TWO FILE FOR MAYOR; ELECTION CALLED AUG. 14

A special election will be held in Wheeler Saturday, August 14, for the purpose of electing a mayor to serve until the next regular city election in April, 1977. The filing deadline for filing for the position was Tuesday, July 13 at 5:00 p.m.

Two names were filed with the City Secretary. Filing were Alana S. Daughtry and O. B. "Pete" Burton.

Alana S. Daughtry is the wife of Ken Daughtry and the mother of two boys. The

couple has lived in Wheeler for the past 7 years. Alana is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Hammon.

Ken, the son of a farmer mayor -- Thomas Daughtry, is employed by Natural Gas Pipeline.

O. B. "Pete" Burton has served 5 years as Mayor and 5 years as a member of the council.

The election is being held to fill the unexpired term of Harrison Hall who resigned his office Tuesday, June 22.

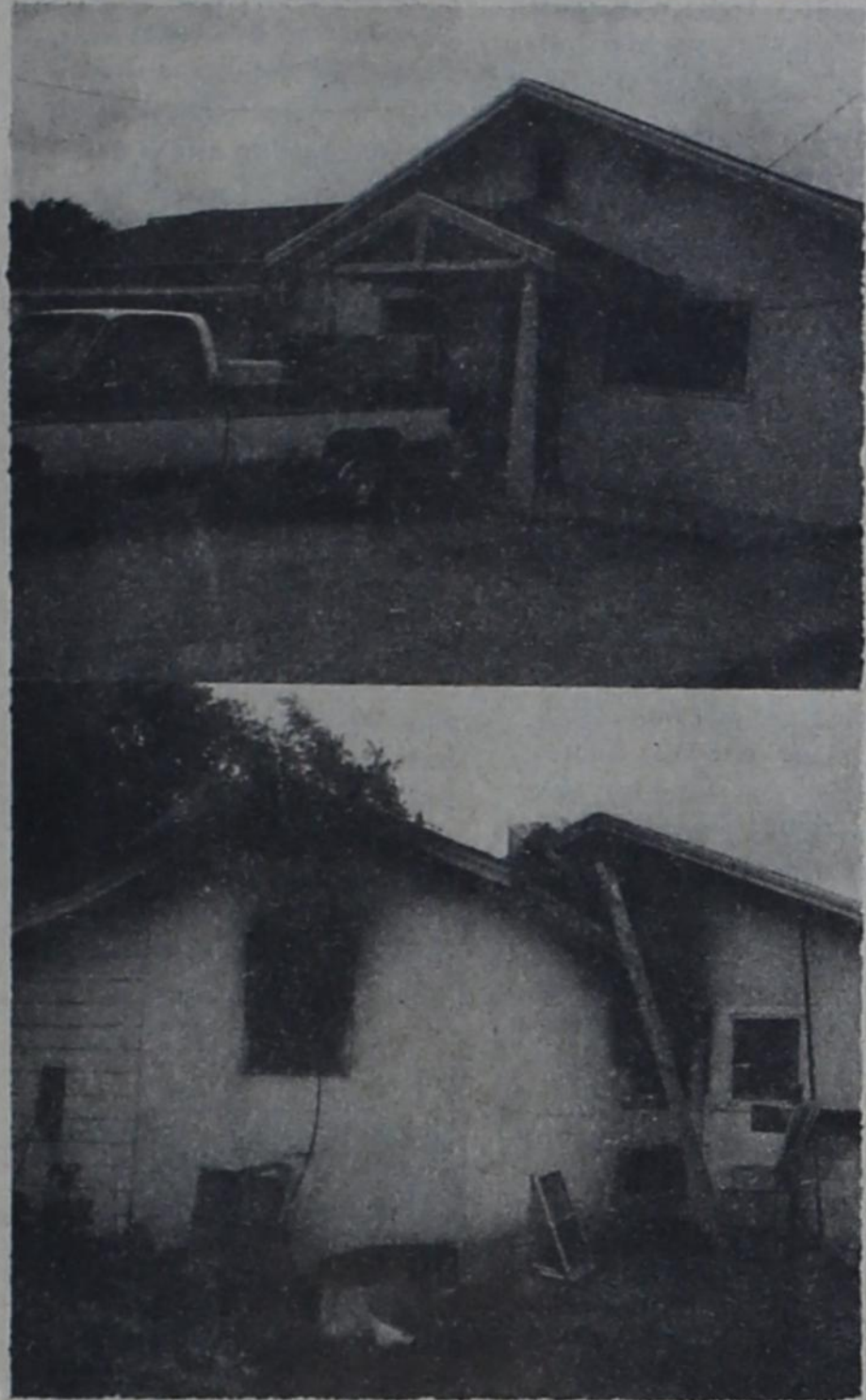
