THE DIRIGIBLE'S FUTURE

It is a far cry from the mighty Graf Zeppelin, the great air liner that recently sped across the Atlantic, to the first dirigible balloons, made and flown over a quarter of a century ago.

For it is rapidly becoming evident that lighter than air flying machines are barely beginning to come into their own.

Approximately a decade and a half ago an American aeronaut, with a party of half a dozen assistants, tried to fly the Atlantic in a dirigible.

There was nobody, then, to dispute with him. Possibly the Zeppelin engineers and designers might have, but they were too busy.

Regular trans-Atlantic dirigible passenger service is practically assured for the near future.

It is reasonable to suppose that future developments will make even such ships as the Graf Zeppelin look small and inadequate.

Just as soon as the 100 acre tract is graded the markers will be placed. This preliminary work will enable planes to land without further delay. After they know where to land the field can be used every day, while the work of installing the fuelling stations and hangars is completed.

A crew of men will start work on the fuelling stations and hangars the latter part of the week, after the grading is completed.

Big Spring will be on the National airline east and west and the airport will serve planes going in every direction. All Big Spring owes a vote of thanks to Messrs. King and Taylor, for providing Big Spring with an airport, and such a first class one as this one is going to be. Every live wire city has an airport today, it being just as big an asset to the city as an office building, first class telephone service or any other commercial enterprise today.

Duck Season Opens Here On October 16th

May. Shoot Quail After Nov. 31; Deer, Bear on Nov 16

The season for shooting duck, goose and snipe in Texas opens today, October 16th and continues through January 1.

The dove hunting season, which opened September 1, has nearly three more weeks to run the deadline being November 1.

The Texas season on rail and gallinules is the same as for doves. Quails may be killed in this state between December 1 and January 16 inclusive squirrels from October 1 to December 31, inclusive.

The law allows just 36 days a year in which to kill a deer, a bear or wild turkey, the dates being November 16 to December 31, inclusive.

Prairie chickens are even more rigorously protected, it being illegal to kill them at any time except from September 1 to September 10, inclusive.

New Cotton Disease Has Been Discovered

COLLEGE STATION, Tex., Oct. 15.—A new disease of cotton has been discovered by Dr. J. J. Taubenhause, chief of the division of plant pathology, Experiment Station, A. & M. College of Texas, in connection with his studies of the cotton root rot disease. This new malady has been found in three different sections of Texas, including the blackland section, and its effects upon cotton are, in many respects, similar to those due to the cotton wilt, common in Eastern states.

Just how serious this new disease may now be, or may become, is not known at present, but it is not believed to be of so much importance as cotton root, nor is it believed that farmers need feel serious apprehension at this time. In the study of cotton root rot from every angle that offers hope for a practical solution of the problem, research workers of the Experiment Station are also noting carefully the presence and the activity of any other disease of cotton which may be affecting the crop under Texas conditions.

Favorite Recipes Of A Screen Star

Hot Tea Biscuits

Tea biscuits, those delicious round pats of hot bread which the English call "scones" are the simplest things in the world to make. The average cook finds them the hardest to make perfectly. The reason is that nine cooks out of ten handle them too much. To a pint of sifted flour add a teaspoonful and a half of baking powder. Sift again. Add a pinch of salt and a teaspoonful of sugar. A piece of butter or shortening the size of an egg. Work this shortening into the flour with the hands until the flour has the consistency of sand. Take a large baking spoon and mix the dough with milk or water until it is like a sponge. Drop spoonfuls on a hot buttered pan and bake in a quick, hot oven. These can be made and served on the table in twenty-five minutes.

Old-Fashioned Chili Sauce

Six large ripe tomatoes, two onions, one red pepper, one teaspoonful cinnamon, salt, cloves, all-spice one cup vinegar. Cook slowly until mixture is thick enough to pour into a jar.
