# JURY DENIES DAMAGES

A 31st District Court jury here awarded no damages in the \$754,261.79 suit filed against the Texas Highway Department and Eugene Allen Trucking.

The suit stems from an accident on Feb. 26, 1972 when Clifton Fuselier was crushed to death between a road grader owned by the highway department and the truck he was driving.

His wife, Lydia, filed the suit.

News accounts of the accident in 1972 said a deer crossing U.S. 83 at the north end of Sweetwater Creek, four

miles north of Wheeler, inadvertently caused the death of a Lake Charles, La. truck driver.

It was 4:30 a.m., according to records, when Fuselier jackknifed his truck as he dodged the deer. The truck was loaded with helium.

It came to rest with the trailer over an embankment on the west side of the road and the tractor in the west lane of traffic.

Highway Department officials were contacted. Ross Henson of Wheeler was driving the road grader.

The grader was in front of the truck and the highway department was behind to warn oncoming traffic.

At 5:45 a truck driven by Roger Dale Hickey, 24, of Clifton, Tex., was traveling north and failed to see the warning lights. He came in collision with the trailer.

The truck loaded with 3-500 pound calves pulled a left wheel.

Fuselier was standing between the grader and helium truck when the cattle truck struck the grader.

He was dead on arrival at Parkview Hospital in Wheeler.

The trial began on April 26 with jury selection, and ended Tuesday night.

Jury deliberations continued through Wednesday when the foreman reported that jurors awarded no damages in the case.

The Texas Highway Department was represented by James Dorres, an Amarillo attorney, and Robert Smith, also of Amarillo, represented the trucking firm.

Mrs. Fuselier's attorney was Merlin Thompson of Orange.

Melinda Reeves joined the Mustang Band her freshman year in school. Melinda has played flute the last four years.

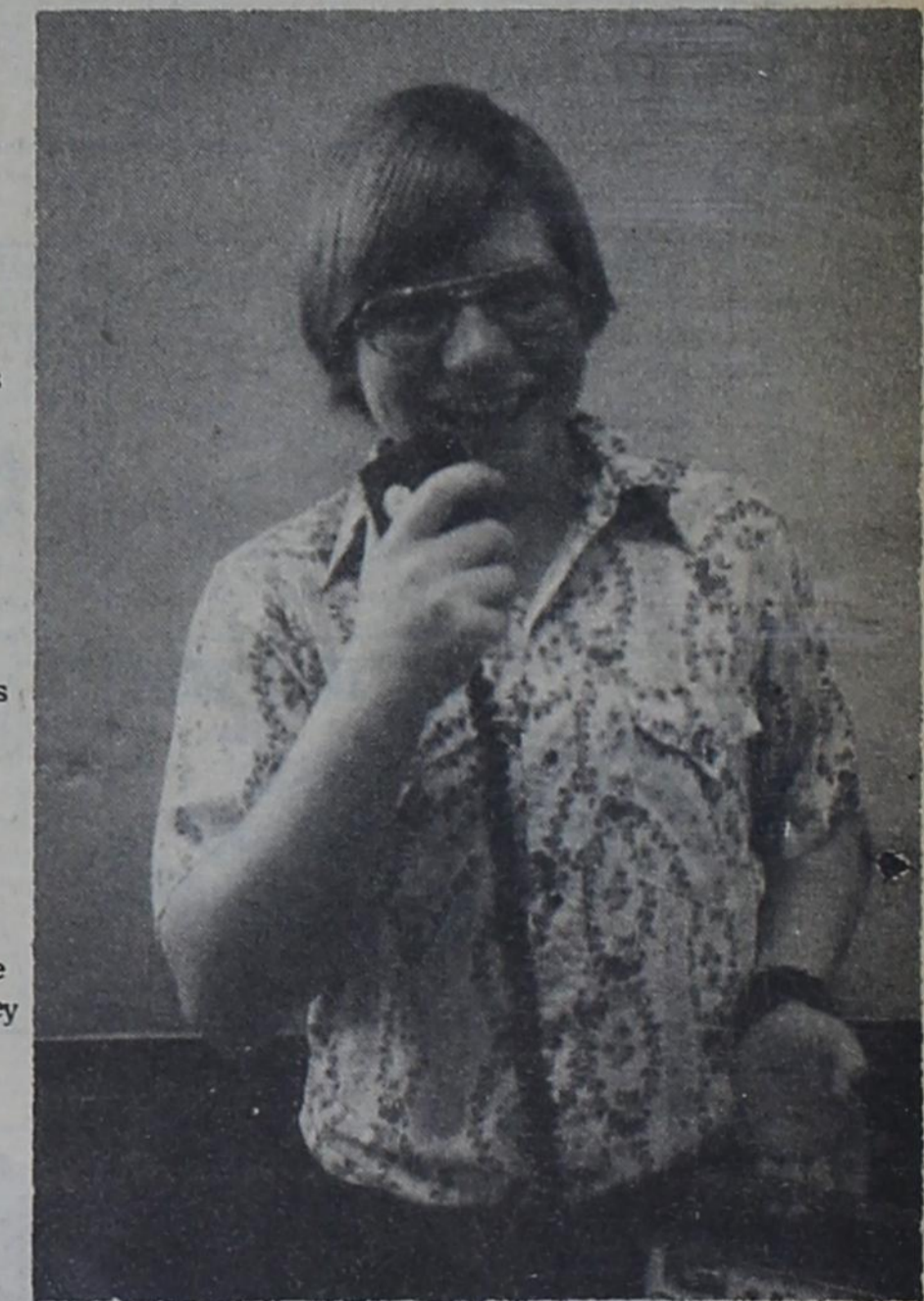
Lana Callahan is a band

20% of Americans eat a nutritionally poor diet, reported a survey by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. Surprisingly, this included affluent families, which reflects a lack of dietary knowledge rather than a lack of food money. One-half of the households had diets that failed to meet the requirements for one or more nutrients. Calcium (milk), Vitamin A, and ascorbic acid (citrus fruits) were the nutrients most often found lacking. If one compares the size of the soda water department with the declining milk counter in many supermarkets, the results of the survey are understandable.

has had considerable experience in remodeling, it's best to let the contractor handle the job of building the floor, walls and roof of the addition. Once this part of the job is complete, the do-it-yourselfer can take over as much of the light construction and interior finishing as his skills permit.

But even though an addition may be desirable in terms of getting the space the family needs, it can leave the family with added financial burdens. The same factors that have driven up

the cost of new housing are affecting remodeling and home improvements. Some things a family might consider if adding new rooms is the only alternative are the cost per square foot generally drops if two floors are added instead of one, and new plumbing will generally cost less if it is installed

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## U.S. Patent Office Took Lead In Agricultural Development

Many of America's founding fathers were farmers, most notably George Washington whose Mount Vernon estate covered thousands of acres. However much the new country owed to its farmers, there was no official government farm agency until 1862.

A federal department of agriculture was proposed, however, as far back as 1776, when two resolutions recommending aid to agriculture were adopted by the Second Continental Congress. In his last annual message to Congress some 20 years later, George Washington advocated the establishment of a board of agriculture to collect and disseminate information and " . . . by premiums and small pecuniary aids to encourage and assist a spirit of discovery and improvement."

Although the House produced a bill which would have implemented Washington's proposal, the measure never came to a vote. A similar proposal in 1817 met a similar fate.

In spite of these official rebuffs, the young nation's leaders remained acutely aware of the importance of improving agriculture. When he was abroad, Benjamin Franklin was an energetic collector of seeds and botanical specimens, and sometimes felt compelled to smuggle his biological bounty past the watchful eyes of customs officers. Merino sheep from Spain, which did much to improve the early American sheep industry, were sent to this country by an American diplomat in Madrid.

During John Adams' administration, this method of improving American agriculture was officially recognized. All United States consuls

were directed to forward rare plants and seeds to Washington. Under Adams, too, a botanical garden was set up and, in 1825, a committee on agriculture was established. The House had had such a committee for five years.

But even so, progress was slow. A significant development began in 1836, when Henry L. Ellsworth, the U.S. Commissioner of Patents, began to distribute seeds from abroad to enterprising farmers. Three years later, Ellsworth wheedled \$1000 out of Congress. The solons earmarked the appropriation for collecting agricultural statistics, conducting agricultural investigations and distributing seeds.

With the money, Ellsworth set up an Agricultural Division of the Patent Office. In the years that followed, money was appropriated irregularly for the work he had begun, but Ellsworth's personal interest and zeal kept the project going. In one year alone, over 30,000 packages of seed were given away. In 1842, Ellsworth oversaw the

publication of the agricultural statistics collected as part of a ten-year census, and also published a report of crop conditions.

From 1847 on, Congress made annual appropriations for this kind of work, which was still conducted out of the Patent Office. In 1854, Charles Mason, Ellsworth's successor, hired a chemist, a botanist and an entomologist to conduct experiments. The budget that year was \$35,000. Two years later, a five-acre garden was obtained and investigations of sorghum and tea were begun.

Finally, in 1862, a bill creating the United States Department of Agriculture was signed into law by President Abraham Lincoln. Isaac Newton, chief of the Patent Office's agricultural division, was the first commissioner of agriculture. With Newton began the organization which was to become a potent force in what was already becoming the most productive agricultural community the world had ever seen.

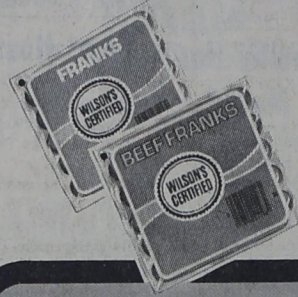
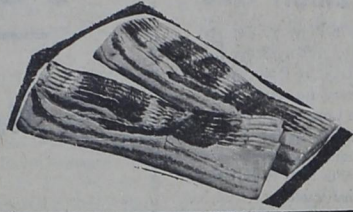
