## Emergency Med. Training Liberty Tree Dedication Monday On Wheeler Square The Indian Tribes of the

Southern States were the first to enjoy the fruits of the pecan tree. Because the pecan is native only to North America, these Indians were the only ones aware of its existance for several hundred years.

Early explorers in Texas noted the Indians dependancy on the oecan as a food source. Cabaza de Vaca wrote "it is the substance of the people for two months in the year without another thing." The Indians would travel so that their journeys always took them to the river of nuts when the pecans were in season. "The river of nuts' later became known as the Guadelupe River

George Washington became a noted lover of the pecan. Historians have observed "the celebrated General always had these nuts and was constantly eating them." A 1794 entry in his diary mentions planting

### Group Purchases Abilene Bank

Controlling interest in Abilene National Bank was acquired Friday by a group of stockholders headed by Don Earney, a former Federal Housing Administration director from Lubbock.

Eamey, 41, was elected president an chairman of the board. He announced the purchase of the bank following a board of directors meeting Friday after-

The control group purchased 110,000 shares, 55 per cent of the bank's stock. Former president Joe Hodges remains active in the bank as senior vice president and a director.

All other bank officers retain their previous positions and all directors will remain with the excpetion of Jack P. Chapman of Odessa, who tendered his stock for sale and is leaving the board, and Henry Grubbs of Abilene, who earlier had asked to be allowed to resign from the board. Grubbs was named director emeritus Friday. Besides Earney, new di-

rectors named Friday are Pete Burton of Wheeler, owner of a Ford dealesship, director of the First Nation al Bank of Wheeler, and former mayor of that city; Dr. Jim Granberry, a Lubbock orthodontist and former mayor who was the Republican candidate for governor in 1974; and Chester Glancy, Jr. of Shamrock, a motel owner and busin essman and present member of the city council.

things in the world is to forgive a person who has mistreated you. I can think of only one thing harder and that is to forgive yourself when you have miserably failed or committed some terrible sin. Every adult I know carries a burden of sin in some form - a sin committed, or a sense of regret for something done

or undon e. One episode in the life of Jesus shows clearly how he faced people who knew what it was to fail, and the solution bepresented to the problem. The story is found in John 8: 2-11. It relates how the scribes and Phari sees, having caught a woman in the act of adultery, presented her to Jesus asking him whether to stone her. Jesus, before daying a word, bend down and wrote on the ground with his finger. When they kept on questioning him, he straighten ed up and said to them, "If any one of you is with out sink let him begin stoning her. ' Upon hearing this the crowd began slowly to disperse until only the woman and Jesus were there. Jesus asked, "Wo-

man, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" "No one sir," she said. "Then neither do I condemn you, " Je sus declared. 'Go now and leave your life of sin."

This story shows how men Mr. and Mrs. Richard Kiker react to sin and how Jesus deals with their reactions. 'Ie rejected the approach of the Pharisees and in this place propo sed a radical solution - God's forgiveness freely of fered and freely received. To the accused who recogneizd the depth of her sin, he issued pardon! He directedin a way that demonstrated acceptance and hope. He lifted the burden and gave her back her life. The one who expected the worst because she knew she was a sinner was not condemned. These who were condemning found themselves under condemnation. To the one who admitted her sin, Jesus offered acceptance and hope in the shape of God's forgiveness. To those who re-

> fused to ack no wledge their own sin he spoke harshly. The people in the days of Jesus were astonished

Custom operators - those who perform a specialized service for others in farming are not a new development in American agriculture.

In fact, as far back as early Colonial days, there were custom operators at work in the settlements of the New England and Mid-Atlantic areas.

The original custom operator was the community plow-

Although they were the most basic of farming implements, plows were very scarce in the Colonies. The Plymouth Colony did without plows for more than 12 years and farmers depended entirely on hoes and mattocks for breaking the

Likewise, the Swedish Colony along the Delaware had few plows. But these implements were in greater supply on the farms of Massachusetts Bay and around Philadelphia.

Due to their scarcity, a plow soon became a sign of agricultural distinction. The services of a plowman were in great demand.

### **Butter Was** Farm's First **Dairy Product**

Butter was the main source of dairy income for many years, and it's said that excellent butter came out of Colonial springhouses. This was true even though little was known of the necessity for sterilizing utensils, and no refrigeration was available but cold spring water and ice. These methods of preserving were inadequate in the summer, when butter was salted down in wooden buckets and kept sweet in the springhouse until winter when the price

The farm wife of the day took competitive pride in the quality of the butter which she sold to year-round customers - the village doctor, lawyer, banker or to the village store. Private customers paid her 15 to 20 cents a pound for butter, while the storekeeper paid only 10 to 12

cents either in cash or barter. Production for sale as fluid milk was limited to farms near cities and towns where delivery could be made daily. In cities like New York and Philadelphia, dairy farmers in the early 1800's would trudge the streets weighted down with a yoke carrying two large kettles of milk. Here's the milk! Yo!" they'd call to let their customers know they were coming. Some farmers drove around in covered carts, selling their fluid bounty for six to ten cents a quart.
