The Wheeler Mustangs returned home to the friendly confines of Nicholson field for their 4th District Game with the White Deer Bucks. Both teams enter the contest with perfect 3-0 records in district play. With the winner taking command of the district race and possibly winning the district title outright.

The first quarter would be scoreless after a Wheeler touchdown on their first possession would be wiped out due to a penalty. The Bucks would get on the board first on a 26 yard pass completion for a TD. The extra point failed and the Bucks would lead 6-0 at the 11:44 mark in the second quarter. The Mustangs would take their next possession 67 yards in 11 plays as Caleb Finsterwald gets the last 20 yards over left guard. Bret Goad's kick is good and the Mustangs take the lead 7-6 with 7:09 in the second quarter. After a great defensive effort by the Mustang defense, the offense would mount another drive deep into Buck territory but would turn the ball over on downs with 5 ticks left on the clock before half time.

The Mustangs would take the opening kickoff of the second half and go 65 yards in 6 plays for a TD. Jake Britt gets the TD on a 3 yard run over right tackles. Chris Gallagher's 37 yard run set up the TD. The Mustangs lead would be 13-6. Finsterwald would get his second TD of the night on a 15 yard burst to cap a 15 play 80 yard drive at the 2:38 mark in the third quarter. The extra point try was blocked and the Mustangs lead would be 19-6.

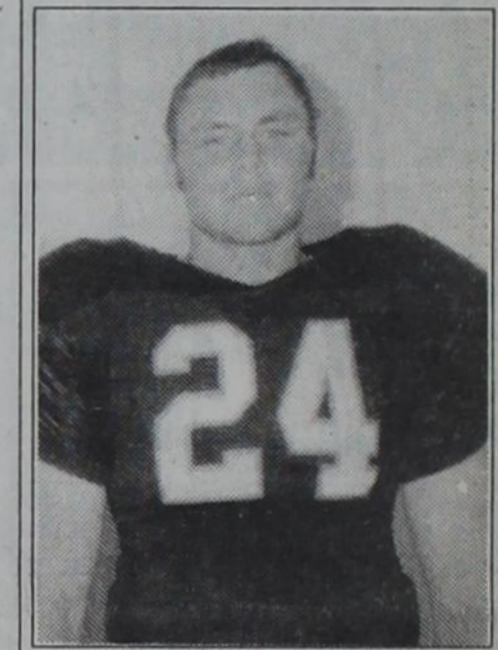
The Mustang defense would come up with a goal line stand as they stopped the Bucks as Danny Spikes would recover a lateral pass to give the Mustangs possession of the ball. The Mustangs would finish out the scoring in the fourth quarter by scoring 15 points in a span of less than one minute. Finsterwald would get his third TD of the night on a 56 yard run and James Chapman runs in the extra point try to increase the lead to 27-6. On the next Buck possession, Gavin McQueen picks off a Buck pass and returns the interception 48 yards for the TD. Goad's kick was good and the Mustangs closed out the scoring 34-6. The Mustang defense would thwart another Buck drive late in the fourth quarter as Bret Goad intercepts a Buck pass on the Mustang 10 yard line.

The Mustangs travel to Shamrock on Thursday night to wrap up the district title with game time being at 7:30.

Caleb Finsterwald Is 'Player of the Week'

Wheeler Mustang Caleb Finsterwald was named Class 1-1A "Player of the Week" by the *Amarillo Globe-News*.

The article reads: The Mustangs hammered down the District 1-1A championship with a 34-6 win against White Deer and Finsterwald had a big hand in the victory. Finsterwald rushed 22 times for 190 yards and made touchdown runs of 20, 15 and 56 yards. On defense, the senior made six unassisted tackles and knocked down a pass at the goal line.

COMMENT: "He's done a great job for us. He's a veteran of three years and last four or five weeks, he's really picked it up. He's not the fastest guy in the world and he's not going to bolt over you. He's a straight-up runner and he's not going run over you either. But he's got good size and good speed and he hits the hole hard and he's going to make yards."—Wheeler coach Jim Verden.

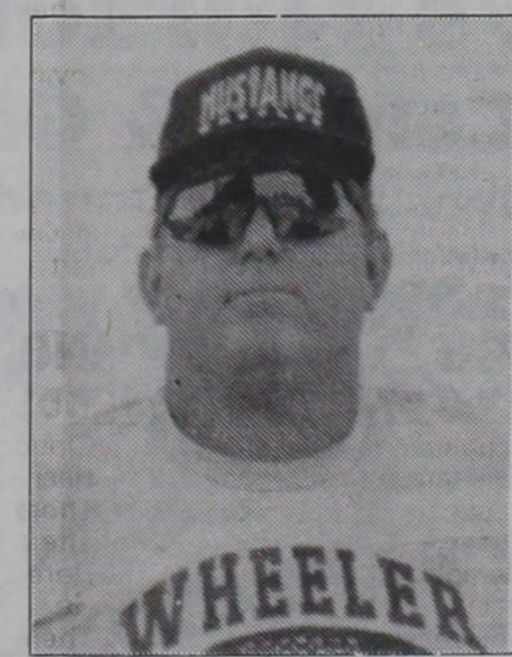

I see there were quite a few Chandlers around. I had a great-grandmother, Frances Chandler, born in

S.C. and a great-great named Nancy, born in NC.

got off our train and were told to "hit the beach!" We did and got wet, but no enemy was there. I was assigned to the *USS Zeilin* (APA-3) and we took off by Hawaii and saw what was left at Pearl Harbor. We went to the Soloman Islands and put marines on Tulagi in two battles. Many americans were killed and wounded in the Solomans between Tulagi and Guadalcanal. Sharks killed some men who tried to swim ashore from their sinking ships. Luckily, the *Zeilin* was not hit when I was aboard. We took over 450 Japanese P.O.W.s from Guadalcanal to New Zealand. I worked with them. Guadalcanal was tropical, but it was snowing at Wellington. Later I was transferred to New Caledonia to await my orders to arrive to train to be a naval officer. The *Zeilin* was in a battle after I left it and I was on New Caledonia for many months before my orders arrived. I should have gone to Notre Dame, but training had started there and I was sent to Columbia U. in New York. While training there, I met a girl, Lois Dubuar, who has been my wife for over 55 years.

As a lieutenant I was assigned to the *USS Patoka* (AO9) a tanker. We spent almost two years hauling oil off the east coast of South America from the Amazon River down to Uruguay. We saw the remains of the German battleship *Graf Spa*. Some of the dam-



aged ships at Pearl Harbor helped to sink this ship. The German captain had all of his men get off this ship, but he stayed aboard and sank with it.

The *Patoka*, the only ship ever to have had a mooring mast for dirigibles returned to America and Lois and I got married. We were together only one month before the *Patoka* was sent to Okinawa by the way of Panama Canal and Hawaii.

Out there we were in 3 typhoons which were like battles. One of our battleships lost part of it bow. A Destroyer-Escort was washed ashore and was destroyed. An air craft Carrier lost part of it flight deck. Once when I was in charge of the *Patoka* underway in a typhoon, a big wave hit our bow and washed one of my fellow officers from the bow to the stern. He could have been killed, but he was not hurt. It was just impossible to miss the big waves. In the Atlantic, typhoons are called hurricanes.

I taught school for twenty years in Texas. The G-I Bill enabled me to get a degree in Agriculture in Texas A&M. Some of my students who raised wheat made more money than I did.

After twelve years of teaching agriculture at Spearman Texas High School, Lois and I moved back to New Jersey so we could help her parents. I taught science and mathematics at Mt. Hebron Junior High at Montclair, New Jersey for twenty years before retiring. I still get a monthly pension check which is more than twice as much as my yearly pay as a Rural School Principal. Of course, things are higher today. A gallon of gasoline is I was able to give my wife, Lois, a Lottery Ticket several years ago on Mother's Day which she won but is getting about \$30,000 a year for

25 years after her winning day. I do not think I will be here when she gets her last check. If I am, I will be 103. Our children will get what Lois does not get.

I was so lucky to have met Lois Dubuar. She was her families only child. Her father had many patents relating to telephones. He worked with Bell Telephone labs. When Lois and I retired, we moved to Colorado. I attended Colorado U. of Mines one summer. We love it here. Our four children and their families live here and we see them often. They help us. Our oldest daughter moved here from New Jersey several months ago. Her husband had died. He worked for a telephone company in New Jersey. She does our driving. Lois and I are too old to drive. I am having stiffness from my knees down to a little extent, but I still walk. So does Lois with a metal walker. She had been doing our driving very good, but her doctor said she must quit driving.

I know I have said too much. My big point was my birthday in the old Wheeler jail. When my mother was County Treasurer, she helped to do the "book work" in order to get the old wooden Courthouse renewed into the nice Courthouse that is used today.

May I say "Good Luck to you folks who live in Wheeler. When I lived in Wheeler it, to me, was like a big family. If I were caught misbehaving, I might get a spanking and sent home and get another one. We had the Gunter Hotel in Wheeler for many years. My brother, Terrell, helped my mother in raising our family. He was a County Officer for a long time.

Water Quality Season Ends

By Bart Wyatt

With the last of the water quality samples picked up in Roberts County, the Water Quality Program has ended for the year. One hundred sixty-seven different sites throughout the District were scheduled for water gathering this season. Out of these several sites, only eight samples were missed due mainly to locked gates at the point of entrance or the lack of wind at windmills. Of the one hundred fifty-nine samples tested, twenty-six (16%) were high in iron. Eleven of

these samples (42%) were taken from windmills. Rusting pipes are usually the main cause of water being high in iron content. Eighteen samples (11%) were above state standards in sulfate content, while seven samples (4%) were above in chlorides. Rounding out the minerals found in various samples finds two samples (1 %) high in nitrate levels and less than 1% high in fluoride.

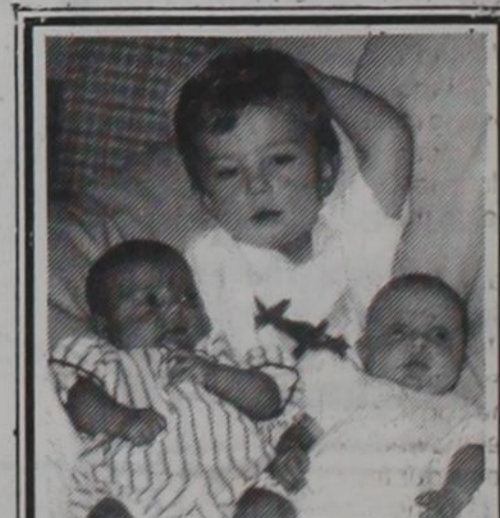

Sift one or two tablespoons powdered sugar on small cup towel. Turn cake out on the towel. Immediately remove paper carefully and roll the cake up with towel. Cool completely.

Don't think I'm not traveled. I've been to New York City. It's just the next door towns that elude me.

Allison, Texas, is a tiny town but I went there once to do a program and Allison people have big city ways.

Every year I take a car load of kids to Seiling for the Musical Festival. We pass through Leedey, Camargo, Vici and my home town, Hammon. Thanks to Seiling for giving thousands of kids a taste of music performance.

The dances at Durham offer an opportunity for the Texas—Oklahoma people to know each other. They have a "dinner on the ground" type of supper and they like each other—first name friends. It's a melting pot of people.

We know some of our neighbor towns: Sayre, Elk City, Clinton. We play ball, visit, read their papers. We know Weatherford, because it's our school.

How about Pampa, Texas? (You

fill in the towns I inadvertently omit.)
We feel as if Oklahoma City is home, but some of us barely know Amarillo although Cheyenne is halfway between Oklahoma City and Amarillo.

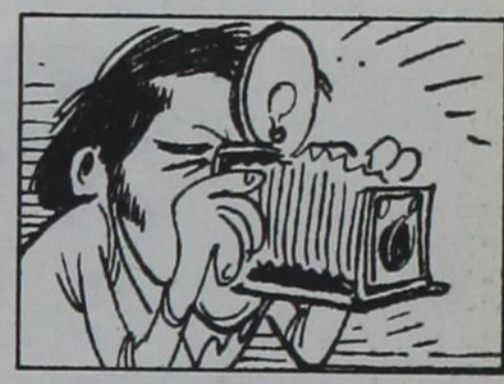
My hometown is Hammon. Once there was an "Old" Hammon (about 1910) until the railroad moved it to "New" Hammon.

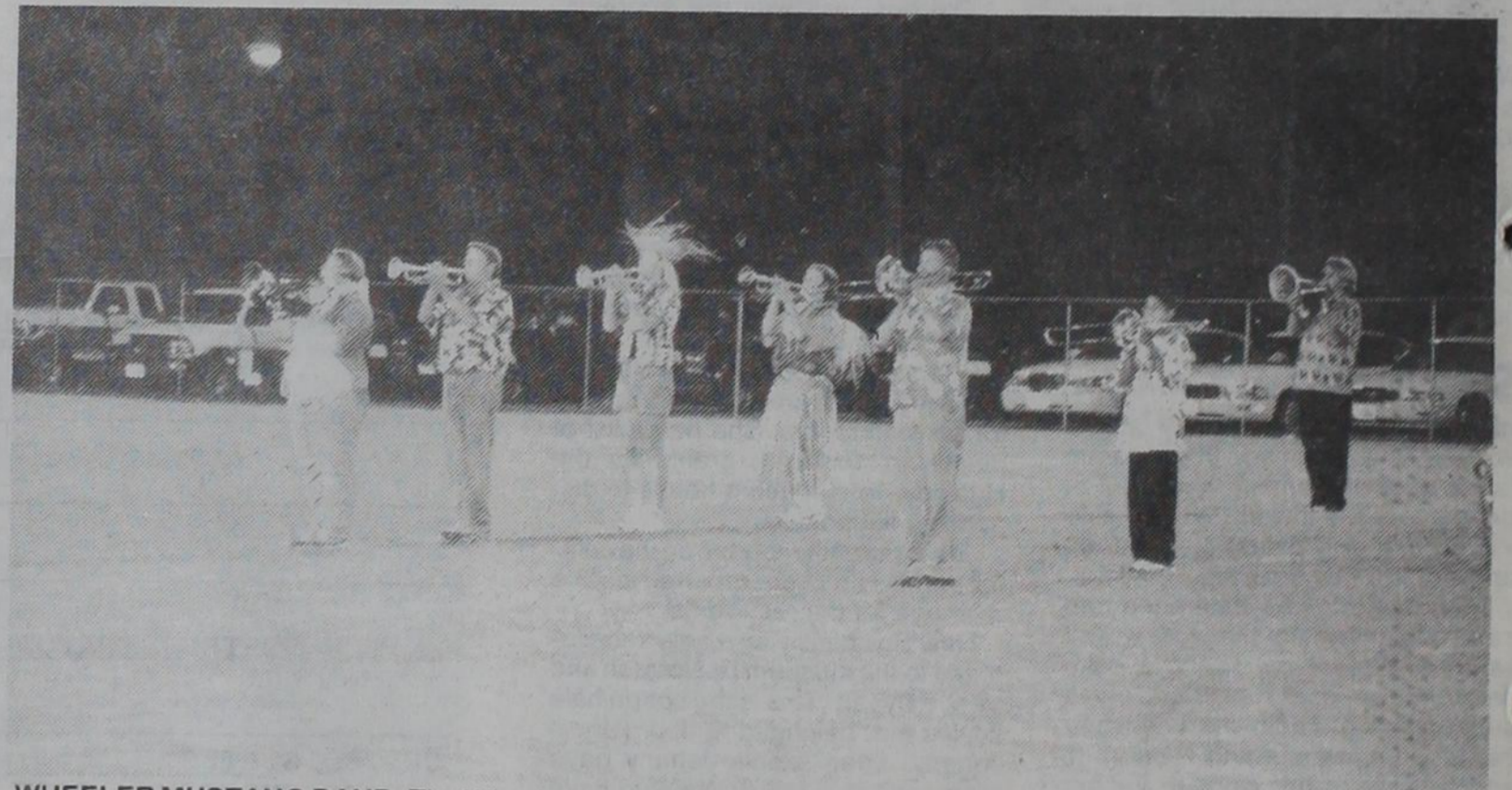
