Following the business meeting, refreshments were served.

"Because cancer eventually strikes two out of three families," Mr. Clay said, "there is urgent need for everyone to do his share to combat a disease which last year took the lives of more than a quarter of a million of our fellow Americans."

"Here in Wheeler County we can help save lives by serving as volunteers, by contributing our money to the Crusade, or by doing both," Clay said. "Crusade volunteers will not only ring doorbells to collect funds, but will leave in each home leaflets which could save the life of some member of the family."

Clay pointed out that some 85,000 men, women and children die needlessly of cancer every year simply because they do not see their doctors in time. "Our volunteers will urge every adult in every household to get a health checkup regularly and learn and watch for cancer's seven danger signals," he said, "and they will also ask for a check to help the cancer through research, education and service."

"Let us join together to surpass our efforts of last year by giving more and working harder in the 1961 Cancer Crusade. One Million Americans now living have been cured of cancer. Our objective is to help save more lives and to support the research that will one day find a solution to the cancer problem."

## - This Is Our Problem -

Back in the days when communism was beginning to take hold in Russia, Lenin told his followers that the first step would be to take all of Eastern Europe. That Phase of the conquest has been completed. Eastern Europe is now fully under the communist yoke.

One of the most advanced countries in Latin America, Argentina, is ripening for the communists. They have already won the first phase in this battle of ideology for that country by driving our Christianity.

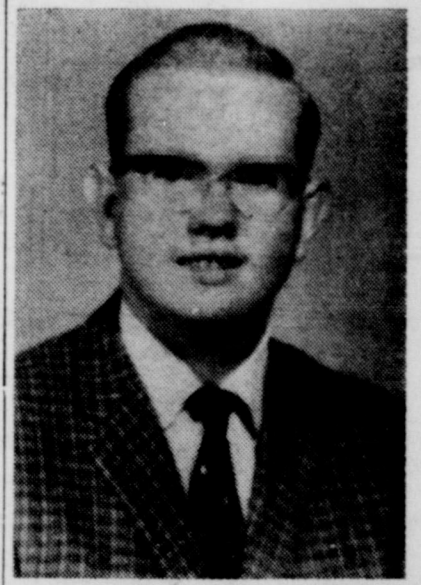
Argentina has many churches, but few church goers. It has developed the greatest percentage of atheists outside of the Iron Curtain. Argentina is supposed to be a Catholic country, but last year only six priests were ordained in the entire nation, and even fewer Protestant ministers.

Other Latin American countries, including Brazil have become equally indifferent to Christianity. The communists have done their job well in this country.

Now, I say to you, what problem could possibly be more important than the problem of combating communism.

Chickasha, with offices in Clinton, purchased the Wheeler Gin and the Dozier Gin in Texas. The other ten gins were located in Oklahoma.

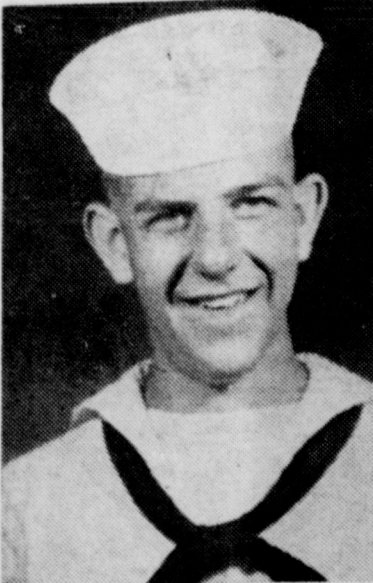
Fat Jones will continue as the manager of the local gin.

## Increases Announced In Money Orders And Special Delivery Fees

Proposed increase in money order and special delivery fees starting July 1, 1961, were announced today by Postmaster General J. Edward Day. No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned.

Special delivery fees for second third and fourth class matter will be increased by 10c in each of the non-first class fee brackets as follows:

The following is the proposed fees:

Up to 2 pounds — 1st Class, 30c; Other, 55c  
Over 2 to 10 pounds — 1st Class, 45c; Other 65c  
Over 10 pounds — 1st Class, 60c; Other, 80c

The increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal revenues, based on current special delivery volume.

Money orders up to \$5 and over \$50 will be increased by 5 cents. The new money order schedule will combine the present 15-cent and 20-cent fee brackets into one at 20 cents. It also splits the present 30-cent bracket at the \$50 level, raising to 35 cents the fee for denominations up to \$100. These changes will affect over 100 million money order transactions. Based on this volume, new revenues would total about \$5 million.

The new schedule will put into effect the following rates:

\$0.01 to \$10 — 20c  
\$10.01 to \$50 — 30c  
\$50.01 to \$100 — 35c

These proposed changes can be put into effect by Postmaster General Day under his existing administrative authority. Similar action was taken recently to adjust postal rates for mail going to foreign countries.

These actions are part of the Post Office Department's program to place the postal Service in a more favorable fiscal condition, in accordance with the Postal Policy Act of 1958.

## Housing Loan Funds Available

Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor John I. Manning said today that owners of farms who need to replace or repair houses and other essential farm service buildings are showing a great deal of interest in the agency's farm housing loan program.

These loans are available to qualified owners of all sizes of farms provided the farm will produce at least \$400 worth of commodities for sale or home use each year, based on the 1944 prices. Additional loan funds have recently been made available for this type of credit.

An injured steer and a slightly damaged car was the result of an auto-steer collision Monday evening 7 miles east of Wheeler.

Approximately \$70.00 damage was done to the automobile and the steer was only slightly injured.

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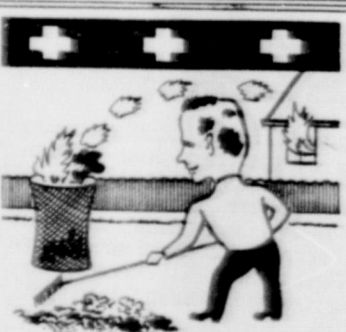

## SAFE DRIVING PROGRAM TO BE PRESENTED AT AREA SCHOOLS

Students of Kelton school will have an opportunity at 10 a.m. Friday, May 15th to see for themselves how the false impression and sense of security that a driver of a modern automobile gets, can and does, often lead into the danger zone and trouble, when they participate in a series of driving tests.

The tests, which will be in two parts, will be given under the direction of Joe Smetana, director of Safety of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department. The Wheeler county sheriff and his deputies will also be on hand for the demonstration.

The first section will be a short talk on traffic safety and the second will be the demonstration. High point of the demonstration will come when driving tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric donator which is mounted on the front bumper of the car will fire yellow paint bullets to indicate the distance required to stop the car in an emergency.

The driver being tested will be signaled to stop by the report of the first shell. The second will be fired automatically when the brake is applied and the third when the car halts. Distance between the spots of paint will then be measured to determine the reaction and braking distances.

The program will also be presented to Mobeetie students at 10:00 p.m. May 5th.

Tests will be limited to 20, 30 and 40 mile per hour speeds because of the danger in making emergency stops at higher speeds. Police officers will be used as drivers in the high speed tests.

As part of a program for safety on the highway, the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department is presenting this driving demonstration and test before the high schools of this state. The program is being brought to Kelton and Mobeetie under the sponsorship of Wheeler County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend.

## Research Center Tells Results Of Different Varieties Of Corn

"Twenty varieties of corn were planted on April 16 at the High Plains Research Foundation for the 1961 research program", announced Dr. Earl H. Collister, Chief Agronomist, today.

The varieties were planted in four-row plots, 50 feet long with four plots for each variety. The soil temperature at planting time was 57 degrees. Fertilizer applied was at the rate of 30 pounds actual nitrogen and 50 pounds actual phosphorus to the acre.

The application was made at planting time, 4 inches to the side and 4 inches below the seed.

One new variety in the Foundation's planting was Asgrow XP 1899, a dwarf, multiple-eared, hybrid corn.

The twenty varieties, including the above were Asgrow, 300, 400, 500, and 105 W; Pag 436, 485, and 10185; Steckley Genetic 15-B and 30-B; Texas 26, 28, 30 and 17-W; Texas Experiment 5803, 5925 and 6006; and Funk's G-711AA.

PAG 485 and Funk's G-711AA were the high yielding varieties in 1960, with 172 and 171 bushels per acre, respectively.

## Governor To Cooperate With Trailer Legislation

Governor Price Daniel today advised Representative Grainger McIlhenny that he would cooperate in every way possible toward enactment of farm trailer legislation which would accomplish the purpose of his original bill, H.B. 59.

"As indicated in my veto message today, the original bill by Representative McIlhenny was limited to relief for farm trailers, and the reasons for my veto applied almost entirely to additional exemptions and amendments added in the House and Senate," Daniel said.

"I have assured Representative McIlhenny that I will be glad to work with him and others interested in the original intent and purpose of his bill."
