### Minnie Lancaster Rites Read Tues.

Funeral services for Mrs. Minnie Pheobe Lancaster, 90 long time resident of Mobeetie was held at 10:00 A.M. Tuesday morning in the Carmichael-Whitley Colonial Chapel with the Rev. Aaron Lancaster, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Mobeetie officiating.

Mrs. Lancaster was born in 1886 in Rusk County, Texas and died in the Pampa Nursing Center, Sunday, September 19, 1976.

In 1902 she was married to Mr. Aubrey Bassett Lancaster in Rusk County. To their union was born three sons and two daughters.

They moved to Mobeetie from Collingsworth County in 1919 where Mr. Lancaster farmed. He preceded her in death in 1970.

Mrs. Lancaster had lived in Pampa for two years. A son Aubrey also preceded her in death. Survivors are two sons, Curtis of Mobeetie and Richard of Grass Valley, California; two daughters, Mrs. Eileen Zell of Wichita Falls, and Mrs. Aileen children of Pampa; two sisters, Mrs. Inez Morris of Fort Worth and Mrs. Mittie Young of Henderson. Also surviving are 17 grandchildren, 39 great-grandchildren and 19 great-great-grandchildren. Burial was in the Mobeetie Cemetery.

### Speech, Hearing, Language Exam

A team composed of speech, hearing, and language specialists from the Panhandle Regional Speech and Hearing Association will visit Wheeler County, Texas on Saturday, September 25th to provide free speech and hearing and language examination for those children in the community who are 3, 4, 5, and 6 years old. They will be at North Ward School in Shamrock, Texas from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. and again from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the afternoon.

It is now commonly understood that all types of speech, language, and hearing problems can be dealt with far more effectively when diagnosed at an early age. Some of these problems are subtle and not easy for parents or teachers to identify. For these reasons the Association recommends that every child in the 3 to 6 year age range be evaluated by this visiting team. There is no charge for this service. Those children found to have significant problems will be referred to appropriate professionals for complete diagnosis and recommendations.

This visit of the evaluation team to Wheeler County is being sponsored by the Shamrock Boosters Club.

One of the aspects of the Pirates offense that will pose problems for the Mustangs will be that they run an offensive formation that is just not seen anymore and that is the single wing.

Operating out of the important tailback position in the Pirates attack will be Phil White, a 155 lb. senior. White has averaged just under 200 yard a game

The September meeting of the Wheeler City Council was held Monday evening, September 20, in the City Office. Meeting with the council were Dwain Jackson, Richard Wallace, Thurman Bowen, Paul Topper, Jerry Hefley, and Jerry Kelly.

The meeting opened with the reading of the minutes of the August meeting. The minutes were approved and signed.

Dwain Jackson met with the council to discuss his vacation. Paul Topper met with the council to discuss the franchise for the TV System in Wheeler.

Mayor Pete Burton reported on the bids for fire equipment. The specifications for the fire equipment will be submitted to a number of companies and bids will be opened at the next meeting of the City Council.

The Wheeler Library request additional support from the city. The board is in the process of remodeling the Old Hospital and requested the City support the library in the amount of \$100 per month and utilities. The council voted to grant the request effective October 1.

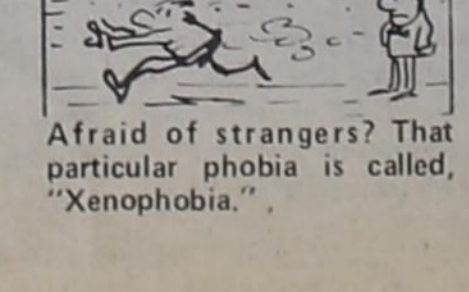

## Booze Ban At Contest

Administrators and other officials are not being arbitrary when they will not permit liquor upon public school grounds. House Bill No. 531 forbids the bringing or carrying of intoxicating beverages into any stadium or field where high school athletic events are being carried on. The Bill is quoted below, for the benefit of all public school officials: "Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to bring or carry into any enclosure, field or stadium, where athletic events, sponsored or participated in by the public schools of this state, are being held, any intoxicating beverage in his possession while in or on said enclosure, field or stadium."

Section 2. Provided that if any officer of this State sees any person or persons violating the terms of Section 1 of this Act, he shall immediately seize such intoxicating beverage and shall within a reasonable time thereafter deliver same to the County or District Attorney."

# TODAY'S CHRISTIAN

**Lee Henry**  
 "Like father, like son," we say. And so often we do not mean it as a compliment. A drunkard father has a son to follow in his footsteps, and someone is sure to apply the formula and explain away the whole matter.

Paul knew well the importance of children walking in the footsteps of the Heavenly Father. To the Ephesians he wrote, "Since you are God's dear children, you must try to be like him" (Ephesians 5:1, TEV). Other translations (NIV, RSV), speak of imitating God's example. We tend to disdain anything imitative, thinking it must be counterfeit. But in this situation the genuineness of God's children is measured by how well they imitate Him.

In Paul's view, imitating God is perfectly natural for God's children. It would be unnatural for them to act in any other way. In their early years, children copy their adult models in speech, habits, dress, mannerisms, and countless other ways. Only as we gain independence does this mimicry disappear, and not entirely even then. Since God's children never cease being dependent on him, they may always be expected to follow his pattern.

Living in Christ is both the means of imitating God and the product of doing so. This life is motivated and controlled by love—the same kind of love which led Jesus to give himself up for us "as an offering and sacrifice who fragrance is pleasing to God" (Eph. 5:2, NEB). This life of love is a very special kind of life, one in which "There must not be even a hint of sexual immorality, or of any kind of impurity, or of greed, because these are improper for God's holy people" (Eph 5:3 NIV). God so wants his people and the ungodly to be separated that he warns, "...have nothing at all to do with such people" (Eph. 5:7, TEV).

Not only is the life of the Christian contrasted with that of the non-Christian; it also differs greatly from the Christian's own former life. Paul put it so simply: "You yourselves used to be in the darkness, but since you have become the Lord's people you are in the light. So you must live like people who belong to the light" (Eph. 5:1).

Living in the light brings a "rich harvest of every kind of goodness, righteousness, and truth" (Eph. 5:9). On the other hand, living in darkness involves things "to shameful even to talk about" (Eph. 5:12). These things may be done in darkness and secret, but their true nature is clearly revealed by the sacred light.

It is interesting that Paul does not really argue the necessity of living in the light. He just reminds his readers that children of God do live in the light. It is true that, in order to be saved in heaven, one must imitate God. But the emphasis here is that one who has been redeemed does live in the light.

The Christian needs no arti-

cial stimulus, such as wine. When he is filled with the Spirit, his life is one of praise and thanksgiving. He is thrilled for all who watch to know that he is walking in his father's footsteps. "How beautiful to walk in the steps of the Savior, Stepping the Light!"

Opens New Year**







The following information comes from an article, "Care Can Ensure Safe School Lunches," from Food In The News, a publication by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

It's back to school time again! Children hurry off to school wearing new outfits and toting new school supplies—a notebook with pictures of TV heroes on the cover, plenty of lined paper, a box of crayons with 48 colors, pencils and an eraser. Even a

shiny apple for the teacher! You may pack a special treat in your son's new lunch box. That's a great way to start off the new school year. Kids love lunches from home, especially when

there is a treat or surprise inside. Be careful, though, to avoid packing a dangerous surprise in your child's lunchbox—food poisoning.

Packed school lunches can be dangerous if they are not prepared carefully. While Mickie is learning her reading, writing, and arithmetic, the delicious meatloaf sandwich you made her this morning sits in a school locker or desk. It may sit there for three to four hours before lunch. Bacteria and germs, which cause food poisoning, grow rapidly at temperatures between 40F and 140F. Warm temperatures in school lockers and desks provide a playground for

growing germs and bacteria. Here are some tips from the U. S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) that will help you prepare safe school lunches for your children:

**Keep Food Cold.** Sandwiches containing meat and poultry products can be frozen the night before they are packed for lunch. Take them out of the freezer right before leaving the house. They will thaw slowly in the locker and be just right by noon. By keeping sandwiches cold, you inhibit the growth of germs and bacteria.

When preparing sandwiches to freeze, spread on just enough butter, mayonnaise, or sauce to

cover the bread. Don't spread it on too thick—the bread may become soggy during thawing. Lettuce can also be used in frozen sandwiches. Some quality is lost in freezing, but this can be minimized by putting each piece of lettuce dry before putting into the sandwich.

To keep school lunches cold—get a freezer gel device. Place one in each lunch bag. If you don't have one—make your own. Just take a clean margarine container, fill it with water and freeze it overnight. Just before your children leave for school, place the homemade device in the center of their lunch bags. This will keep lunches cold and safe until it is time to eat them.

Keep food products can be liquid by pouring them into a vacuum bottle or other insulated container. Close the lid immediately to keep warm air out and cold air in.

**Keep Foods Hot.** During the fall and winter months—as the weather outside gets cool and crisp—soups and hot chocolate become popular lunchtime treats. Be creative—try something new this year! How about some chili for lunch or maybe some pork and beans. These are great for lunches. But, don't just be creative—be safe. To keep these foods warm until noon, pour them into a vacuum bottle or other insulated container when they are boiling hot. Put the cap on immediately. Steam escaping from the food should be kept inside to help keep the contents warm longer.

**Keep Foods Clean.** Traditionally, students could win the teacher's good graces by placing a big polished apple on the teacher's desk. You can win the good graces of your children by putting fresh fruit and vegetables into their lunchboxes. Some favorites are apples, oranges, carrot sticks, and pickles. Don't be limited to these. Tomato wedges, cucumber slices, cole slaw, and fruit salads make interesting surprises. Just be sure to clean and scrub all fruits and vegetables thoroughly before packing them in a school lunch. In addition to possible bacteria, these foods could be contaminated with surface residues of pesticides if not washed carefully.

Cleanliness is the key to preparing safe brown bag lunches... Always wash your hands carefully with soap and water before handling food. Wear rubber gloves if you have a cut or infection on your hands. Make sure all utensils, cutting boards, and counter surfaces was washed thoroughly with hot, soapy, water immediately before and after they are used.

"Herby, I'll trade you my peanut butter and jelly sandwich for your ham and cheese!"

"OK."

"Trading" is a common practice among classmates. However, this could be a dangerous practice. Discourage your children from "trading" prepared foods with classmates. There is no way of knowing if the sandwich Herby got was prepared and stored safely. So, why take any chances?

Make creative lunches for your children. Keep them interesting! Try packing new foods and preparing foods in a different way. Include the foods that your children like and avoid the ones they don't. Encourage them to get involved in planning and preparation of their lunches, they may not "trade" them quite so quickly.

The Lunchbox vs. The Brown Bag. Lunchboxes hold the cold

inside much better and are easier to keep clean. However, if you prefer a sack lunch, buy bags which are to be used specifically for this purpose. Mark them clearly and store them apart from your other bags. Do not use bags which have been previously used to carry groceries, lunches, detergents, etc. Used bags may contain harmful germs, bacteria, and chemicals.

With these tips from USDA, you can avoid packing any dangerous surprises in your children's lunchbox.
