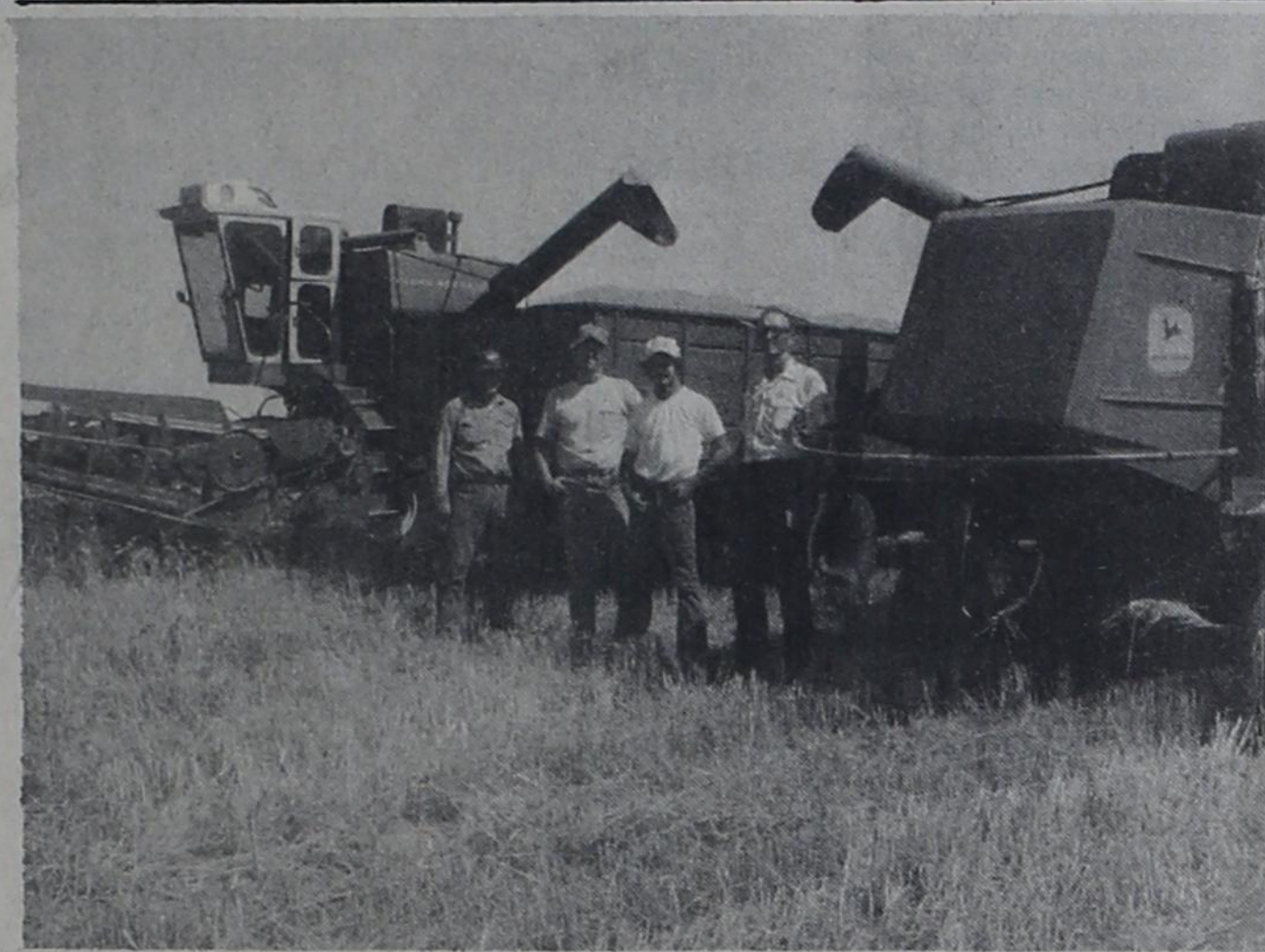
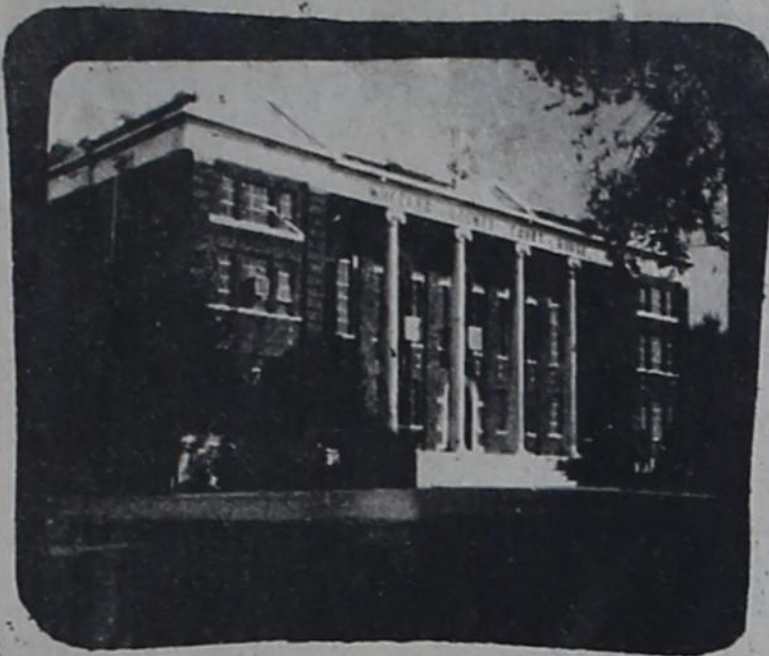

WATER IS COUNCIL TOPIC

The June 21 meeting of the Wheeler City Council opened with a prayer. Minutes were read for the May regular meeting and special meeting June 7. They were approved. Jerry Hefley reported on the activities of the Water and Sewer Department. Keith Miller reported on the Police Department. Wesley Masters and Arden Kenady met with the council to discuss the purchase of water for the City of Wheeler. It was proposed by Masters

to furnish water to the city of Wheeler for a period of 10 years at a cost of 17 cents per thousand gallons; the city of Wheeler to purchase a minimum of 200,000 gallons average per day. Richard Oldham, representative of Fire Appliance Co. of Texas, met with the council to discuss the city's needs in the way of a fire truck and discussed the specifications with the city. The matter was tabled with the council planning to meet with the fire department.

Wallace proposed the Council payoff the 1958 Bond Account. The bond in the amount of \$110,000 was used for the updating of the sewer system and the building of an underground storage tank. The amount remaining on the bond is \$48,000; by paying off the bond at the present time, the city would save approximately \$4,000 in interest. The council voted to follow the suggestion.

In further discussion of the water situation by the Council, it was agreed to offer 15 cents per thousand for the water; Kenady and Masters agreed with the understanding that the cost be reviewed in three years and adjustment to be made in accordance with the cost of fuel. The adjustment in three years is not to exceed 2 cents per thousand over

the period of 10 years. The council voted to have a contract drawn for the purchase of water from Masters and Kenady. The council voted not to honor checks held more than 60 days. The bank is to be notified of this policy. It was resolved to raise the water deposit from \$20 to \$25. The council voted to require that a "saddle" be used in sewer taps. The City will install the saddle with the customer being charged the cost of the saddle.

HARVEST UNDERWAY: James Verden harvested one of the best, if not the best, crops in the area Monday, June 21. Verden has 60 acres of irrigated wheat located 1/4 mile west of the city limits. The Centurk Wheat produced 57.89 bushels per acre; it was planted in November and watered four times. Verden spent \$33 per acre on fertilizer; he used more fertilizer this year. The yield this year compares to last year's 37 bushels per acre on the same field and same type of wheat. Two machines belonging to John C. Vise and Cecil Pierce were used. Some harvesting was underway last week in the area, but it moved into full swing Monday; yields are reported to be exceptional on both dry and irrigated land. Pictured are John C. H. J. Ridgeway Receives Award

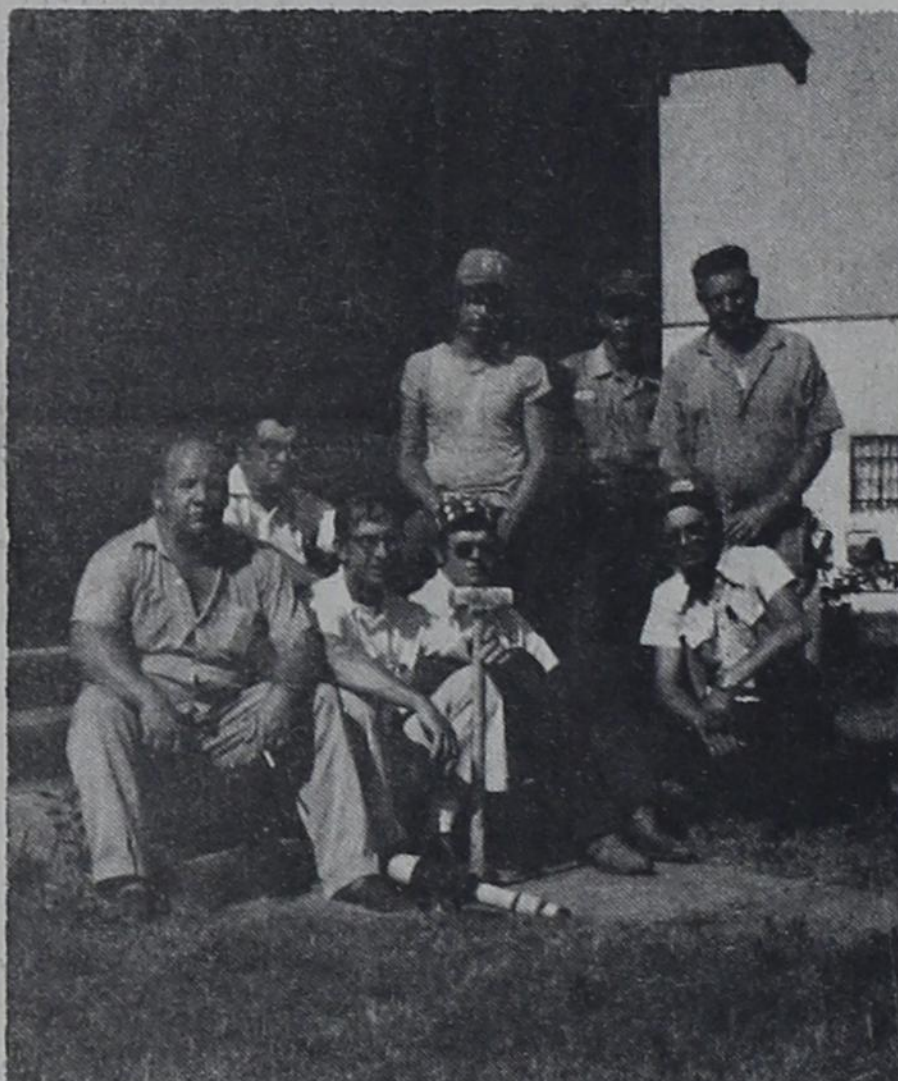

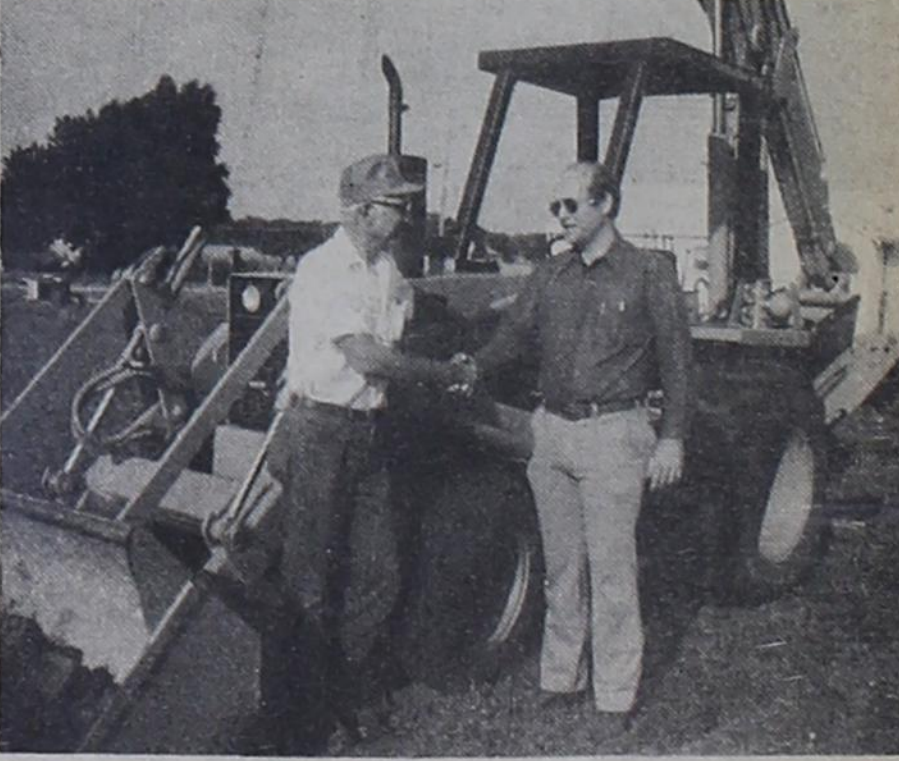

Meredith Walleye Underfished

Fritch--Recent surveys of the lake Meredith walleye population indicate a slower growth rate due to an overpopulation of of large walleye.

These growth figures collected over the last five years by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists support the numerous indications that they were on their way from Crown Point, New Mexico to Oklahoma location where Ralph will retire from the teaching profession. Our sincere best wishes go with them may they enjoy their retirement.

there are plenty of catchable walleye in the Panhandle lake and the stocking of more walleye fry would only increase the problem.

"There are a few ardent walleye tournament has also helped start some anglers on the successful road to walleye fishing," said Joe Kraai, fishery biologist for the Panhandle.

"We need more fishermen to harvest the excess fish now while they are available," Kraai Continued.

Lake Meredith has been a successful walleye fishery since 1968 and natural reproduction of walleye eggs in the lake each spring by the mature female fish is estimated in the millions.

Lake Meredith is like any other Texas lake, all of which can only hold or support so many fish per acre. When the fish become crowded or too thick, the growth rate slows even though there are fish in the 10-to-12 pound class at the present time at Meredith.

The larger walleye become harder to catch due to the requirement of big bait fish. Most fishermen cannot get the large fish to bite because they fail to use large lures or large baits.

Many seven-to-ten inch walleye were collected and released during the recent spring spawning season and these fish should furnish anglers with plenty of hungry walleye next spring for their stringer.

Successful walleye fishermen use all types of spoons, jigs, spinners, and live worms and minnows for bait and both bank and boat anglers have been reeling in some nice catches of fish this spring. The most consistent locations on lake Meredith are near rocky points and deep water. The sensitivity of walleye to light seems to drive them deeper as the daylight increases.

The daily creel limit of five walleye will furnish any gourmet angler with plenty of fish filets for the frying pan. Many anglers consider the walleye the best eating fish available in Texas.

More information about walleye fishing is available by contacting any of the bait shops near Meredith or call the P&WD warden in your area for an up-to-date report.

Consumers will see a variety of new jar lid closures this year and should use only known good quality closures and jars. The shortage of jar lids in 1974 and 1975 has encouraged the entry of several manufacturers into the production of jar lids--this year's supply will double from two billion lids in 1975 to four billion in 1976.

Southern states receive the first shipments due to their early canning season. And larger shipments will arrive as the bulk of canning is underway.

Manufacturer's directions should be followed closely to insure a good seal. If lids fail to seal or are defective in any manner, write directly to the manufacturer. His address should be on the package.

To be considered safe, jar lids must make and hold a seal. Test by checking for a concave appearance the day after canning or by pressing the center of the lid, and if it will not move, the jar is sealed.

Also if there is a clear ringing sound when the center of the lid is tapped with a spoon, the seal is good. Lids should be checked again before use.

Information and bulletins on home food preservation is available free of charge from the county Extension Office in the Courthouse. Pressure Canners can also be tested for accuracy at the extension office.

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write Box 505 or call the extension office at 826-5243. Many mothers may enjoy canning baby food--and the process is easy and inexpensive. Select fresh, tender vegetables. Cook them in a small amount of water, then press them through a fine sieve or food mill. Use a blender to puree the vegetables.

Add boiling water if necessary to make the puree about the same thickness as heavy cream. Reheat to boiling and pour into hot half-pint or pint jars, leaving one-half inch head space. Insert a table knife into the jar to remove any bubbles.

Adjust the caps and process according to the recommended time for pureed vegetables at 10 pounds pressure. Processing time for strained vegetable is longer than for chopped or canned whole, because the puree is thicker and slows the rate of heat penetration.

For older babies eating chopped vegetables, the process is even easier. Simply wash, drain and chop vegetables. Boil three minutes in enough water to cover. Pack, leaving about one-half inch head space. Process as instructed for low acid vegetables.

Baby fruits such as peaches and apricots should be cooked. For strained fruits, follow recipes for fruit puree.

Extension publication "Home Canning-Fruits, Vegetables", 194, contains a section on canning purees which is applicable to canning baby food. This publication can be obtained from the county Extension office.

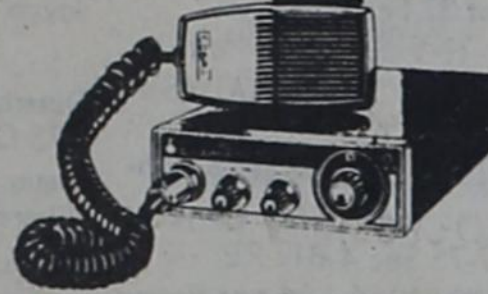

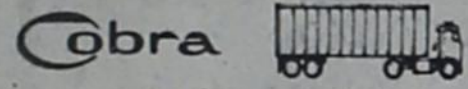


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Safety Standards For Agriculture

Beginning June 7, 1976, farm employers engaged in agriculture will be required to meet some of the safety provisions of the new Machine Guarding Standard for Agriculture issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). The purpose of the standard is to protect from owners and their employees from hazards associated with moving parts of farm machinery.

According to a recent OSHA report, guards or shields must be placed on power take-off drives for such field equipment as tractors, swathers, cotton pickers, hay balers, bale loaders, forage harvesters, hay cubers and vegetable harvesters. Self-unloading forage wagons, gravity-unload grain trailers, all types of manure spreaders and portable grinder-mixers are considered field equipment.

Farmstead equipment such as auger and flight elevators, mechanical bunk feeders, silo unloaders, bin unloading systems, grain dryers, grinders, mixers, sorting tables, coolers and all other types of material-handling equipment must be guarded.

Lack of adequate power take-off guarding is considered a recognized hazard for which farmers can be cited and penalized even in the absence of a specific standard, the report stated. Farm employers cannot permit any employee to operate machinery around the farmstead unless the power drive is guarded.

Also required are nip-point guards (sometimes called "pinch" or "mesh" point) on all driven gears, belts, chains, sheaves, pulley sprockets, idlers and rollers.

Employee operators must be instructed in the safe operation and servicing of tractors, field implements and farmstead equipment that they operate.

According to the report, all cotton ginning equipment must be guarded by June 3, 1977.

Safety Administration officials urge farm employers to comply with the machine guarding standard for a safer farming operation.

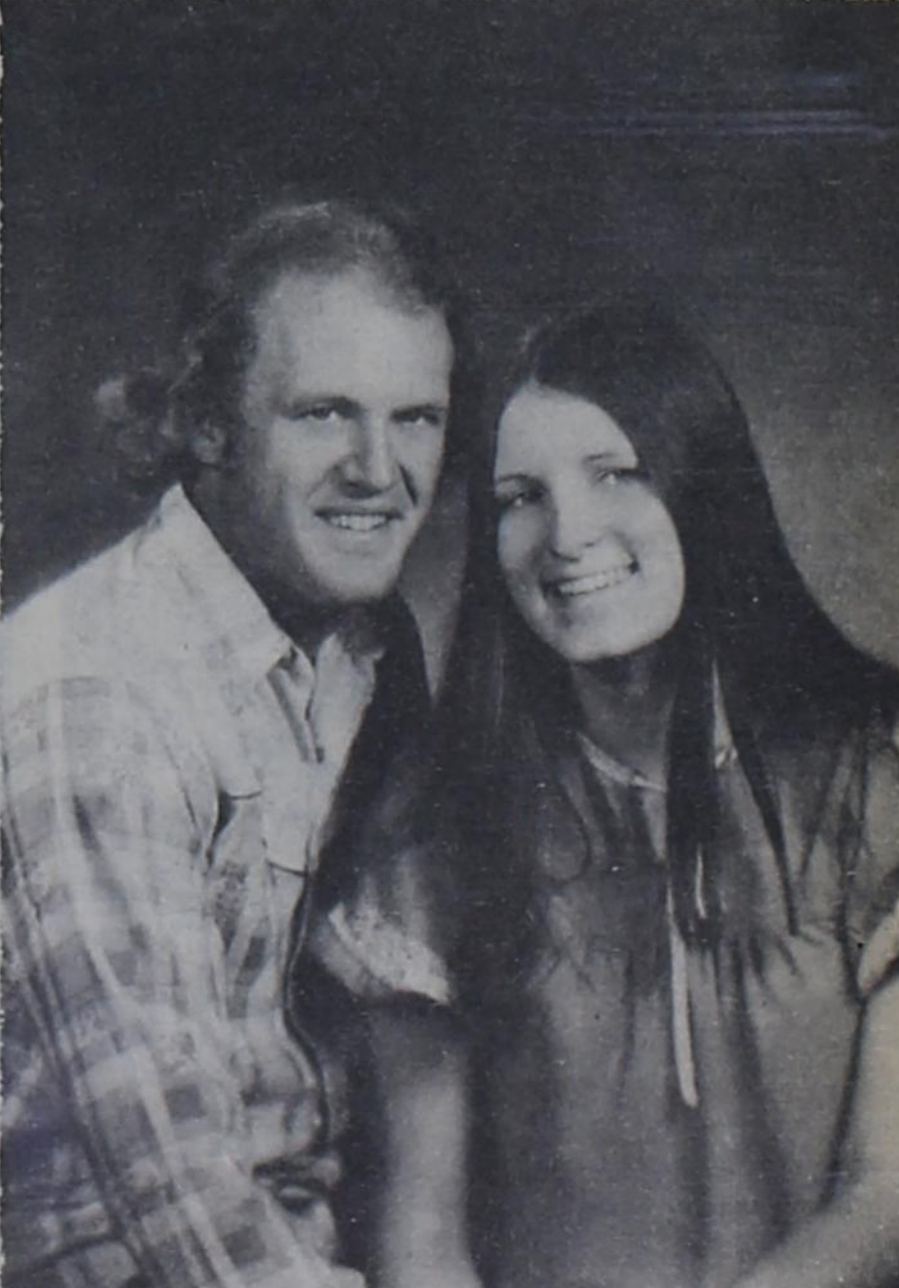

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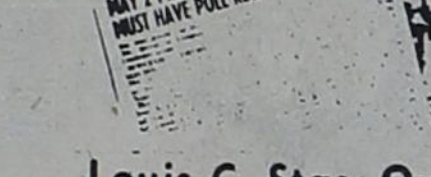
