Bank Announces Plans For New Location, Facilities

The First National Bank of Wheeler announced Wednesday the purchase of the Old Hotel, the Terrill Gunter Property, Ruby Williams Property and the H & H Milling Property to be used for the relocation of new bank facilities. The property, Block 22 of the Wheeler townsite, covers a square block area with the exception of the 125 x 150 location of Garrison Service.

As soon as title work is completed, the removal of building and leveling of the property will begin, according to bank president, Charles R. Brown.

A date for the beginning of construction is not available. The plans have yet to be drawn, but included in the modern new facility will be a new drive-in bank, new safety deposit area, community room, bookkeeping

area, officers quarters and a large customer service area and lounge.

The present location at Texas and Main has been used by the bank since 1908. The move will be one block east of the present location.

A stockholders meeting was held Tuesday, January 20 for the election of board members. The directors presently serving were re-elected. Following stockholders meeting the directors-elect met and elected the following officers: Charles R. Brown, President, Adrian Risner, vice-president and cashier, Joe Rogers assistant vice-president, Sherry Porter, assistant cashier, and Georgia Smith assistant cashier.

The clearing of the property will be an improvement to the looks of the town even though construction will be in the near future.

CHRISTIANITY TODAY

This is the year of the bi-centennial when our nation is celebrating its 200th birthday. This is a year when freedom and what it means is on everyone's mind. But there is another kind of freedom, that is the freedom that only a Christian can know. This kind of freedom, comes only from within. Our inner freedom must come from an understanding of the love and faithfulness of God. To be free we must realize that our relationship with God does not depend on our own goodness. We cannot be good by humankind in us. One of the reasons we do not experience freedom is that we do not understand what freedom really is. God is the author of our freedom because he safeguards our right to opinion as well as our own privileges. The Christian tests the correctness of his actions by an appeal to the standard of God. He tries to "speak and act as those who are to be judged under the law of liberty." And this law restrains him even when the statute laws may not. We pride ourselves on our freedom of worship yet in our places of worship we are under certain restraints as to our conduct. We do not interrupt the services of worship, and the preacher does not take the liberty to say everything he thinks. We insist on freedom of speech, yet a good teacher feels the responsibility of restraining himself from expressing every fleeting idea passing through his mind. We think too much about freeing ourselves from our restraints and too little about freeing ourselves for our responsibilities. Jesus stressed the fact that the freedom from evils or restrictions is not enough. He told the parable of the house which was freed from evil spirits and left empty. Its latter state was worse than the former (Matt. 12: 43-45; Luke 11: 24-26). Jesus came to free people with a yoke (Matt. 11: 29). He knew that our nature is made for service to others and not for self-service. The only way to be really free is to fulfill our true nature by becoming involved in something greater than ourselves. Truly, there are two kinds of Christian experience: one restricts the flow of God's blessings; the other receives the flow of God's blessings and responds in loving service. Too many of us have locked ourselves in rooms with

The most important factor to consider when buying this jewelry is to purchase from a reputable dealer with an established place of business. Many dealers travel from place to place leaving the consumer with no way to locate them with complaints.

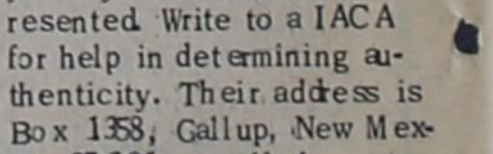
To help determine the true value of a piece of jewelry, ask a dealer these questions:
Is it handmade? Some machine made jewelry may appear handmade.

Are the stones untreated natural turquoise? Much low quality softer turquoise is being used and it tends to crumble.

Is it made of sterling silver? If you simply want a piece of jewelry with a pleasing design, you may not care about these points. But if you are investing money in something that is supposed to be authentic be sure that it is.

Consumers do have a "but" if they suspect that jewelry has been misrepresented. Write to a IACA for help in determining authenticity. Their address is Box 1358, Gallup, New Mexico 87301, or call them at 505-722-9483.
