

TRAFFIC FATALITY: A one car accident at 10:45 Monday evening killed Robert Lee Hoover, 24, of Hollis, Okla. Hoover was dead on arrival at Parkview Hospital with head, chest and neck injuries. Hoover was driving a 1957 Chevrolet south on Alan L. Bean Boulevard when he lost control, side swiped a light pole, jumped the curb traveled 80' and struck a tree dead center in the 1100 block of the boulevard. 



#### Be Prepared For Windy Season

This time of year we begin thinking about the coming windy season. Perhaps we should heed the warning snd be more careful to leave a good cover drop on our soil. The fields that have a good residue cover will not be dam aged by wind emsion, but the fields that are cleaned tilled receive considerable damage. Emergency tillage is a

good method to help control wind erosion on clean tilled fields. Emergency tillage supplements meater supplies of residues with cloddiness and ground roughness and catches drifting sand particles to prevent damage to entire fields. Emergency tillage operations will be generally at right angles to the prevailing wind. Cultural operations suitable for performing emergency tillage are listing, chiseling, pitting, sand fighting, rotary hoeing and use of a stalk cutter. This will provide only temporary protection and should not be con sidered for any long term benefits. This practive may have to be performed mere than once depending on the number of wind storms. The pattern of the first pattern of any emergency till age should be the minimum required to provide current control. The soil Conservation

# JUNK CAR ORDINANCE

Art. 2. Junked Vehicle Or-

Note: For state law relating to junked vehicles, see VACS store, preserve, and aminart. 6701d-11

Sec. 10-21. Brief Title. This article shall be known and cited as the "Junked Vehicle Ordinance" Sec. 10-22. Definitions .

As used herein: (1) The term "junked vehicle" means any motorvehicle as defined in Vernon's Annotate d Civil Stautes of the State of Texas, art. 670 ld-11, 1, as amended, which is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate and which is either wrecked, dismantled, partially dismantled or discarded.

(2) The word "demolisher" means any person whose business is to convert a motor vehi de into processed scrap or scrap metal or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles.

(3) The term "motor vehicle" means any motot vehicle subject to registration pur uant to the Texas Certificate of Title Act

(4) The term "antique model" means passenger cars or trucks that were manufactured in 1925 or before, or which become 35 or more ye ars old.

(5) The term "special interest vehicle' me ans a motor vehicle of any age which has not been altered or modified from original manufacturers specifications and, because of its historic interest, is being preserved by hob by ists.

(6) The term 'collector' means the owner of one or more antique or sepcialinterest vehicles who collects, purchases, acquires, trades, or disposes of spe-

cial-interest or antique vehicles or parts of them for his own use in order to retain an antique or speicalinterest vehicle for historic interest.

Sec. 10-23. Declared Public blic nuisance exists, as the nuisances.

The City Council hereby finds that 'junked vehicles' as defined above, which are located in any place where place or public right-of-way are detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tending to reduce the value of private property, to invite vandalism, to create fire haz ares, to constiture an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and are detrimental to the economic welfare o the City of Wheeler, Texas, by procucing urban blight which is adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the City; and any such vehicle is, therefore, declared to be a public nuicance.

Sec. 10-24. Chief of Police to give notice. (a) The Chief of Police of the City of Wheeler, Te-

xas, upon noticing or having brought to his attention that a nuisance exists, as defined above, within the City, either upon private property or public property or on a public right-of-way, shall give or cause to be given to the owner or occupant of such private or public property, or to the owner or occupant of the premises adjacent to the public rightof-way whereupon such public public nuis ance eix sts, a written notice stating the nature of the public nuisance and that same must be removed and abated within ten (10) days.

(b) All notices sent hereunder shall be mailed by certified or registered mail

with a 5-day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the private or public premises, or to the owner or oc cup ant of the premises adjacent to the public rightof-way whereup on such pucase may be. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued t hey are visible from a public to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.

Sec. 10-25. Public hearing to be held order of removal

Sec. 10-26. Chief of Police to remove vehicle, when; sale of vehicle.

(a) Upon the expiration of

the 10-day dotice period given under section 10-24 above, provided no proper request for hearing has been made, or upon the expiration of the 10-day notice period given after public hearing pursuant to section 10-25 above, if the junked vehicle or vehicles involved have not been removed, it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police or those acting under or other public or private his authority to remove tuch vehicle(s) to a sutiable city storage area or to a demolisher as defined herein. Sec 10-27. Not to be made

A junked vehicle, once removed in accordance with this ordinance, shall never be reconstructed or made

Section 10-28. Notice to be given to Texas Highway Department.

Within five (5) days after the removal of any junked vehicle, notice thereof shall be given to the Texas High-

way Department, identifying the vehicle or part thereof removed.

Sec. 10-29. Application of ordinance.

This ordinance shall not apply to-

(1) vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street property.

(2) vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle de aler or junk yard;

(3) unlicensed, operable property, provided that the vehicles and the outdoor storage are as are maintained in such a manner that they do not constitute a health hazard and are screened from ordinary public view by means of a fence, rapidly growing trees, shrubbery or other appropriate

Sec. 10-30. Administration of ordinance

This ordinance shall be administered by regularly ployees of the City, except that the removal of vehicles or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person. Without intending to limit the above, the Chief of Po-

lice, specifically, may delegate any of the duties imposed upon him hereunder to any employee described above. Sec. 10-31. May enter upon

private property; Court may issue orders Any person duly authorized

to administer the provisions of this ordinance may enter upon private property or parts thereof, to obtain in-

formation as to the identity of vehicles and to remove or cause the removal of a vehicle or parts thereof declared to be a nuisance pursuant to this ordinance. The Municipal Court of the City shall have authority to issue all orders necessary to enforce the provisions hereof. Sec. 10-32. Unlawful acts declared.

It is unlawful-

(1) to leave, or permit to remain, upon public or private property within the City of Wheeler, Texas, any junked vehicle, or part or parts thereof, for a period of time in excess of ten (10) days, subject to the proviction subject to the provisions of section 10-2 above;

(2) to fail or refuse to comply with any order to re. move and abate a nuisance issued under section 10-24 or 10-25 of this ordinance, subject to the right to hearing specified in section

(3) to leave, or permit to remain, upon upon public or private property within the City of Wheeler, Texas, any junked vehicle or part or parts thereof, for a period of one (1) day or more, after such vehicle has been onc removed and abated as a nuisance, subject to the provisions of section 10-29 above, or

(4) to reconstruct or make operable a junked vehicle after same has been remobed pursuant to this ordinance. Sec. 10-33. Penalty.

Any person found guilty and convicted of violating the terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not Isee than \$100, nor more than \$200.00 each day of violation shall be and constitute a sel erate offense.

The illusion of freedom, then, is to do what I want. The reality of freedom is self-limitation and responsibility. and was never free again." Recognizing that freedom is not license to what one wishes, it is still difficult to give an adequate difinition. Franklin D. Roose velt spoke of the world being founded on essential human freedoms; freedom of speech, freedom of worshio, freedom from want, and freedom from fear. Goethe said "None is more hopelessly enslavedth an those who boast of their freedom by virtue of their unbelief. I'm free, I do as I please," they say, while blindly enslaved to sin. Jesus message was to seek truth and indeed, "the truth will make you free."

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
