

TRAPPING SEASON UNDERWAY

Many Texas sportsmen are through Jan. 31. cleaning their rifles; and planning for next fall but a few are participating in an ancient winter sport; trap-

Fur prices are showing a comeback as the trapping season progress is with one buyer paying \$43 for a large prime bobcat. Most buyers are paying \$20-\$40 for bobcat; \$7-\$8 for coyotes and \$5-\$10 for raccoon.

Competition between buyers and trappers is increasing as the prices move up with trappers hauling their furs to the higheet bidder. Only top dollar is being paid for prime pelts that are either brought in as a carcassor cased the way the buyer wants it done.

The open season for taking pelts for sale for mink is Nov. 15 through Jan. 15, muskrat, Nov. 15 through Jan. 31 and all other furbearing animals, Dec. 1

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Fur-bearing animals include badger, beaver, fox, mink, muskrat, opossum, otter, raccoon, ring-tailed cat, skunk (polecat) and wild civet. Bobc at and coyote atr not considered furbearers and can be taken any time of the year but prime pelts on these two

through March. A license is required of those who take for the purpose of barter of sale of pelts of any fur-bearing animal in Texas. Special licenses are available for residents and non-residents as well as retail and wholesale for buyers. A resident trapping license is available for \$5 and the non-resident license is \$200.

animals occur from November

The fur-bearing license is required for the sale of pelts only and a Texas hunting license must be obtained when hunting our of your county of residence if you are 17 years of age or older and not over 65 years of age.

'Iunting regulations apply ot both hunters and trappers alike as does the requi rement of premission from the landowner before hunting or trapping. Afew sportsmen are bag-

ging coyotes and bobcats by using a varmint caller. The use of a high-powered rifle in the vicinity of livestock can be dangerous and vamint hunters should clear the use of these firearms with the lando wner. Livestock own ers know that an excess of covotes can deplete their herds and trapping and controlled hunting of these animals is beneficial.

More information about trapping and varmint hunting is available from your local game warden or any P& WD

To Die or Not To Die- What Is Your Community's Answer?

Did you know.

About 45 percent of ambulance personnel have received emergency care training up to the level of national standards.

About 25 percent of ambulance vehicles meet standards of configuration, equipment and performance.

About 30 percent of ambulances are able to communicate by rapid hospital emergency departments. You should also know.

That the states, in cooperation with their political subdivisions, are required under the high way Safety Act of 1966 Public Law 89-564) to have an approved program to insure that the activities and requirenents mentioned in the Following checklist are implemented.

That your governor is responsible for seeing that the Provisions of the Highway Safety Program Standard on "Emergency Medical Services' are properly upr-

That federal funds are made available to your Governor for help in darrying out the provisions of this standard, particularly for (1) training of ambulance and rescue personnel; (2) purchase of vehicles, equipment and communication gear; (3) establishing state and locl a offices for planning and managing improved services.

What you can do to improve the situation:

The greatest impediments to upgrading emergency medical services are public apathy and lack fo public knowledge and appreciation of the problem. Citizens should become concerned and involved. Here is a checklist which will help you assess how your state or community is doing to as sure the professional performance of these services. 1. There is an up-to-dzte comprehensice plan for emergency Medical Services

including. a Effective communication b. Definition of areas of

responsibility c. Designated hospital emergency department(s) d. Agreements for mutual

e. Funding Commitment f. EMS Advisory Committee Yes--- 10---

2. There are publicly known procedures for summoning and dispatching aid. Yes--- Mo---

3. There are requirements for the types and numbers of emergency vehicles, their location and safe operation and the supplies and equipment they carry Yes--- 'lo ---

4. There are requirements for collection and analysis of performance data to provo de evaluation reports Yes--- Vo---

5. There is a public information andeducation program regarding EMS Yes-- Vo---

6. There are Training and Licensing requirements for ambulance and rescue vehicle operators, attendants, drivers, and dispatchers.

Yes--- No---If the above essential elements are lacking in a conmunity or emergency Medical Services Area, there is really no EMS System in truth, but rather, an inerfective program that does not adequately serve the public need.

Excise Tax Reduced

The excise tax on telephone bills will be reduced 1 per cent-from 7 to 6 per cent-beginning January 1, 1976, as a result of the fourth step of a 10 year reduction.

The tax elimination was en acted as part of the Excise, Estate and Gift Tax adjustment Act of 1970 calling for successive 1 per cent reductions in the excise tax on telephone bills on the first of each year, until the tax expires on Decem ber 31, 1981

General Telephone customers paid an estimated \$2.1 million less in Federal Excise Taxes on Telephone bills during 1975 because of the 1 per cent reduction in the tax beginning January 1, 1975.

Based on the 1975 excsie tax o 7 per cent, General Tel ephone will have collected an estimated \$15 million from customers by the end of 1975.

The excise tax on telephone bills was first imposed by Congress during World War I as a 'temporary me asure. Although repealed briefly after the war, the tax was teinstated during the depression and has continued ever since at varying rates as high zs 15 per cent on local service and 25 per cent on Long fistance calls. From 1954 until 1975, it stood at 10 per cent.
