Democrats in Wheeler as well as Dallas, Houston and even Washington were amazed at the first break in Texas Politics in 91 years.


Stunned Democratic leaders in Washington received with dismay and almost disbelief the news that John G. Tower, a Republican, had been elected United States Senator from Texas.

Not for 91 years had anyone but Democrats been elected to a statewide Texas office. Even that last victory — Morgan C. Hamilton to the Senate in 1870 — was by the legislature and not by statewide vote of the people.

For the most part Democrats withheld comment. Texans among them at first clung to the hope that there were actually more outstanding votes to be counted than were first reported.

Reports from practically every large city in Texas during the past few weeks have indicated that the ocrats have felt all along that election would be close. But Dem-Blakley would win anywhere from narrowly to decisively.

Although the Kennedy administration realized that Senator Blak-ley would vote against its legislation on most issues nevertheless it wanted him to win. It had no desire for history to write that it

President Kennedy at a press confernce let it be known he wanted Blakley to win, and confidentsaid that the people of Texas could be trusted to take care of the situation

Vice President Johnson and Speaker Sam Rayburn both endorsed Blakley and Senator Ralph Yarborough let it be known that he had cast an absentee ballot for th junior Texas Senator.

Republicans naturally were exultant. Tower's victory will be the most talked-of thing at the series of fund-raising dinners in various arts of the country this week.

Tower's swearing-in date probably will be a week or more away. College Professor Tower, is Barry Goldwater conservative who has never held public office.

CONSERVATION NEWS

Since more than half of the Wheeler Soil Conservation District is in rangeland, the Supervisors are as concerned about grassland conservation as about cropland conservation. Brush control and grass seeding are two practices well used in the district.

Many stockmen have not yet used a planned system of deferred grazing. This practice is very important if grasses are to reseed themselves. Deferrment of land sprayed for brush control is very important the year it is sprayed. Best results from spraying always come on the pastures that have the most grass. Grass will help shade out sprouts and use the moisture that would otherwise go to the sprouts.

Deferred grazing should be planned according to the grasses wanted on the pasture. The best grasses should be allowed to seed. Using the pasture after the seed has matured will give about as much grazing as it would have made by yearlong grazing and will allow the grass to improve.

In some cases, additional fencing or water is needed to allow resting pastures. Cost-sharing program have these practises. The Soil Conservation Service person nel in the district will be glad to help you plan these programs.


