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Legislature goes in final stretch of the regular session with the possibility of a final session.

Among provisions of the proposed bill is one that would cause a driver to lose his license convicted of two moving traffic violations within a year and he did not carry insurance.

Redistricting Approved — Despite disappointments & conflicts a legislative redistricting bill has passed both House and Senate.

Sen. J. P. Fuller carried on a nine-hour filibuster against the Senate portion of the bill. Fuller protested that Jefferson County (Beaumont-Port Arthur) has more than enough population to be a one-county district. In a bill Jefferson County is placed in a district with Orange County, as before.

Rep. Will Ehrle of Childress, who is placed in the same district with veteran Rep. Bill Healy of Paducah, has announced that he has given up the idea of running for speaker next term.

Club Regulation Passed — A bill to license and regulate private clubs serving liquor by the drink gained final House passage.

Rep. Tom James of Dallas, sponsor, declared it was a law enforcement measure needed by the Liquor Control Board in order to halt saloons operating in the guise of private clubs. Opponents declared it would legalize liquor by the drink.

Under the bill, clubs would pay annual license fees ranging from \$500 to \$10,000. James noted it would bring in some \$2,500,000 a year.

"Sit-ins" are target — A bill aimed at outlawing "sit-ins" and "stand-ins" has received preliminary House approval.

Rep. Lloyd Martin of Norman is author of the bill. It would provide a fine of \$200 for persons who refuse to leave a business establishment after being asked to do so.

Tax Refund Ordered — State must return to several Dallas liquor stores \$89,246 in liquor taxes paid under protest, says the State Supreme Court.

These are taxes paid by the stores on liquor in stock before the effective date of an increased tax passed by the Legislature in 1959.

DPS Exams Announced — Young men between 21 and 35 may make application through June 9 to attend the next school for state highway patrolmen. Department of public safety has announced that men meeting the patrol's standards will take exams in several cities June 13, 14 and 15. Prospective applicants may write to the Department of Public Safety at Austin for information.

Flood of Bills — With the clock running out on this session, a large volume of bills is being moved at a swifter pace. Riding in the flood are bills that would:

1. Take the University of Houston into a state-supported college system. Bill finally passed the Senate after nearly a month of delays, but must be passed again in the House.
2. Provide up to \$12 a month for medical, hospital and nursing care for persons on the state welfare rolls. Passed by Senate.
3. Recodify the school laws and cut number of hours future teachers must spend in courses on how to teach. Passed by the House.
4. Allow for payment of state aid to school districts on the basis of the present year attendance rather than the previous year's. Passed by the Senate.
5. Outlaw sale of obscene pictures, books, magazines or phonograph records. Passed by House. Penalty for violation would be a fine up to \$2,500, a prison term up to two years or both.
6. Increase the annual barber's license fee from \$5 to \$10 and set up higher requirements for barber colleges. Passed by House.
7. Allow the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited lands to persons other than veterans. This is a constitutional amendment and would have to be voted on by the people. Sponsors said the measure was aimed at providing a way for the state to get back money involved in the "land scandals." Passed by Senate.
8. Require registration of pest extermination services with the State Agriculture Commissioner. Given preliminary Senate passage.
9. Reorganize the State Water Board as the Texas Water Commission with a three-man board for policy making and a chief engineer to administer the department. Passed by the House.
10. Set filing fees for candidates for state office in general or special elections at 5 per cent of a year's salary. Passed by House.
11. Require cities whose firemen are in the state pension plan to contribute more to the pension fund. Given preliminary House passage.

Camp Kiowa '61 Havc Record Season

On the basis of early reservations, a record season was predicted today by Hollis W. Alford of Pampa, camp director of Camp Kiowa operated by the Adobe Walls Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The camping program will open June 4 after a week's staff training period. At Camp Kiowa, fifteen miles east of Canadian, there will be eight camping periods conducted for Boy Scouts 11 years and older.

Many troops will camp under their own leadership at a fee of \$14.00 for each Scout per period. Scouts may register and deposit a \$2.00 fee with their scout masters. This summer it is anticipated that 950 boys will enjoy camping at Camp Kiowa. Last year there were 710 campers.

Communities throughout America recognize the importance of providing camping facilities and programs. The nation has 829 local Council-conducted Scout camps. They represent an investment of over 80 and a half million dollars to provide camping facilities.

Camping plays a vital part in a Scout's training. Here in a Scout setting with their own troop leadership, boys grow in body, mind, and spirit. Camping provides adventure. Boys acquire new interests and skills, develop resourcefulness and become better prepared for the exciting years ahead.

It follows:

"As an American I will do my best to:

"Be clean in my outdoor manners. I will treat the outdoors as a heritage to be improved for our greater enjoyment. I will keep my trash and garbage out of America's water, fields, woods, and roadways.

"Be careful with fire. I will prevent wild fire. I will build my fire in a safe place, and be sure it is out before I leave.

"Be considerate in the outdoors. I will treat public and private property with respect. I will remember that use of the outdoors is a privilege I can lose by abuse.

"Be conservation-minded. I will learn how to practice good conservation of soil, waters, forests, minerals, grasslands, and wildlife; and I will urge others to do the same. I will use sportsmanship method in all my outdoor activities."

USDA REPORT

The United States Department of Agriculture in a May 10 release reports that Texas farmers expect to harvest 3,875,000 acres of wheat in 1961. Yield per harvested acre is placed at 22 bushels, with a production of 85,250,000 bushels.

Only the bumper wheat crop of 1947 and 1949 exceed this forecast. Yield of 22 bushels per acre equals 1958 and is second to the record high yield of 22.5 set in 1960. Heavy greenbug infestations developed in the central high plains, but extensive spraying held down losses. Wheat needs rain in most areas.

The couple plans to make their home in Shamrock following the wedding.

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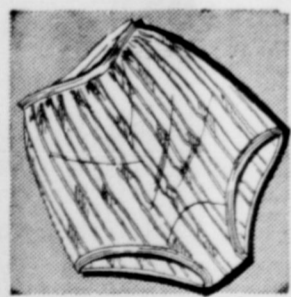

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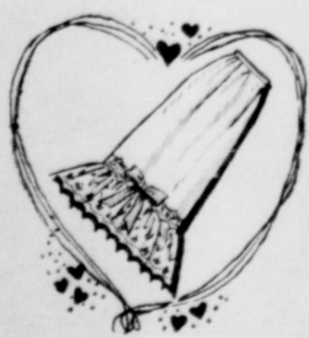

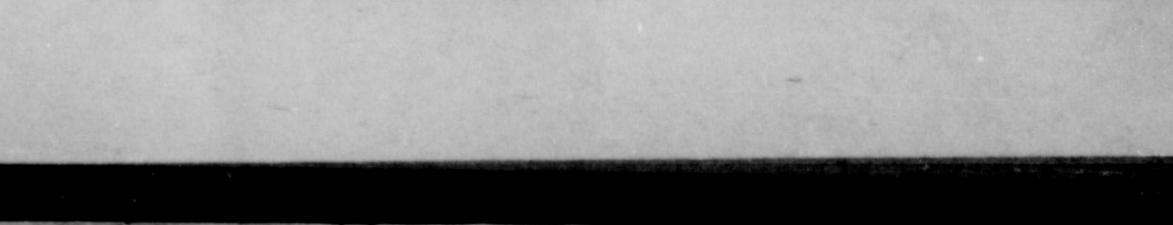

CONSERVATION NEWS

Since more than half of the Wheeler Soil Conservation District is in rangeland, the Supervisors are as concerned about grassland conservation as about cropland conservation. Brush control and grass seeding are two practices well used in the district.

Many stockmen have not yet used a planned system of deferred grazing. This practice is very important if grasses are to reseed themselves. Deferment of land sprayed for brush control is very important the year it is sprayed. Best results from spraying always come on the pastures that have the most grass. Grass will help shade out sprouts and use the moisture that would otherwise go to the sprouts.

Deferred grazing should be planned according to the grasses wanted on the pasture. The best grasses should be allowed to seed. Using the pasture after the seed has matured will give about as much grazing as it would have made by yearlong grazing and will allow the grass to improve.

In some cases, additional fencing or water is needed to allow resting pastures. Cost-sharing program have these practices. The Soil Conservation Service personnel in the district will be glad to help you plan these programs.

Can you think of a place that equals Wheeler County with the variety of game animals, birds, and fish? The biologist say Wheeler County is one of the best wildlife areas in Texas. We have deer, turkey, quail, dove, rabbits, squirrel, fish, prairie chickens, duck, and many kinds of fur bearing animals and rodents. The sad part is that we are not taking care of our wildlife properly.

Nearly every person that has lived in Wheeler County 25 or 30 years can remember having more birds and animals to hunt. Creeks used to have more swimming holes and fish. That was when there was more food and protection for wildlife. That was before the fields had washed into the creeks.

The Wheeler Soil Conservation District supervisors, in cooperation with the federal and state wildlife biologists and Extension Service, are making an effort to restore our natural conditions for wildlife in this part of the state. The dams on Gageby Creek, many ponds, and terraces will prevent silting of streams below the dams. Fishing and duck hunting should improve on Gageby Creek.

Wildlife protection plantings are the two main needs to preserve our wildlife protection plantings are the two main needs to preserve our wild animals and birds. Landowners should leave grain sorghums and small grain that border creeks and pastures. The use of fruit bearing plants such as plums, persimmons, locust and berries in tree rows near water will encourage wildlife.

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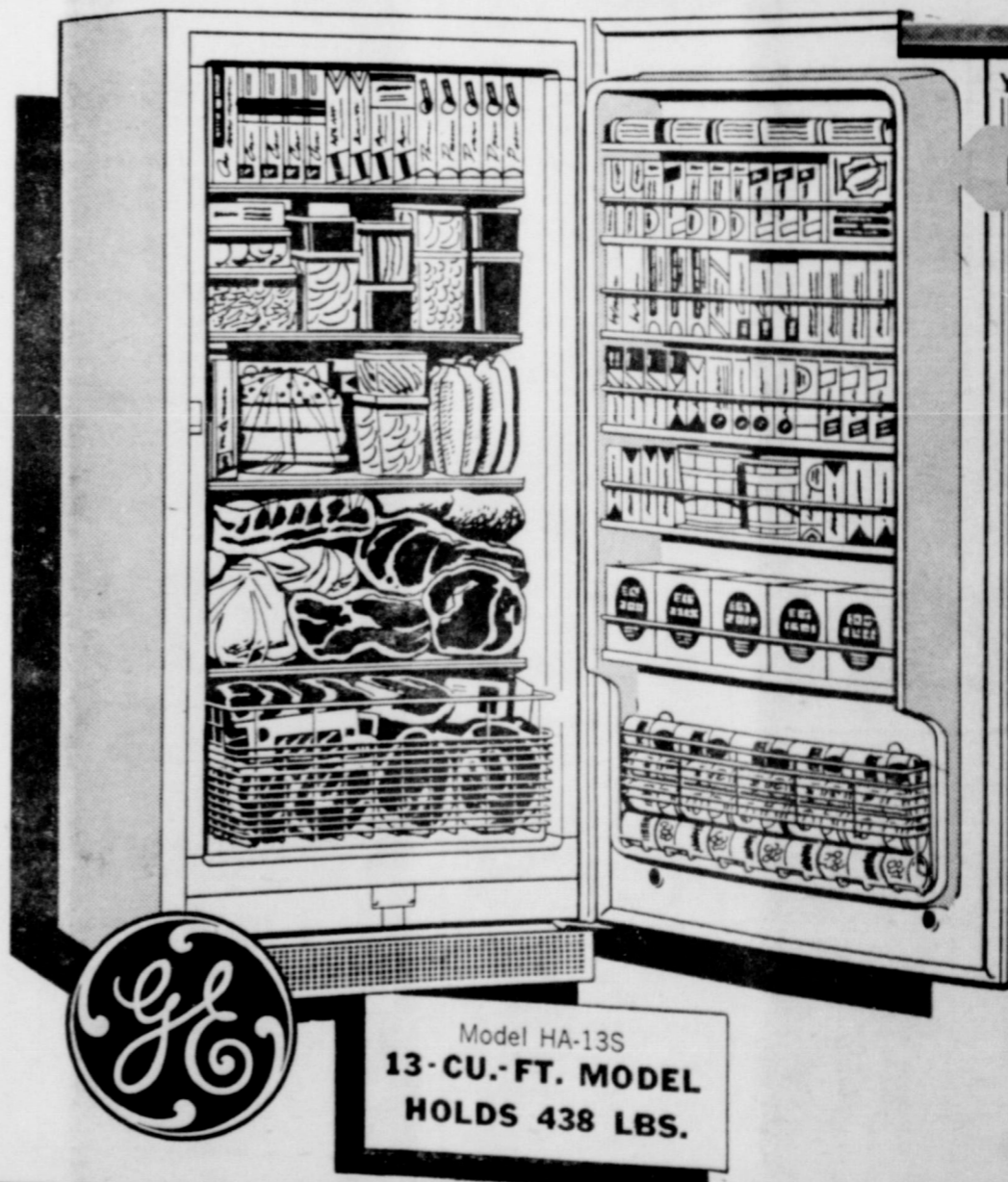
