak by the Mustangs a number of years back on this same gridiron and this is really the first opportunity the Mustangs have had since that time to play the Tigers when they are in possession of such a lofty perch.

The Lefors Pirates came sailing into Wheeler last Friday night undefeated and tied for the top in the 1-B championship race but when they left Nicholson Field the Pirates had absorbed their first defeat, a thorough

35-10 shellacking by the Wheeler Mustangs.

Lefors did get on the scoreboard first but after that was a Mustang show with even the reserves getting into the act with Brett Mosley sprinting 52 yards

for the final TD of the night.

The win over the Pirates kept the Mustangs undefeated and set the stage for this weeks encounter with the Groom Tigers.

Phil White capped a 7 play, 27 yard drive with a 30 yard field goal to put the Pirates ahead at 11:11 after Marvin Grimes had fumbled away the pigskin on the first play of the game.

Emergency Care Attendant Course Is To Begin Oct. 4

October 4 is the date for the Emergency Care Attendant course to begin. The class is to be held at the Wheeler High School and instruction will begin at 7:00 p.m.

The course will be taught through Amarillo College with assistance from area citizens.

If you are interested in attending the course, it is not necessary that you notify anyone. You will be enrolled Monday evening.

The 24-hour course to be offered area adults will teach how to care for heart attack and accident victims. The Monday evening classes will offer instruction in bandaging, splinting and CPR with the only cost being that of purchasing books—an estimated \$10.

The length of the class period will determine the number of

weeks the course will run. Those attending will decide on a three or four hour session Monday evening. Completion of the course requires 24 hours in the classroom.

It is hoped some of the individuals completing the course will help with the operation of the Wheeler County Ambulances. A person completing the course and passing the examination will be qualified to work with an EMT, Emergency Medical Technician, in the operation of the ambulances.

Helping with the ambulances is not a requirement. This course is good training for anyone and your knowledge may save a life. Heart attacks are very common and in some cases, the victim needs help within 4 minutes—an ambulance may be more than 4 minutes away. The training you receive in bandaging may enable you to stop severe bleeding and prevent or treat shock.

The course is being offered by the Wheeler County Ambulance Service, and being sponsored by Wheeler County.

An estimated 25 students have expressed an interest in taking the course and there is room for several more students. Citizens of the surrounding communities need to take the course.

PARKVIEW HOSPITAL INCREASES ROOM RATES

At its regular meeting September 13, 1976, the board of trustees of Parkview Hospital voted a room rate increase to become effective October 1. This is the first room increase for Parkview Hospital since May 15, 1974 and only the second since September 1970. In face of the ever spiraling cost of medical care that we hear and read about every day, Parkview Hospital is proud of its containment of cost to the extent that only two rate increases have been necessary in the last six years.

Those units being affected by the increase will be private rooms, increased from \$35.00 per day to \$45.00 per day, and semi-private rooms from \$32.00 to 40.00.

The board of trustees and the administration has continuously put forth every effort to furnish the people of the North Wheeler County Hospital District with the best of medical and hospital care at the lowest possible cost, and feel that they have been successful in this accomplishment. Even with this increase just voted, the room rates of Parkview Hospital remain from \$10.00 to \$20.00 a day under those hospitals of comparable size in our surrounding towns.

There are several factors that were instrumental in creating the necessity of this increase which include increase in minimum wage law from \$1.60 per hour in 1970 to \$2.30 per hour January 1, 1977, increases in cost of equipment, utilities and supplies and many other items. However, the most predominant factors that makes this rate increase necessary are Medicare discounts and nonpayment of hospital bills by private paying patients.

During the present fiscal year, Medicare has paid Parkview Hospital 74% of billed charges on all Medicare patients, thereby forcing Parkview Hospital to write-off \$58,656.12 as an uncollectible from the patient regardless of additional insurance policies carried by the patient, etc.

The second factor, and a very costly one, is failure to pay by patients other than Medicare patients who are capable of paying. This category is an item of major cost to Parkview Hospital as a false figure of income. Second, the actual loss of the cost of service and supplies furnished this individual and not paid for. Third, the cost of attorneys fees when this method is used in attempts to collect from this nonpaying patient.

The additional cost to the paying patient becomes most obvious: rates are increased to offset the loss created by the nonpaying.

The board of trustees and administration continue to pledge all their efforts in furnishing the very best medical and hospital care to the residents of North Wheeler County Hospital District at the lowest possible cost to the patient and the residents. Government and Medicare regulations will continue to force us to write off that portion of Medicare bills not paid by Medicare as an uncollectible item. However, we can help keep the cost down to the paying patient by being more forceful with the nonpaying patient through tighter controls on credit given, greater collection efforts by referring more unpaid bills to attorneys for collection and legal action when necessary and by adding the cost of this collection procedure to each individual bill being collected.

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COLTS ARE 38-6 VICTORS IN OPENING GAME SEPT. 23

The Wheeler Colts ran roughshod over the Claude Colts in their opening game last Thursday night and about all you could tell about the Colts was that the score could have been much worse than the final 38-6.

Scoring the first three times they had their hands on the ball, the host Colts built up a 24-0 lead after the first 8 minutes over their outmanned visitors.

Two fumbles by Claude, one at their 30 and the other at the 33, gave the Colts two early chances and they were quick to take advantage of each.

Robert Ford fell on the first Claude fumble on the first play of the game at the Claude 30 and it took Coach Richard Gaines crew only four plays to bring lights flashing on the scoreboard for Wheeler.

Benny Baker, one of several good running backs in the Colts

stable, found a gaping hole at right guard at the 10 and scored standing up to put the Colts in front after just four plays. The score went to 8-0 with Baker's run good for two more points.

Claude fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Tommy Calverly pounced on the ball at the 33 and the Colts were back in the scoring business.

Calverly punched out 7 yards up the middle before Baker found daylight around his left side and raced to the end zone to put the Colts up by two touchdowns with just 2½ minutes gone off the clock. Calverly added the two points and Wheeler was ahead 16-0 and Claude had run one play from scrimmage.

Holding onto the ball for the first time, Claude was able to get three running plays off before punting and Baker gathered the kick in on his 25 and returned the boot 75 yards for another TD in the Colts' rout. Calverly once more ran over for two and the score rose to 24 zip.

A 23 yard pass from Ty Henderson to Joe Guthrie was the big play on the Colts next possession but this drive stalled at the Claude 23 as Coach Gaines started substituting freely and continued to do so for the final three quarters.

Just over a minute remained in the half when Baker intercepted a Claude pass on the Claude 42 and the 145 lb. tailback ran it back all the way for his fourth TD, of the half.
