

Cattlemen Ass'n. Ask for Proof

AUSTIN-The Independent Cattlemen's Association has called on the U.S. Department of Agriculture to show that American meat producers-already crippled by foreign meat imports-won't be further hurt by USDA's proposal to let the Republic of China, Taiwan, ship meat into the United States.

ICA President T. A. Cunningham of Goliad said that any imports permitted from Taiwan should be restricted within overall limits set by the existing Meat Importation Act.

"If Taiwan simply got a chunk of existing import trade, then we wouldn't be hurt any worse than we are already," Cunningham said, "but if these are new and additional imports, then for every pound an American stockman suffers.

The USDA has said its proposal to let Taiwan export meat to the U. S. is based on findings that Taiwan meat processing standards are equal to the U. S. meat inspection program.

"Assuming this is correct, it represents some protection American consumers don't now have with the millions of pounds of imported meat coming her,' Cunningham said, referring to ICA's efforts to pass federal legislation requiring better inspection of foreign packing plants which ship meat to the United States.

Cunningham said also that ICA would like to see the Agriculture Department "show us that this is truly a proposal of the USDA instead of another example of the State Department using agriculture as a pawn in foreign policy."

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

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest

rate limit on such bonds. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as estab-
