1976 Wheeler Co. Junior Livestock Show Mar. 11-12

Entries for the 1976 Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show are in and this year's show promises to be even bigger than the 1975 Show. The show is scheduled for March 11-12 in the Wheeler County Agricultural Center.

Entries include 33 steers, 7 heifers, 113 barrows and 24 gilts. Members of 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters in Allison, Briscoe, Kelton, Wheeler, Shamrock and Mobeetie will be showing the 177 head of livestock.

The show will actually get under way Wednesday March 10 when the steers and barrows are weighed in. Barrows will be weighed between 6:00 and 8:00 p.m. and the steers between 8:00 and 10:00 p.m.

The swine show will begin at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, March 11, with the judging of the barrows. The order of the judging will be (1) Chester White (2) Duroc (3) Hampshire (4) Poland China and Spotted Poland China (5) Yorkshire and (6) Crossbreds. The gilts will be shown immediately after the barrows.

The beef cattle show will be Friday, March 12. Steers will be judged beginning at 10:00 and will be followed by the heifer judging.

There will be a free barbecue held again this year prior to the barrow sale. The barbecue will begin at 6:00 p.m. Friday. Everyone is invited to attend.

The Auction Sale will be held following the barbecue at 7:00 p.m. Bedford Forrest, Farm Director, KVII-TV in Amarillo will serve as auctioneer for the approximately 60 barrows. Of course everyone attending the barbecue is invited to stay for the sale.

Officials for the 1976 Wheeler County Livestock Show, which is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association, include Joe Hefley, General Superintendent; Wallace Fields, Beef Cattle Superintendent and David Zybach, Swine Superintendent.

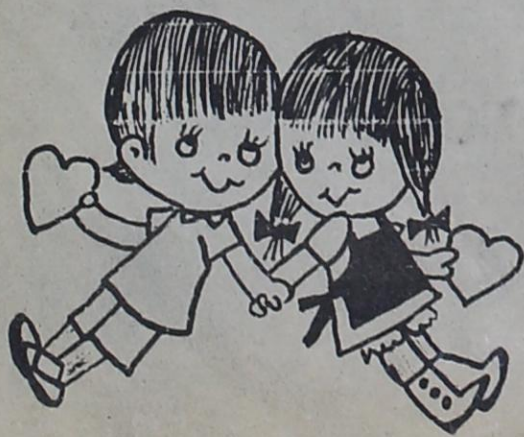

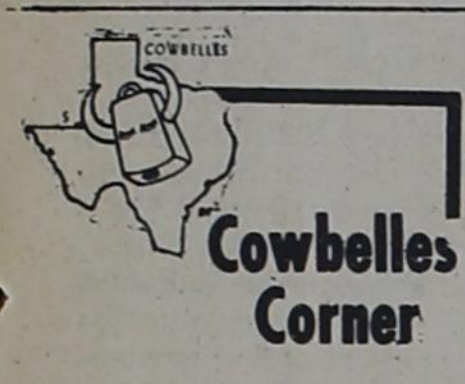

Weekends provide many good opportunities to replace broken glass in windows and doors around the home--and it's a job most people can do.

The difficulty in replacing broken glass increases as the size of the opening gets larger. Small windows may be required with sashes in place.

Large openings however, are easier to repair if the sash is removed from the frame and placed on a flat surface. This cannot always be done, so you may need outside help in replacing a larger glass.

Tools needed for the job are window glass, glazing compound or putty, putty knife, hammer, pliers, knife, glaziers points, and metal clips or plastic tension strips for metal frame windows.

Metal frame windows may look more complex than wooden sash, but usually they are no more difficult or time consuming to repair than the wooden ones.

Many tools and procedures for repairing wooden windows apply also to metal units. The major difference in wood and metal sash windows is the way the glass is secured to the frame. For wooden frame windows, small triangular shaped pieces of metal called glaziers points are placed against the glass and are driven into the wood. Glaziers points are covered with putty or glazing compound.

Two of the most common ways of securing glass in metal sash windows are with clips and plastic tension strips.

Metal clips press against the glass when inserted in the window frame opening. Putty is applied over the clips as in a wood frame window.

Cut plastic tension strips into four pieces to correspond with measurements of the window opening. Plastic strips are compressed slightly and inserted to fit under a groove in the frame and against the window glass. When the four pieces are secured around the opening and the glass clean, the job is complete.

Follow these steps in replacing broken glass:

--Step 1. Remove broken glass from the window frame.

Wood: Working from the outside, remove loose putty, bits of glass and glaziers points.

Metal: Working from the outside, lift or pry off plastic tension strips with screwdriver. Do not damage strips. They may be reused. If putty is used, pry it out and remove metal clips holding glass in place. Keep clips for reuse.

--Step 2. Clean frame well.

Wood: Use a wood rasp or sandpaper to remove all putty from the grooves. Wipe clean with damp cloth.

Metal: Rub with steel wool to remove putty, rust and corrosion from opening. Wipe clean with damp cloth.

Step 3: Seal frame opening from moisture.

Wood: Coat wood with linseed oil, wood preservative or house paint. Dry thoroughly.

Metal: Apply coat of paste wax. Dry thoroughly.

--Step 4. Have glass cut to size.

Wood and Metal: Measure length and width of opening. Have glass cut one-eighth inch smaller in each dimension.

Step 5: Prepare frame for glass.

Wood and Metal: Apply a bead of putty or glazing compound in groove around frame to cushion the glass. Carefully press down into putty.

Step 6: Secure glass to frame.

Wood: Lay glaziers points against glass and carefully tap into frame. Use the flat blade of a screwdriver against the point. Tap on the screwdriver, not the glass. Use two points to a side in small panes, use one for each six inches in larger sashes.

Metal: Secure glass with the old fasteners. Spring-metal

removed, cut new ones. Except for sealing and cleaning, the job is complete when all four strips are in place.

--Step 7. Apply sealing bead to putty.

Wood: Work putty or glazing compound well down into the 'L' formed by glass and frame. Press firmly for a good seal. The putty should be flush with the outer edge of the molding and as high as the inner edge (inside glass). Trim excess as you work. Dry for several days.

Metal: Where metal clips are used to secure glass to frame, apply putty or glazing compound as for wood frame windows.

--Step 8. Apply paint to match window unit.

Wood: With trim or sash brush, paint glazing compound the same color as the windows. Paint should reach one-eighth inch up on the glass to assure weather seal.

Metal: Where putty or glazing compound is used, apply paint as for wood-sash window.

Step 9: Clean Glass in window unit.

Wood and Metal: After paint has dried thoroughly, remove paint and putty smudges with thinner. Polish glass.

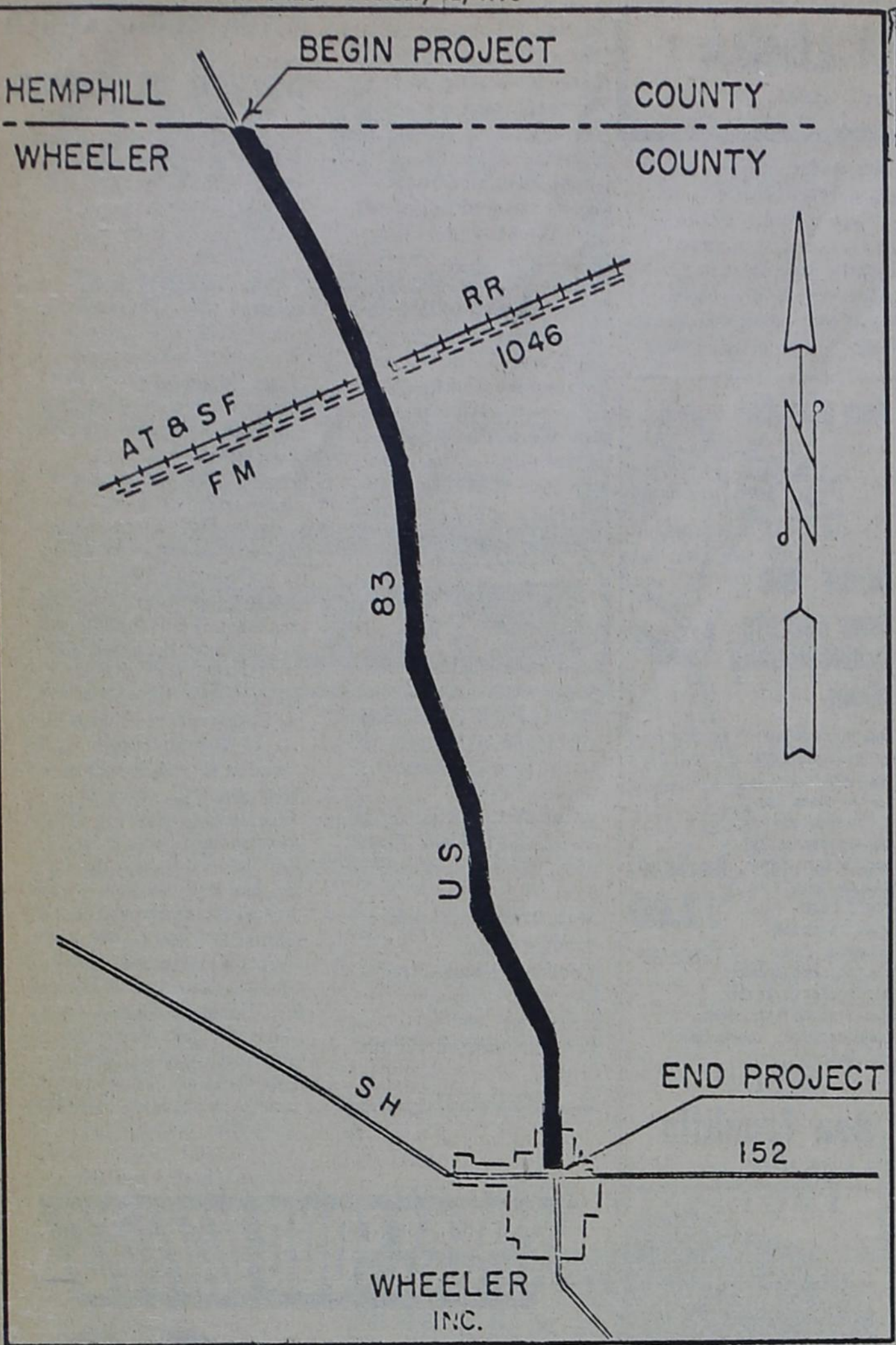

Notice affording opportunity for public hearing corridor (location) and design (combined hearing)

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning the improvement of U.S. Highway 83, extending from the Hemphill County Line, south to State Highway 152 in the City of Wheeler, a distance of approximately 130 miles, in Wheeler County.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing of the existing 24 foot pavement to provide two 13 foot travel lanes, with 9-foot paved shoulders, and an additional 12-foot climbing lane in areas where steep grades warrant. Also included is a curb and gutter section, beginning at S.H. 152 in the City of Wheeler and extending approximately one-half mile, to provide four traffic lanes and two parking lanes.

Route of the proposed project is along the present location of U.S. Highway 83. Additional right of way will be obtained as required to provide a minimum right of way width of 150 feet throughout the project, with the exception of the curb and gutter section where no additional right of way will be required. In areas where steep slopes occur, maximum right of way requirement will be approximately 200 feet. There will be no displaced persons, or relocations of businesses or farms, as a result of this project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of O. V. Johnson, Supv. Resident Engineer of Wellington, Texas.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction, can be obtained at the District Office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, P.O. Transplant Trees Properly

Many people will be planting trees, shrubs and vines during the next couple of weeks. For successful transplanting, particular attention should be given to a few details.

In transplanting any woody plant, the planting hole and backfill used are extremely important. The old saying that "it is better to use a \$1 plant in a \$10 hole than

to try to squeeze a \$10 plant in a \$1 hole" is still true. The hole should be just deep enough to allow the tree or shrub to be set at the same depth it was in the container or at the nursery.

The poorer the soil, the greater should be the diameter of the hole. A good rule-of-thumb is to make the pit at least one-and-one-half times larger than the root ball.

If the existing soil it to be used as backfill, it should be enriched with at least one part peatmoss or compost to two parts soil. Work the soil mixture in around the roots of a bare-root plant or pack it in firmly around the soil ball of container of balled and burlapped plants. When the pit is about two-thirds filled with soil, water thoroughly and allow the water to drain before completely filling the hole with backfill.

Build a dam or berm about 8 to 12 inches beyond the edge of the hole as an aid in watering the first year or two. Trees over 4 to 5 feet high should be staked or guyed, especially if they are evergreen. It using guy wires, run the wire through a piece of old garden hose before placing it around the trunk to prevent damage to the bark. Check frequently to be sure the tree is not being girdled.

Care after planting is important. Water regularly and thoroughly when needed but do not over-water as this keeps soil pores filled with water and slows root growth. Use a mulch around the base of the plant to keep down weeds, conserve moisture and prevent soil compaction. Fertilize only after the plant is well established.

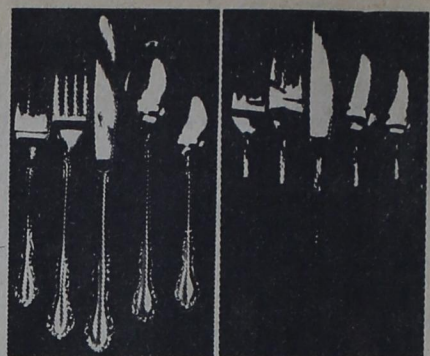
