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CITY TO ELECT MAYOR SATURDAY

The citizens of Wheeler will go to the polls Saturday, August 14 to elect a mayor. Two names, Alana Daughtry and Pete Burton, appear on the ballot. The election is being held to fill the position vacated by Harrison Hall.

The elected official will serve until the next regular election in April, 1977.

The election was called at a special meeting of the city council following the resignation of Mayor Harrison Hall June 22. The citizens were given time to file for the office with the deadline being July 13. Alana S. Daughtry and O. B. "Pete" Burton chose to place their names on the ballot.

Alana S. Daughtry is the wife of Ken Daughtry and the mother of two boys. The couple has lived in Wheeler for the past 7 years. Alana is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Hammon. Ken, the son of a former mayor, Thomas Daughtry—is employed by Natural Gas Pipeline.

O. B. "Pete" Burton has served 5 years as Mayor and 5 years as a member of the council. He owns and manages Pete Burton Ford.

The election will be held at the school cafeteria. The polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Election judge will be Laura Guthrie.

Citizens of Wheeler are urged to vote Saturday, August 14.

Lorance Will Oppose Yarbrough As Write-in

Houston attorney Tom Lorance, 53, said today he will be a write-in candidate for the Texas Supreme Court against beleaguered Democratic nominee Don Yarbrough.

There is no Republican in the race.

Houston attorney Yarbrough's candidacy has been assailed recently as a result of 16 civil lawsuits against him.

At a civil trial in June, he was found to have engaged in civil fraud and legal malpractice in a 1975 bank deal.

A State Bar grievance committee is presently considering about 30 charges against Yarbrough that could result in disciplinary action, including possible disbarment.

Lorance, senior partner in the law firm of Lorance Thompson & Wittig, 609 Fannin said other attorneys and friends convinced him to run "because someone has to do something about Yarbrough."

"I'm no politico. I'm a trial lawyer and have been most of my life," he said. "I do know that write-in candidacies are usually unsuccessful."

"If you want the truth and no fancy stories, I'll tell you I'm in this race to keep Don Yarbrough from getting on the bench."

Lorance, who said he specializes in insurance said he has no judicial experience.

"But I know the problems of trial courts and appellate courts because I've been in them so much," he said.

Lorance graduated from the University of Texas Law School in 1949 and served as a Dallas County assistant district attorney in 1949-50.

He said he voted in the 1976 Republican primary elections and

is not sure if that would affect his legal standing as an independent write-in candidate.

Lorance and his wife June live at 513 S. Post Oak Lane and have three grown children.

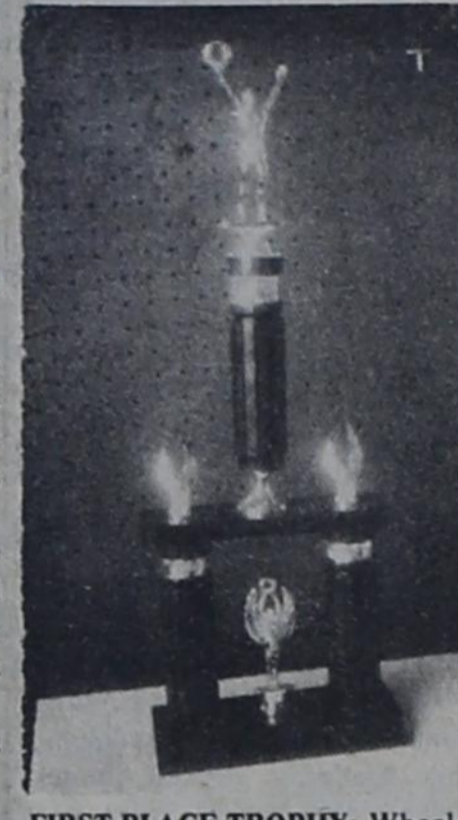

Again this year a division has been set up for the best all-wool or riding outfit. The dress revue committee explained that because "this mode of dress has become a part of our way of life and heritage, it should be a part of the contest."

The junior level contest, to be staged at the same time as senior competition, is for younger 4-H'ers, ages 9 to 14. They will not compete beyond the district level. For them, the event offers experience and leadership development.

Senior winners will take their designs to the State 4-H Dress Revue in San Antonio Sept. 17-18. Parents, 4-H leaders, and special guest will be on hand for the occasion. The public is invited to the revue at 2 p.m. A 3 p.m. tea sponsored by the Texas Home Demonstration Association will climax the event.

Pampa Trial Is Moved To Wheeler

A change of venue request to move the Packerland Packing Co. Inc. suit in which the state of Texas is seeking more than \$240,000 in penalties for violation of the Texas Clean Air Act was granted this morning.

The trial will be held in the 31st District Court of Wheeler County, 42 miles from Pampa.

Ross Buzzard, Pampa attorney who asked that the trial be moved from Gray County, said, "I simply make this point - 800 names on a petition - the lan guage of which is extreme - all stating they think something should be done about this condition - could very well take this desire to a jury...."

Buzzard was referring to a petition in which Charles W. Smith of Pampa testified that 800 persons had signed.

It read in part that the Packerland condition had "turned Pampa from a good town in which to live to a nightmare."

"Personally, I'm prejudiced," Smith said. "I have an extreme interest. It is affecting my home and my property." The case was scheduled to begin trial in the 31st District Court here at 9 a.m. on July 26, but Judge Grainger McIlhany, who granted the request for a change of venue, set the pretrial in Wheeler for Sept. 27 with jury to be impaneled on Sept. 27 with the jury to be impaneled on Sept. 28.

Paul Gosseink of Austin, who represented the state, said he in no way wanted to conduct a trial where a defendant could not get a fair and impartial jury.

"But the state is of the opinion that Packerland can get a fair trial. We have heard of no personal animosity against Packerland," Gosseink said, "Some of our witness will not be able to go elsewhere. Therefore it will weaken our case."

"The court is more persuaded by a petition with 800 names. That is a suggestion of a significant number who may have feelings," Judge McIlhany commented in saying that it would be in the best interests of the people to move the trial to Wheeler where residents are not personally involved.

The first witness called by the state was the Rev. Norman Dow Jr., minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Pampa, who said he had read about the suit in the paper, but felt a fair and impartial jury could be obtained here.

Mack Wofford city manager, said on one weekend he received about 25 phone calls at home from persons who were disturbed about the odor at Packerland.

"I felt that the number of phone calls was unusual. It appeared to me that individuals had a prepared statement in regard to the odor problems," Wofford said. "It appears to me there is some animosity in regard to the odor."

Wofford said some callers requested that the City of Pampa do something about it.

"But it appears that we are not the proper agency," Wofford said.

Two Packerland officials, Howard M. Frankenthal, general manager, told the court that they believed they could not receive a fair trial in Gray County.

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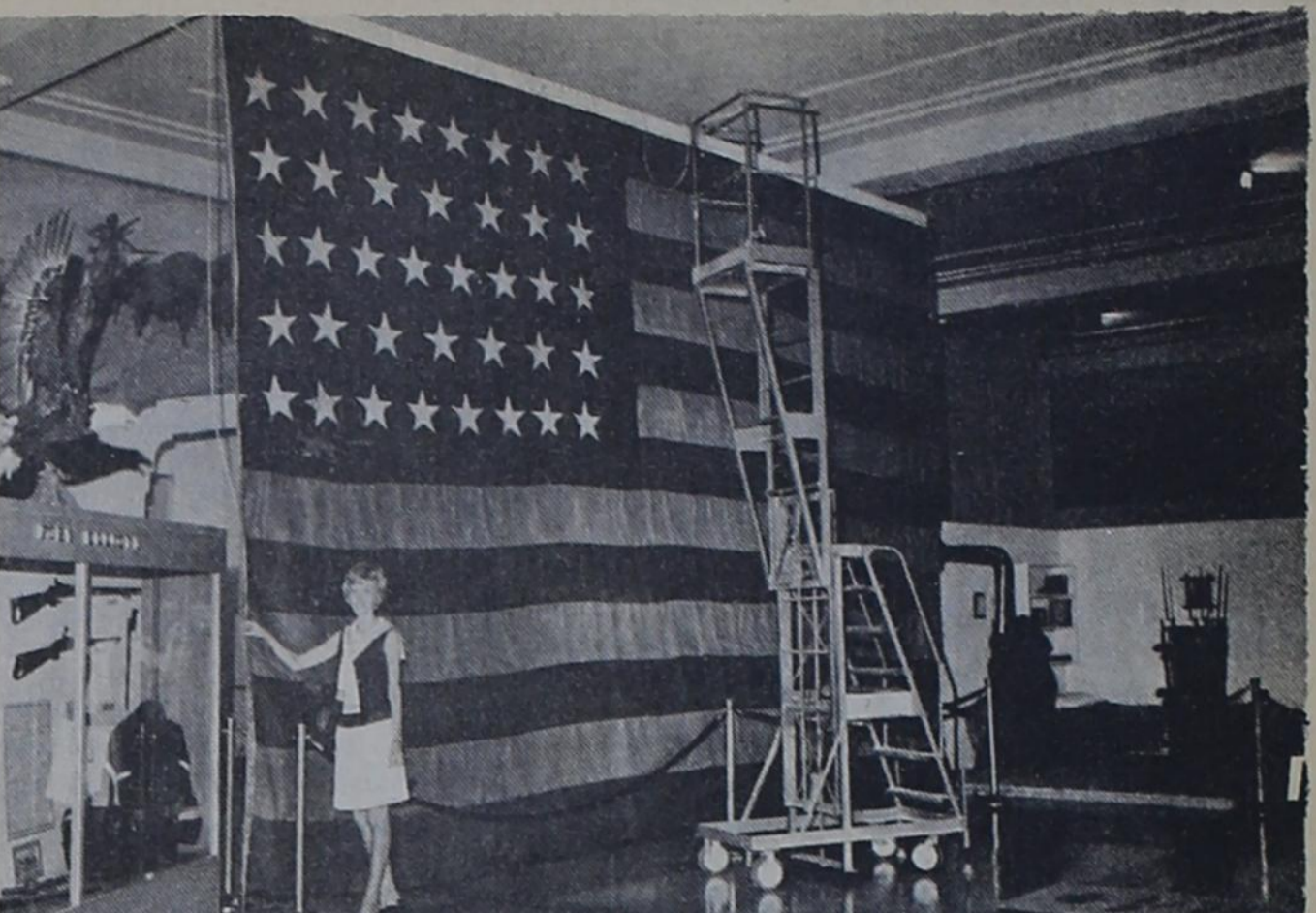

Fort Elliott Exhibit At Canyon Museum

An exhibit on Fort Elliott, the Texas Panhandle's first permanent fort in existence from 1875 to 1890, is on display in the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's main building. Focal point of the exhibit is the fort's 28 by 14 foot United States garrison flag suspended from the front room ceiling. For Elliot was established near Mobeetie to complete the ring of forts around the Indian reservations in Oklahoma. The soldiers' duties were to patrol the border between Texas and the Indian territory to prevent the Indians from slipping out to raid or hunt. The museum's information records that "post life was seldom exciting unless Indians had escaped from their reservation". "Recreation consisted of reading and attending lectures on such subjects as 'first aid help in hemorrhages, drowning, poisoning by snake bites, fractures and dislocation.'" the descriptions continue. The soldiers also pursued rustlers and horse thieves, and were involved in road building and telegraph installation. Other parts of the exhibit include guns, swords, uniforms and a typical bedroom used by the soldiers. The exhibit will be up until September.

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ZACK T. MILLER WAS AN AREA PIONEER

Zack T. Miller, Sr. and his wife JoAnna moved from Voca, Texas in the spring of 1878 to the headwaters of the Washita River, near Canadian, Texas to make their home, and run cattle with Mr. and Mrs. Henry Frye. Mrs. Frye being Mr. Miller's sister.

They were newly weds. Mrs. Miller, 19 years old helped her husband drive the 1000 head of cattle. When they got to Double Mountain their two hired hands quit, so Mr. Miller and his eleven year old sister rode their horses driving the cattle. Mrs. Miller and her husband's mother drove the two wagons. The older Mrs. Miller driving the horse drawn wagon, Mrs. Miller driving to one pulled with oxen. The oxen had no harness only yokes with ropes around their ears and horns, and they were hard to drive. Mrs. Miller was small and it took all her strength to handle the oxen.

They found the grass waist high and very flush. The cattle wintered on the grass only and were fat in the spring.

They lived in the house with Fries two years while they were getting their own 2 room house with a dirt floor. The house being built from pickets with picket top covered with dirt. The only furniture they brought with them was a cook stove. Lumber had to be hauled from Dodge City, Kansas or Wichita Falls, Texas. They got their water from the Washita Creek, it being two years before they got a well.

Their eldest child, Arch, was born at this place. Arthur was born at Voca, Texas. Henry (Hank) was the first white child born in Wheeler County of Texas, it being a large county at that time. Their son, Earl was born while they lived in old Greer County, Oklahoma, near Sayre. Here they hauled their water from the Jay Buckle Springs. Zack Jr. and Bertha were born at Canadian, Texas and Elmer on the home ranch in Wheeler County near the Texas, Oklahoma line.

In May 1896 Zack T. Miller Sr. and family moved to Cheyenne, Oklahoma where Mr. Miller ran an livery stable. He served as sheriff of Roger Mills County, Cheyenne, Oklahoma from January 1, 1897 to January 1, 1899.

In 1900 or 1901 they moved from Cheyenne to the home ranch 13 miles east of Wheeler, Texas where Mr. Miller resided until his death November 10, 1910.
