Funeral services for Roscoe Meek of Mobeetie were held Wednesday in the Baptist Church in Mobeetie with the Rev. Charles Uzzle, Baptist pastor assisted by the Rev. C. C. Lamb, Methodist pastor, officiating.

Mr. Meek, father of the late Aaron Meek, former principal of Lamar School, died suddenly in his home in Mobeetie at 9:15 a.m. Monday, April 24.

He was born in Tennessee July 25, 1879 and he was 81 years 8 months and 29 days old at the time of his death.

Mr. Meek and his wife, Florence Box were married in Forrestburg, Tex., on September 8, 1901. And moved from Montague County to Knox County in 1913 and then moved to Wheeler County in 1917.

They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in the home of their daughter, Mrs. C. C. Dyson near Mobeetie in 1951.

Mr. Meek was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Esther Lee Dyson of Mobeetie and Mrs. Maude Trimble of Almagordo, N.M.; three sons, W. L. Meek of Childress, E. E. Meek of Gageby and Paul Meek of Kermit.

Also seven grandchildren and fifteen great grandchildren. His wife one son, two brothers and three sisters preceded him in death.

Interment was in the Mobeetie Cemetery under the direction of the Kirk Funeral Home of Wheeler.

The local team became eligible following their spectacular appearance at the regional meet in Lubbock last Saturday.

The 440 yard relay team placed second at Lubbock and established a new record for class B schools. The boys, David Tremble, Jerry Hefley, Clayton Bradshaw and Jim Jolly ran the 440 in 44.4 seconds, in the preliminaries they ran the

course in 44.6.

Jim Jolly also qualified in the 100 yard dash with a 10.3 which won him a second place.

Dorothy Hall won a regional first in girls declamation and Joe Loter won a regional first in the science contest.

The track team, along with Dorothy and Joe will enter state competition next month.

The regional wins are quite an accomplishment for Wheeler since our regional contains 16 districts which will include well over 100 schools.

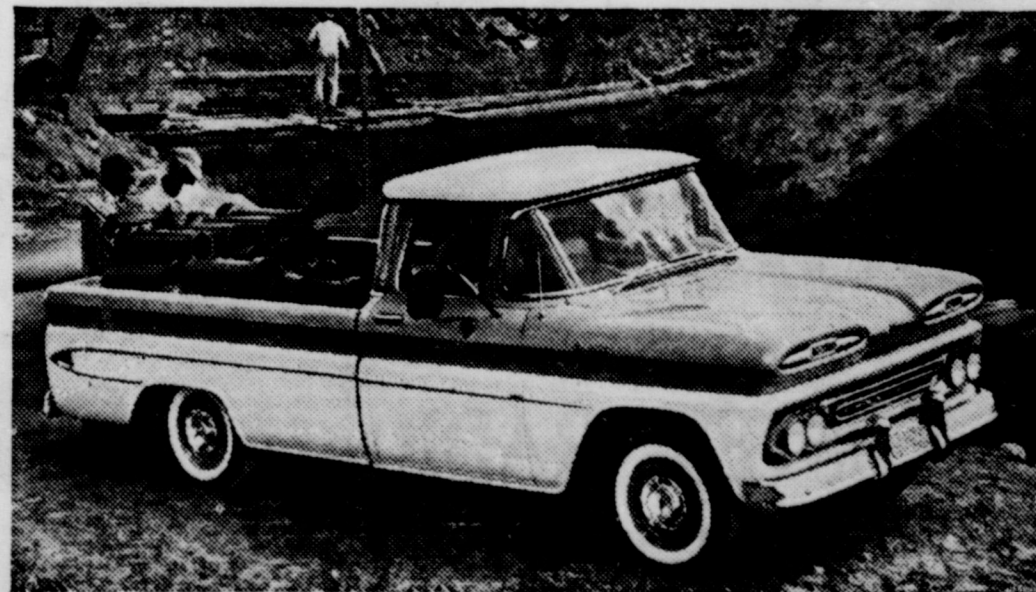

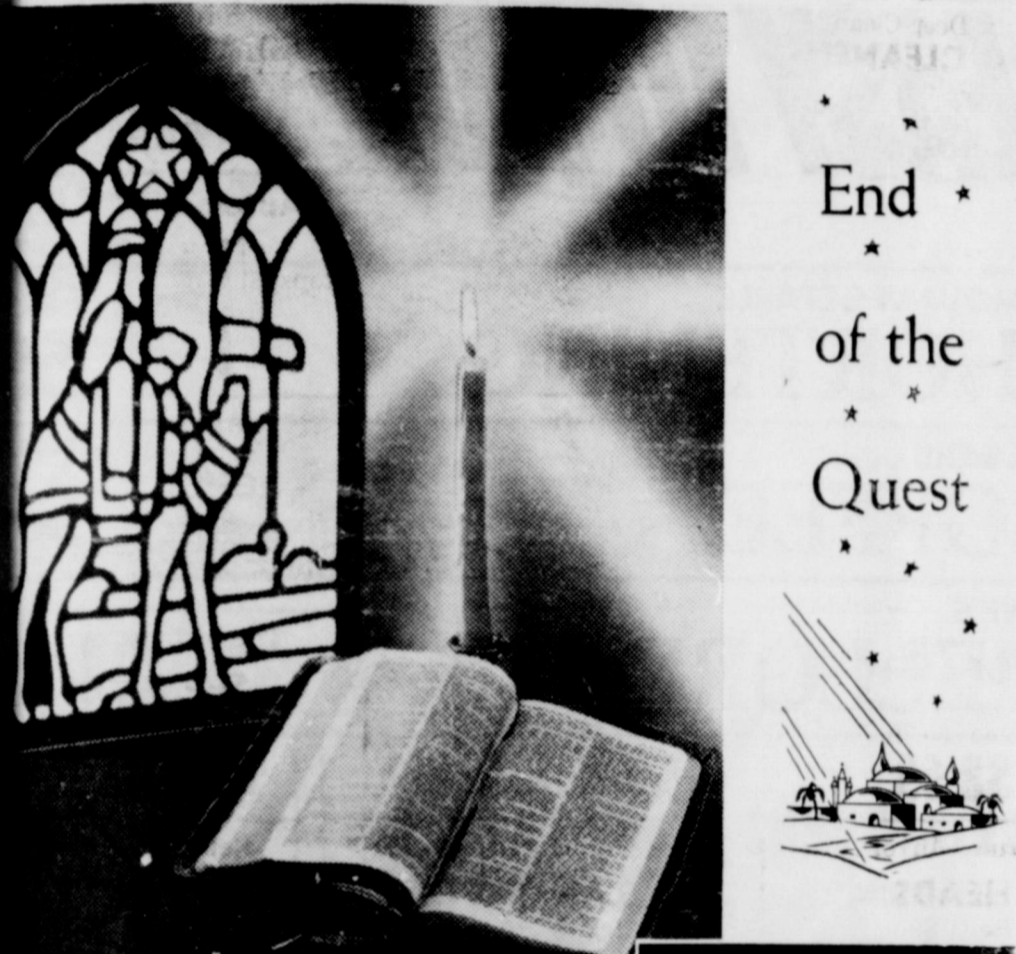

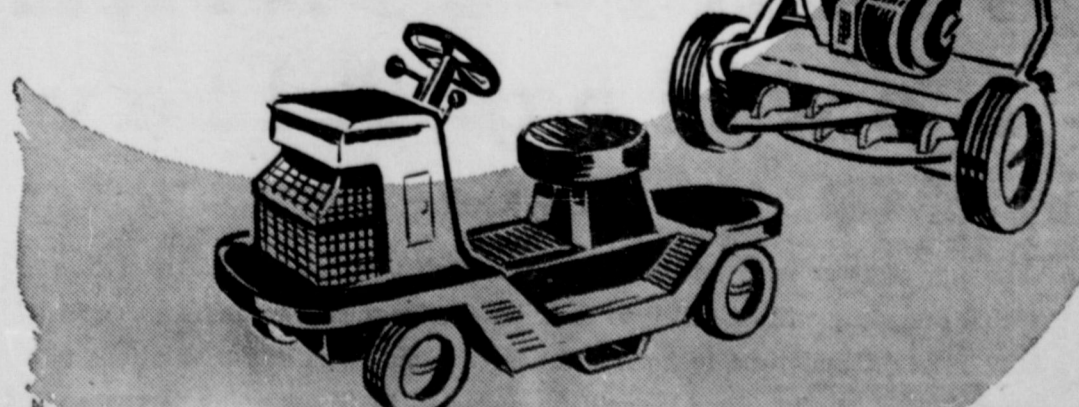

Some Survivors Are Eligible For Benefits

Social Security benefits may now be paid to survivors of workers who died between March 31, 1938 and January 1, 1940. If the worker had at least a year and a half of social security work before he died, says Hal Geidon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Administration District Office.

Before the Social Security Amendments of 1960, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of a worker who died before 1940. Under the new law, if such worker had worked under social security for at least a year and a half, benefits are payable to his widow and dependent mother at age 62, to his dependent father at age 65, and to his disabled children who were disabled before they became age 18. This is true if the family had collected the "lump sum" at the time he died.
