Emergency Care Attendant Course Has Been Postponed

The Emergency Care Attendant course scheduled to begin Monday, September 13 has been postponed due to a mix-up in paperwork by Amarillo College. It is hoped the error can be corrected and class begun with the next few weeks. The new date will be announced as soon as it is set.

The 24-hour course to be offered area adults will teach how to care for heart attack and accident victims. The Monday evening classes will offer instruction in bandaging, splinting and CPR with the only cost being

that of purchasing books—an estimated \$10.

The length of the class period will determine the number of weeks the course will run. Those attending will decide on a three or four hour session Monday evening. Completion of the course requires 24 hours in the classroom.

It is hoped some of the individuals completing the course will help with the operation of the Wheeler County Ambulances. A person completing the course and passing the examination will be qualified to work with an EMT, Emergency Medical

Technician, in the operation of the ambulances.

Helping with the ambulances is not a requirement. This course is good training for anyone and your knowledge may save a life. Heart attacks are very common and in some cases, the victim needs help within 4 minutes—an ambulance may be more than 4 minutes away. The training you receive in bandaging may enable you to stop severe bleeding and prevent or treat shock.

The course is being offered by the Wheeler County Ambulance Service, and being sponsored by Wheeler County.

An estimated 25 students have expressed an interest in taking the course and there is room for several more students. Citizens of the surrounding communities need to take the course.

Bob Bullock Rep To Make Visit

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that a representative from his Amarillo office will be in Wheeler, Wednesday, September 22, 1976, to answer questions from taxpayers and provide assistance in filing tax returns.

Bullock said EO John Hodges will be at Wheeler County Court House, Commissioner's Court Room, from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

"I hope local merchants will take this opportunity to get any questions they have about the sales or franchise taxes answered," said Bullock. "A little straight information can save us both headaches."

The Amarillo Field Office, headed by Bill Teague, serves Wheeler County.

Fish Applications Are Available

AUSTIN—Channel catfish and sunfish now are being delivered to private pondowners who applied for such species of fish prior to Jan. 1 of this year.

Officials at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Inland Fisheries Division say they now are taking requests for channel catfish, sunfish and largemouth bass to be delivered in 1977.

According to P&WD hatchery coordinator Ted Lowman, deadline for receiving application is Jan. 1, 1977, but Lowman encouraged landowners with ponds to apply early.

"The department will provide the three species of fish free of charge," said Lowman. "To qualify for the service, a pond either must never have been stocked with the requested species, have completely dried and refilled since the last request or have had all fish chemically removed since the last request."

Lowman said the P&WD keeps computer records of all stockings in private waters and will not stock fish in ponds that presently contain the three species of native fish.

Punt, Pass & Kick Competition Set

Local youngsters will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arm soon for the 1976 Punt, Pass and Kick competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be sponsored by Pete Burton Ford.

Nationally PP&K is celebrating its 16th anniversary. It is sponsored by the Ford Dealers of America in cooperation with the National Football League. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted more than 12 million youngsters—and participation this year is expected to top the 1,200,000 mark.

Participants in the Punt, Pass & Kick program compete only against others their own age. Any youngster 8 through 13 years of age, accompanied by a parent or guardian, may register to compete in PP&K at any participating Ford Dealer. There is no entrance fee and no body contact during competition. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing.

Scoring is based on accuracy and range with one point added for every foot of punting, passing and kicking distance, and a point subtracted for every foot off a center line.

Twelve national finalists will compete for the National Championships in their age group during the halftime of an NFL Divisional playoff game in December. Winners will have their names permanently inscribed in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Their trophies will be presented by Football Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Bo Guthrie intercepted a desperation Clay Wynn pass at the Wheeler 16 five seconds before the intermission.

The Mustangs have an open date this week before heading back to district warfare on September 24th against the Lefors Pirates in the Mustangs third straight home contest.

Don Brown led all ball carriers in the Follett game with 147 yards on 22 carries and this added to his Shamrock total gives the Mustang tailback 278 yards after two games.

Brown's rushing totals have been impressive but Marvin Grimes' 179 yards in two games have certainly given future opponents something to be concerned about.

The efforts of these two fine runners would be for naught however were it not for the job that the Mustangs offensive line has been doing. The unsung heroes are the young men down in the trenches that dig out the holes and make the offense go.

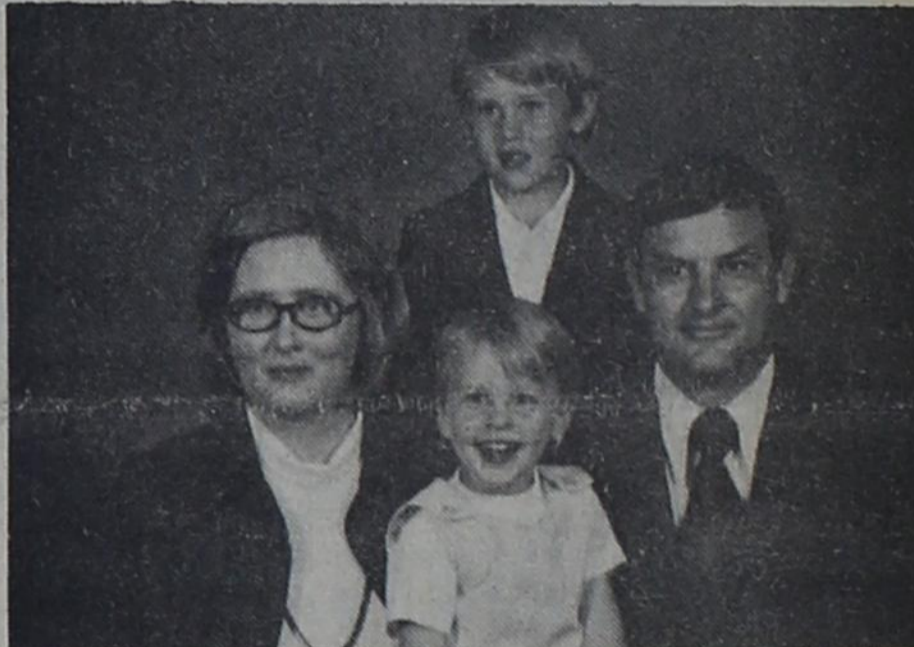

Wheeler Library Receives 7 Books

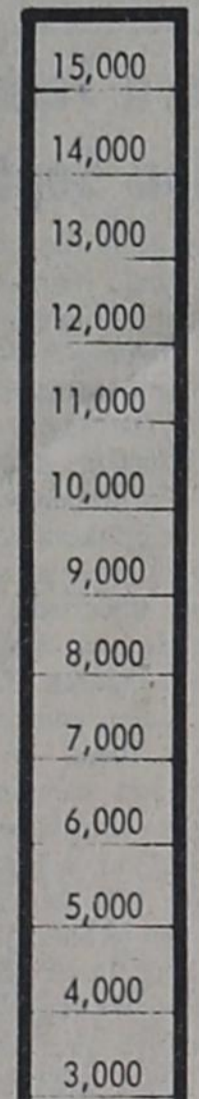

Cattlemen Ass'n. Ask for Proof

AUSTIN—The Independent Cattlemen's Association has called on the U. S. Department of Agriculture to show that American meat producers—already crippled by foreign meat imports—won't be further hurt by USDA's proposal to let the Republic of China, Taiwan, ship meat into the United States.

ICA President T. A. Cunningham of Goliad said that any imports permitted from Taiwan should be restricted within overall limits set by the existing Meat Importation Act.

"If Taiwan simply got a chunk of existing import trade, then we wouldn't be hurt any worse than we are already," Cunningham said, "but if these are new and additional imports, then for every pound an American stockman suffers."

The USDA has said its proposal to let Taiwan export meat to the U. S. is based on findings that Taiwan meat processing standards are equal to the U. S. meat inspection program.

"Assuming this is correct, it represents some protection American consumers don't now have with the millions of pounds of imported meat coming her," Cunningham said, referring to ICA's efforts to pass federal legislation requiring better inspection of foreign packing plants which ship meat to the United States.

Cunningham said also that ICA would like to see the Agriculture Department "show us that this is truly a proposal of the USDA instead of another example of the State Department using agriculture as a pawn in foreign policy."

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

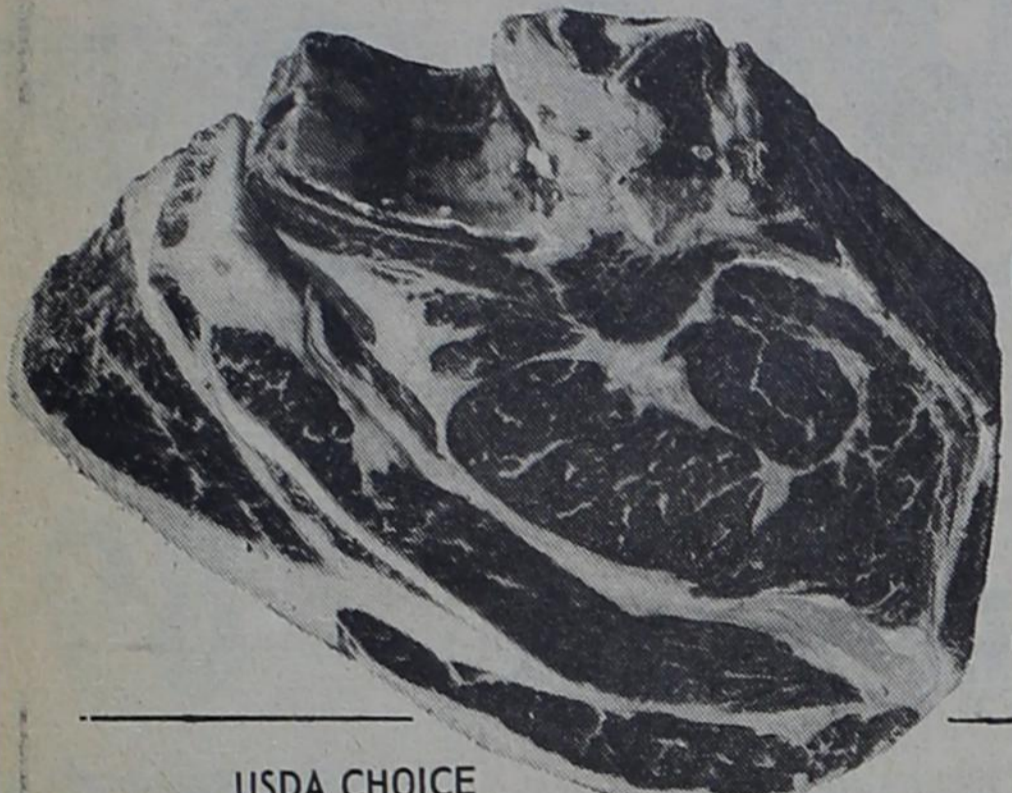


