Home Health Service Now Available In Wheeler

A new health service has recently been instituted in the Wheeler, Canadian, Shamrock community. Nursing services are being offered through the West Texas Home Health Agency, an independent agency based in Lubbock, Texas.

Some of the services available to homebound Medicare pati ents upon orders of the attending physician are surgical dressings, catheterizations, catheter irrigations, insertion of stomach tubes, injections, intravenouses, vena puncture for blood analysis, monitoring blood pressure and other vital signs, exercises, training in ambulation, physical therapy, enemas, sitzbaths, and teaching of family mem-

bers to care for the patient.


Equipment such as hospital beds, wheelchairs, oral el ectric suctions, bedside commodes, crutches, infraredlamps, oxygen, intermittent positive pressure breathing machines, etc. can

that this nursing service is not a continuous service but an intermittent service offered once a day, two or three times a week or whatever the physician feelsis necessary. Health services on a part-time basis may be needed when people are confined to their homes because of an illness or injury, after treatment in a hospital or skilled nursing facility, or care can be provided at hom e to help avoid an inpatient stay.

Reimbursement for home health care can be made not only by Medicare insurance but also by Medicaid, VA, Private Insurance, Champus and Private Pay. West Texas Home Health Agency has been exp anding it's services on consumer dem and sinceit was organized in Lubbock in 1968. It now has services in the entire West Texas area to the New Mexico border West, South to Big Spring, North to the Stratford and

WATS Line For Tax Answers.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office began operation Tuesday of a tollfree WATS line to answer general taxp aver questions. !Ie said the number is

John Warner Enters District Attorney Race

Pampa attorney John W. Warner announced last week that he will seek the Democratic nomination for the office of District Attomey.

Warner has served as County Attomey for Gray County for the past seven years. Prior to that he was Pampa's Municipal Court Judge for over five years. He has been a trail lawyer for 14 years and is with the Pampa firm of Warner, Finney and Marnocha He is a part time instructor at Frank Phillips College teaching criminal law, procedure and evidence for law enforcement officers.

"I have always believed that a person needs to earn the right to seek public office," Warner said in his announcement. "During the past two years I have prosecuted more than 850 misdem eanor cases in the County Court and about 50 felony cases in the District Court. I have worked extensively with grand juries and have had expedence in virtually all aspects of the District Attorney's job. I believe that my record as County Attorney qualifiesmeto seek the office of District Attorney." As Pampa's Municipal

Judge, Warner instituted a Teen-age Traffic Court which met on Saturdays. He required parents to appear in court with their teen-agers who were charged with traffic offenses.
