during World War II. Street lights were turned off; curtains and window shades were drawn. Congressman Priest said that dark night was the first time he had seen stars over the city. Then he said, "The darker the night the clearer you can see the stars."

His friends let him down, and he was convinced that God turned against him, too. God has cast me into the mire, and I have become like dust and ashes." (Job 30: 17, 19). The darkness of pain, disappointment, and loss crushed Job down to complete despair.

But a bright star appeared in his dark night. God spoke to him, and he began to realize that all the bitter things which had happened to him were not as terrible as he had supposed. He said, "Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. I had heard of thee by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees thee" (Job 42: 3, 5).

When Job's night was darkest, he saw the brightest star. He realized that God had control of his life in spite of what had happened to him. That strong faith carried him through some of the most trying times that anyone has ever endured.

It was a dark time for our world the night the congressman looked out his window. However, it wasn't long until bright stars of hope and peace began to dot the sky.
