April Council Meeting

The April meeting of the Wheeler City Council was held Monday, the 19th, in the City Office. Bob Roark, Bob Barnett, and Daryl Snelgroves met with the council.

The meeting opened with a prayer and the reading of the minutes for the March meeting and two special meetings.

Jerry Hefley reported on the water and sewer activities. He expressed the need for a lawn mower. It was agreed to purchase a high wheel rotary lawn mower.

The council agreed to furnish a space in the city garage for the ambulance until such time that a permanent place could be provided.

Keith Miller reported on the Police Department and reported the receiving of six applications for night patrolman. Monday, May 3 has been set for a special meeting to review applications.

Bob Roark met with the council as a representative of the Wheeler Library Board. He requested an agreement on the sponsorship of the Library. The agreement is necessary for the board to pursue efforts to obtain funds for the library.

Bob Barnett met with the council to request permission to put in a large meter and equipment for the loading of transport trucks used by McKinley Oil Field Service. All expense of construction and meter will be incurred by the company.

Daryl Snelgroves of the Wheeler Fire Department met with the council to report on a leak in the garage at the front of the garage and informed the council of the cost of a truck to replace the old red fire truck. The cost will range from \$23,000 to \$29,000. It was requested that a representative of the company meet with the council.

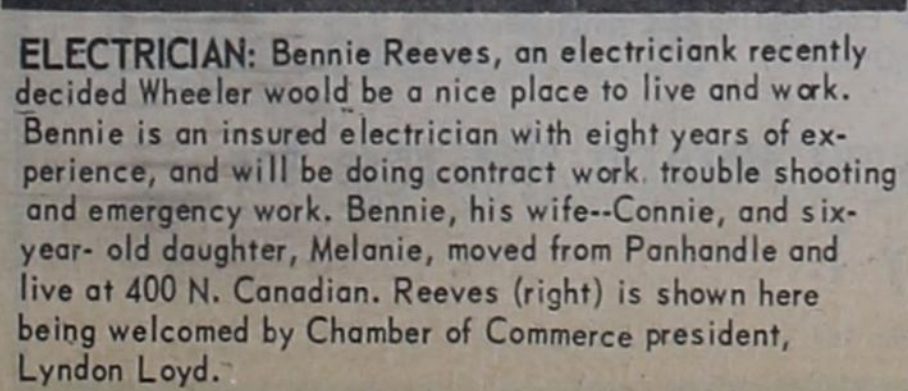
Attorney Sims discussed the condemnation of property for water rights. The vote was unanimous.

Bill Owen reported on the school making preparations to pump water from the Imhoff tank for the irrigation of school property. He motioned the City to make application to revise sewer plant permit in order for them to pump the water; the motion carried.

Applications for management of the swimming pool were opened. Two applications were received; Linda Kay Davis and Mrs. Darrell Moore submitted applications. The council accepted the application of Linda Kay Davis. The pool is to be opened June 1.

Bills were presented and passed for payment. The "Oath of Office" was taken by the mayor and three councilmen. Councilmen were named to their city departments. Bill Owen will serve as Mayor Pro-tem and supervise the water and sewer department. Louis Stas will be in charge of the Park and the Swimming Pool. David Cross will work with the Police Department and be in charge of the Dump Grounds and Airport. Delbert Thomas is over the equipment and Charlie Wagner will oversee the maintenance of the streets.

Bill McIlhany was given the prestigious Mustang Award that is given by an anonymous donor each year.

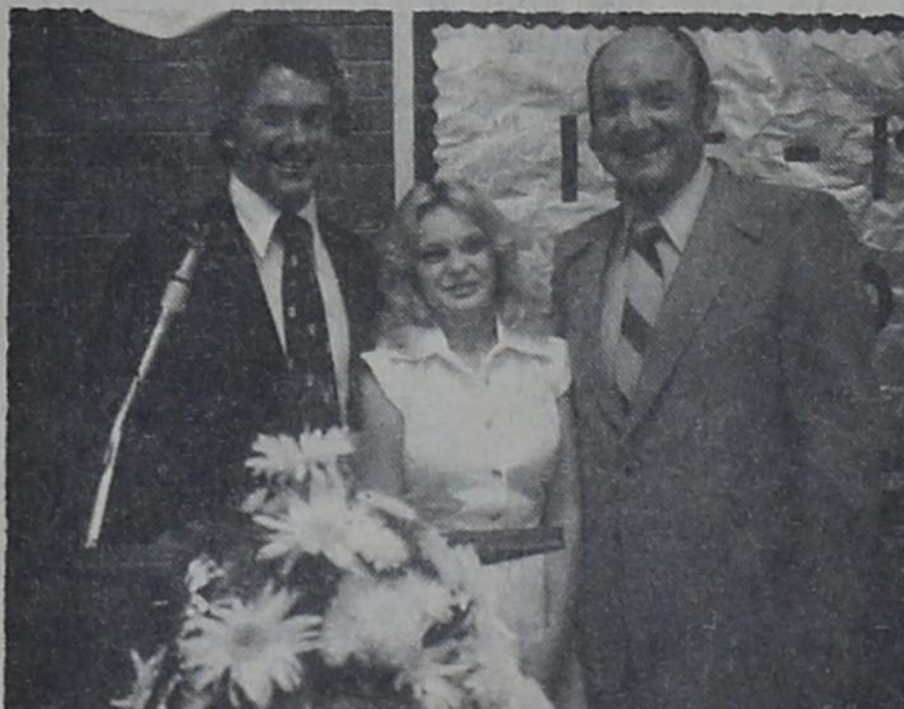

LINES FROM LINDA

Redoing kitchens and bathrooms is one of the best improvement investments that homeowners can make. Homeowners can avoid financial disaster in remodeling their houses by understanding what kinds of improvements add to the house's value on resale. The cost of tearing materials out to install something new may not be recoverable. So consider how much improvement will not be seen.

Old fashioned kitchens and bathrooms which are replaced with functional, attractive areas will justify the cost and bring the price you would expect. But replacing cracked or patched wallboard is an improvement which may not bring any additional money to the homeowner when he sells the house.

Also consider how big an expenditure is involved. There may be no way to recover the total cost of too deluxe an improvement job. Consider whether your standards are higher or lower than the average buyer who will be looking at the house. Buyers may not be willing to pay for your expensive tastes.

Quality and location of the neighborhood make a difference in the value of a remodeling job. In an area where the cost of housing is decreasing, remodeling will not pay. And remember not to over-improve a house in comparison to other houses in the neighborhood.

For example, a homeowner might recover improvement costs of \$1,000 or \$2,000 to a \$29,000 house in a neighborhood of \$26,000-\$30,000 homes. But it would be unwise to make \$10,000

improvements to that same house. Over-investing in a house can be a real mistake. Investing \$10,000 to remodel a \$30,000 house on a block of \$25,000-\$30,000 homes will not make the house sellable at \$40,000. The improvements may be there, but prospective buyers will not pay that much for a house in a neighborhood of lesser

quality homes. Also, some improvements including additions and renovations cause the property to go up in tax valuation

and increase tax assessments. Currently, most appraisers note that homeowners will earn the highest return on dollars spent for a modernized kitchen and modernized bathrooms, and for a ground floor family room. Although the family may enjoy a sauna, greenhouse, or photography darkroom, probably there will not be any financial rewards on resale for those kinds of improvements.

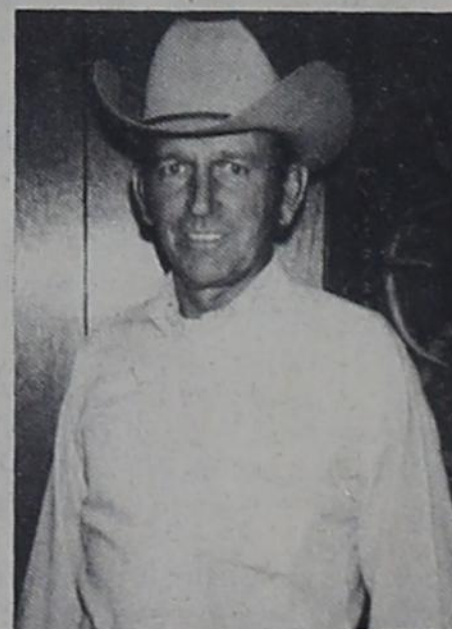

License Designates Anatomical Gift

All Drivers licenses issued after January 1, 1976, will contain a statement whereby the holder of the license may designate any part of his body as an anatomical gift at the time of his death.

Major C. W. Bell, commanding Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety which issues the drivers licenses, said the 64th Legislature enacted the measure that became effective the first of the year.

Accordingly, all drivers licenses issued after January 1, will contain the statement which specifies any or all of the donor's body that may be used as an anatomical gift.

If a person does not desire to participate in the anatomical gift program, Bell said, he need not do anything regarding completion of the statement. Drivers license will continue to be laminated on the front but the back will not be laminated in order that holders of the licenses may sign the statement.

The anatomical gift statement will be printed on the reverse side of the donor's operator's, commercial operator's or chauffeur's license. The gift is invalid on expiration, cancellation, revocation or suspension of the license or by lining out that portion of the statement.

Bell added that another method of voiding or canceling the statement would be to secure a duplicate drivers license in which case the reverse side of the permit would be left blank.

for the gift provision of the license to be valid, the statement must be executed each time the license is replaced, reinstated or renewed. The document must be signed by the donor in the presence of witnesses who must sign the document in the donor's presence.

Licenses which are currently valid in Texas will not be replaced with the newly-designed one, but as holders renew their licenses, they will receive the license which contains the gift statement.

If currently licensed drivers desire the newly-designed one, they may contact their nearest DPS drivers license office and apply for a duplicate license for which there is a minimal charge.

The law that was enacted by the Legislature only requires the DPS to provide a space on the license for the statement concerning the availability of the anatomical gift. "We do not maintain records regarding the anatomical gifts," Bell added.

Recipients of gifts of bodies or vital organs may be any hospital, surgeon, or physician, for medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental science, therapy or transplantation; or any accredited medical or dental school, college or university for education, research, advancement of medical or dental science or therapy.

Other recipients may include any vital organ storage facility established for medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental science or therapy; or any individual specified by a licensed physician for therapy or transplantation needed by him.

Vital Facts In Sprinkler System

To develop a sprinkler system so it will work at its highest efficiency there are several vital facts that need to be known. It is very unwise to take a shot in the dark and buy a system and know nothing about it. The first and probably the most important fact to know in developing a sprinkler system, is to be sure about how much water is available for irrigation. For conservation irrigation systems, it is usually safe to irrigate about one acre of crop for each ten gallons of water per minute available. With help from rainfall, more acreage may be watered. Another very important fact to consider is the type of soil to be irrigated. Sometimes a sprinkler system may be designed to apply water faster than the intake rate of the soil will allow. When this happens we find unnecessary ponding or runoff. This can be controlled by the amount of sprinklers in the system and the size nozzle used. Other things to consider is the size main line and laterals to use. If these lines are too small it will take too much pressure to deliver the amount of water desired through the system. A well designed system should not vary the pressure on the nozzles in the system over five to seven pounds per square inch. If these conditions exist, cost of operation will be unnecessarily high. The technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District will assist you with the design of a sprinkler irrigation system if you so desire.

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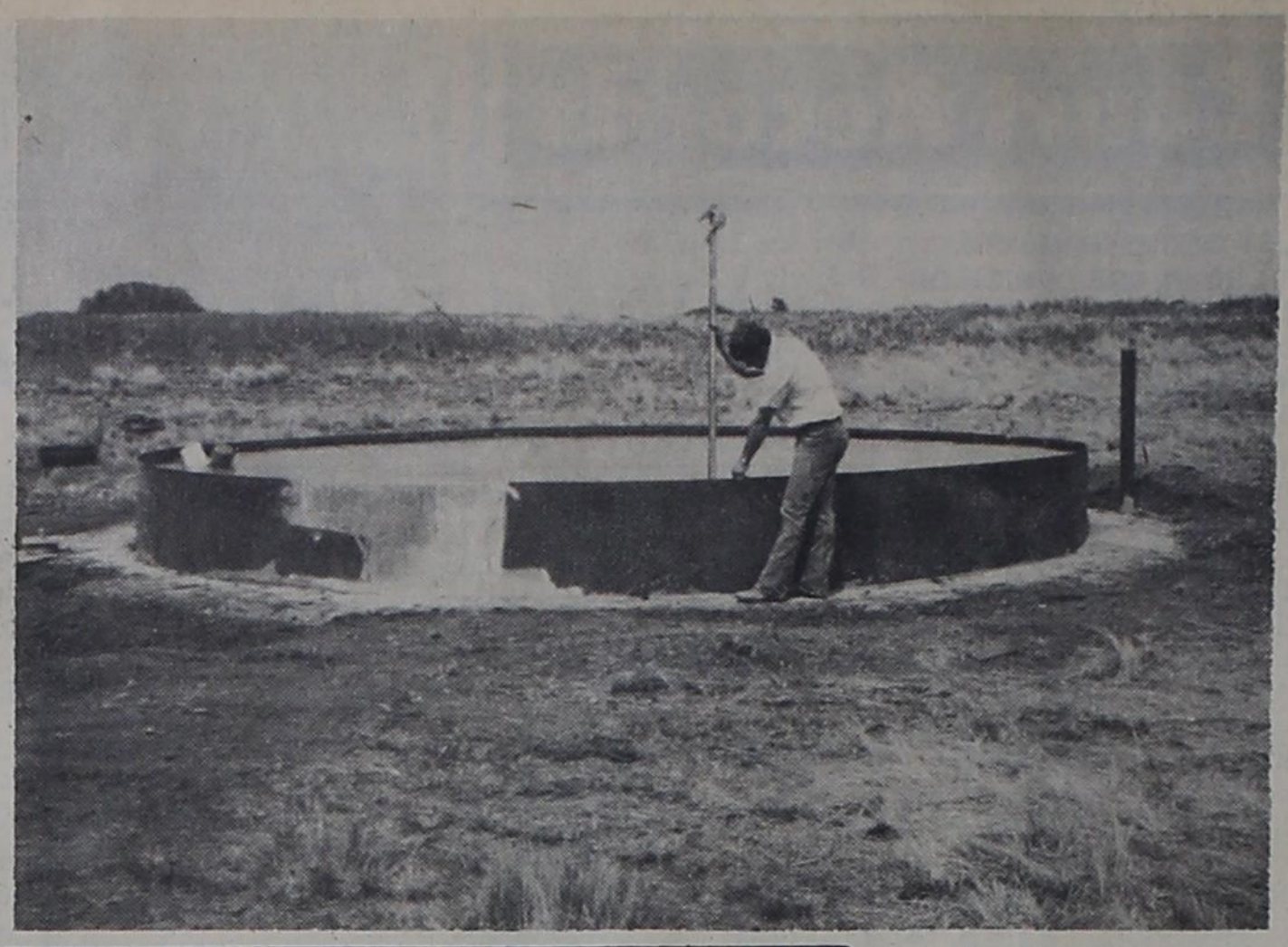
WATER IMPORTANT TO CROPS AND LIVESTOCK

An adequate supply of water is an essential part of any successful grass and livestock management program. Too many times inadequate water storage is constructed for carrying out a grazing system. This can result in water having to be hauled to livestock, or perhaps having to reduce a herd of cattle to a smaller number than forage is available for.

Livestock watering facilities should be constructed at locations which will facilitate proper distribution of grazing. A watering facility should have adequate capacity to meet the water requirements of the livestock it is to serve. The construction site should be well drained. An overflow pipe should be made a part of the construction specifications to provide for overflow being piped to a desirable point of release.

Additional information about water needs for various livestock and construction specifications can be obtained from any of the personnel at the Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler.

Eight Accidents In Wheeler Co.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of March, 1976, according to Sergeant D.E. Womack, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1976 shows a total of 22 accidents resulting in one person killed and eight persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1976, shows a total of 448 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 261 persons injured, as compared to March, 1975, with 446 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 217 persons injured. This was two more accidents, two less killed, and 44 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time. The 15 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1976, occurred in the following counties: Two each in Childress and Palmer; and one each in Baylor, Lockley, Lubbock, Lynn, Wise, Hansford, Hardeman, Hutchinson, Potter, Swisher, and Wilbarger.

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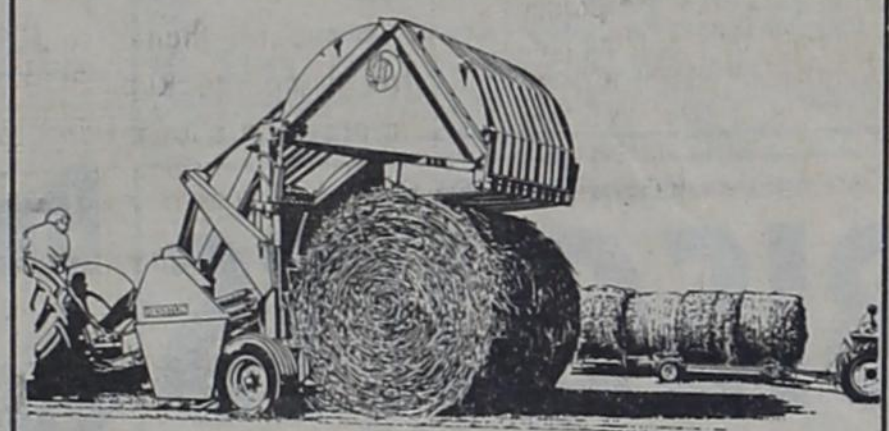
