The Second Democratic Primary will be held Saturday, June 5 to decide the winners in five races. On the state level the runoff is for Railroad Commissioner and Court of Criminal Appeals Judge; on the county level, voters will select the County Sheriff and Commissioners for Precincts 1 and 2.

Four men placed their name on the ballot for County Sheriff following the announcement that Sheriff Bus Dorman would retire at the end of his term. Two were eliminated in the May 1 election and Doyle Ramsey and George Hooten have carried on an active campaign for the office.

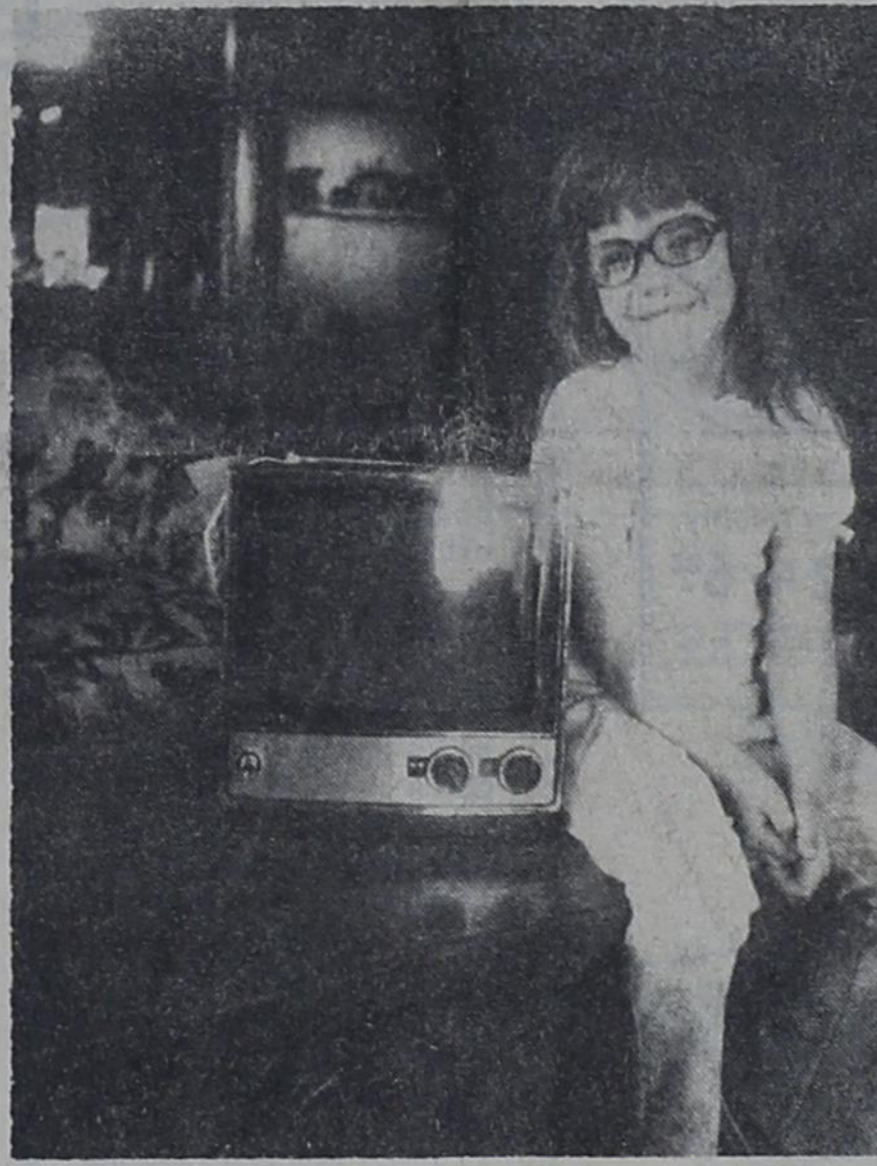
In the race for Commissioner, Precinct 1, Elmer Ray Harrison and T. O. Bradstreet have campaigned for the office presently held by Shorty Sechrist. Sechrist did not seek re-election.

Darrell Moore, Commissioner Precinct 2, has Bill Atherton as an opponent in the race for that office.

In Wheeler, those living west of Main Street will vote in the gymnasium. Those living east of the highway will vote at the Commissioners Courtroom in the Courthouse.

At the close of voting, returns from the county, state and precinct races will be posted as received on a large tabulation board at the courthouse.

A 34-year-old Pampa Man, Michael Frank Moore, was brought to Wheeler County jail after the stolen CB was found in his possession.

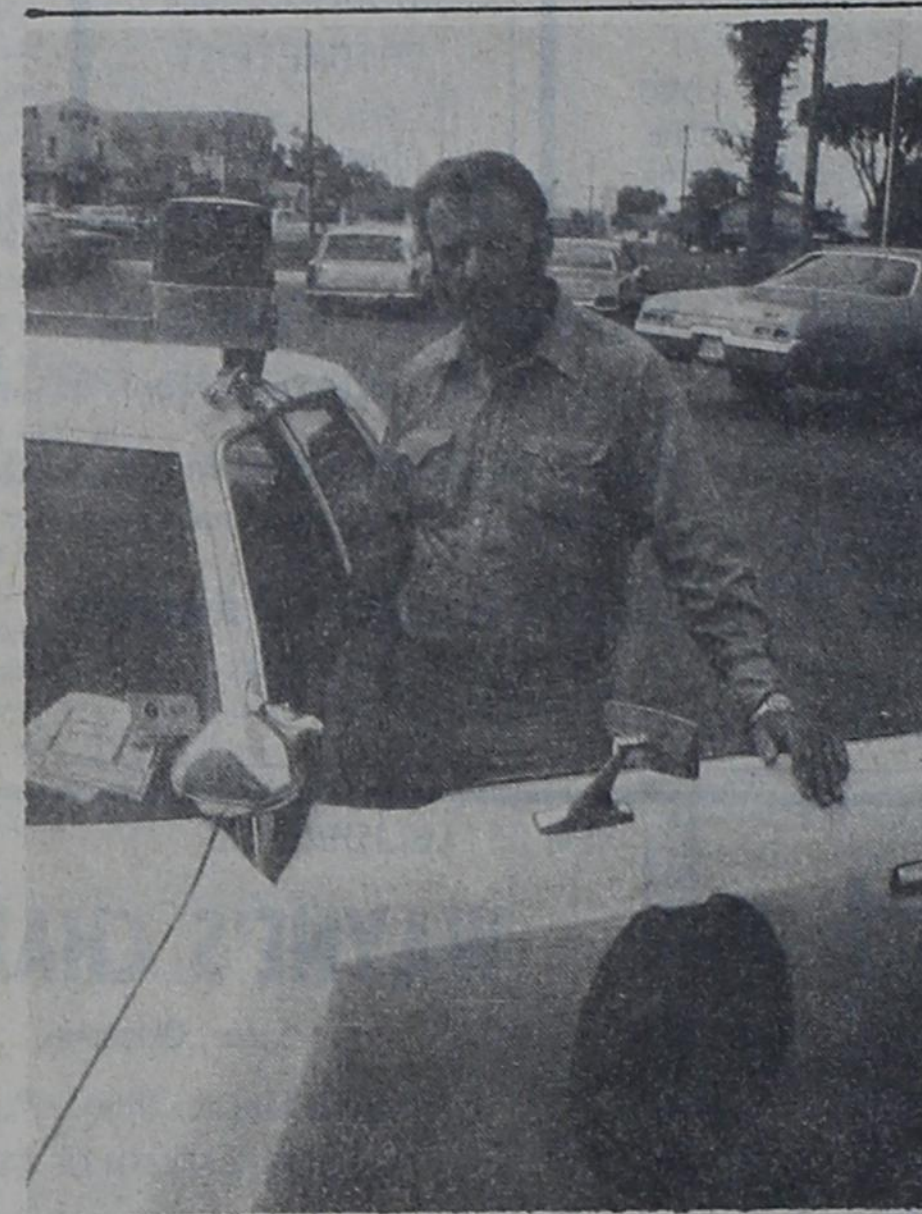
### Blood Pressure Clinic June 4

### Meeting Called On Child Care Licensing June 8

The Child Care Licensing Act of 1975, effective January 1, 1976, provides for the registration of family homes. A family home is defined as a child care facility where care is regularly given in the provider's own residence for not more than 6 children, under 14 years of age, for less than 24 hours a day. A family home must register with the State Department of Public Welfare. The number of children in care does not include the provider's own children. After school care may be given for not more than six additional elementary school age siblings of the children in care. However, the total number of children given care, including the provider's own children, may never exceed 12.

When a person registers a family home with the Department the registrant certifies that he or she meets and will continue to meet the "Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes." The Department requires that the child care provider give the parents of each child in care a copy of the "Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes."

The child care provider is required to have each parent read and sign a statement, provided by the Department, certifying that they have examined the registered family home and are satisfied that it meets "Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes." The responsibility for complying with the standards rests primarily with the parents of the children and the provider. However, the authority to make visits to child care facilities at any time during regular operation is a part of the Child Care Licensing Act of 1975 (Section 7).

Registration of family homes offers benefits to the community to the provider of care, and to the parents and children in care. The Department keeps lists of all child care facilities in each community. These lists are available to parents seeking child care. The Department will also provide consultation services to providers on nutrition, health, equipment, discipline and other aspects of child care. All registered family homes are on the Department mailing list for the day care newsletter which contains current information on what is happening State-wide in day care.

Interested persons may visit, telephone, or write to the local Department licensing office and request a copy of the Child Care Licensing Act of 1975 and a copy of the "Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes." Following certification to these requirements, the day care provider will be given a "Certificate of Registration." This certification is formal acknowledgement that the home is registered with the Department to provide child care and that the caretaker has stated that the home meets State standards. **Registration For Welding Class**

Registration for welding technology will be in progress all day, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at the Registrar's Office at Frank Phillips College in Borger and at the Welding Center, 618 N. Florida, Monday, June 7, and between 6 and 7 p.m. at the Welding Center. Both full-time and part-time classes are also set to begin the same day.

The program in welding technology is organized into four 12-week quarters a year with students being allowed to complete all or part of the prescribed curriculum which can lead to an Associate of Applied Science degree. All courses are designed to lead to a student becoming a proficient and experienced welder. Cost for the course is nominal due to the demand for certified welders in the Borger area.

The first 12 week or quarter of study includes W 101, Basic Acetylene Welding; GR 101, Shop Math; and WR 101, Welding Methods, Electrodes, and Rods and Wire. Students are taught in a self-paced manner depending on the amount of knowledge and experience they have already accrued. Frank Reed and Jack Mosley, both certified welders, are the instructors. Electric arc welding is given special emphasis.

All qualified welders engaged in production work can find employment in structural steel work, pipe fabrication and welding, boilers, and storage tank areas. It is anticipated that many more positions will be found in the construction industries as future demands expand the need for welded structures and materials in accordance with the vast amount of development being done in the Borger area. Brochures are available at the FPC Registrar's Office for persons interested in enrolling.

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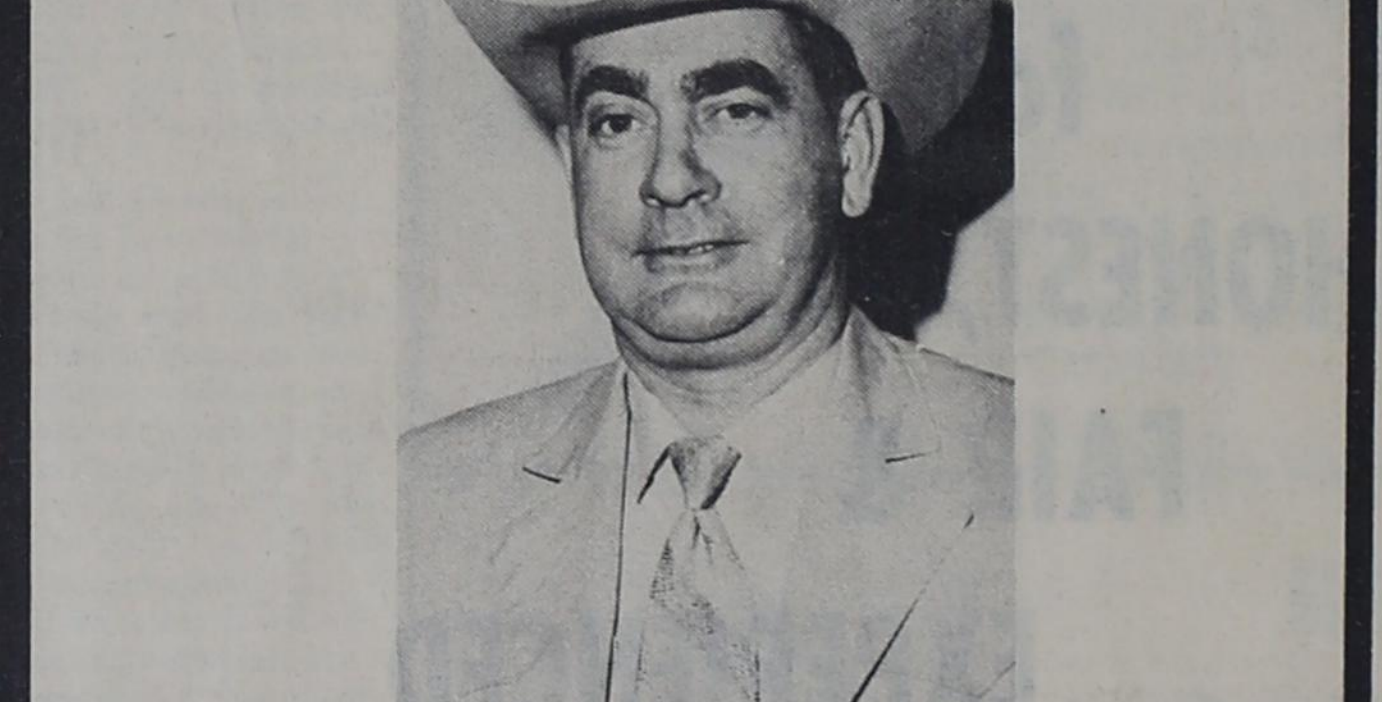

# LINES FROM LINDA

Linda Horton - Asst. CEA

Eating a variety of foods is important to all family members but especially senior citizens. Diets that provide needed nutrients can sustain good health and may prevent, or slow, the onset of certain diseases associated with aging. Seniors may get needed nutrients by eating foods from the four food groups—which are milk, meat, fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals. They need two servings from the milk group, including fluid milk as a beverage, cream soups, custards, cottage cheese and yogurt.

The meat group includes all kinds of meat, fish, poultry, eggs, dry beans and peas. Older adults should try to eat at least two servings of meat or meat alternates each day.

The fruits and vegetables group add color, flavor and texture as well as nutrients and bulk.

Everyone needs four servings each day, including one citrus fruit and one dark green leafy or deep yellow vegetable.

And finally, seniors should try to eat four servings of enriched breads and cereals.

Remember, also to include water with the fluids you drink every day, either at mealtime or other times.

Following are some recipes designed especially for small families—one or two.

**Top-of-Stove Meatloaf**  
1/3 pound ground beef (about 1 cup lightly packed)  
2 tablespoon uncooked rolled oats  
1 tablespoon finely chopped onion  
3 tablespoons milk  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
pepper as desired  
1/4 cup water  
1/2 cup tomato sauce

Put all ingredients except water and tomato sauce in a bowl. Mix well. Shape into two loaves. Brown loaves on all sides in a greased fry pan over medium heat. Pour off fat. Add water, pour tomato sauce over loaves. Cover and cook over low heat 30 minutes. Add more water during cooking, if needed.

Makes two servings.  
Menu Idea: Serve with macaroni salad, green beans and canned fruit or fresh fruit in season.

**One-Pan Macaroni and Cheese**

1 cup hot, cooked macaroni  
1/4 cup water  
1/2 cup instant or 1/3 cup non-instant nonfat dry milk  
1/2 cup cut-up process cheese  
Leave drained macaroni in cooking pan. Mix water and dry milk. Add to macaroni. Add Cheese. Cook over low heat and stir gently until Cheese melts. Let stand a few minutes after cooking for a thicker sauce, if desired. For thinner sauce, add a little water. Makes two servings, one-half cup each.

Menu Idea: Serve with green peas, carrot-raisin salad and peanut butter cookies.

**Squash and Tomatoes**  
2 small zucchini or yellow summer squash, sliced  
1/2 small onion, Chopped  
1 cup canned or cooked to-

matoes  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
pepper as desired  
1 slice bread

Mix all ingredients except bread in a pan. Cover and boil gently about 25 minutes until squash is tender. Add a little water during cooking, if needed. Tear bread in pieces and add to squash and tomatoes. Makes two servings, about 2/3 cup each.

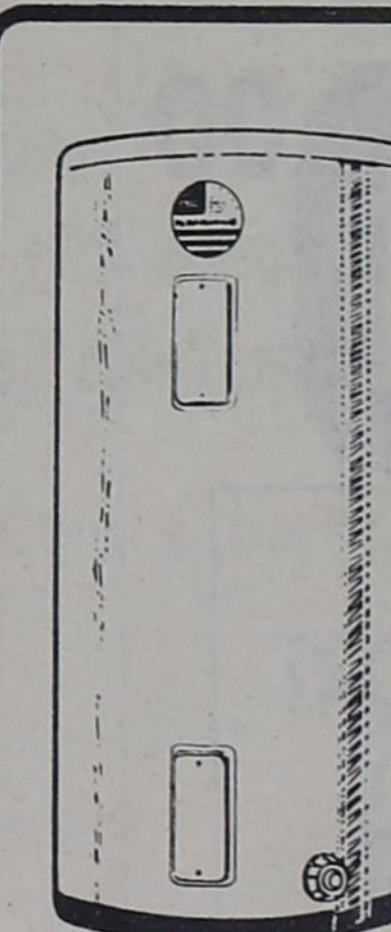
